The Agribusiness Development Corporation (ADC) <u>supports</u> HB 1006 HD1 which seeks to enhance agritourism by including agricultural tourism in the definition of "enterprise" to financially support farming businesses engaged in agricultural tourism. This important amendment will allow ADC to provide financial and strategic support to farming businesses engaged in agritourism, which is a growing and vital component of Hawaii's agricultural economy.

The Role of Agritourism in Hawaii's Agriculture and Economy

Agritourism merges agriculture with tourism, offering unique experiences such as farm tours, hands-on workshops, farm-to-table dining, and direct-toconsumer sales of locally grown products. It plays an essential role in diversifying the agricultural sector, strengthening rural economies, and promoting Hawaii's cultural heritage. Key benefits of agritourism include:

- Economic Sustainability for Farmers: Agritourism provides an additional revenue stream for farmers, helping them offset rising operational costs and the challenges of fluctuating crop prices. This financial stability allows farmers to reinvest in their operations and improve overall productivity.
- 2. Promotion of Locally Grown Products: By engaging directly with visitors, agritourism promotes the value of locally grown food and educates the public on sustainable farming practices, thereby fostering greater appreciation for Hawaii's agricultural products.
- 3. Support for Rural Communities: Agritourism creates jobs and stimulates economic activity in rural areas, offering opportunities for local residents and businesses to thrive.
- 4. Cultural and Environmental Education: Agritourism highlights Hawaii's unique agricultural practices, traditional knowledge, and environmental stewardship, creating opportunities to share Hawaii's cultural heritage with visitors and residents alike.

Why Agritourism Should Be Included in the Definition of "Enterprise"

ADC is instrumental in supporting Hawaii's agricultural sector by providing resources, financial support, and expertise to farmers. However, the current definition of "enterprise" does not explicitly include agritourism, limiting ADC's ability to assist farming operations engaged in this important activity. By expanding the definition of "enterprise" to include agritourism, this amendment will:

- Encourage Diversification in Agriculture: Farmers will have greater access to resources needed to launch or expand agritourism initiatives, helping them diversify their income streams and build more resilient operations.
- Increase Access to Funding and Technical Support: Including agritourism will enable ADC to provide financial support, grants, and technical expertise to farming businesses that incorporate tourism into their operations.
- Support Statewide Economic Goals: Agritourism aligns with Hawaii's broader goals of promoting sustainable tourism, supporting local businesses, and reducing reliance on imports by strengthening the local food system.

Economic Impact of Agritourism in Hawaii

Agritourism already contributes significantly to Hawaii's economy. According to the Hawaii Department of Agriculture, agritourism activities have generated millions of dollars in revenue annually, with many farms reporting that tourism-related income represents a substantial portion of their total earnings. Expanding ADC's mandate to support agritourism will allow more farming operations to benefit from this growing market, further boosting the agricultural and tourism sectors.

Conclusion

Including agritourism in the definition of "enterprise" is a necessary step to ensure that Hawaii's farmers can fully participate in this dynamic and growing sector. By providing financial support and resources to agritourism ventures, ADC will strengthen Hawaii's agricultural economy, enhance rural development, and promote sustainable tourism practices.

I respectfully urge the Committee to support this amendment and authorize ADC to extend its support to farming businesses engaged in agritourism.

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate, and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai'i **Farm Bureau supports HB 1006, HD1**, which includes agritourism in the definition of "enterprise" to authorize the Agribusiness Development Corporation to financially support businesses engaged in agritourism.

We strongly support agritourism, which represents an excellent revenue enhancement opportunity for farmers and ranchers and an educational opportunity for the public. Fostering the profitability of farmers and ranchers will significantly contribute to the State's goal of increased self-sufficiency.

The Agribusiness Development Corporation (ADC) was initiated by the agricultural industry as sugar and pineapple downsized. It was established to help transition Hawaii's agricultural sector from plantation agriculture to smaller, diversified agricultural operations. Transitioning large tracts of monoculture farmland into smaller diversified ag lots and finding and supporting bona fide farmers to work those lands is a long and complex process.
