Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Gabbard and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify to House Bill No.1291, HD2, SD1. This bill extends the offense of false labeling of Hawaii-grown coffee to include roasted coffee. The Department of Agriculture (DOA) strongly supports this bill.

This bill raises the offense of False labeling of Hawaii-grown coffee to a class C felony, which will include roasted coffee. The bill also designates the eight geographic regions that the false labeling would apply under the law.

DOA respectfully requests that funds be added to this bill to support Measurement Standards Inspector V SR-19 \$65,000, to support and restore enforcement capability for labeling regulations for Hawaii products such as coffee, macadamia nuts and mamaki tea. The inspector will inspect and enforce the new laws.

Aloha Chair Rhoads, Vice-Chair Gabbard, and Members of the Committee:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate, and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai'i Farm Bureau supports HB 1291, HD2, SD1, which extends the offense of false labeling of Hawai'i-grown coffee to include roasted coffee.

Hawai'i-grown coffee is recognized for its high quality and aromatic flavor. It is held to a set of quality standards, making it one of the most expensive coffees in the world. Hawai'i-grown coffee is one of Hawai'i's signature crops. The Hawai'i Department of Agriculture estimated the 2023-2024 production value of Hawai'i-grown coffee at \$48.2 million. It ranked third among the state's top fifteen agricultural commodities produced in 2023.

To protect the Hawai'i coffee from counterfeiting, the Legislature enacted Act 211 in 2023. This law requires all coffee products carrying a Hawai'i geographical reference to disclose the location where the coffee was grown and indicate the percentage by weight of locally grown coffee and coffee grown elsewhere. It also specifies that coffee products claiming to be 100% Hawai'ian must be grown and processed entirely in Hawai'i.

The current law focuses on green (unroasted) coffee, leaving a loophole allowing misleading labeling of roasted coffee containing little or no genuine Hawai'i-grown beans. HB 1291, HD2, SD1 closes this gap and strengthens consumer protections by ensuring that roasted coffee labeled as Hawai'i-grown truly originates from Hawai'i farms.
