A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FOOD SUSTAINABILITY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that there is a growing 2 consensus across scientific disciplines that seafood, including 3 fish and all other animal products harvested from aquatic 4 systems, plays a crucial role in food and nutrition security. 5 The legislature also finds that the total annual value of the State's nearshore coral reef-associated fisheries is estimated 6 7 to be between \$10,300,000 and \$16,400,000, with the majority of 8 the value being associated with non-commercial fishing, which 9 amounts to more than 7,000,000 meals per year. The legislature 10 finds however, that the wild seafood system has fallen short of 11 its full potential to enhance food and nutrition security for 12 those most in need because the traditional framing of aquatic 13 animals as a natural resource emphasizes economic development 14 and biodiversity conservation objectives, and the discussions of 15 food and nutrition security and aquatic animals have been 16 disconnected from one another.

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The purpose of this Act is to require the state agriculture
 functional plan to include additional agricultural economic
 updates, including updates on aquaculture, that expand the
 State's priority on food by including freshwater and saltwater
 aquatic organisms as a viable food source.

6 SECTION 2. (a) Pursuant to section 226-55, Hawaii Revised 7 Statutes, the department of agriculture, in coordination with 8 the office of planning and sustainable development, shall 9 prepare and periodically update the state agriculture functional 10 plan to include other agricultural economic updates, including 11 updates on aquaculture, that expand the State's priority on food 12 by including freshwater and saltwater aquatic organisms as a 13 viable food source.

14 (b) As part of the updated state agriculture functional 15 plan, which shall include aquaculture among other agricultural 16 economic updates, the department of agriculture and the office 17 of planning and sustainable development may:

18 (1) Establish objectives, policies, and actions related to
19 aquaculture;

20 (2) Research the agricultural and economic impact that
21 freshwater and saltwater aquatic organisms have on



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food self-sufficiency in the State, including its 1 2 influence on: Non-commercial consumption, such as community 3 (A) sharing and fisher household consumption; and 4 5 (B) Exports; Collect data on the wholesale and retail sales of (3) 6 7 freshwater and saltwater aquatic organisms in the State: 8 Classify and regulate freshwater and saltwater aquatic 9 (4) organisms as a food commodity in the State; and 10 11 (5) Incorporate aquaculture into the state agriculture 12 functional plan related to increased food security and 13 food self-sufficiency. 14 The governor shall submit the updated state (c) 15 agriculture functional plan pursuant to section 226-56, Hawaii 16 Revised Statutes, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 17 18 the regular session of 2026.

19 (d) For the purposes of this section, "freshwater and
20 saltwater aquatic organism" means naturally born or hatchery21 raised fish and shellfish harvested in the wild through

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- 1 commercial, recreational, or subsistence fishing but excludes
- 2 net-pen aquacultural or other farm-raised fish.
- **3** SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
