## H.B. 706, H.D. 1, S.D. 1 RELATING TO HIGHWAY SAFETY

Senate Committee on Judiciary

The Hawaii Department of Transportation (HDOT) **supports H.B. 706, H.D. 1, S.D. 1**, which requires persons under the age of 16 to wear a helmet while riding a skateboard. Clarifies that the Act does not infringe on county ordinances prohibiting skateboards on streets and roadways.

According to the Hawaii Department of Health, from 2019 through 2023, there were 11 serious skateboard injuries on our roadways, 2 of which were under the age of 17 and neither of them were wearing helmets.

According to the National Library of Medicine, wearing a helmet while skateboarding reduces the risk of head injuries by up to 88 percent.

I am writing to express our strong support for HB706 HD1 SD1, which requires all skateboard users under sixteen to wear helmets while riding. KIPC believes this measure is critical for ensuring the safety of young skateboarders and preventing serious head injuries.

Skateboarding is a popular activity among young people, but it also poses significant risks. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), wearing a helmet can lower the risk of severe head injuries by up to 85%. Young riders, due to their developing motor skills and awareness of risks, are particularly vulnerable to falls and collisions. Requiring helmet use would help establish safe habits and greatly reduce preventable injuries.

In addition, traumatic brain injuries impose a significant burden on families and the healthcare system. Emergency treatments and long-term rehabilitation for head injuries can be expensive, making prevention the most effective solution. Hawaii already has a law requiring bicycle helmets under sixteen, so it is only logical to extend similar safety measures to skateboarding.

Organizations such as the American Academy of Pediatrics and the National Safety Council strongly advocate for helmet use in action sports. By enacting this law, we can save lives, reduce medical costs, and promote responsible recreation.

KIPC respectfully urges you to support HB706 HD1 and take necessary action to protect our youth. Thank you for your time and dedication to public safety.
