A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that persons who have 2 been diagnosed with autism or fetal alcohol spectrum disorder in 3 Hawaii face difficult and profound challenges and a present 4 system of care that can be complicated to navigate. Other 5 states, such as Minnesota and Virginia, have made dedicated 6 efforts to make the coverage of medicaid services accessible to 7 persons with autism or fetal alcohol spectrum disorder. The 8 legislature finds that Hawaii needs to make a similar effort to 9 minimize the burdens that persons with autism or fetal alcohol 10 spectrum disorder experience in the navigation, access, and 11 coverage of medicaid services.

12 The purpose of this Act is to establish a joint task force 13 with department of health's behavioral health administration and 14 department of human services' med-QUEST division to review 15 policy issues and opportunities relating to the navigation, 16 access, and coverage of medicaid services by persons with autism 17 or fetal alcohol spectrum disorder.

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1	SECT	ION 2. This Act shall be known and may be cited as
2	"Ann and	Kelii's Law".
3	SECT	ION 3. (a) There is established jointly within the
4	departmen	t of health's behavioral health services administration
5	and the department of human services' med-QUEST division a task	
6	force to review policy issues and opportunities relating to the	
7	navigatio	n, access, and coverage of medicaid services by persons
8	with auti	sm or fetal alcohol spectrum disorder. The members of
9	the task	force shall consist of:
10	(1)	A representative from the department of health's
11		behavioral health services administration;
12	(2)	A representative from the department of health's
13		developmental disabilities division;
14	(3)	A representative from the department of human
15		services;
16	(4)	A representative from the department of human
17		services' med-QUEST division;
18	(5)	A representative from the department of health's state
19		council on developmental disabilities;
20	(6)	At least one representative from a med-QUEST health
21		plan;

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1	(7)	A member to be selected by the chair of the house
2		standing committee with the primary purview over human
3		services;
4	(8)	A member to be selected by the chair of the house
5		standing committee with the primary purview over
6		health and homelessness;
7	(9)	Two members to be selected by the chair of the senate
8		standing committee with the primary purview over
9		health and human services;
10	(10)	At least one member of a developmental or intellectual
11		disability advocacy group;
12	(11)	Two parent-advocates to be selected by the speaker of
13		the house of representatives;
14	(12)	Two parent-advocates to be selected by the president
15		of the senate; and
16	(13)	Any additional representatives from state agencies,
17		stakeholders, advocates, parent-advocates, or other
18		individuals, as deemed necessary by the other members
19		of the task force.
20	(b)	The task force shall conduct a study and submit a
21	report of	its findings and recommendations to the legislature no

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1	later than	n twenty days prior to the convening of the regular
2	session o	f 2024. The study shall include:
3	(1)	Identification of all populations and sub-populations
4		with autism or fetal alcohol spectrum disorder that
5		currently, or may in the future, experience burdens in
6		the navigation, access, and coverage of medicaid
7		services;
8	(2)	Recommendations for potential changes to medicaid
9		policies and rules that may increase access to home
10		and community-based services and other medicaid
11		services by improving navigation, existing service
12		delivery, coverage, and access;
13	(3)	Screening tools for autism or fetal alcohol spectrum
14		disorder, considering relevant guidelines, including
15		guidelines developed in other countries such as for
16		the Canada Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder Research
17		Network titled, Fetal alcohol spectrum disorder: a
18		guideline for diagnosis across the lifespan (February
19		2016), as published in the Canadian Medical
20		Association Journal;

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1	(4)	Recommendations for ways to improve support services
2		as part of the medicaid state plan for persons who
3		have been diagnosed with autism or fetal alcohol
4		spectrum disorder; and
5	(5)	Recommendations for potential legislation, if
6		necessary.
7	(c)	The task force shall also conduct an analysis and make
8	a recomme	ndation on whether a waiver, a waiver amendment, or any
9	other nec	essary policy approval from the Centers for Medicare
10	and Medicaid Services may be necessary to ensure the following	
11	services	are accessible to persons with autism or fetal alcohol
12	spectrum disorder:	
13	(1)	Assistive technology;
14	(2)	Career planning, including vocational assessment and
15		job placement services;
16	(3)	Community transition services;
17	(4)	Day habilitation;
18	(5)	Family support;
19	(6)	Home modifications;
20	(7)	Nutritional consultation;
21	(8)	Residential habilitation;

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1	(9)	Respite care;
2	(10)	Specialized skill development, including behavioral
3		specialist, community support, and systematic skill
4		building services;
5	(11)	Supported employment, including extended employment
6		supports and intensive job coaching;
7	(12)	Temporary supplemental services;
8	(13)	Therapeutic care;
9	(14)	Transitional work services;
10	(15)	Vehicle modifications; and
11	(16)	Supportive housing.
12	(d)	Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, any
13	waiver, waiver amendment, or any other necessary policy approval	
14	from the	Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services recommended
15	by the ta	sk force pursuant to this section shall comply with the
16	applicabl	e federal requirements related to utilization,
17	coverage,	and reimbursement for services provided to persons who
18	have been	diagnosed with autism or fetal alcohol spectrum
19	disorder,	including any federally mandated level of care or
20	needs-bas	ed criteria requirements.

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(e) The members of the task force shall serve without
 compensation, but shall be reimbursed for necessary expenses,
 including travel expenses, incurred for service on the task
 force.

5 (f) The task force shall convene no later than thirty days6 after the effective date of this Act.

7 (g) The task force shall serve until it has accomplished
8 the objectives of this Act or twenty days prior to the convening
9 of the regular session of 2024, whichever occurs first.

10 (h) As used in this section, unless the context clearly11 requires otherwise:

12 "Autism" means autism spectrum disorder, which is a 13 neurodevelopmental disorder, as defined by the most recent 14 edition of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental 15 Disorders.

16 "Therapeutic care" means services provided by licensed 17 speech pathologists, licensed occupational therapists, licensed 18 social workers, licensed clinical social workers, or licensed 19 physical therapists.

20 SECTION 4. (a) The department of human services shall
21 seek a waiver, a waiver amendment, or any other necessary policy

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1 approval from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services
2 that may be necessary to provide home and community-based
3 services or other medicaid services for medicaid-eligible
4 individuals who have been diagnosed with autism or fetal alcohol
5 spectrum disorder, if recommended by the task force pursuant to
6 section 3(c) and pursuant to an appropriation pursuant to
7 paragraph (b).

8 If the task force recommends a waiver, waiver (b) 9 amendment, or any other necessary policy approval that requires 10 additional medicaid expenditures to implement, then an 11 appropriation shall be sought from the legislature that is 12 sufficient to cover the state portion of increased medicaid 13 expenditures arising from the waiver, waiver amendment, or any 14 other necessary policy approval. Any waiver, waiver amendment, 15 or other necessary policy approval shall not be implemented 16 without an appropriation.

SECTION 5. The provision of home and community-based services and other medicaid services for individuals diagnosed with autism or fetal alcohol spectrum disorder as required by this Act shall apply to all plans issued under medicaid managed care and fee-for-service programs in the State.

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1 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 3 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 for 4 the department of human services to procure consultant technical 5 assistance to write medicaid waivers and develop an estimated 6 budget for any recommended service and benefit coverage 7 expansions proposed by the task force established by section 3 of this Act. 8 9 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 10 of human services for the purposes of this Act. 11 SECTION 7. If any provision of this Act, or the 12 application thereof to any person or circumstance, is held 13 invalid by state or federal law, the invalidity does not affect 14 other provisions or applications of the Act that can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this 15 16 end the provisions of this Act are severable.

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SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect on June 30, 3000;
 provided that section 5 shall take effect upon approval by the
 Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services of any waiver, waiver
 amendment, or necessary policy change submitted pursuant to
 section 4 of this Act.
