A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY'S 'OLELO HAWAI'I INITIATIVES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that article XV, section 4, of the Hawaii State Constitution affirms that English and 2 3 'Ōlelo Hawai'i (Hawaiian language) shall be the official 4 languages of the State. The legislature also finds that the Constitution provides for the preservation and promotion of 5 native Hawaiian culture, history, and language in various 6 7 provisions including article X, section 4, which states, "The State shall promote the study of Hawaiian culture, history and 8 9 language."

The legislature further finds that the judiciary has 10 already taken initial steps to explore ways of providing 'Olelo 11 Hawai'i resources, interpreter, and translation services to the 12 public. To advance this work, in 2015, the legislature adopted 13 a concurrent resolution, H.C.R. No. 217, Session Laws of Hawaii 14 2015, that requested the judiciary to convene a task force to 15 examine and report on establishing 'Olelo Hawai'i resources for 16 17 the judiciary. The task force report made several findings



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1 including that 'Olelo Hawai'i "possesses appropriate specificity, 2 sophistication, and technical breadth of terminology to 3 accurately translate legal terminology from English into 'Olelo 4 Hawai'i." Additionally, according to the U.S. Census Bureau's 5 2009-2013 American Community Survey Five-Year Estimates, 'Ōlelo 6 Hawai'i ranks number five in languages other than English spoken at home in the State. Further, the task force found that as an 7 8 independent branch of government, the judiciary could 9 effectively serve as a focused model to demonstrate the use of 10 'Ōlelo Hawai'i.

While the judiciary has continued its efforts to make resources and services available in 'Ōlelo Hawai'i, it is time for more attention and funding to move these efforts forward. The task force report made several recommendations and identified projects that can serve as a guide to the judiciary.

16 The legislature notes that this Act should not be viewed as 17 groundbreaking. Other countries that recognize more than one 18 official language provide access to government services and 19 documents in all official languages, and the United Nations 20 operates in six official languages.

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The purpose of this Act is to support the judiciary's 'Ōlelo
 Hawai'i initiatives. It is not the legislature's intent that the
 requested funds supplant the judiciary's existing funding or
 budget requests.

5 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general 6 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$300,000 or so much 7 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and the 8 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 9 2024-2025 to support the judiciary's 'Ōlelo Hawai'i projects as 10 follows:

11 (1) \$100,000 for a program coordinator; and

12 (2) \$200,000 for implementation, including translation
13 services, website upgrades, preparation of materials,
14 and educational efforts.

15 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the judiciary16 for the purposes of this Act.

17 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2023.
