The IATSE represents approximately 168,000 members in the United States and Canada and 800 of those members across the Hawaiian Islands. We are the artists and technicians who work behind-the-scenes in film, television, live events, tradeshow and conventions, and we are grateful for the opportunity to testify in **SUPPORT** of HB194, HD1, which proposes the establishment of May 22nd as Maritime Day in Hawai'i.

Hawai'i's history is deeply intertwined in the sea, dating back to the early Polynesian voyagers who navigated vast distances to find the Hawaiian Islands to the skilled mariners who guide modern-day vessels into our harbors. Being the furthest distance from any other land mass on the planet, Hawai'i relies heavily on the maritime industry for domestic and international goods such as food, fuel and supplies. It sustains our local economy and contributes to our local culture.

As we celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the Polynesian Voyaging Society this year, and the global recognition of the 60-foot double-hulled canoe, "Hökūle'a", it would be fitting to designate May 22nd as Maritime Day as an annual reminder of the importance of the maritime industry to Hawai'i.
