SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE AUDITOR TO CONDUCT A PROGRAM AUDIT OF THE STATE'S CHILD PROTECTIVE SERVICES SYSTEM.

WHEREAS, ensuring the wellbeing, safety, and stability of 1 Hawaii's children and families is a top priority for the State; 2 and 3 4 WHEREAS, numerous state and county agencies are involved in 5 the State's child protective services system, including the 6 7 Department of Human Services, Department of the Attorney General, Judiciary, and county police departments; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, the Department of Human Services' most recent report on child abuse and neglect, published in 2021, found that 11 more than ten thousand cases of child abuse were reported in the 12 State between 2017 and 2021; and 13 14 WHEREAS, recent high-profile cases of child abuse and child 15 murder in Hawaii have suggested that the victims were failed by 16 the State's child protective services system; and 17 18 WHEREAS, a comprehensive assessment is needed to determine 19 how the State's child protective services system can be 20 21 improved; and 22 WHEREAS, Article VII, Section 10 of the Hawaii State 23 Constitution and section 23-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, task the 24 Auditor with carrying out program and performance audits of 25 26 government agencies; and 27 WHEREAS, the Auditor has carried out previous performance 28 29 audits and follow-up audits of the State's child protective 30 services and child welfare services systems; now, therefore, 31 32 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2024, 33 34 that the Auditor is requested to conduct a program audit of the State's child protective services system, including child 35 protection roles in the Department of the Attorney General, 36



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Department of Human Services, family courts, and county police 1 departments; and 2 3 4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, for purposes of the audit, the Auditor is requested to consult with the National Conference of 5 State Legislatures Child Protection Reform Project, National 6 Resource Center of Child Maltreatment, or other national 7 entities with child welfare expertise; and 8 9 10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is also requested to consult with parents, foster parents, healthcare providers, 11 educators, and other stakeholders; and 12 13 14 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the audit is requested to address: 15 16 (1)Whether effective communication exists among the 17 various agencies involved in child protective 18 -19 services; 20 Whether agency staff receive adequate training on 21 (2) 22 identifying child abuse and neglect; 23 24 (3) Whether each agency has a manageable caseload; 25 (4) The adequacy of each agency's child protection 26 resources; and 27 28 (5) The effectiveness and efficiency of decision-making 29 processes in the child protective services system, 30 including decisions related to: 31 32 33 (A) Screening; 34 35 (B) Case selection; 36 (C) Child safety, including methods to keep a 37 maltreated child safe and the conditions under 38 39 which the child should be placed outside the 40 home: 41 (D) Reunification of the child and family; and 42



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1 (E) The termination of child protective services 2 involvement; and 3 4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the audit is requested to 5 include a review of recent cases of recurring child abuse and 6 neglect; and 7 8 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to 9 provide specific recommendations to guide any necessary reforms 10 to the State's child protective services system; and 11 12 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to submit all findings and recommendations to the Legislature no 14 later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular 15 Session of 2025; and 16 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 18 19 Resolution be transmitted to the Auditor, Attorney General, 20 Director of Human Services, Administrative Directors of the 21 First through Fifth Circuit Courts, and Chief of each county 22 police department.
