A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TELEPHONE SERVICES FOR COMMITTED PERSONS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the department of 1 2 public safety contracts with a private telecommunication service 3 provider to provide telephone services to committed persons. 4 The private service provider's arrangement with the department 5 includes commission payments to the department based on revenues 6 generated by telephone usage by committed persons. During a five-year period starting in February 2010, the department 7 8 received almost \$500,000 in commission payments.

9 The legislature further finds that communication between 10 committed persons and their families is an important factor in 11 reducing recidivism. At present, the cost of a fifteen-minute 12 call from a committed person can be as much as \$13.30. This 13 cost is borne by the families of committed persons, who often 14 live in conditions of financial hardship. Over time, the high cost of phone calls can make contact between committed persons 15 16 and their families unaffordable.

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1	The legislature also finds that if the commission payments		
2	were eliminated, the cost of phone calls between committed		
3	persons and their families could be reduced. Recent rulemaking		
4	by the Federal Communications Commission discourages commission		
5	payments from service providers to state agencies that operate		
6	correctional facilities and caps the rate for local and in-state		
7	calls from state and federal prisons to eleven cents per minute.		
8	The purpose of this Act is to:		
9	(1) Restrict the department of public safety from		
10	receiving commission payments from telephone calls		
11	made by committed persons; and		
12	(2) Prohibit the department of public safety from entering		
13	into or renewing any contract with any privately owned		
14	prison telephone communications provider.		
15	SECTION 2. Chapter 353, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
16	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated		
17	and to read as follows:		
18	"§353- Committed person telephone calls; site		
19	commissions restricted. (a) Notwithstanding any other law to		
20	the contrary, the department shall not receive site commissions.		



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1	(b)	The department shall develop internal policies and	
2	procedure	es consistent with this section.	
3	(c)	For the purposes of this section:	
4	"Cal	ling services" means a service that allows committed	
5	persons t	o make calls to individuals outside the correctional	
6	facility	where the committed person is being held, regardless of	
7	the techn	ology used to deliver the service.	
8	<u>"Sit</u>	e commission" means any form of monetary payment,	
9	in-kind payment, gift, exchange of services or goods, fee,		
10	technolog	y allowance, or product that a provider of calling	
11	services	or affiliate of a provider of calling services may pay,	
12	give, don	ate, or otherwise provide to:	
13	(1)	An entity that operates a correctional facility;	
14	(2)	An entity with which the provider of calling services	
15		enters into an agreement to provide calling services;	
16	(3)	A governmental agency that oversees a correctional	
17		facility;	
18	(4)	The State or county in which a correctional facility	
19		is located; or	
20	(5)	An agent of any correctional facility."	

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SECTION 3. The department of public safety shall not enter 1 into or renew any contract with any privately owned prison 2 telephone communication provider. 3 SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored. 4 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval. 5 6 Cen
