In consideration of GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE 770 SUBMITTING FOR CONSIDERATION AND CONFIRMATION TO THE COMMISSION ON WATER RESOURCE MANAGEMENT, GUBERNATORIAL NOMINEE, HANNAH KIHALANI SPRINGER, FOR A TERM TO EXPIRE JUNE 30, 2028

The Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) strongly supports the Governor's appointment of Ms. Hannah Kihalani Springer to serve on the Commission on Water Resource Management (Commission) for a term to expire June 30, 2028.

The Commission is required under Section 174C-7, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, to select commissioners through an open, competitive process. A nominating committee—composed of two members selected by the Governor, one by the Senate President, and one by the Speaker of the House—reviews the applications of candidates, conducts interviews, and submits to the Governor the names of at least three individuals for consideration for each open seat on the Commission.

By law, each nominee must have "substantial experience in the area of water resource management." Additionally, the State Water Code requires that at least one commissioner—commonly referred to as the loea—possess "substantial experience or expertise in traditional Hawaiian water resource management techniques and in traditional Hawaiian riparian usage such as those preserved by section 174C-101 [of the State Water Code]." Governor Josh Green, M.D., has selected Ms. Hannah Kihalani Springer to fill this critical loea seat on the Commission.

Ms. Springer is highly qualified for this appointment, bringing to the Commission an extraordinary record of public service, community advocacy, and steadfast dedication to environmental and cultural stewardship. A kamaʿāina of Kaʿūpūlehu in North Kona, Ms. Springer has deep ancestral and generational ties to the lands and waters of Hawaiʿi Island. She has long served as a respected voice in

As the loea Water Commissioner, she will ensure that indigenous knowledge systems are not only represented but meaningfully engaged in shaping water policies. Ms. Springer's ability to elevate and articulate the 'ike of place-based communities—particularly those whose relationships to water resources are defined by cultural, spiritual, and subsistence practices—will significantly strengthen the Commission's work.

We look forward to her leadership as a cultural expert whose life and work exemplify a profound commitment to kuleana. Her insight and guidance will provide a vital lens through which to understand and respond to the complex and interdependent challenges facing Hawai'i's water resources today.

Aloha Chair Inouye, Vice Chair Elefante, and members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in **strong support** of GM 770, the nomination of Hannah Springer to the Commission on Water Resource Management (CWRM). Hannah Kihalani Springer has been nominated to fill the "loea" seat, the member of CWRM who "shall have substantial experience or expertise in traditional Hawaiian water resource management techniques and in traditional Hawaiian riparian usage such as those preserved by section 174C-101." (HRS §174C-7(b)).

DHHL notes that the loea seat was not an original inclusion in our state Water Code, but resulted from an amendment that itself was responding to repeated decisions by CWRM where staff and Commissioners did not affirmatively protect Native Hawaiian water rights, including the native Hawaiian water rights protected under the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act. As DHHL continues its efforts to build homesteads on its lands where competition for water is significant, the importance of this seat and CWRM's duties to DHHL cannot be understated.

Hannah Springer's extensive experience demonstrates that she more than meets the requirements to serve in the loea seat. A kanaka maoli descendant of Ka`ūpūlehu, Hawai`i Island, she has been a well-known leader of many `āina and wai related practices. Notably she was a key member of the association Ka Pa`akai o Ka `Āina, whose efforts directly led to the development of the Ka Pa`akai Test which now helps county and state agencies fulfill their duties under Article XII, section 7 of the Hawai`i Constitution.

We note that Ms. Springer also will bring to CWRM extensive experience working in public and private boards, including the Planning and the Public Access, Open Space and Natural Resources Preservation Commissions of Hawai`i County, the Board of Trustees for the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, and the Ka`ūpūlehu Marine Life Advisory Committee. Combined with her qualifications as a loea, Springer will be an invaluable addition to the Commission on Water Resource Management.

Submitting for consideration and confirmation to the Commission on Water Resource Management (CWRM), Gubernatorial Nominee Hannah Kihalani Springer, for a term to expire 06/30/2028. The Hawaii State Aha Moku (Aha Moku) strongly supports this Gubernatorial Nominee.

Ms. Springer has spent her life supporting and protecting the unique ecosystem of the Pae'Aina of Hawaii. Her resume touches on her extensive experience in government policies, practices, and more importantly on her civic engagements where her love for her 'aina and her people, including the Public Trust is predominantly brought forward.

Aha Moku brings forth the voices of the generational and traditional native Hawaiians of the eight islands of the Pae'Aina, the natural and cultural resources of Hawaii Nei. One of the most important issues that affect all of Hawaii Nei is the Hawaii Water Plan which consists of five constituent parts: 1) Water Resource Protection Plan prepared by CWRM; 2) A Water Quality Plan prepared by the Dept. of Health; 3) A State Water Projects Plan prepared by the Engineering Division of DLNR; 4) an Agricultural Water Use and Development Plan prepared by the Dept. of Agriculture; and, 5) Water Use and Development Plans prepared by each separate county. Ms. Springer's extensive experience in working over the past decades on each of these critical components makes her one of the most sought-after nominees for CWRM.

However, Aha Moku recognizes more! Hannah Springer is incredibly humble and is the recipient of generational and traditional knowledge handed down by her Kupuna. This knowledge recognizes the importance of Wai (Water) and its impact on our natural resources - land, coastal areas, and ocean. It recognizes the kuleana that CWRM carries in upholding Hawaii State Constitutional laws that protect the indigenous peoples, the native Hawaiian traditional practices that depend on the protection of our water. At the same time, the Public Trust needs must also be protected. Hannah Springer is unusually qualified for these important tasks.

And, while she often downplays her participation in the Hawaii Supreme Court Law – the Kapa'akai O Ka'Aina Law, passed in 2000, Hannah Springer played a significant part as one of the original plaintiffs. This alone, strengthens her role as a Water Commissioner as she has a deeper understanding of Hawaii State Law and the Kapa'akai O Ka Aina Analysis.

Kapa'akai O Ka Aina Analysis

Pae'Aina: Moku O Keawe, Moku O Piilani, Moku O Kanaloa, Nana'i Kaula, Moloka'i Pule O'o, Moku O Kakuhihewa, Manokalanipo, Ka'Aina O Kawelonakala The Kapa'akai Analysis may be used in determining whether traditional and customary practices would be impacted by the activities of government agencies, present and in the future.

Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law of the Kapa'akai Case

- Identification and scope of "valued cultural, historical, or natural resources" in petition or impacted area, including the extent to which traditional and customary native Hawaiian rights are exercised in the petition area;
- The extent to which those resources, including traditional and customary native Hawaiian rights, will be affected or impaired by the proposed actions;
- The feasible action, if any, to be taken to reasonably protect native Hawaiian rights if they are found to exist.

Thank you for the opportunity to sharing our mana'o with you. We strongly support Hannah Springers nomination to the Commission on Water Resource Management (CWRM).

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) **SUPPORTS** GM770, which would confirm Hannah Kihalani Springer for appointment to the Commission on Water Resource Management (the "Commission").

Under the State Water Code, Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS) chapter 174C, the Commission is comprised of five voting members who "have substantial experience in the area of water resource management." HRS § 174C-7(b). Of these five "at least one member shall have substantial experience or expertise in traditional Hawaiian water resource management techniques and in traditional Hawaiian riparian usage[s]" of water such as gathering and kalo cultivation. *Id.* Ms. Spring is eminently qualified to fill this loea seat and OHA is pleased to endorse Ms. Springer taking up this kuleana on behalf of the Native Hawaiian community.

Ms. Springer's professional and volunteer experience spans over four decades and reflects a deep dedication to cultural stewardship and co-management of resources. She has served on the Kahu Kū Mauna Council advising the Office of Maunakea Management, chaired the County of Hawai'i's Public Access, Open Space and Natural Resources Preservation Commission, and provided cultural expertise to organizations such as the Ka'ūpūlehu Marine Life Advisory Committee, Kūkio and Hualālai Resorts, and numerous environmental nonprofits. The Ka'ūpulehu Marine Life Advisory Committee is a leading example of blending traditional ecological knowledge with the latest science in a collaborative co-management model and exemplifies the relevant government experience and community leadership that Ms. Springer will bring to the Commission.

Ms. Springer is also a cultural practitioner with generational knowledge of her home island. A plaintiff in the landmark case, *Ka Pa'akai O Ka'Aina v. Land Use Comm'n*, Ms. Springer testified concerning the importance of clean, fresh water for gathering salt along the North Kona coastline. 94 Haw. 31, 49, 7 P.3d 1068, 1086 (2000). In doing so, Ms. Springer helped to establish the foundational analytic framework used by government agencies to protect Native Hawaiian rights. Ms. Springer's generational 'ike is a critical qualification for filling the loea seat. Additionally, her knowledge about a region of Hawai'i island that has variable rains and is fire-prone will be invaluable to the Commission's work as our State faces the increasing impacts of climate change.

Finally, OHA recognizes Ms. Springer's longstanding contributions to the Native Hawaiian community including her previous service as an OHA Trustee from 1996 to 2000. As the constitutionally established body responsible for protecting and promoting the rights of Native Hawaiians, OHA has long supported the inclusion of qualified Native Hawaiian voices in key decision-making bodies such as the Commission. Ms. Springer's deep understanding of 'āina-based resource management, her role as a trusted cultural advisor, and her history of community stewardship make her exceptionally qualified to contribute meaningfully to the work of the Commission as set forth in the Water Code.

Mahalo nui for the opportunity to testify. OHA urges the Committee to **PASS GM770**, and thereby **confirm Hannah Kihalani Springer** to the Commission on Water Resource Management.

We are Olan Leimomi Fisher and Kevin Chang, Kua'āina Advocate and Executive Director, respectively, testifying on behalf of <u>Kua'āina Ulu 'Auamo (or KUA)</u>, "Kua'āina Ulu 'Auamo" stands for "grassroots growing through shared responsibility," and our acronym "KUA" means "backbone." **Our mission is to connect and empower communities to improve their quality of life through the collective care for their biocultural (natural and cultural) heritage, serving as a "backbone organization" that supports creative and community-driven solutions to problems stemming from environmental degradation.** Hawai'i's biocultural resources continue to be negatively impacted by political, economic, and social changes, and the increasing dangers of climate change make fostering and empowering resilient communities acutely critical.

Currently KUA supports three major networks of: (1) over 40 mālama 'āina (caring for our 'āina or "that which feeds") community groups collectively referred to as E Alu Pū (moving forward together); (2) over 60 loko i'a (fishpond aquaculture systems unique to Hawai'i) and wai 'ōpae (anchialine pool systems) sites in varying stages of restoration and development, with numerous caretakers, stakeholders, and volunteers known as the Hui Mālama Loko I'a ("caretakers of fishponds"); and (3) the Limu Hui made up of over 50 loea (traditional experts) and practitioners in all things "limu" or locally-grown "seaweed." **Our shared vision is to once again experience what our kūpuna (ancestors) referred to as 'ĀINA MOMONA – abundant and healthy ecological systems that sustain our community resilience and well-being.**

KUA enthusiastically supports GM770 as an incremental step towards 'āina momona.

It has long been in the spirit of our work that the formal governance of our resources increasingly reflect the leadership and wisdom of our community and their interdependence with their places and these islands. We are also familiar with the long process it has taken to fill this seat, and as such, we express our deep kāko'o (support) for the appointment of Hannah Kihalani Springer to serve on the Commission on Water Resource Management as the much-needed loea (expert), reserved for a member with substantial 'ike (knowledge or expertise) in traditional Native Hawaiian water resource management techniques and traditional Native Hawaiian riparian usage. A lineal descendant of the celebrated kaha lands of Kā'ūpulehu and Kūki'o on Hawai'i Island, Aunty Hannah, as so many affectionately call her, is an excellent choice for this role as a well-respected koa aloha 'āina momona (fearless warrior for aloha 'āina and abundance) in not only her own ahupua'a, but across all of Hawai'i.

Aunty Hannah played a significant role in the litigation that established the <u>Ka Pa'akai</u> <u>analysis</u>, a legal framework operationalizing our constitutional protections for Native Hawaiian traditional and customary rights that all governmental actors have an affirmative duty to follow. She is also a well-known community and civic club leader and environmentalist, former Office of

Hawaiian Affairs trustee, member of our E Alu Pū Network Council, and valued member on the KUA Board since 2019. Further, Aunty Hannah is a founding and active member of the Ka'ūpūlehu Marine Life Advisory Committee and their <u>"Try Wait"</u> initiative to bring back abundance and responsible community-based nearshore management in the Ka'ūpūlehu and Kūko'o ahupua'a. Beyond all her accomplishments, Aunty Hannah continues to inspire and guide countless other koa aloha 'āina in Hawai'i with her incredible mo'olelo (storytelling) and oratorical skills, her aloha, grace, holu (resilience), and ha'aha'a (humbleness), all while maintaining that trademark twinkle in her eye. We cannot emphasize enough our support for her in this next calling to protect our most precious resource, wai, for generations to come.

The communities we work with are committed to ensuring the long-term health of our biocultural resources that they have cared for and depended on for generations since time immemorial. We believe our environment, the foundation of our very existence and "that which feeds" us all, requires long-term investment through a shared vision of achieving 'āina momona (abundance) once again. To get there requires dedicating more resources for mālama 'āina (caring for our environment), including through this well-deserved appointment of Aunty Hannah as the much-needed loea on our Commission on Water Resource Management. Dear Chair Inouye, Vice-Chair Elefante, and members of the Senate Committee on Water and Land:

Earthjustice **strongly supports GM 770**, the consideration and confirmation of Hannah Kihalani Springer to the Commission on Water Resource Management. This appointment brings closure to the year-long controversy between the governor and Native Hawaiian community members and supporters over the nomination process. Now that a qualified loea has been appointed through the lawful process, we support Ms. Springer's confirmation.

The commission has been without a lawfully appointed loea for nearly a year, and Springer's appointment presents an opportunity for the Senate to finally confirm a qualified and lawfully selected nominee for that role. Ms. Springer has now been vetted for this position twice, having gone through two rounds of interviews with two nominating committees, and each time being selected as a qualified and recommended nominee on the list given to the governor. Unlike the governor's prior appointment, Ms. Springer's appointment does not present concerns about the integrity of the nomination process or authority of the nominating committee.

Ms. Springer is indeed a respected loea in her community. With her experience, she is well equipped to serve in the role as a commissioner. She has served as a member on the Hawai'i County Planning Commission and Public Access, Open Space and Natural Resources Preservation Commission, and the Board of Trustees for the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. She has also served leadership roles in for the Akaka Foundation for Tropical Forests, Kua'āina 'Ulu 'Auamo, and the Ka'ūpūlehu Marine Life Advisory Committee. Ms. Springer's history demonstrates her commitment to 'āina stewardship and public service, and it is no wonder that communities across the pae 'āina support her appointment. The loea commissioner position was created to ensure that traditional and customary rights of ahupua'a tenants and appurtenant water rights of kuleana and taro lands are respected and protected. Ms. Springer embodies what it means to be a loea. She has continuously embraced roles to protect traditional and customary rights of Native Hawaiians, and the loea appointment is just her next step in continuing that work.

For these reasons, Earthjustice strongly supports GM 770 and respectfully requests that the Senate vote to confirm Hannah Kihalani Springer as the loea for the water commission. Hawai'i's biocultural resources continue to be negatively impacted by political, economic, and social changes, and the increasing dangers of climate change make fostering and empowering resilient communities acutely critical.

MLEF enthusiastically supports GM770 as an incremental step towards 'āina momona.

It has long been in the spirit of our work that the formal governance of our resources increasingly reflect the leadership and wisdom of our community and their interdependence with their places and these islands. We are also familiar with the long process it has taken to fill this seat, and as such, we express our deep kāko'o (support) for the appointment of Hannah Kihalani Springer to serve on the Commission on Water Resource Management as the much-needed loea (expert), reserved for a member with substantial 'ike (knowledge or expertise) in traditional Native Hawaiian water resource management techniques and traditional Native Hawaiian riparian usage. For examples, just look to the source - her home and upbringing.

Aunty Hannah is a lineal descendant of Kaʿūpūlehu and Kūkiʿo, known as "ke kaha wai 'ole," a waterless region. She is - in fact - so grounded in the 'ike kūpuna of her ancestors who understood how to not just survive, she embodies and understands more than anyone what it means to thrive the highly variable rainfall conditions of these ahupuaʿa and possibly, too, an uncertain water future.

Her soft words, and aloha for each and every person, is reflected in her belief of the preciousness of wai. The precarity of every discussion, reflecting how water and our words will be increasingly important and we will be inclined to be more articulate than ever before. Aunty Hannah, as we have seen in her advocacy for the Hā'ena CBSFA many years ago, is one of the most articulate individuals we know. She is amiable and always allows aloha to enter each discussion. And so, we will seek the protection of aloha in each dicourse regarding wai as if the sharing and protection of if aloha in discussion was the increasingly limited resource itself.

Aloha Chair Inouye, Vice Chair Elefante and Members of the Senate Committee on Water and Land,

Trust for Public Land strongly supports the nomination of Hannah Kihalani Springer to serve on the Commission on Water Resource Management (COWRM). I have known Hannah for over 30 years and have worked with her professionally in as an attorney for the Earthjustice Legal Defense Fund, an attorney and partner at Alston Hunt Floyd & Ing (now Dentons), and in my current position as State Director for the Trust for Public Land's Hawai'i program.

Hannah has dedicated her life to safeguarding Hawaiian culture and values, perpetuating Kānaka Maoli traditional and customary practices, particularly those relating to water resources. She has over 40 years of experience, serving as an OHA Trustee and was one of the early advocates/parties whose efforts resulted in a Hawai'i Supreme Court decision known as Ka Pa'akai that requires state agencies to evaluate impacts of agency actions on Native Hawaiian traditional and customary rights guaranteed under Hawai'i's Constitution. She is a founding and leading member of the Ka'ūpūlehu Marine Life Advisory Committee and has ancestral ties to Ka'ūpūlehu and Kūki'o and the cultural knowledge necessary to balance critical water management issues.

Our Hui of about a dozen small family farmers has been growing kalo on the same 'āina in Wai'oli Valley for many, many generations. We work to support and enhance the ma uka to ma kai biocultural resources primarily in the Wai'oli Stream Watershed, protect the natural and cultural resources that enable traditional and customary Native Hawaiian practices, maintain habitat for endangered Hawaiian waterbirds, and engage the greater Kaua'i community through educational outreach programs and initiatives relating to kalo farming and community-based stewardship of water resources.

As you may recall, our lives on Kaua'i's North Shore were upended in 2018 with what some have described as a thousand-year flood event. We went from focusing on kalo farming to being forced to navigate a complicated web of permits and exemptions from the Water Commission, Board of Land and Natural Resources, Hawaiian Homes Commission, and host of other County, State, and Federal entities. We could not have done this without kōkua from so many, including Chair Inouye and this Committee who supported us with concurrent resolutions and bills.

Aloha e Chair Inouye, Vice Chair Elefante, and Members of the Committee:

Huliauapa'a is a Hawaiian non-profit organization with a mission to educate and empower students, communities, and professionals on the stewardship of Hawai'i's wahi kūpuna (ancestral places). We are writing in strong support of Hannah Springer's confirmation to the Native Hawaiian Practitioner seat ("loea seat") on the Commission on Water Resource Management, as reflected in GM770.

Our support of this nomination stems from over a decade of work with Hannah Springer and the Ka'ūpūlehu community. This includes our annual Wahi Kūpuna Internship Program (WKIP) in 2012 and, more recently, a project with the Ahupua'a Accelerator Initiative from 2023-2024 aimed at strengthening adaptive community-led ahupua'a stewardship of the rich and diverse biocultural resources in Ka'ūpūlehu. Since 2021, Hannah Springer has been a member of the Kali'uokapa'akai Collective Papa Kāheka (Kūpuna Council), providing integral insights and strategic direction to build capacity and take collective action in safeguarding Hawai'i's wahi kūpuna. The Kali'uokapa'akai Collective is a community of practice of advocates in wahi kūpuna stewardship, and Huliauapa'a currently serves as its administrative backbone.

The CWRM plays a vital role in overseeing and protecting Hawai'i's water resources, which are essential to the life and culture of our island communities. The loea seat is critical, ensuring that at least one Commissioner has "substantial experience or expertise in traditional Hawaiian water resource management techniques and in traditional Hawaiian riparian usage such as those preserved by section 174C-101," namely traditional and customary practices. HRS § 174C-7(b). Importantly, the loea seat provides technical expertise to the Commission and is an important bridge for community outreach and trust-building efforts. In the initial discussions around amending the Water Code to add the Loea seat, the House Committee on Judiciary found that a Native Hawaiian Practitioner seat "...would be beneficial to include on the Commission to better perform its duties." H. Stand. Comm. Rep. No. 1503, in 2003 House Journal, at 1653. Since the CWRRM makes decisions that could impact native Hawaiian water rights, it is integral that whoever is selected for this position has sufficient expertise in traditional Hawaiian riparian usage and is also trusted by the Hawaiian community.

Hannah Kihalani Springer, a kama'āina of Ka'ūpūlehu, Kona 'Ākau, is indeed that person. She is qualified to serve as the loea seat and is highly respected in the Hawaiian community. "Aunty" Hannah is one of the best possible candidates to serve on the Water Commission. She is a deeply respected cultural practitioner and historian with lineal ties to Ka'ūpūlehu and Kūki'o, where her 'ohana has lived for generations, not only surviving but thriving in a space famously referred to as "ke

kahawai'ole." In a place named for its scarcity of water, Aunty Hannah stands as a living testament of the generational knowledge essential to thriving in the highly variable rainfall conditions of this ahupua'a. As a lifelong advocate for elevating and integrating 'ike Hawai'i and community voices into decisions directly affecting our 'āina and kai, she brings a plethora of much-needed experience to the Commission. Her deep commitment to aloha 'āina is evident in her role as a steadfast advocate, beautifully weaving 'ike kūpuna, wahi kūpuna, and 'ike Hawai'i to the forefront of Hawai'i's environmental movement.

Aunty Hannah has participated in two critical legal interventions during the land-use planning process at Kaʻūpūlehu. One, an Army Corps of Engineers dredging permit, caused the kūpe'e nests, limu-beds, and a particular moi hole found at the dredging site to be analyzed using National Historic Preservation Act criteria, not just as part of a biological assessment. The other, known as "Ka Pa'akai O Ka 'Āina," ushered in the Cultural Impact Assessment requirement and the consideration of the intangible aspects of culture. Beyond Aunty Hannah's groundbreaking role in integrating 'ike Hawai'i and community voices in government and agency decision-making processes, her experience is evident in the sheer number of positions she has held on advisory councils, nonprofit boards, and state commissions focused on environmental protection, cultural heritage, and community-based resource management. Notably, she has served as a member of the Hawai'i County Planning Commission and the Public Access, Open Space, and Natural Resources Preservation Commission. She was also a leading advocate for the successful designation and expansion of the Papahānaumokuākea Marine National Monument; a founding and current leading member of the Kaʿūpūlehu Marine Life Advisory Committee, which successfully advocate for a ten year, all species rest period; a past and present board member of a plethora of native hawaiian serving organizations including Conservation Council for Hawai'i and Kua'āina Ulu 'Auamo: and even served as an Office of Hawaiian Affairs trustee. In 2024, KIKA processed and sold 70,000 pounds of kalo to support local farmers and increase Hawai'i's food sovereignty, collaborated with volunteers for a total of 8,800 volunteer hours at site visits and community workdays, and directly engaged 5,000 Hawai'i youth with cultural educational experiences.

The work we do at KIKA depends on pono environmental stewardship of 'āina, consistent access to wai, and the continued ability to preserve and protect our cultural sites and practices. Thankfully, the Water Code reserves one seat on the seven-member Water Commission for an expert in Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices related to water management. Confirming her nomination will help to heal the harm of a century of water mismanagement.

She grew up in an environment with variable rainfall and knows how to manage on a limited water source better than most. Nā Kia'i Kai submits this testimony in <u>strong support</u> to GM 770. We urge this committee to confirm Hannah Springer to the Commission on Water Resource Management.

Nā Kia'i Kai is a community-based organization established by West Kaua'i residents, including Native Hawaiian fishers and cultural practitioners, to protect West Kaua'i's river and coastal waters, humans, and aquatic life from pollution. For decades, Nā Kia'i Kai has advocated on behalf of our community against a multitude of environmental harms.

For more than a century, West Kaua'i has borne the brunt of the island's environmental and cultural injustices. Beginning in the late 1800s, sugar plantations filled and channelized the Mānā Plain—once home to a thriving network of wetlands and freshwater springs—to artificially create dry land suitable for sugar cultivation. For over a century, these sugar plantations dammed and completely drained the Waimea River and its tributaries to irrigate its crops. This water pumping and water diversion infrastructure is still in operation today and has all but destroyed the complex stream, wetland, and reef ecosystems along West Kaua'i from mauka to makai.

We support Springer's appointment to the Water Commission because she has the background, experience, and relationships necessary to help Hawai'i navigate its way back to sharing and distributing our limited water supply in a more just and sustainable way. Our generation is living with the consequences of choices that did not prioritize sustainability, cultural understanding, or long-term thinking. **"O ke kahua ma mua, ma hope ke kūkulu."**

Aunty Hannah Springer committed her life to mālama 'Āina and mālama wai, guided by pono and 'Ike kūpuna. **"I ulu no ka lālā i ke kumu."** Her guidance can help restore balance to how we manage wai, honoring both traditional practices and modern needs. As an 'ōpio who cares deeply for this 'āina, wai and its future, I believe that her presence on the Water Commission will help shift us toward decisions that uplift kaiāulu, culture and sustainability.

This is especially true where I live in Ke'anae; the water for the many streams that are diverted now lay dry, which has impacted our cultural practices of gathering food and resources in a negative way. Where the land was once rich with native species, invasives have taken over the land and sea because of the altering of natural ecosystems that were once abundant with water.

Hannah Springer understands these impacts to the water and how it affects our ecosystem. Her work with Ka'ūpūlehu is a good example of being connected to the 'āina (land and sea). Hannah Springer is a respected Hawaiian cultural practitioner, one trusted by the community and who will advocate for data and culturally-informed decision making. Her experience, wisdom, and leadership will guide her to be invaluable to the Water Commision and their work. Her understanding of mauka to makai (mountains to the sea) systems will be greatly valued in the loea seat. She sees the importance of cultural and environmental functions of wai (water) from the rainforests, dryland

forests, and into the ocean. Pō'ai Wai Ola's Testimony in STRONG SUPPORT of GM 770

Aloha e Chair Inouye, Vice Chair Elefante, and Committee Members,

Pō'ai Wai Ola submits this testimony in <u>strong support</u> of GM 770, the appointment of Hannah Springer to the Commission of Water Resource Management (CWRM).

Pō'ai Wai Ola is a community-based organization of residents in West Kaua'i. Pō'ai Wai Ola members are cultural practitioners, maha'ai (farmers), and fresh water and reef lawai'a (fishers). Our roots in the West Kaua'i ahupua'a span many generations. Our hui is dedicated to managing and conserving water resources for present and future generations and protecting the long-term sustainability and health of our watershed, from its mauka headwaters to makai nearshore marine areas.

Waimea River is the lifeblood of our community and supports a host of protected instream public trust uses—such as kalo cultivation and subsistence gathering. For generations, our community has watched as the Waimea River's waters were diverted, first to feed plantations, and then by corporate farms who took over operation of the outdated and inefficient plantation-era water diversion infrastructure. For decades, tens of millions of gallons of water were diverted from the river every day, often causing large stretches of the river to run dry, cutting off the connection between the mountains and the sea. Throughout our lives, those with power and money have decided what to do with Waimea River's precious water resources, which are supposed to belong to all of us. This is a power dynamic our community continues to combat as we seek to restore Waimea River flows to support public trust uses and restore dwindling populations of native streamlife that have been devasted by decades of wholesale water diversion.

The Water Commission is a key to properly addressing the long history of water mismanagement. The Commission has a seat dedicated to representing the expertise of cultural practitioners perpetuating Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices in agriculture and water management. Ms. Springer is a Native Hawaiian cultural practitioner, farmer, educator, conservationist, and advocate. She has authored several books on Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices and Hawaiian history. She is a kupa of Kukio and Ka'ūpūlehu, an arid dryland forest still dominated by native forest flora and fauna. She is a former trustee to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and has served on many non-profit boards advocating for the protection and restoration of native ecosystems. She has the experience, background, and approach critical to fulfilling the commission's mission to "protect and manage the waters of the State of Hawai'i for present and future generations."

She is known for saying "I am shaped by my geography." This is important because the geography of this region of Kona has long confronted many of the challenges the rest of the Hawaiian Islands are becoming increasingly familiar with. Ms. Springer's life experiences growing up with a limited freshwater supply, drought, invasive species, and encroaching luxury development means she is well-prepared to help the Water Commission rise to the challenges it faces today in properly stewarding and fairly sharing our imperiled freshwater supply.

Unfortunately, a year was wasted in filling this crucial seat because the Green Administration insisted on favoring the interests of developers and diverters over the interests of the streams and the community for which this seat was designated. We urge the Senate to act quickly to confirm Ms. Springer in order to make up for this wasted time and make clear that games, like the ones Green's team played with this vacancy, will not be tolerated.

Aloha e Chair Inouye, Vice-Chair Elefante, and committee members,

We are the alaka'i of 'Ahahui o Hawai'i ("the Hui"), an organization of law student advocates at the William S. Richardson School of Law. For over 50 years, the Hui has advocated for Native Hawaiian justice in all areas of law, especially those affecting Native Hawaiian communities, traditional and customary practices, resource management, and environmental protection. Today we submit this testimony in **<u>STRONG SUPPORT of GM770</u>**.

The Hui is one of the 70 local and national organizations who zealously urged Governor Green to follow the law and appoint a qualified expert in traditional Hawaiian water management to the loea seat. The Governor's failure to select from the original list of names presented to him, which included Aunty Hannah Springer, for more than a year is egregious and unacceptable, especially given the tragedies suffered in Lahaina. We cannot allow private developer interests to influence policy decision-making and take precedence over the health of Hawai'i's people and resources.

Established in 1987, the purpose of the Water Commission was to effectuate the Water Code and the state's constitutional obligation under Art. XI, § 1 and § 7 to protect and preserve Hawai'i's water resources for present and future generations. Decades later, our water continues to be exploited for profit. Appointing a true Native Hawaiian water expert to the Water Commission is both pono and legally necessary.

The Governor's decisions throughout the loea appointment process have created distrust among the community, as he has stretched the language of the Water Code to meet his political goals. He has repeatedly circumvented this legislature and the democratic processes in place to push his own agenda—a pattern of practice that should not be tolerated. **The confirmed appointment of a true loea like Aunty Hannah Springer will help mend the distrust between our community and government.**



Aunty Hannah will help effectively manage our wai so that we can avoid man-made disasters like the Lahaina wildfires in the future. Aunty Hannah has committed her life to protecting water resources that perpetuate Kānaka Maoli traditional and customary practices. She is a celebrated, highly accomplished, and dedicated aloha 'āina warrior, whose wisdom and experience will be an invaluable addition to the Water Commission. She has over 40 years of experience in the field, which included her service as an OHA Trustee; her role in creating the *Ka Pa'akai* analysis; and her continued efforts as a founding and leading member of the Ka'ūpūlehu Marine Life Advisory Committee. Aloha Chair Inouye, Vice Chair Elefante, and Members of the Committee,

I am so happy to see that Governor Green has selected Hannah Springer for the loea seat on CWRM. Hannah Springer is a highly accomplished cultural practitioner, community leader, and dedicated aloha 'āina, whose wisdom and experience will be invaluable to the Water Commission's work. She has served in her role as an OHA Trustee; her role in creating the "Ka Pa'akai" analysis used to balance development and other proposed actions with the protection of cultural practices and resources; her community service on various nonprofit boards including the Conservation Council for Hawai'i and Kua'āina Ulu 'Auamo, and her

continued work as a founding and leading member of the Ka'ūpūlehu Marine Life Advisory Committee—a model of collaboration between developers, private landowners, lineal descendants, cultural practitioners, and community members all dedicated to the stewardship of the 'āina, wai, and kai of Ka'ūpūlehu and Kūki'o. I. NOTICE OF STANDING AND LAWFUL AUTHORITY

I, Roslyn Cummings, a Wahine Maoli and lawful hoʻoilina of Ko Hawaiʻi Pae ʻĀina, submit this affidavit under the protections of:

- The 1840 Kumu Kanawai of the Hawaiian Kingdom
- The Civil Code of 1859 and related statutes
- Keelikolani v. Robinson, 3 Haw. 160 (1869)
- Kaalaea Mill Co. v. Kalaau, 13 Haw. 366 (1901)
- Magna Carta of 1839, and Kanawai Māmalahoe
- The Law of Evidence, Chapter LIII (1850 Penal Code)
- Vienna Convention on the Law of Treaties (Art. 27, 62)

• And under the Rule of Law and Rule of Evidence, including the unrepealed statutes and decisions of the Hawaiian Kingdom judiciary

I stand under the jurisdiction of exclusive equity and operate as an heir and lawful steward, not a U.S. citizen. This affidavit is not a request for permission but a lawful declaration under continuing Hawaiian Kingdom law and equitable right.

II. REGARDING HB596 HD1 — EMERGENCY POWERS

I submit this testimony in strong support of HB596 HD1, which seeks to rein in unlawful extensions of emergency executive powers. The unchecked use of emergency declarations to override the lawful rights of the people — especially without precise definitions — is a breach of both U.S. and Hawaiian Kingdom constitutional separation of powers.

Legal Foundation:

• The 1840 Constitution of Hawai'i (Art. 41) affirms the tripartite structure of government and prohibits unilateral consolidation of powers.

• Under the Penal Code of 1850, Chapter LXI, no public official may bypass law or due process "except in cases of actual insurrection or foreign attack."

This bill aligns with both the Hawaiian Kingdom and international jurisprudence. The attempt to declare complex socio-political issues as emergencies in perpetuity is a usurpation of legislative authority, violating both equity jurisdiction and common law restraint.

Relevant Case Law:

• Dreier v. Kuaa, 5 Haw. 119 (1884): affirmed that even the Crown could not act outside the rule of law.

• In re Boundaries of Pulehunui, 4 Haw. 239 (1879): the court ruled that the government cannot arbitrarily expand authority without evidentiary procedure and land commission oversight.

Conclusion:

HB596 HD1 affirms the rule of law and restrains administrative overreach. It is the lawful duty of the legislature to preserve due process, public participation, and constitutional balance. I urge its passage without dilution.

III. REGARDING GM770 — APPOINTMENT OF HANNAH K. SPRINGER

I submit this testimony in strong and pono support of GM770, the nomination of Hannah Kihalani Springer to serve as the Water Commission's loea (Native Hawaiian water management expert).

Aunty Hannah's Lineage and Standing:

• She is a lineal descendant of Kaʻūpūlehu and Kūkiʻo — ahupuaʻa known as kekahawaiʻole, land without water — and carries the ancestral ʻike of water scarcity, land balance, and abundance through stewardship.

• Her grounding in moʻok \bar{u} 'auhau, cultural practice, and environmental law make her ideally suited to advise on equitable water allocation, especially in light of climate shifts and over-extraction.

Legal Precedent:

• Waikane v. Poohilo, 6 Haw. 214 (1876): recognized kuleana rights to water cannot be severed from ancestral claims and moʻokūʻauhau.

• In re Water Rights of Waiahole Ditch, affirming that the Public Trust Doctrine aligns with traditional and customary Native Hawaiian practices of water sharing, not commodification.

Springer's Service:

• Creator of Ka Pa'akai Analysis, used to balance development with cultural rights

• OHA Trustee, Marine Life Advisory Committee founder, and steward of biocultural restoration

• Lawful interpreter of both Western science and 'ike kupuna, essential for upcoming legal decisions on water disputes

Conclusion:

Aunty Hannah Springer is not only a candidate — she is the lawful and most qualified person to fulfill the kuleana of loea. To reject her would be a breach of both cultural integrity and legal standards.

IV. CLOSING DECLARATION UNDER EQUITY AND KULEANA

I declare under oath and under penalty of perjury in Ko Hawai'i Pae 'Āina that:

My name is Riley Bond, and I was raised in Lahaina, Maui. I'm writing today in strong support of the Governor's recommendation to appoint **Hannah Springer** to the Commission on Water Resource Management.

Lahaina was once known as the "Venice of the Pacific," with fresh, life-giving waters flowing freely through Mokuhinia and Moku'ula. Today, those streams have been diverted, dammed, and drained. On August 8th, 2023, our community was engulfed in flames. More than 100 lives were lost, and generations of trauma were created in a single afternoon.

I attended the recent CWRM meeting held at Lahainaluna High School. During the staff presentation, it was stated that the systems used to collect water data are largely Western—focused on flow rates, yield, and numerical thresholds. These models do not account for Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices, or how water is intricately tied to cultural, spiritual, and generational survival.

The presenters mentioned that they would be "consulting" with Native Hawaiian cultural practitioners to gather input. But during the Q&A portion of the meeting, I submitted a handwritten question asking how these conversations would be *quantified*. How do you measure the depth of generational 'ike, the value of kapu, or the loss of a lo'i that no longer flows?

The question was read aloud to a room full of community members and it was danced around. The answer was vague: "We'll gather data." But that isn't enough. It's not even close. A simple consultation process, tacked onto a Western framework, does not honor the depth or importance of traditional water relationships. That moment underscored for me just how critical it is to have decision-makers on the Commission who already live and breathe these practices.

That's why the LEOA seat exists. And that's why it's time to not only nominate but fully support, appoint, and uplift, **Hannah Springer.**

Water determines whether our communities survive. Whether our children can remain on 'āina. Whether our kupuna's knowledge is passed down or erased. Appointing Hannah Springer to the CWRM isn't just a good decision—it's the necessary one.
