A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FOOD SECURITY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that accessing fresh, 2 diverse, nutritious, healthy food on a weekly basis is a significant challenge for many individuals and families in the 3 4 State. According to Feeding America, a nonprofit network of 5 over two hundred food banks nationwide, there has been a fifty-6 one per cent increase in the number of families experiencing 7 food insecurity in the State since 2019. A 2021 study by the 8 University of Hawaii found that forty-eight per cent of Hawaii's 9 families with children report food insecurity. Hawaii Foodbank also reported that, in 2021, one out of every four children in 10 11 the State were at risk of going hungry. It is estimated that 12 more than eighty thousand children in the State will struggle 13 with hunger this year.

14 Providing weekly access to healthy food also is critical to 15 the disabled, kupuna (elderly), ALICE (Asset Limited, Income 16 Constrained, Employed), and veteran populations who are impacted 17 by food insecurity. Access to healthy food options on a weekly



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basis also will improve the health of the State's population
that is impacted by heart disease and diabetes.

The legislature further finds that food insecurity levels 3 remain elevated after the coronavirus disease 2019 pandemic 4 5 period. Food pantries and food banks provide a safety net for local families facing ongoing food insecurity caused by natural 6 disasters, economic pressures, inflation, or the high cost of 7 living in the State. According to Feeding Hawai'i Together, dba 8 9 The Pantry by Feeding Hawaii Together (The Pantry), the only 10 free e-commerce food pantry and the only year-round food distribution site in the State, the frequent distribution of 11 12 food ensures that those who are food insecure do not go hungry. Nonprofit food distributors, such as The Pantry are funded 13 14 through donations, purchases, and federal programs. However, food purchasing costs have increased twenty-five per cent in the 15 past three years, exacerbating an already existing structural 16 17 issue of food insecurity in the State's most vulnerable 18 populations. As food costs have increased for individuals and 19 families, food pantries and food banks have also experienced 20 such increases, along with growing demand and supply chain 21 issues.



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Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to appropriate
funds to contract with service providers for the purchase,
storage, and operational costs of food distribution to Hawaii
families.

5 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general 6 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 7 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and 8 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 9 year 2024-2025 to contract with service providers for the 10 purchase, storage, and operational costs of food of food 11 distribution in the State; provided that a maximum of fifteen 12 per cent of the total sum may be expended on administrative 13 costs.

14 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the office of 15 community services for the purposes of this Act.

16 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2023.
