In consideration of SENATE BILL 1074 SD1 RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT STATEMENTS

Senate Bill 1074 SD1 proposes an amendment to Chapter 343, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), also known as the Hawai'i Environmental Policy Act (HEPA), to allow a previously authorized or permitted activity or operations to continue operation while the appropriate agency determines whether the activity or operation is subject to or exempt from the environmental review process when challenged. This bill also allows a person with the oversight of a previously authorized or permitted activity to renew the appropriate permits while under the environmental review process. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports the intent of this measure and offers the following comments.

Recent judicial interpretations of HEPA have resulted in significant challenges for the Department and other agencies. Notably, the Hawai'i Supreme Court ruled in <u>Umberger</u>, et al. v. <u>DLNR</u>, 140 Hawai'i 500 (2017), that all Aquarium Fish permits issued by the Department's Division of Aquatic Resources (DAR) pursuant to section 188-31, HRS, are subject to HEPA. Subsequently, in <u>Kaupiko et al. v. DLNR</u>, Case No. 1CCV-20-0000125 (2020), the First Circuit Court ruled that HEPA also applies to the taking of aquatic life for commercial aquarium purposes under licenses issued by DAR pursuant to section 189-2, HRS (or "Commercial Marine Licenses" or "CMLs"). As a result, the Department no longer issues CMLs for commercial aquarium purposes, while continuing to issue CMLs for the commercial harvest of marine resources for food and other non-aquarium purposes.

More recently, the Second Circuit Court in <u>Nā Papa'i Wawae 'Ula'ula, et al. v. DLNR</u>, Case No. 2CC-17-1-000483 (2024), enjoined the Department from issuing or renewing any commercial use permits (CUPs) for activities in Kā'anapali ocean waters off West Maui until a determination is made that the

activities are exempt from HEPA, or an environmental review is completed. The initial scope of the litigation targeted six CUPs issued by the Department's Division of Boating and Ocean Recreation (DOBOR), but the court's immediate decision also affects the renewal of a total of thirty active DOBOR CUPs for Kā'anapali ocean waters. This situation presents a considerable economic risk for these permittees, as many have been operating at Kā'anapali for decades, and the inability to renew these CUPs would lead to the immediate cessation of longstanding operations.

The Department shares the courts' intent to ensure proper environmental review of activities that have the potential for substantial environmental impacts. However, many of these ocean recreational activities have been permitted for many years, in some cases 20 years. The Department constantly strives to find balance between preserving and protecting our valuable natural and cultural resources while permitting a level of commercial recreational activities that provide jobs, opportunities for locals and visitors to enjoy our ocean resources, and a source of revenue for the Department. Without a mechanism for continued operations during environmental review, impacted businesses are forced to cease operations indefinitely, resulting in job losses and economic harm without knowing the environmental impact of these long-standing ocean recreational activities. We believe this bill permits the status quo, no expansion of activities, pending the Department's determination of appropriate environmental review.

Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Gabbard, and Members of the Senate Committee on Judiciary.

The Office of Planning and Sustainable Development (OPSD) <u>supports</u> SB 1074, SD 1, and offers <u>comments with amendments</u> on SB 1074, SD1 which intends to clarify and resolve the effect that recent court decisions have had on long-standing historically permitted activities in managed areas. SB 1074, SD 1 would amend HRS Chapter 343 by adding a new paragraph with language establishing that under certain limiting circumstances, a previously permitted or authorized action that is being challenged as to whether the action is subject to the requirements of the HRS 343 may continue while those requirements are being pursued.

OPSD notes that the findings section of this bill suggests that **previously permitted or authorized** commercial activities are intended to be the subject of the bill, however, language in the proposed new language (on page 2, line 12, and again on page 3, lines 9 & 10) state that the subject activities include those "... or undertaken by a commercial entity...." This language could allow commercial activities that were "undertaken," but not permitted or authorized to continue pursuant to the bill, which is counter to the intent of the bill.

OPSD suggests the following amendment to page 2, lines 10 - 13 to clarify this confusion:

"(a) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, when an a commercial activity or operation previously permitted, or authorized, or undertaken by a commercial entity is challenged ...".

And this similar amendment to page 3, lines 8-10,

"(b) If an agency determines that an a commercial activity or operation previously authorized, or permitted, or undertaken by a commercial entity is subject to the requirements of this chapter, ...".

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) respectfully submits this testimony in **OPPOSITION** to **SB1074 SD1**, which would amend Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS) Chapter 343, the Hawai'i Environmental Policy Act (HEPA), to allow previously permitted activities to continue, if challenged under HEPA, pending environmental review.

This amendment would have unintended negative consequences, including for Native Hawaiian rights, interests, and cultural practices, by allowing harmful activities to continue simply because they have been previously permitted, even if done so illegally, or prior to the adoption of HEPA. Stopping an activity from proceeding during HEPA review is a bedrock principle of the law and ensures that precious resources are not destroyed before the public has input and decision-makers are fully aware of the potential consequences of their permitting choices. Thus, while framed as a tag-on amendment to the law, this amendment would fundamentally alter the nature of HEPA review and the ability of the statute to accomplish its intended purposes.

HEPA is frequently a vehicle for OHA's beneficiaries to ensure the protection of their rights including the exercise of traditional and customary practices. As just one example, the commercial aquarium trade had never been subject to environmental review prior to a 2017 ruling from the Hawai'i Supreme Court, and was subsequently enjoined in certain areas pending HEPA compliance. Traditional Native Hawaiian fishers and cultural practitioners were among the plaintiffs in that landmark ruling to ensure careful consideration of how this extractive commercial enterprise affects others who depend on the same resources for subsistence and cultural practices. This is simply one example of many illustrating the importance of this law to the individuals and communities that OHA represents. However, if the amendment proposed in SB1074 SD1 had been in place in 2017, unchecked commercial extraction would have continued pending environmental review.

Aloha Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Gabbard, and Members of the Committee,

On behalf of our over 20,000 members and supporters, the Sierra Club of Hawai'i **STRONGLY OPPOSES SB1074 SD1**, which would turn our environmental review process into an afterthought, and pave the way for significant and unnecessary environmental, cultural, socioeconomic, and economic impacts to our islands and future generations.

The Sierra Club emphasizes that this measure will result in significant, unnecessary, and potentially irreversible impacts to the wide range of public interests in our islands' vital but fragile environment. Our environmental review law has, for 40 years, played a critical role in ensuring that certain decisions potentially impacting our islands' environmental, cultural, and socioeconomic integrity are carefully and transparently assessed by government decisionmakers, before they render their decisions and proposed actions are taken. The environmental review process also helps to ensure that these decisionmakers explicitly consider ways to avoid such impacts, to the extent feasible. Notably, the environmental review law includes opportunities for decisionmakers with limited experiences to be informed by those with a wide range of expertise, insight, and perspectives - including Native Hawaiian cultural practitioners and others with intimate place-based knowledge of their local environment and associated cultural and recreational practices.

Unfortunately, as has been affirmed time and again by our court system, agencies sometimes fail to follow the requirements of the environmental review law prior to decisionmaking, allowing actions to proceed or continue without any of the benefits of environmental review. This includes the issuance of commercial permits to allow the unlimited take of marine life for aquarium purposes, as well as of stream diversion permits that have drained streams needed by watersheds, estuaries, and rural Native Hawaiian communities for decades. Notably, in the latter example, the dewatering of East Maui's streams continued, uninterrupted, for nearly 20 years after an environmental review for long-term diversions was ordered by the circuit court - a practice that has most recently been confirmed as illegal by the Hawai'i Supreme Court. Such failures to follow the established law have resulted in long-term, deleterious, and otherwise avoidable impacts including impaired watersheds and aquatic ecosystems, severely diminished regional food security, substantial water waste, cessation of cultural and subsistence practices, and many others.



This measure would legitimize these and other unlawful and harmful agency practices, and open the door for future abuses of our environment, culture, and community rights and interests. Allowing actions to be executed and continued while environmental review requirements are considered, challenged, and/or rectified - something which may take years or decades - would essentially make environmental review an afterthought, rather than a prudent planning and harm mitigation mechanism. With the after-the-fact environmental reviews implicitly authorized by this measure, even well-meaning decisionmakers will be inevitably pressured by political and/or monied special interests to disregard their environmental review obligations in favor of expedited approvals to continue unlawfully authorized actions – with no meaningful remedy for the unaccounted-for harms inflicted, as legal review and compliance actions are dragged on for years or indefinitely.

The Sierra Club understands that the impetus behind this measure has been a court ruling that found the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) in violation of our environmental review law, in its issuance of commercial operator permits in Ka'anapali. The Sierra Club urges the Committee to note that the DLNR has not provided an explanation as to whether it has initiated the environmental assessment process in the eight years since the underlying lawsuit was filed; examined whether certain operations can be permitted under a categorical exemption; or offered to negotiate with the plaintiffs to support a stay on the court ruling, subject to the adoption of interim permit conditions to address the wastewater discharge, public access, and other concerns that were raised.

As we continue to navigate an era of unprecedented uncertainty and instability, we need much greater, not less, mindfulness and prudence in how we treat our environment - the very foundation of our future generations' existence. This bill proposes the exact opposite. Please do not pass this measure.

Accordingly, the Sierra Club respectfully urges the Committee to **HOLD** SB1074 SD1. Thank you very much for this opportunity to testify.

Earthjustice **strongly opposes SB 1074, SD1**, which, if passed, would gut core protections provided by the Hawai'i Environmental Policy Act ("HEPA"), one of Hawai'i's bedrock environmental laws. The proposed measure would allow agencies like the Department of Land and Natural Resources to continue indefinitely rubberstamping approvals to use our public trust land, water, and ocean resources, no matter how environmentally and culturally destructive. This negates HEPA's fundamental purpose to consider and mitigate such impacts *before they occur*. Please reject and hold this bill.

The legislature established HEPA over 50 years ago to mandate the disclosure of environmental impacts and "ensure that environmental concerns are given appropriate consideration in decision making." Hawai'i Revised Statutes ("HRS") § 343-1. This purpose is just as or even more important today as when the law was originally passed. HEPA defines applicable "actions" to include "program[s] or project[s] initiated by an agency or applicant" and specifically identifies the types of actions that trigger the requirement for environmental review. *Id.* § 343-5(a). For decades, HEPA and its public review process have stood as a charter mandate for protecting Hawai'i's environment for the long-term benefit of its citizens. SB 1074, SD 1 cuts to the heart of HEPA's purpose, subordinating the public interest in service to "commercial entit[ies]."

SB 1074, SD1's preamble suggests that "the State's environmental review process" is to blame for "commercial operations" being "forced to cease operations." In the boating context underlying this and similar bills this session, we understand that the parties are in the process of working out a settlement that would allow operations to continue. The legislature should respect the court process and not intervene on behalf of specific parties or interests in pending litigation.

The further assertion that "recent court decisions have broadened the definition of 'action'" misrepresents the law. *See, e.g., Umberger v. Dep't of Land & Natural Res.,* 140 Hawai'i 500, 515-16, 403 P.3d 277, 292-93 (2017) (listing examples of "the wide range of activities and courses of conduct to which HEPA has been applied"); *see also* HRS § 343-2 (defining "action" broadly as "any program or project to be initiated by an agency or applicant"). The *Umberger* court based its interpretation of the term "action" on the plain, dictionary meanings of the words "program" and "project." 140 Hawai'i at 513, 403 P.3d at 290. More recently, in 2019, the Office of Environmental Quality Control promulgated specific further definitions for "program" and "project." Hawai'i Administrative Rules ("HAR") § 11-200.1-2. If anything, the courts and the 2019 HEPA rules have *narrowed* the definition of "action" by providing greater clarity as to what "action" means.

Having begun from faulty premises, SB 1074, SD 1 then subverts HEPA's core purpose by proposing to allow ongoing or recurring permitted activities to continue even while undergoing environmental review. This is an overblown response to the stated reasons for the legislation and threatens to cause sweeping damage beyond its intended scope. Giving a free pass to ongoing permitted activities under HEPA would mean that, in instances where such activities are in fact causing environmental damage, they would be allowed to heedlessly continue, even if environmental review is required. Indeed, permittees and agencies would have zero incentive to timely and faithfully comply with the environmental review process, relegating it to a meaningless paper exercise to justify continued harm and zero change in the status quo. Put simply, SB 1074 is gross overkill: it threatens to undo decades of environmental progress in Hawai'i, and it is entirely unnecessary to achieve its stated goals.

HEPA already expressly provides that agencies may exempt from environmental review "specific types of actions, because they will probably have minimal or no significant effects on the environment." Haw. Rev. Stat. § 343-6(a)(2); see also HAR §§ 11-200.1-15, -16, -17 (provisions for general exemptions, agency-specific exemption lists, and procedures for exemption notices). These provisions have been in place and available to state agencies for decades and are still available now to exempt minor activities and allow them to continue. Agency inaction, delay, or recalcitrance in processing appropriate exemptions is no reason to dismantle HEPA. Rather it only highlights the need for the agency to respect the law and process and allow it to work and fulfill its fundamental purpose.

It is by now common knowledge that this and other similar bills this session are purportedly targeted at a specific circumstance on Maui involving commercial tour boat operators in Ka'anapali. Again, we understand that the case is headed toward a resolution that would allow tour operations to continue, with conditions that address the West Maui community's concerns including ocean safety. In other words, HEPA appears to be fulfilling its purpose in that case.

Indeed, commercial tour boat operators, even more than most commercial entities, rely directly on healthy marine ecosystems for their business. HEPA has been an important and necessary tool for protecting Hawai'i's natural and cultural resources, including specifically our marine ecosystems. Gutting HEPA as proposed in SB 1074, SD 1 will ultimately hurt these businesses along with the rest of the community and public who share in these ocean resources. We urge this Committee to hold this bill and foster real solutions to identifiable and actionable issues, rather than capitulate to overreactions and fearmongering.

For these reasons, Earthjustice strongly opposes SB 1074, SD 1 and respectfully requests that it be held. Mahalo nui for this opportunity to testify. Please do not hesitate to contact us with any further questions or for further information.

Aloha e Chair Rhoads, Vice-Chair Gabbard, and committee members:

The Native Hawaiian Legal Corporation **opposes SB1074 SD1**, which subverts the fundamental purpose of the Hawai'i Environmental Policy Act ("HEPA"), Hawai'i Revised Statutes ("HRS") chapter 343, by proposing to allow ongoing or recurring permitted activities to continue even while undergoing environmental review.

HEPA was enacted over 50 years ago to protect the state's natural resources, held in trust for the people of Hawai'i, by "ensur[ing] that environmental concerns are given appropriate consideration in decision making." In so doing, the legislature declared that "the process of reviewing environmental effects is desirable because environmental consciousness is enhanced, cooperation and coordination are encouraged, and public participation during the review process benefits all parties involved and society as a whole." See HRS § 343-1. Since that time, this statute has been an important vehicle for communities across the pae 'āina – including Native Hawaiian cultural practitioners with place-based knowledge and traditional practices — to come to the table as part of the formal process to assess environmental impacts of proposed actions and provide agencies with the most comprehensive information to guide its decisionmaking and mitigate impacts **before** any action takes place.

SB1074 does the opposite. By allowing permitted activities to continue while undergoing environmental review, HEPA is turned on its head, rendering the legal requirements of environmental review an afterthought rather than a planning tool to guide agency decision-making.

We have already witnessed the effects of unchecked authorizations without environmental review. For well over a century, commercial entities have historically dewatered streams in East Maui to support commercial operations dozens of miles away, severely impacting Native Hawaiian communities and their traditional farming, fishing, and gathering practices as well as the watershed that supports the moku's forests and estuaries. Under the authority of ongoing but "temporary" annual revocable permits, the state freely allowed the diversion of streams nearly two decades after (1) the community pushed for environmental review and (2) an environmental assessment was ordered by the circuit court. The diversions dried up streams, devastated lo'i kalo, destroyed the habitat that native species needed to thrive, and damaged the community's cultural heritage. And it was for that reason, the Hawai'i Supreme Court held that HEPA applied to these continuing activities: "[G]iven the significant environmental impact of the permitted action, [the Board of Land and Natural Resources' authority to issue revocable permits is subject to the environmental review requirements of HEPA." Carmichael v. Bd. of Land and Nat. Res., 150 Hawai'i 547, 552, 506 P.3d 233 (2022).

Indeed, turning a blind eye to the impacts of a "previously authorized or permitted activity" contradicts the intent and purpose of HEPA. SB1074 SD1 would allow for the rubberstamping of potentially devastating projects and programs, the perpetuation of harmful agency practices, and the authorization of actions that could harm our environment, culture, and community. Addressing compliance (or lack thereof) with environmental review could take years—years of potentially irreparable impacts that may never be able to be properly mitigated. "Disrupting" ongoing commercial activities should be the least of our state's concerns where our public trust resources are at stake.

Additionally, the proffered justification for SB 1074 SD1 — *i.e.*, that "recent court decisions have broadened the definition of 'action'" — misstates the law. HRS § 343-2 defines "action" as "any program or project to be initiated by an agency or applicant." In looking at the range of activities to which HEPA has been applied, the Hawai'i Supreme Court in *Umberger* relied on "a generally accepted dictionary" for the plain meaning of the words "program" and "project" — ultimately narrowing and clarifying the broader statutory definition. *See Umberger v. Dep't of Land & Natural Res.*, 140

Hawai'i 500, 513, 403 P.3d 277, 290 (2017); see also Hawai'i Administrative Rules § 11-200-1.2 (further defining "program" and "project").

It is also worth noting that HEPA already exempts from environmental review "specific types of actions, because they will probably have minimal or no significant effects on the environment." HRS § 343-6(a)(2). Commercial operations engaged in activities that will have no impact on our resources can rely on this provision—as they have always been able to do. But a wholesale exemption from the law is irresponsible and inconsistent with the state's kuleana as trustee of our public trust resources.

For these reasons, NHLC opposes SB 1074 SD1 and requests that it be held. Mahalo for the opportunity to testify.



Opposition to SB 1074 SD1 and HB 661 HD1

Aloha,

We, the undersigned, **strongly oppose HB SB 1074 SD1 and 661 HD1**, which would amend the Hawai'i Environmental Policy Act (HEPA), to allow activities previously "undertaken by an applicant" to continue, while still pending environmental review, even if causing irreversible environmental or cultural damage and challenged under HEPA.

These bills would severely undermine core protections for Native Hawaiian rights and Hawai'i's foundational environmental law, potentially leading to substantial, irreversible environmental and cultural harm.

Stopping an activity from proceeding during HEPA review is a fundamental principle of the law and ensures that precious public and cultural resources are not destroyed before the public has input and "environmental concerns are given appropriate consideration in decision making." (HRS. 343).

In addition, we have substantial concerns about the enormous loophole created for extractive activities in marine areas, including protected and nearshore areas.

The proposed amendment to HEPA states that the amendment "shall not apply to activities involving construction, grading, dredging, or other structural modifications to land, waterways, or marine environments" but would apply to a wide range of potentially permanently damaging commercial and "non-commercial" extractive activities in state waters for which there are already clear examples of irreparable damage. We are deeply concerned about commercial fishing and extractive activities and industrial levels of "non-commercial" extractive activities, including fishing, in state waters.

Papahānaumokuākea

Over a hundred thousand people fought for the establishment of the strongest possible protections for the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands – leading to the creation of the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands (NWHI) State Refuge as well as for protections in federal waters, including the establishment of the NWHI Coral Reef Reserve in 2000 and the Papahānaumokuākea Monument in 2006.

The strong protections of the Reserve, State Refuge, and Monument were established as a result of public outrage over decades of the state's refusal to exercise jurisdiction and refusal to implement HEPA in the state waters of the NWHI. This allowed Wespac lobster fishers and poachers to destroy lobster populations in state waters contributing to the starvation of the nearly extinct Hawaiian monk seals. Past commercial fishing vessels slammed into reefs damaging corals and releasing thousands of gallons of fuel, hydraulic and motor oil, fishing gear and other contaminants into the NWHI marine environment. Sadly, lobster stocks have never recovered.

Allowing significant extractive activities — whether labelled commercial or "non-commercial" — in state waters in the absence of HEPA review has already led to permanent harm. Should protections in fragile Papahānaumokuākea be weakened in the future, this proposed enormous loophole could potentially be used to allow unchecked destruction of precious Papahānaumokuākea natural and cultural resources in state waters.

The proposed changes would allow environmental damage to continue unabated in state waters of the Main Hawaiian Islands while "waiting" - potentially for *decades* - for the completion of an environmental review.¹

Concerns about the negative impact on traditional cultural resources and practices

According to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA):

"HEPA is frequently a vehicle for OHA's beneficiaries to ensure protection of their rights including the exercise of traditional and customary practices. As just one example, the commercial aquarium trade had never been subject to environmental review prior to a 2017 ruling from the Hawai'i Supreme Court, and was subsequently enjoined in certain areas pending HEPA compliance. Traditional Native Hawaiian fishers and cultural practitioners were among the plaintiffs in that landmark ruling to ensure careful consideration of how this extractive commercial enterprise affects others who depend on the same resources for subsistence and cultural practices. This is simply one example of many illustrating the importance of this law to the individuals and communities that OHA represents. However, if the amendment proposed ... had been in place in 2017, unchecked commercial extraction would have continued pending environmental review."

Negating HEPA's fundamental purpose

This amendment of HEPA is being proposed in response to the claim that recent court decisions "have broadened the definition of an environmental 'action." This is untrue.

According to Earthjustice:

"If anything, the courts and the 2019 HEPA rules have narrowed the definition of "action..." HEPA already expressly provides that agencies may exempt from environmental review "specific types of actions, because they will probably have minimal or no significant effects on the environment." Haw. Rev. Stat. § 343-6(a)(2).

This provision has been in place and available to state agencies for decades. <u>Agency inaction in processing appropriate exemptions is no reason to undercut HEPA's core requirements</u> and fundamentally alter the landscape of environmental protection in Hawai'i Nei."

"Exempting ongoing permitted activities under HEPA would mean that, in instances where such activities are in fact causing environmental damage, they would be allowed to continue unabated, even if environmental review is required or completed...It threatens to undo decades of environmental progress in Hawai'i, and it is entirely unnecessary to achieve its stated goals."

The proposed amendment "would negate HEPA's fundamental purpose for a broad subset of permitted activities, allowing irreparable environmental harm."

¹ For example, "the dewatering of East Maui's streams continued, uninterrupted, for nearly 20 years after an environmental review for long-term diversions was ordered by the circuit court – a practice that has most recently been confirmed as illegal by the Hawai'i Supreme Court. ... With the after-the-fact environmental reviews implicitly authorized by this measure, well-meaning decisionmakers will be inevitably pressured by political and monied special interests to disregard their environmental review obligations in favor of expedited approvals – with no meaningful remedy for the unaccounted-for harms inflicted, as legal challenges to unlawfully approved actions drag on for years, or even decades." Aloha e Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Gabbard, and Committee Members,

Please accept these comments submitted by the Center for Biological Diversity (Center) in **strong opposition of Senate Bill 1074**, which would enable agencies to continue approving environmentally destructive activities, such as commercial aquarium collection, without adequately assessing their impacts until, if ever, the agencies decide to conduct a proper review or take corrective action.

The Center is a non-profit 501(c)(3) membership corporation dedicated to the protection of native, threated, and endangered species and the habitats they depend on to survive. Through science, policy, and environmental law, the Center is actively involved in endangered, threatened, and native species and habitat protection issues throughout Hawai'i. The Center has more than 88,000 members throughout the United States, including Hawai'i, with a direct interest in ensuring the conservation of our Hawaiian species and waters.

Senate Bill 1074 undermines crucial protections for Hawai'i's native and endemic species and the ecosystems they depend upon for survival. At a time when many of Hawai'i's species are teetering on the brink due to climate change, habitat disruption, invasive species, and human population growth, it is imperative that we redouble our efforts to recover and safeguard the remaining species and marine ecosystems we still have.

However, Senate Bill 1074 would have the opposite effect. The Center is deeply concerned about the harmful effects this bill would have on Hawai'i's fragile reef ecosystems and the traditional lawai'a pono practices that have been passed down for generations. Commercial aquarium collectors have already caused significant ecological damage to reef systems on O'ahu and

Hawai'i Island, extracting hundreds of thousands of fish and invertebrates annually from critical marine areas, including hotspots like West Hawai'i and Kāne'ohe Bay. Among the species targeted for collection are native and endemic species such as the lau'ipala (yellow tang), kole (goldring surgeonfish), and pāku'iku'i (Achilles tang). These species play a fundamental role in maintaining the health and biodiversity of the reefs, and their removal disrupts the delicate ecological balance that is vital for supporting both healthy ecosystems and Native Hawaiian subsistence fishing practices.

Rather than remaining on the reefs to fulfill their ecological role, the reef life that is extracted is sold and shipped around the world, often in plastic bags, to supply the global ornamental fish market. This practice depletes the local marine environment and denies Hawaiians access to the fish they have relied upon for generations. It is not just an environmental issue; it is a cultural and economic one, as the removal of these species undermines the sustainability of traditional fishing practices that are essential to many Native Hawaiian's culture and livelihoods.

Thanks to the Hawai'i Environmental Policy Act (HEPA) and recent court rulings, the extraction of aquarium fish has been temporarily halted while the State and collectors are required to engage in a more comprehensive review of the environmental and cultural impacts of the practice. This pause has allowed the public environmental review process to properly assess the long-term consequences of aquarium collection and explore alternatives that could help protect Hawai'i's reefs and preserve cultural traditions. This review is an essential step in ensuring that any actions taken do not exacerbate the harm to Hawai'i's fragile marine ecosystems.

However, this bill would severely weaken HEPA's ability to protect the environment by allowing commercial aquarium collectors to continue their harmful practices without first undergoing a thorough and meaningful environmental review. It would essentially provide a free pass to industry, allowing them to cause further damage while postponing environmental assessment until it is too late to prevent harm. The bill would render the environmental review process meaningless, turning it into a mere formality rather than a substantive tool for preventing irreversible ecological degradation. The harm caused by continued extraction, once done, cannot be undone, and the long-term impacts on Hawai'i's reefs could be devastating.

Moreover, this bill would gut HEPA's core purpose. The law was designed to ensure that all projects with potential environmental impacts undergo proper review before they proceed, allowing for informed decision-making and public participation. While HEPA does provide for exemptions for activities with truly minor impacts, the scale and nature of commercial aquarium collection make it far from a minor concern. This bill is unnecessary and would undermine the very protections that Hawai'i's environment, cultural resources, and future generations depend upon. Instead of weakening HEPA, we should be reinforcing it to ensure that future decisions about the use of Hawai'i's natural resources are made with the utmost care and respect for both the environment and the cultural practices that sustain it.

Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Gabbard, and Committee Members:

The League of Women Voters of Hawaii opposes SB 1074, SD1.

Chapter 343, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is "triggered" by private permit applications for "use" of public property or the Conservation District. In April 2024, the Hawaii Intermediate Court of Appeals (ICA) ruled that Chapter 343 required a formal determination as to whether an environmental assessment (EA) must be prepared prior to DLNR approval of 6 permit applications for commercial thrill craft at Kaanapali. Since the ICA ruling the DLNR has not determined whether an EA is required for either new permits or renewal of several dozen existing permits for commercial boating at Kaanapali. The League has no position concerning EA requirements for controversial thrill craft permit applications. However, it would be reasonable, and Chapter 343 rules allow, for the DLNR to publish electronic notice that an EA is not required for renewal of noncontroversial permits for existing commercial boating at Kaanapali.

The primary purpose of SB 1074 was to allow existing Kaanapali boating businesses to renew permits and continue existing commercial activity regardless of whether an EA is required. Unfortunately, this bill is not limited to boating at Kaanapali. SB 1074, SD1 proposes that when a private applicant requests agency approval to renew ANY permit which "triggers" Chapter 343, and does not "... include construction, grading, dredging, or other structural modifications....", there would be no deadline for the approving agency to determine whether an EA is required and no deadline for completion of an EA. In effect Chapter 343 would no longer require either environmental analysis or the opportunity for informed public comment prior to renewal of controversial, problematic permits which authorize private businesses to continue diverting streams, removing native plants and animals, or dumping polluted wastewater.

Dear Chair Rhoads, Vice-Chair Gabbard and Committee Members,

For the Fishes, a Maui-based nonprofit organization dedicated to protecting Hawaii's coral reef wildlife **strongly opposes SB1074 SD1** which would allow previously permitted actions and activities to CONTINUE while an agency, individual or business conducts an environmental analysis.

As proposed, this bill would completely gut our landmark Hawaii Environmental Policy Act (HEPA) that the legislature adopted to ensure actions/activities, especially those that may cause irreparable harm to our marine and terrestrial environments, are appropriately analyzed, given natural resources are held in the public trust for all the peoples of Hawaii, and constitutionally protect against those activities that may impact native Hawaiian cultural practices.

While the original intent of this bill may have been to allow non-extractive activities to continue while a state agency such as DLNR conducts a routine assessment to determine if the activity qualifies for exemption, as written, the bill would have far-reaching implications. In addition, there is no time limit for the preparation of an environmental analysis, so a destructive practice could essentially continue for years, or even decades, if/while an individual or business prepares an environmental assessment.

State agencies routinely review and prepare environmental exemption assessments (i.e. state and county exemption lists are published monthly in the Environmental Notice). We agree that agencies should prepare them promptly, however, blanketly exempting existing permitted activities from HEPA is not the way to address DLNR or other state or county agency dereliction.

Further, exempting existing activities from potential environmental review completely removes the public and the impacted communities from the process, whereby agencies or applicants would not be required to solicit public opinion or hold public hearings to receive feedback from the impacted communities as is required under HEPA.

We urge the Committee to defer this bill in its entirety.

We are Olan Leimomi Fisher and Kevin Chang, Kuaʻāina Advocate and Executive Director, respectively, testifying on behalf of Kuaʻāina Ulu 'Auamo (or KUA). "Kuaʻāina Ulu 'Auamo" stands for "grassroots growing through shared responsibility," and our acronym "KUA" means "backbone." Our mission is to connect and empower communities to improve their quality of life through the collective care for their biocultural (natural and cultural) heritage, serving as a "backbone organization" that supports creative and community-driven solutions to problems stemming from environmental degradation. Hawaiʻi's biocultural resources continue to be negatively impacted by political, economic, and social changes, and the increasing dangers of climate change make fostering and empowering resilient communities acutely critical.

Currently KUA supports three major networks of: (1) over 40 mālama 'āina (caring for our 'āina or "that which feeds") community groups collectively referred to as E Alu Pū (moving forward together); (2) over 60 loko i'a (fishpond aquaculture systems unique to Hawai'i) and wai 'ōpae (anchialine pool systems) sites in varying stages of restoration and development, with numerous caretakers, stakeholders, and volunteers known as the Hui Mālama Loko I'a ("caretakers of fishponds"); and (3) the Limu Hui made up of over 50 loea (traditional experts) and practitioners in all things "limu" or locally-grown "seaweed." **Our shared vision is to once again experience what our kūpuna (ancestors) referred to as 'ĀINA MOMONA – abundant and healthy ecological systems that sustain our community resilience and well-being.**

We strongly oppose SB1074 SD1, as a dangerous threat to achieving 'āina momona.

This measure would allow a previously authorized commercial activity to continue regardless of whether it has gone through our time-tested environmental review process. This could allow unsustainable and destructive activities to continue without considering the environmental impacts, mitigation measures, or alternatives. **SB1074 SD1 is unnecessary given that our Hawai'i Environmental Policy Act (HEPA) laws** *already* **provide for exemptions for activities with minor impacts.** This bill also threatens the health of our nearshore ecosystems, Native Hawaiian cultural and traditional rights, and community stewardship practices, while undermining the necessary public participation and transparency provided through our established environmental review laws. It would create *more* stress and *more* work for DLNR and communities, not less, and for the benefit of only a small vocal minority of commercial aquarium operators.

The communities in our KUA networks, including Native Hawaiians and kama'āina alike, depend on the health and balance of our nearshore ecosystems in order to continue their traditional and customary practices and to mālama their 'āina. SB1074 SD1's existential undermining of HEPA would make way for far-reaching negative effects on our already suffering i'a (sea life) that do not justify the supposed need to appease the well-documented (and litigated)

exploitation by a small handful of aquarium fishing operators. HEPA serves to ensure public awareness and participation from as many stakeholders as possible, including Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practitioners protected under our Hawaii State Constitution. HEPA also provides stability for public participation with the constant changes in DLNR leadership and staff.

As the recent <u>Umberger</u> and <u>Kaupiko</u> Supreme Court decisions made clear, DLNR severely lacks capacity to provide proper management and protection of our nearshore resources and Native Hawaiian rights involving aquarium fishing permits alone. Undermining HEPA is *not* the answer, especially with increasing threats (invasive species, pollution, overtourism, natural disasters, etc.) to the fragile biocultural resources that we ALL depend on to live and thrive here in Hawai'i. **This measure is unnecessary and will only lead to more lawsuits, more contested cases, and more community distrust and division.**

SB1074 SD1 works directly against achieving 'āina momona to ensure healthy and thriving biocultural resources for generations to come.

The Ocean Tourism Coalition (OTC) appreciates the opportunity to provide testimony in support of SB1074 with amendments. OTC represents ocean tourism operators across the state, many of whom have been severely impacted by the 2023 Lahaina Fire. We support a framework that allows currently permitted boat operators in Kaanapali to continue operating while environmental review is completed.

However, we have concerns that the broad language of the current bill could create unintended consequences that may prevent it from ultimately helping those on Maui that are currently under threat of being shut down. As written, the measure could be interpreted to allow a wide range of activities far beyond the scope of what we believe the bill intends to address.

OTC believes the bill should be narrowly tailored to ensure that it provides relief to operators who depend on ORMA permits at Kaanapali. Given the unique challenges facing ocean tour operators in this area, we respectfully suggest limiting the bill's application to commercial use permits in Kaanapali waters and would not oppose a sunset date.

By refining the bill's scope, the Legislature can ensure that it provides relief to tour operators currently under threat of losing their livelihood.

Surfrider Foundation Hawai'i Region strongly opposes Senate Bill 1074 which would allow state agencies to permit commercial activities even before environmental review is complete. This undercuts the core function of the Hawai'i Environmental Policy Act (HRS Ch. 343), which requires a hard look at environmental impacts *before* a potentially hazardous commercial activity is permitted.

Surfrider Foundation is a grassroots activist network dedicated to the protection of our oceans, waves, and beaches. Our chapters on Maui, Oʻahu, and Kauaʻi have tirelessly defended and protected Hawaiʻi's coastal and marine environments for decades. Hawaiʻi's environmental review process is pivotal to this mission.

We oppose SB 1074 for the following reasons:

This Bill is Unnecessary.

Chapter 343 *already* allows exemptions or streamlined processes for activities that are not likely to be environmentally hazardous. This includes benign permit renewals if a commercial activity has been operated safely in the past.

The Bill Incentivizes Commercial Operators to Challenge Environmental Protections.

The bill claims that it "temporarily" allows commercial activities to continue while the environmental review process unfolds. But the bill provides no guidelines for how long that temporary exemption may last. In a scenario where the environmental review process determines that the activity is too dangerous to approve, commercial operators will be incentivized to challenge that decision. By dragging out their challenge, a commercial entity could continue operating for years and years even after it is initially determined that the activity is too dangerous to permit.

The Bill is Shockingly Broad. It Applies to Any Activity "Undertaken by a Commercial Entity."

Despite claims that this bill applies only to previously permitted activities, the plain text of the bill is much broader. It applies to any activity "previously permitted, authorized or undertaken by a commercial entity." This broad exemption allows any commercial entity to continue any previously undertaken activity during environmental review, irrespective of whether that activity was previously permitted or authorized.

Environmental protections are being viciously dismantled and gutted on a national level, Hawai'i needs to stand firm in our environmental laws and protections with the utmost diligence. I urge you to OPPOSE SB 1074 SD 1.

TESTIMONY IN STRONG OPPOSITION TO SB 1074, SD1

Aloha Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Gabbard, and Members of the Committee,

Nā Kia'i o Wai Ha strongly **opposes SB 1074, SD1**, which would **weaken Hawai'i's environmental review law (HEPA)** and allow government agencies to **approve projects without first assessing their environmental and cultural impacts**.

A recent ruling by the Hawai'i Environmental Court demonstrates why a strong HEPA is necessary. The court halted the Honokea Surf Village wave pool project after finding that the Hawai'i Community Development Authority (HCDA) failed to properly evaluate water use, cumulative impacts, and resource depletion. The judge ruled that there was "insufficient evidence" to determine whether the project would cause irreversible harm, reinforcing the need for environmental review before a project moves forward—not after damage has already occurred.

Our lawsuit against HCDA further proves that agencies cannot be trusted to conduct thorough environmental assessments without proper oversight. SB 1074, SD1 would allow agencies to permit destructive projects before evaluating their true impact, undermining HEPA's entire purpose and ignoring legal safeguards upheld by our courts.

Why SB 1074, SD1 is Dangerous

- The Honokea ruling proves that environmental reviews must happen before projects move forward, not after damage is done. SB 1074, SD1 would allow agencies to rubberstamp projects while delaying the review process.
- The bill undermines legal accountability. HEPA already allows exemptions for low-impact projects, and courts have enforced environmental review when agencies fail to do their job—SB 1074, SD1 removes that safeguard.

• It threatens Hawai'i's water resources. The judge found that the wave pool developers failed to adequately analyze cumulative water use impacts, an issue that would be ignored if SB 1074, SD1 were law.

Nā Kia'i o Wai Ha urges the **Senate Committee on Judiciary to VOTE NO on SB 1074, SD1** and protect Hawai'i's environmental review process.

My name is William "Billy" Kinney and I am from Hanalei and Hā'ena on Kaua'i. I am currently the Assistant Director of the Hui Maka'ainana o Makana (the "Hui") - a nonprofit organization of lineal descendants stewarding Hā'ena State Park, and Hā'ena nearshore fisheries. In 2015 we became the first Community-based Subsistence Fishing Area with a management plan and rules package signed into law. On behalf of the Hui, our cofounders and members, who are also lawai'a and ocean advocates - such as Presley Wann and Kelii Alapai - we strongly oppose SB1074, SD1, which would allow agencies to keep rubberstamping these environmentally harmful activities (like commercial aquarium collection) to our fisheries in which we epend on. Our nearshore fisheries are our "icebox". Detrimental activities such as the ones that have been going on, unfettered and unchecked, need to an end date or else the structural balance and health of our fisheries will.

We are deeply concerned how this bill would affect our reefs and reefs elsewhere in Hawai'i, and moreso, we are extremely concerned at the message this sends to others who dont ascribe to lawai'a pono practices to reiterate that it is okay to destroy a communal food source for personal monetary gains.

Commercial aquarium collectors have devastated reef ecosystems around Oʻahu and Hawaiʻi Island, extracting hundreds of thousands of fish and invertebrates each year in hotspots including West Hawaiʻi and Kāneʻohe Bay. Collected species include lauʻipala (yellow tang), kole (goldring surgeonfish), pākuʻikuʻi (Achilles tang), among many other native and endemic species that are critical for maintaining healthy reefs and supporting Native Hawaiian subsistence fishing and cultural practices.

Thanks to HEPA and recent court rulings, our reefs have finally gotten a break from unlimited aquarium extraction while the collectors and State look at environmental and cultural impacts, mitigation measures, and alternatives through the public environmental review process.

Please let HEPA do its job to inform agency decision-making beforehand, rather than handing industry a free pass to continue causing harm for years on end until they get around to completing the environmental review process. This bill would turn HEPA review into an

afterthought and meaningless formality to justify harm that's already been done . . . and can't be undone.

This bill would gut HEPA's whole purpose and is unnecessary. HEPA provides for exemptions of activities that have truly minor impacts.

I strongly urge you to VOTE NO on SB1074, SD1.

The Hawai'i Reef and Ocean Coalition (HIROC) is a group of scientists, educators, filmmakers and environmental advocates who have been working since 2017 to protect Hawaii's coral reefs and

ocean. We support funding for environmental stewardship. The mission of the Climate Protectors Hawai'i is to educate and engage the local community in climate change action, to help Hawai'i show the world the way back to a safe and stable climate. We support measures to reduce climate warming and its impacts.

Hawai'i Reef and Ocean Coalition and Climate Protectors Hawai'i respectfully but **STRONGLY OPPOSE SB1074 SD1!**

As a Deputy Attorney General, for 14 years I represented the agencies that administer Hawaii's Environmental Policy Act (HRS chapters 343 and 344, aka HEPA), the Office of Environmental Quality Control and the Environmental Council. It is my considered opinion that this bill would undercut the core purpose of HEPA, to ensure that projects with potential environmental impacts undergo proper review before they proceed, allowing for informed decision-making and public participation. It would make environmental review an afterthought in many instances instead of a useful planning process.

Not all existing commercial operations are small, benign, and without environmental impacts that should be allowed to continue to damage the environment while being reviewed. Not all "previously undertaken activities" should be grandfathered from review of environmental impacts, especially when they have new projects or programs, while environmental review takes place. To allow this continuation could have grave consequences for our precious coral reefs and other critical ecosystems.

This bill is overbroad and potentially harmful. If litigation over existing charter boat operations has not been settled and an exemption for them is still desired, that situation should addressed narrowly, not used as a basis to extend, as this bill does, an exemption from environmental review to all previously permitted commercial operations. HEPA already provides for agencies to establish procedures to exempt from environmental assessments "specific types of actions, because they will probably have minimal or no significant effects on the environment." HRS Sec. 343-6(a)(2).

The overbroad language in this bill could allow the indefinite continuation, for example, of aquarium trade operations and the dewatering of East Maui streams. This broad exemption language looks like an inappropriate end-run against validly decided court decisions, *Umberger*, et al. v. DLNR, *Kaupiko et al. v. DLNR*, etc.

Please hold this bill in current overbroad form!

Aloha e Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Gabbard, and Members of the Senate Committee on Judiciary,

Nā Kia'i Kai submits this testimony in <u>strong opposition</u> to **SB 1074, SD 1**. We urge this committee to <u>reject this bill</u>.

Nā Kia'i Kai is a community-based organization established by West Kaua'i residents, including Native Hawaiian fishers and cultural practitioners, to protect West Kaua'i's river and coastal waters, humans, and aquatic life from pollution. For decades, Nā Kia'i Kai has advocated on behalf of our community against a multitude of environmental harms.

For more than a century, West Kaua'i has borne the brunt of the island's environmental and cultural injustices. Beginning in the late 1800s, sugar plantations filled and channelized the Mānā Plain—once home to a thriving network of wetlands and freshwater springs—to artificially create dry land suitable for sugar cultivation. For over a century, these sugar plantations dammed and completely drained the Waimea River and its tributaries to irrigate its crops. This water pumping and water diversion infrastructure is still in operation today and has all but destroyed the complex stream, wetland, and reef ecosystems along West Kaua'i from mauka to makai.

After the last sugar plantation closed in 2000, it did little to clean up and remediate the land it had once occupied, leaving the soil and water contaminated with long-lasting pesticides. With the end of the plantation era, the biotech industry saw an opening to seize agricultural lands on the Mānā Plain and quickly transformed West Kaua'i into ground zero for agrochemical "GMO" operations. Rampant pesticide use on the west side came to a head in 2006 and 2008, when students and staff at Waimea Canyon Middle School were taken to the hospital suffering symptoms of pesticide exposure.

West Kaua'i also hosts numerous industrial uses, including a gravel and asphalt plant, a county wastewater treatment plant, a sand and rock mining operation, and a U.S. Navy base that occupies a vast stretch of coastline. Agricultural and industrial runoff is discharged along the West Kaua'i coastline and has devasted our once-thriving reef ecosystems and traditional fishing grounds. West Kaua'i is also home to the island's only landfill.

Through decades of advocacy, our community has become far more aware of our rights and the legal tools we have to protect our resources, our livelihoods, and the health and

well-being of our future generations. HEPA has been and continues to be a valuable legal tool for our community by ensuring government decision-makers consider the environmental and cultural impacts of activities <u>before</u> they occur. This bill would allow decision-makers to bypass consideration of environmental harms and give a free pass to industries to continue destructive environmental practices without first complying with the law. Our communities have successfully taken agencies like DLNR to court to demand accountability. This bill would eliminate this hard-fought progress and send us back to the days when corporate interests trumped pono stewardship of our lands and resources.

Nā Kia'i Kai strongly urges this Committee to protect the integrity of one of the most valuable legal tools we have to protect our community by voting **NO to SB 1074.**

My name is Charles Young. I reside in the Ahupa'a of Kealia in the Kapalilua region of S. Kona Hawaii Island. I submt this testimony in strong opposition to SB 1074 and it's various iterations. I speak on behalf of the Hawaii Island Aha Moku as the current Po'o for Hawaii Island.

The Aha Moku is an advocate for Article XII Section 7 of the Hawaii State Constitution regarding native Hawaiian gathering rights and the Hawaii Supreme Courts 2000 Ka Pa'a Kai O Ka 'Aina vs Land Use Commissions decision that affirmed the State's responsibilities under the Constitution. Indeed the DLNR Chair has on many occasions stressed the importance of that decision and the binding conditions as set out forth in the courts decision. In my opinion it is in this area where the Senate Committee on Judiciary should focus. The mulitple testimonies that speak to the consequences for businesses and for-profit enterprises are of secondary importance. The DLNR and Federal agencies such as NOAA agree that Hawaii's marine resources continue to suffer depletion from overuse and an ever expanding demand for access to our marine resources for commercial purposes. Native Hawaiian Customary and Tradtional rights and practices are protected under the State's Constitution as referenced above and they are almost exclusively dependent on the health of Hawaii's natural resources. In its' Ka Pa'a Kai decision the Hawaii Supreme Court as provided for in Article XII Section 7 states that when the State makes decisions that may affect these Customary and Traditional rights and practices the State shall affirm and protect them and further the court provided a framework for doing so, the Ka Pa'a Kai analysis.

SB1074 proposes that businessess that have already been granted permits for the commercial access, use and/or extraction of our ocean resources should not be subject to todays more comprehesive permitting requirements particularly in the areas of cultural and environmental impacts.

It further proposes permitted activities found to be potentially harmful to the resources can be continued, perhaps indefinitely. The Aha Moku believes that SB1074 as a policy or statute fails to address the fact that each individual permittee contributes to the cumulative effects that have in large part resulted in a reduction in abundance. The Aha Moku also believes that the legislature should consider the health of the resources first, the health of its communities second and not simply provide relief for making profit. The Aha Moku does not object to the commercial use of our natural resources, provided those uses align with native Hawaiian cultural values and practices. However, the permitting process particularly when dealing with non-Hawaiians has and does not recognize the importance of that alignment in the vetting process

The Aha Moku has previously testified that Hawaii's marine resources managed by the State are held in public trust for the benefit of all. The hierarchy of use for the trust places the resources first and commercial last. The Aha Moku has also testified that a Ka Pa'a Kai analysis should be required for all commercial use of the public trust lands and oceans as the health of the trust gives rise to the health of native Hawaiians and their future generations. Hawaii has reached a point and the Aha Moku has great concern that the cumulative effects and continued use of our marine resources in a for-profit business model will continue to add to the depletion of our public trust resources. SB1074 would support the continuation of that business model and should be opposed. The Aha Moku urges the members of the State Judiciary Committee to oppose passage of SB1074 and/or its revisions. The Bill sets a bad precedent and does not go to the root of the issue.

We appreciate this opportunity to provide testimony opposing the passage of SB1074.

Aloha e Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Gabbard, and Committee Members,

Pō'ai Wai Ola submits this testimony in strong opposition to SB 1074, SD 1.

Pō'ai Wai Ola is a community-based organization of residents in West Kaua'i. Pō'ai Wai Ola members are cultural practitioners, maha'ai (farmers), and fresh water and reef lawai'a (fishers). Our roots in the West Kaua'i ahupua'a span many generations. Our hui is dedicated to managing and conserving water resources for present and future generations and protecting the long-term sustainability and health of our watershed, from its mauka headwaters to makai nearshore marine areas.

Waimea River is the lifeblood of our community and supports a host of protected instream public trust uses—such as kalo cultivation and subsistence gathering. For generations, our community has watched as the Waimea River's waters were diverted, first to feed plantations, and then by corporate farms who took over operation of the outdated and inefficient plantation-era water diversion infrastructure. For decades, tens of millions of gallons of water were diverted from the river every day, often causing large stretches of the river to run dry, cutting off the connection between the mountains and the sea. Throughout our lives, those with power and money have decided what to do with Waimea River's precious water resources, which are supposed to belong to all of us. This is a power dynamic our community continues to combat as we seek to restore Waimea River flows to support public trust uses and restore dwindling populations of native streamlife that have been devasted by decades of wholesale water diversion.

Through decades of advocating to restore Waimea River flows to protect our community's resources and preserve our traditional and customary practices, our community has become far more aware of our rights, and we have remained vigilant to make sure those rights are respected. The Hawai'i Environmental Policy Act, or HEPA, has been a necessary and valuable legal tool for our community to protect our resources, our practices, our livelihoods, and the health and well-being of our future generations.

This bill threatens one of the few legal tools rural communities like West Kaua'i has to protect itself from corporate greed. SB 1074 would turn HEPA on its head, allowing destructive activities to continue for years on end without any prior look at the action's environmental impacts, mitigation measures, and alternatives. This is moving us backwards, to where we were a century ago when corporate diverters were allowed to make wholesale diversions of valuable water resources without regard to the disastrous impacts it would have on our communities, our livelihoods, and our environment.

Pōʻai Wai Ola is deeply concerned about how this bill would give a blanket free pass to commercial users of our public trust land, water, and ocean resources, no matter what the harms. We strongly urge this committee to protect one of our bedrock environmental laws and uphold fundamental principles of pono environmental stewardship. **Please vote 'A'OLE to SB 1074.**


I **strongly oppose** SB 1074, SD1, which would allow agencies to keep rubber stamping environmentally harmful activities (like commercial aquarium collection) until whenever the agencies may get around to actually looking at the impacts and doing anything about it.

I am deeply concerned how this bill would affect Hawai'i's reefs and lawai'a pono practices.

- Commercial aquarium collectors have devastated reef ecosystems around Oʻahu and Hawaiʻi Island, extracting *hundreds of thousands of fish and invertebrates each year* in hotspots including West Hawaiʻi and Kāneʻohe Bay. Collected species include lauʻipala (yellow tang), kole (goldring surgeonfish), pākuʻikuʻi (Achilles tang), among many other native and endemic species that are critical for maintaining healthy reefs and supporting Native Hawaiian subsistence fishing and cultural practices.
- This reef life is sold and shipped in plastic bags to the continent and around the world to supply the *global pet market for ornamental reef fish*, instead of staying on the reefs to support ecosystem health and Native Hawaiian fishing practices that have been handed down for generations.
- Thanks to the Hawaii Environmental Policy Act (HEPA) and recent court rulings, our reefs have *finally gotten a break from unlimited aquarium extraction* while the collectors and State look at environmental and cultural impacts, mitigation measures, and alternatives through the public environmental review process.
- Please let HEPA do its job to *inform agency decision-making beforehand*, rather than handing industry a free pass to continue causing harm for years on end until they get around to completing the environmental review process. This bill would turn HEPA review into an afterthought and meaningless formality to justify harm that's already been done . . . and can't be undone.
- This bill would *gut HEPA's whole purpose* and is unnecessary. HEPA provides for *exemptions of activities that have truly minor impacts*.

I strongly urge you to **VOTE NO on SB 1074, SD1**.

Opposition to SB 1074 SD1 and HB 661 HD1

Aloha,

We, the undersigned, **strongly oppose HB SB 1074 SD1 and 661 HD1**, which would amend the Hawai'i Environmental Policy Act (HEPA), to allow activities previously "undertaken by an applicant" to continue, while still pending environmental review, even if causing irreversible environmental or cultural damage and challenged under HEPA.

These bills would severely undermine core protections for Native Hawaiian rights and Hawai'i's foundational environmental law, potentially leading to substantial, irreversible environmental and cultural harm.

Stopping an activity from proceeding during HEPA review is a fundamental principle of the law and ensures that precious public and cultural resources are not destroyed before the public has input and "environmental concerns are given appropriate consideration in decision making." (HRS. 343).

In addition, we have substantial concerns about the enormous loophole created for extractive activities in marine areas, including protected and nearshore areas.

The proposed amendment to HEPA states that the amendment "shall not apply to activities involving construction, grading, dredging, or other structural modifications to land, waterways, or marine environments" but would apply to a wide range of potentially permanently damaging commercial and "non-commercial" extractive activities in state waters for which there are already clear examples of irreparable damage. We are deeply concerned about commercial fishing and extractive activities and industrial levels of "non-commercial" extractive activities, including fishing, in state waters.

Papahānaumokuākea

Over a hundred thousand people fought for the establishment of the strongest possible protections for the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands – leading to the creation of the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands (NWHI) State Refuge as well as for protections in federal waters, including the establishment of the NWHI Coral Reef Reserve in 2000 and the Papahānaumokuākea Monument in 2006.

The strong protections of the Reserve, State Refuge, and Monument were established as a result of public outrage over decades of the state's refusal to exercise jurisdiction and refusal to implement HEPA in the state waters of the NWHI. This allowed Wespac lobster fishers and poachers to destroy lobster populations in state waters contributing to the starvation of the nearly extinct Hawaiian monk seals. Past commercial fishing vessels slammed into reefs damaging corals and releasing thousands of gallons of fuel, hydraulic and motor oil, fishing gear and other contaminants into the NWHI marine environment. Sadly, lobster stocks have never recovered.

Allowing significant extractive activities – whether labelled commercial or "non-commercial" – in state waters in the absence of HEPA review has already led to permanent harm. Should protections in fragile Papahānaumokuākea be weakened in the future, this proposed enormous loophole could potentially be used to allow unchecked destruction of precious Papahānaumokuākea natural and cultural resources in state waters.

The proposed changes would allow environmental damage to continue unabated in state waters of the Main Hawaiian Islands while "waiting" - potentially for *decades* - for the completion of an environmental review.¹

Concerns about the negative impact on traditional cultural resources and practices

According to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA):

"HEPA is frequently a vehicle for OHA's beneficiaries to ensure protection of their rights including the exercise of traditional and customary practices. As just one example, the commercial aquarium trade had never been subject to environmental review prior to a 2017 ruling from the Hawai'i Supreme Court, and was subsequently enjoined in certain areas pending HEPA compliance. Traditional Native Hawaiian fishers and cultural practitioners were among the plaintiffs in that landmark ruling to ensure careful consideration of how this extractive commercial enterprise affects others who depend on the same resources for subsistence and cultural practices. This is simply one example of many illustrating the importance of this law to the individuals and communities that OHA represents. However, if the amendment proposed ... had been in place in 2017, unchecked commercial extraction would have continued pending environmental review."

Negating HEPA's fundamental purpose

This amendment of HEPA is being proposed in response to the claim that recent court decisions "have broadened the definition of an environmental 'action." This is untrue.

According to Earthjustice:

"If anything, the courts and the 2019 HEPA rules have narrowed the definition of "action..." HEPA already expressly provides that agencies may exempt from environmental review "specific types of actions, because they will probably have minimal or no significant effects on the environment." Haw. Rev. Stat. § 343-6(a)(2).

This provision has been in place and available to state agencies for decades. <u>Agency inaction in processing appropriate exemptions is no reason to undercut HEPA's core requirements</u> and fundamentally alter the landscape of environmental protection in Hawai'i Nei."

"Exempting ongoing permitted activities under HEPA would mean that, in instances where such activities are in fact causing environmental damage, they would be allowed to continue unabated, even if environmental review is required or completed...It threatens to undo decades of environmental progress in Hawai'i, and it is entirely unnecessary to achieve its stated goals."

¹ For example, "the dewatering of East Maui's streams continued, uninterrupted, for nearly 20 years after an environmental review for long-term diversions was ordered by the circuit court – a practice that has most recently been confirmed as illegal by the Hawai'i Supreme Court. ... With the after-the-fact environmental reviews implicitly authorized by this measure, well-meaning decisionmakers will be inevitably pressured by political and monied special interests to disregard their environmental review obligations in favor of expedited approvals – with no meaningful remedy for the unaccounted-for harms inflicted, as legal challenges to unlawfully approved actions drag on for years, or even decades." Sierra Club, testimony on HB 661, January 11, 2025

The proposed amendment "would negate HEPA's fundamental purpose for a broad subset of permitted activities, allowing irreparable environmental harm."

For the reasons listed above, we, the undersigned, oppose - and urge you to oppose - SB 1074 SD1 and HB 661 HD1.

Environmental review law works to fully inform the decision-makers of potential long-term impacts to the public interest from proposed activities before those activities are allowed to proceed. This ensures thoughtful planning, conflict reduction, minimizing adverse outcomes, and safeguarding the health and well-being of present and future generations.

This bill would do the opposite, allowing activities that have previously been occurring without environmental review to continue while the environmental review is pending. I have spent my entire career in the tourism industry, starting from the ground up—taking photos at a surf school in Ka'anapali and working tirelessly to build this business. But this bill could change everything. If these long-standing, legally operating boats lose their permits, not only will my business be at risk, but so will the livelihoods of my employees and their families.

We've already been through so much. As a business owner, I've had to navigate the uncertainty of COVID, not knowing if I could keep my business running and continue employing people who depend on me. Then came the fires—our office burned down, and one of the boats we work on was completely lost. Again, we faced months of uncertainty, struggling to rebuild, hoping we could keep going. And now, this bill presents yet another massive challenge.

My name is Antoinette Davis. It has been my honor to represent the Activities and Attractions Association of Hawaii (A3H), a not-for-profit 501c6 trade organization, as its executive director since 1997 (28 years). A3H strongly supports SB1074 with changes.

SB1074 allows previously permitted activities to continue operating while undergoing environmental assessment, or an environment impact statement is required. This is critical for ensuring regulatory stability and preventing unnecessary interruptions for compliant businesses. In no way is this Bill meant to undermine the Umberger Ruling.

Usually, an environmental review is required before opening an area to commercial activities. However, for those commercial activities that started some 40 years ago, this review may not have taken place. Activities that use Hawaii's natural resources are stewards of the place being used. They provide safety, security, and access to the place and the visitors. These users support environmental protection. They are now collateral damage from doing something before we ALL became better stewards of this place.

Recommendation:

Add exceptions to Hawaii Environmental Policy Act (HEPA) for:

I strongly oppose SB1074 SD1. It is an unnecessary and dangerous proposal to weaken the Hawaii Environmental Policy Act. There are alternatives to solving what SB 1074 SD1 seeks to accomplish without weakening HEPA. Please read on.

HEPA already expressly provides that agencies may exempt from environmental review "specific types of actions, because they will probably have minimal or no significant effects on the environment." Haw. Rev. Stat. § 343-6(a)(2).

This provision has been in place and available to state agencies for decades. Agency inaction in processing appropriate exemptions is no reason to undercut HEPA's core requirements and fundamentally alter the landscape of environmental protection in Hawai'i Nei.

If SB 1074 SD1 is approved, state waters of Papahanaumokuakea could see the return of Wespac bottomfishing, lobster fishing, precious coral harvesting, a coral reef fishery, etc. in waters out to 3-miles if NOAA's proposed Papahanaumokuakea commerce sanctuary is approved by Congress in a few weeks.

Representing the Hawaiian Islands Humpback Whale Sanctuary, I attended a National Marine Sanctuaries Advisory Council Chair's meeting in Florida over a decade ago. I was surpriced to hear horror stories across the board on how sanctuary designation resulted in massive commercial activities but very little if any additional protection. United States Marine Sanctuaries are not designed to protect the marine environment but to promote multiple uses including commercial tourism and extractive activities like fishing. Hotels, tourism and the businesses related to the hospitality industry are struggling to regain any level of occupancy and productivity. Exacerbating this by any measure to remove, eliminate or further take away business or activities for our guests to participate in while staying in Ka'anapali or West Maui seems unconscionable. Due to a position taken recently by Judge Cahill "ALL" businesses in Kaanapali for ocean recreation, boating and watersports will cease to exist once their current permits expire and remain closed until an environmental assessment is conducted. This is untenable and would immediately bankrupt and force 27 professional operations to close. Again, this is beyond thinkable and puts 260 families out onto the street! In fact, it seems like those of us in the boating and ocean recreation industry have been unreasonably caught up as "collateral damage" with other ongoing conservation and environmental related challenges elsewhere. The Ka'anapali ORMA permit holders and ocean recreation operators provide a service and experience without the taking, harvesting, gathering or any potential negative impact to natural resources. Simply hosting a guest on a sunset or whale watch sail or offering a surfing lesson or even outrigger canoe ride is vastly different than other challenges the State may have. This Bill was created and submitted to recognize and help the Ka'anapali operators with pending full closure and aid those operators as they attempt to yet again recover from disaster. Please do not punish longstanding, professional operators that in many cases have been safely and respectfully operating in Ka'anapali for nearly two generations.

My interpretation of SB 1074 SD1 is that it provides for an operator to go forward and continue with their operations and services during the process of an environmental review. Services as permitted would be allowed to continue everything for operations as is normal circumstance if / when permits are challenged for environmental or other concerns. Having this continuation of services is very important as it allows the operator to remain in business and continue until or if reviews show that for any reason operations should be stopped. If narrowing this Bill to apply to

Ka'anapali ORMA permit operators as was the intention assist in moving forward towards approval that would be fully acceptable.

If long standing permit holders that have operated within all guidelines and followed all regulations are put into a position whereby, they need to fully cease all activities of their business during environmental reviews then we will lose strong, dependable operators and punish them for following and abiding by all State mandated guidelines. Once they close history shows, and practical understanding reflects *that they are not coming back*! We should not lose valuable Hawaii jobs and reputable community businesses in this manner.

Beyond the immediate impact to our valuable Ka'anapali and West Maui visitors and our employees and business many, many support operators and businesses will be crushed. Please consider:

- Estimated \$60M in annual revenues generated by all Ka'anapali ORMA permit operators goes away
- 3% of \$60M in revenue now goes to DLNR or \$1.8 M to their budget, that goes away. NOTE: A Bill is now also being proposing a bill in legislature to raise this to 5%. Whether 5% or 3 % if no revenue no %
- \$1.00 per passenger to DAR (program just started in 2024) that would be \$750K-\$1M, that all goes away
- 4.172% sales tax on \$60M or \$2.83M in state tax revenue, that all goes away
- \$9M (estimated) in commissions paid to travel agents, concierge, and activity desk operators on \$60M, that all goes away*
- All pre and post revenue to restaurants and shops in the Ka'anapali area by tens of thousands of annual boating and ocean recreation participants, that all goes away*
- More than 225,000 meals prepared by local restaurants or caterers for use on all boating operation, that all goes away-and the jobs of those people preparing them!
- Mechanics, fuel providers, maintenance personnel, transportation, ice deliveries, Uber drivers and countless others impacted with massive drop in needs and then loss of need for those jobs. That all goes away
- \$500K or more in beverage purchase and delivery of those items. This all goes away
- With a tremendous reduction of activities, experience and things to do in Ka'anapali / West Maui literally thousands of vacationers and tourist may choose elsewhere and then they go away.

There are multiple points of further impact and collateral damage to other industries, jobs, livelihood, and commerce. These are important, however the human impact, as noted above remains a direct loss of 260 ocean activity and boating related jobs, family upheaval, removal from schools, inability to afford staying on Maui and families then moving to the mainland. This all would be unacceptably tragic.

I'm asking you to please vote for and *pass SB 1074* SD1 for the sake of our communities, families, business investments and small entrepreneurs that are the backbone of our economy, and **specifically here on Maui** where concentration for support, and urgent consideration is needed at this post-fire, rebuilding time of our community.

I was taught as a child to respect my elders, those who came before me. The earth and its non human residents are to me my elders, and deserve our respect and protection.

We, the undersigned, **strongly oppose HB 661 HD1 and SB 1074 SD1**, which would amend the Hawai'i Environmental Policy Act (HEPA), to allow activities previously "undertaken by an applicant" to continue, while still pending environmental review, even if causing irreversible environmental damage and challenged under HEPA.

These bills would severely undermine core protections for Native Hawaiian rights and Hawai'i's foundational environmental law, potentially leading to substantial, irreversible environmental and cultural harm.

Stopping an activity from proceeding during HEPA review is a fundamental principle of the law and ensures that precious public and cultural resources are not destroyed before the public has input and "environmental concerns are given appropriate consideration in decision making." (HRS. 343).

In addition, we have substantial concerns about the enormous loophole created for extractive activities in marine areas, including protected and nearshore areas.

The proposed amendment to HEPA states that the amendment "shall not apply to activities involving construction, grading, dredging, or other structural modifications to land, waterways, or marine environments" but would apply to a wide range of potentially permanently damaging commercial and "non-commercial" extractive activities in state waters for which there are already clear examples of irreparable damage. We are deeply concerned about commercial and industrial levels of "non-commercial" extractive activities, including fishing, in state waters.

Papahānaumokuākea

Over a hundred thousand people fought for the establishment of the strongest possible protections for the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands – leading to the creation of the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands (NWHI) State Refuge as well as for protections in federal waters, including the establishment of the NWHI Coral Reef Reserve in 2000 and the Papahānaumokuākea Monument in 2006.

The strong protections of the Reserve, State Refuge, and Monument were established as a result of public outrage over decades of the state's refusal to exercise jurisdiction and refusal to implement HEPA in the state waters of the NWHI. This allowed Wespac lobster fishers and poachers to destroy lobster populations in state waters contributing to the starvation of the nearly extinct Hawaiian monk seals, the most endangered pinniped in the world! Past commercial fishing vessels slammed into reefs damaging corals and releasing thousands of gallons of fuel, hydraulic and motor oil, fishing gear and other contaminants into the NWHI marine environment. Sadly, lobster stocks have never recovered.

Allowing significant extractive activities – whether labelled commercial or "non-commercial" – in state waters in the absence of HEPA review has already led to permanent harm. Should protections in fragile Papahānaumokuākea be weakened in the future, this proposed enormous loophole could potentially be used to allow unchecked destruction of precious Papahānaumokuākea natural and cultural resources in state waters.

The proposed changes would allow environmental damage to continue unabated in state waters of the Main Hawaiian Islands while "waiting" - potentially for *decades* - for the completion of an environmental review.[1]

Concerns about the negative impact on traditional cultural resources and practices

According to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA):

"HEPA is frequently a vehicle for OHA's beneficiaries to ensure protection of their rights including the exercise of traditional and customary practices. As just one example, the commercial aquarium trade had never been subject to environmental review prior to a 2017 ruling from the Hawai'i Supreme Court, and was subsequently enjoined in certain areas pending HEPA compliance. Traditional Native Hawaiian fishers and cultural practitioners were among the plaintiffs in that landmark ruling to ensure careful consideration of how this extractive commercial enterprise affects others who depend on the same resources for subsistence and cultural practices. This is simply one example of many illustrating the importance of this law to the individuals and communities that OHA represents. However, if the amendment proposed in HB661 had been in place in 2017, unchecked commercial extraction would have continued pending environmental review."

Negating HEPA's fundamental purpose

This amendment of HEPA is being proposed in response to the claim that recent court decisions "have broadened the definition of an environmental 'action.'" This is untrue. According to Earthjustice:

"If anything, the courts and the 2019 HEPA rules have narrowed the definition of "action..."

HEPA already expressly provides that agencies may exempt from environmental review "specific types of actions, because they will probably have minimal or no significant effects on the environment." Haw. Rev. Stat. § 343-6(a)(2).

This provision has been in place and available to state agencies for decades. Agency inaction in processing appropriate exemptions is no reason to undercut HEPA's core requirements and fundamentally alter the landscape of environmental protection in Hawai'i Nei."

"Exempting ongoing permitted activities under HEPA would mean that, in instances where such activities are in fact causing environmental damage, they would be allowed to continue unabated, even if environmental review is required or completed...It threatens to undo decades of environmental progress in Hawai'i, and it is entirely unnecessary to achieve its stated goals."

The proposed amendment "would negate HEPA's fundamental purpose for a broad subset of permitted activities, allowing irreparable environmental harm."

We strongly urge you to oppose these amendments to HEPA.



I **strongly oppose** SB 1074, SD1, which would allow agencies to keep rubber stamping environmentally harmful activities (like commercial aquarium collection) until whenever the agencies may get around to actually looking at the impacts and doing anything about it.

I am deeply concerned how this bill would affect Hawai'i's reefs and lawai'a pono practices.

- Commercial aquarium collectors have devastated reef ecosystems around Oʻahu and Hawaiʻi Island, extracting *hundreds of thousands of fish and invertebrates each year* in hotspots including West Hawaiʻi and Kāneʻohe Bay. Collected species include lauʻipala (yellow tang), kole (goldring surgeonfish), pākuʻikuʻi (Achilles tang), among many other native and endemic species that are critical for maintaining healthy reefs and supporting Native Hawaiian subsistence fishing and cultural practices.
- This reef life is sold and shipped in plastic bags to the continent and around the world to supply the *global pet market for ornamental reef fish*, instead of staying on the reefs to support ecosystem health and Native Hawaiian fishing practices that have been handed down for generations.
- Thanks to the Hawaii Environmental Policy Act (HEPA) and recent court rulings, our reefs have *finally gotten a break from unlimited aquarium extraction* while the collectors and State look at environmental and cultural impacts, mitigation measures, and alternatives through the public environmental review process.
- Please let HEPA do its job to *inform agency decision-making beforehand*, rather than handing industry a free pass to continue causing harm for years on end until they get around to completing the environmental review process. This bill would turn HEPA review into an afterthought and meaningless formality to justify harm that's already been done... and can't be undone.
- This bill would *gut HEPA*'s *whole purpose* and is unnecessary. HEPA provides for *exemptions of activities that have truly minor impacts*.

I strongly urge you to **VOTE NO on SB 1074, SD1**.

Honorable Chair and Vice Chair and Members of the Committee:

The immediate impact to our valuable Ka'anapali and West Maui coast and the visitors, employees and other businesses will be significant.

The impact will be as follows:

- Estimated \$60M in annual revenues generated by all Ka'anapali ORMA permit operators will no longer be generated thus decreasing our general excise taxes to the State etc.
- 3% of \$60M in revenue now goes to DLNR or \$1.8 M to their budget, that will no longer continue.
- \$1.00 per passenger to DAR (program just started in 2024) that would be \$750K-\$1M, will not be collected.
- 4.172% sales tax on \$60M or \$2.83M in state tax revenue, will not be collected and turned over to the State.
- \$9M (estimated) in commissions paid to travel agents, concierge, and activity desk operators on \$60M, workforce compensation will stop.
- More than 225,000 meals prepared by local restaurants or caterers for use on all boating operation, will stop.
- \$500K or more in beverage purchase and delivery of those items. This stops.

There are multiple points of further impact and economic damage to other industries, jobs, livelihood, and commerce. These are important, however the human impact, as noted above remains a direct loss of 260 ocean activity and boating related jobs, family upheaval, removal from schools, inability to afford staying on Maui and families then moving to the mainland.

I, Nicholas Kuhns am in support of SB 1074 SD1

Upon writing this today Maui and Lahaina / Ka'anapali remain in critical condition. Recovery for us following the horrendous fires as residents, employees and businesspeople has been at a snail's pace that does not seem to be moving forward with any real pace now or for the foreseeable future. Hotels, tourism and the businesses related to the hospitality industry are struggling to regain any level of occupancy and productivity. Exacerbating this by any measure to remove, eliminate or further take away business or activities for our guests to participate in while staying in Ka'anapali or West Maui seems unconscionable. Due to a position taken recently by Judge Cahill "ALL" businesses in Kaanapali for ocean recreation, boating and watersports will cease to exist once their current permits expire and remain closed until an environmental assessment is conducted. This is untenable and would immediately bankrupt and force 27 professional operations to close. Again, this is beyond thinkable and puts 260 families out onto the street! In fact, it seems like those of us in the boating and ocean recreation industry have been unreasonably caught up as "collateral damage" with other ongoing conservation and environmental related challenges elsewhere. The Ka'anapali ORMA permit holders and ocean recreation operators provide a service and experience without the taking, harvesting, gathering or any potential negative impact to natural resources. Simply hosting a guest on a sunset or whale watch sail or offering a surfing lesson or even outrigger canoe ride is vastly different than other challenges the State may have. This Bill was created and submitted to recognize and help the Ka'anapali operators with pending full closure and aid those operators as they attempt to yet again recover from disaster. Please do not punish longstanding, professional operators that in many cases have been safely and respectfully operating in Ka'anapali for nearly two generations.

My interpretation of SB 1074 SD1 is that it provides for an operator to go forward and continue with their operations and services during the process of an environmental review. Services as permitted would be allowed to continue everything for operations as is normal circumstance if / when permits are challenged for environmental or other concerns. Having this continuation of services is very important as it allows the operator to remain in business and continue until or if reviews show that for any reason operations should be stopped. If narrowing this Bill to apply to Ka'anapali ORMA permit operators as was the intention assist in moving forward towards approval that would be fully acceptable.

If long standing permit holders that have operated within all guidelines and followed all regulations are put into a position whereby, they need to fully cease all activities of their business during environmental reviews then we will lose strong, dependable operators and punish them for following and abiding by all State mandated guidelines. Once they close history shows, and practical understanding reflects *that they are not coming back*! We should not lose valuable Hawaii jobs and reputable community businesses in this manner.

Beyond the immediate impact to our valuable Ka'anapali and West Maui visitors and our employees and business many, many support operators and businesses will be crushed. Please consider:

- Estimated \$60M in annual revenues generated by all Ka'anapali ORMA permit operators goes away
- 3% of \$60M in revenue now goes to DLNR or \$1.8 M to their budget, that goes away. NOTE: A Bill is now also being proposing a bill in legislature to raise this to 5%. Whether 5% or 3 % if no revenue no %
- \$1.00 per passenger to DAR (program just started in 2024) that would be \$750K-\$1M, that all goes away
- 4.172% sales tax on \$60M or \$2.83M in state tax revenue, that all goes away
- \$9M (estimated) in commissions paid to travel agents, concierge, and activity desk operators on \$60M, that all goes away*
- All pre and post revenue to restaurants and shops in the Ka'anapali area by tens of thousands of annual boating and ocean recreation participants, that all goes away*
- More than 225,000 meals prepared by local restaurants or caterers for use on all boating operation, that all goes away-and the jobs of those people preparing them!
- Mechanics, fuel providers, maintenance personnel, transportation, ice deliveries, Uber drivers and countless others impacted with massive drop in needs and then loss of need for those jobs. That all goes away
- \$500K or more in beverage purchase and delivery of those items. This all goes away
- With a tremendous reduction of activities, experience and things to do in Ka'anapali / West Maui literally thousands of vacationers and tourist may choose elsewhere and then they go away.

There are multiple points of further impact and collateral damage to other industries, jobs, livelihood, and commerce. These are important, however the human impact, as noted above remains a direct loss of 260 ocean activity and boating related jobs, family upheaval, removal from schools, inability to afford staying on Maui and families then moving to the mainland. This all would be unacceptably tragic.

My name is U'ilani Naipo and I live on Moku o Keawe. I'm a lineal descendant and hoa'āina (caretaker) of Miloli'i fishing village and I am an ocean advocate.

I strongly oppose SB1074 SD1.

SB1074 will allow agencies to continue issuing permits that allow environmentally harmful activities (like commercial aquarium collection) with no accountability until likely there is no recourse for recovery.

I am seriously troubled by how this bill would affect Hawai'i's reefs and lawai'a pono practices.

- Commercial aquarium collectors have devastated reef ecosystems around O'ahu and Hawai'i Island, extracting hundreds of thousands of fish and invertebrates each year in hotspots including West Hawai'i and Kāne'ohe Bay. Collected species include lau'ipala (yellow tang), kole (goldring surgeonfish), pāku'iku'i (Achilles tang), among many other native and endemic species that are critical for maintaining healthy reefs and supporting Native Hawaiian subsistence fishing and cultural practices.
 - Today, pāku'iku'i is on a no take list for West Hawai'i in attempts to recover its abundance. The State claims no correlation to aquarium collection, yet offers no other conclusive reasoning for its significant depletion, whereas no where else in the state is experiencing the same condition.
- Marine reef life is sold and shipped in plastic bags to the continent and around
 the world to supply the global pet market for ornamental reef fish, instead of
 staying on the reefs to support ecosystem health and Native Hawaiian fishing
 practices that have been handed down for generations.
 - Aquarium collection exploits and privatizes the take of marine public trust assets. Its negative and lasting impact to our marine ecosystems, and competition of food fish with subsistence and commercial fishers is not pono.
- Thanks to HEPA and recent court rulings, our reefs have **finally** gotten a break from unlimited aquarium extraction while the collectors and State look at environmental and cultural impacts, mitigation measures, and alternatives through the public environmental review process.
- Please let HEPA do its job to inform agency decision-making beforehand, rather than handing industry a free pass to continue causing harm for years on end until they get around to completing the environmental review process. This

bill would turn HEPA review into an afterthought and meaningless formality to justify harm that's already been done . . . and can't be undone.

• This bill would **dismantle** HEPA's function and allow its work to be circumvented. **HEPA provides for exemptions** of activities that have truly minor impacts.

According to the Standing Committee Report, the intent of this measure is intended to evaluate the environmental impact of new projects rather than disrupt ongoing, well-regulated activities.

It should be noted that recent court rulings have also been made for long-time running activities that DLNR has issued permits for. These include activities of which DLNR has not performed capacity planning exercises to set limits on issuing commercial activity permits, and only upon court rulings have they considered performing environmental impact assessments.

Meanwhile, the State remains liable for these permitted activities and continuously have been plaqued with lawsuits.

I strongly recommend that all commercial extractive activity of marine life which does not directly feed Hawai'i's people, be ceased. These extractive activities do not enhance Hawai'i's food security, they unfairly take and privatize shared public trust assets, and diminish the health of our coral reefs.

As we work to **combat** climate change, **restore** our nearshore areas and coral reefs, **restore** loko i'a, and **rehabilitate** our fishing grounds, extractive commercial activities work against us.

At such a tumultuous and unpredictable time of having many conservation programs cut, Hawai'i can not risk taking such a liberal and risky approach in continuing to hand out extractive commercial activity permits.

I strongly urge you to **VOTE NO** on SB1074 SD1 for Hawai'i Nei.

Respect the law and the process. HEPA already provides for categorical exemptions that could resolve concerns like this without turning HEPA on its head and allowing destructive activities to continue for years on end without any prior look at the action's environmental impacts, mitigation measures, and alternatives

I strongly oppose SB 1074, SD1, which would gut HEPA, one of our bedrock environmental laws. HEPA requires consideration of the environmental and cultural impacts of activities before they occur. Instead, the bill would allow state agencies like DLNR to keep rubberstamping permits until whenever they may get around to actually looking at the impacts.

DLNR has for years rubberstamped diversions of billions of gallons of water in East Maui and Kaua'i and extraction of millions of reef fish on Hawai'i Island and O'ahu, without ever looking at the impacts. I have worked with numerous different boat companies that beach load their boats at Kaanapali, but do not work directly for these companies. I can state without question that the captains and crew on these boats are highly conscientious- Put simply, the people working these jobs, which are not easy jobs putting in a ton of hours in the sun, are among the people who most love the ocean and respect and understand the beauty of the land and people of Maui and want to preserve and honor it.

I am not pro tourism. I am passionately against arguments against those who are anti-tourism use whataboutism of 'but where do you think all your money comes from?' A huge amount of Hawaiians and especially native Hawaiians do not see that money, and it's an insult to assume everything that's a working business is good for the island.

In this case, I especially resent the sacred lands of black rock being the center of such commercial enterprise. However, I have seen again and again how those same tourists who see this island as some kind of theme park to lounge in, with no knowledge of the history, are consistently educated and have their eyes opened by their experiences on the boats.

Across numerous different companies, workers on the boats go out of their way to try to engender respect for Maui, from as simple as explaining which island as which to sharing stories of Hawaiian lore, I honestly think a lot of people get a tiny introductory window into respecting the culture from these trips. I have seen countless instances of people explaining the importance of reef-safe sunscreen to tourists that were clearly scoffing at the idea of it and are forced to understand it is killing the exact thing they are paying to see. I have seen consistent acute clarity made about no turtle harassment, taking people who genuinely ask if they can touch the shell to an understanding of how any behavior that disrupts its natural course is a crime, through zero tolerance to paying customers with shaming and a reminder of the \$10,000 fine.

Teaching them not to step on the reef, these things that to us are an absolute obvious basic, no one at the hotels is going to tell these people this.

I understand this may seem tangential to SB1074, and I am not saying this is the ideal form of educating people to respect the island- It's just an unbelievably consistent amount of personal

experience seeing tourists dealing with the workers at these boat companies who have an infectious amount of genuine care. Upon writing this today Maui and Lahaina / Ka'anapali remain in critical condition. Recovery for us following the horrendous fires as residents, employees and businesspeople has been at a snail's pace that does not seem to be moving forward with any real pace now or for the foreseeable future. Hotels, tourism and the businesses related to the hospitality industry are struggling to regain any level of occupancy and productivity. Exacerbating this by any measure to remove, eliminate or further take away business or activities for our guests to participate in while staying in Ka'anapali or West Maui seems unconscionable. Due to a position taken recently by Judge Cahill "ALL" businesses in Kaanapali for ocean recreation, boating and watersports will cease to exist once their current permits expire and remain closed until an environmental assessment is conducted. This is untenable and would immediately bankrupt and force 27 professional operations to close. Again, this is beyond thinkable and puts 260 families out onto the street! In fact, it seems like those of us in the boating and ocean recreation industry have been unreasonably caught up as "collateral damage" with other ongoing conservation and environmental related challenges elsewhere. The Ka'anapali ORMA permit holders and ocean recreation operators provide a service and experience without the taking, harvesting, gathering or any potential negative impact to natural resources. Simply hosting a guest on a sunset or whale watch sail or offering a surfing lesson or even outrigger canoe ride is vastly different than other challenges the State may have. This Bill was created and submitted to recognize and help the Ka'anapali operators with pending full closure and aid those operators as they attempt to yet again recover from disaster. Please do not punish longstanding, professional operators that in many cases have been safely and respectfully operating in Ka'anapali for nearly two generations.

- Estimated \$60M in annual revenues generated by all Ka'anapali ORMA permit operators goes away
- 3% of \$60M in revenue now goes to DLNR or \$1.8 M to their budget, that goes away. NOTE: A Bill is now also being proposing a bill in legislature to raise this to 5%. Whether 5% or 3 % if no revenue no %
- \$1.00 per passenger to DAR (program just started in 2024) that would be \$750K-\$1M, that all goes away
- 4.172% sales tax on \$60M or \$2.83M in state tax revenue, that all goes away
- \$9M (estimated) in commissions paid to travel agents, concierge, and activity desk operators on \$60M, that all goes away*
- All pre and post revenue to restaurants and shops in the Ka'anapali area by tens of thousands of annual boating and ocean recreation participants, that all goes away*
- More than 225,000 meals prepared by local restaurants or caterers for use on all boating operation, that all goes away-and the jobs of those people preparing them!

It is time to honor and give back to the host culture rather than condone more extract ive and non traditional profit bases businesses like selling corals and aquatic life.

Our environmental review law allows decisionmakers and the public to make more fully-informed decisions that can balance and mitigate potential long-term impacts to the public interest from certain proposed activities, before those activities and their impacts are allowed to proceed. This ensures prudent planning while reducing conflict, minimizing adverse outcomes, and safeguarding the health and well-being of present and future generations.

Unfortunately, the failure of certain departments to comply with this law before authorizing certain actions - such as permitting the take of an unlimited number of of ecologically critical marine specimens for the aquarium trade, or the decades-long dewatering of streams in East Maui - has resulted in severe and in some cases irreparable ecological, cultural, social, and economic harms that could and should have been avoided through the prudent planning embodied in our environmental review law.

By allowing illegally authorized activities to continue while environmental review challenges are resolved - something that has taken literal decades in the dewatering of East Maui's streams - this bill would turn our environmental review process into an afterthought, legitimizing extractive, unlawful and irresponsible agency practices that have inflicted and that will continue to inflict tremendous generational harms and injustices upon our islands and communities.

Aloha Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Gabbard and Members of the Committee,

I, Michael T. Kelley, am writing in support of SB 1074 SD1.

As I write this today, Maui—specifically Lahaina and Ka'anapali—remains in critical condition. Recovery from the devastating fires has been excruciatingly slow for residents, employees, and business owners. There is no indication that this process will accelerate anytime soon. The hospitality industry, including hotels, tourism, and related businesses, is struggling to regain occupancy and productivity. Given these challenges, any further restrictions on businesses or activities available to guests in Ka'anapali and West Maui would be unconscionable.

Due to a recent decision by Judge Cahill, all ocean recreation, boating, and watersports businesses in Ka'anapali will cease operations once their current permits expire and will remain closed until an environmental assessment is conducted. This is untenable. Such a closure would immediately bankrupt and force the permanent shutdown of dozens of well-established, professional local businesses. These companies are 100% locally owned and operated, many by families who have been in the industry for generations. Employees have built long-term careers, with 10, 15, or even 20 years of seniority. The potential closure of these businesses is unthinkable, leaving at least 260 families without jobs, income, and stability.

It feels as though those of us in the **boating and ocean recreation industry have become collateral damage** in broader conservation and environmental debates that do not directly involve us. Ka'anapali ORMA permit holders and ocean recreation operators provide non-consumptive services, meaning we do not take, harvest, or extract from the environment. Activities such as sunset sails, whale-watching tours, surfing lessons, and outrigger canoe rides are vastly different from the issues the State is facing elsewhere.

SB 1074 SD1 was introduced specifically to recognize and support Ka'anapali operators facing total shutdown. This bill would allow these businesses to continue operating while an environmental review is conducted, rather than requiring them to shut down completely. It ensures that longstanding, professional operators—who have adhered to all State regulations—are not unfairly punished. If narrowing the bill's scope to apply specifically to Ka'anapali ORMA permit holders improves its chances of passage, that would be entirely acceptable.

If long-standing permit holders who have complied with all State guidelines and regulations are forced to cease all operations during environmental reviews, we will lose experienced, dependable operators and community leaders. Once these businesses close, history has shown that they do not come back. We must not lose valuable local jobs and reputable community businesses in this manner.

Beyond the immediate impact on Ka'anapali and West Maui visitors, employees, and business owners, *many other businesses will also suffer*. Consider the economic consequences:

- **\$60 million** in annual revenue generated by all Ka'anapali ORMA permit operators would be lost. *That goes away*
- \$1.8 million in lost revenue to DLNR (currently receiving 3% of operators' revenue). A proposal to raise this to 5% would be meaningless if there is no revenue at all. That goes away
- \$750,000–\$1 million in lost revenue to DAR from the new \$1-per-passenger fee, implemented in 2024. That goes away
- **\$2.83 million in lost state tax revenue** (4.712% sales tax on \$60 million). <u>That goes away</u>
- **\$9** *million in lost commissions* paid to travel agents, concierge services, and activity desk operators. *That goes away*
- **Tens of thousands of lost restaurant and shop sales** due to the disappearance of ocean recreation participants. <u>That goes away</u>
- Over 225,000 meals per year that have been created and prepared by local restaurants and caterers for boating operations. That goes away
- **Significant job losses** among mechanics, fuel providers, maintenance personnel, transportation workers, Uber drivers, and others who support these businesses. That goes away
- Over \$500,000 in purchases for beverages and deliveries. That goes away
- A severe reduction in available activities for visitors, leading to thousands of tourists to choose other destinations—a ripple effect that could devastate the local economy. <u>They go away</u>
- **Thousands** of hotel rooms nights for individual F.I.T "frequent independent travelers" and multiple incentive groups choosing elsewhere. Room occupancies drop, need for employees drop, tax base drop, TAT drop. That all takes a big hit

The economic toll is massive, but the *human impact is even greater*. At least **260 ocean** activity and boating-related jobs will disappear, leaving families struggling to survive. Many will be forced to leave Maui, uprooting their children from schools and severing deep community ties. This would be an *unacceptable tragedy*.

I urge you to **vote in favor of SB 1074 SD1** or amend it to apply specifically to Ka'anapali and **pass it for the sake of our community, families, businesses, and local entrepreneurs—the backbone of our economy.**

I, Herbert Conley, am in support of SB 1074 SD1

Upon writing this today Maui and Lahaina / Ka'anapali remain in critical condition. Recovery for us following the horrendous fires as residents, employees and businesspeople has been at a snail's pace that does not seem to be moving forward with any real pace now or for the foreseeable future. Hotels, tourism and the businesses related to the hospitality industry are struggling to regain any level of occupancy and productivity. Exacerbating this by any measure to remove, eliminate or further take away business or activities for our guests to participate in while staying in Ka'anapali or West Maui seems unconscionable. Due to a position taken recently by Judge Cahill "ALL" businesses in Kaanapali for ocean recreation, boating and watersports will cease to exist once their current permits expire and remain closed until an environmental assessment is conducted. This is untenable and would immediately bankrupt and force 27 professional operations to close. Again, this is beyond thinkable and puts 260 families out onto the street! In fact, it seems like those of us in the boating and ocean recreation industry have been unreasonably caught up as "collateral damage" with other ongoing conservation and environmental related challenges elsewhere. The Ka'anapali ORMA permit holders and ocean recreation operators provide a service and experience without the taking, harvesting, gathering or any potential negative impact to natural resources. Simply hosting a guest on a sunset or whale watch sail or offering a surfing lesson or even outrigger canoe ride is vastly different than other challenges the State may have. This Bill was created and submitted to recognize and help the Ka'anapali operators with pending full closure and aid those operators as they attempt to yet again recover from disaster. Please do not punish longstanding, professional operators that in many cases have been safely and respectfully operating in Ka'anapali for nearly two generations.

My interpretation of SB 1074 SD1 is that it provides for an operator to go forward and continue with their operations and services during the process of an environmental review. Services as permitted would be allowed to continue everything for operations as is normal circumstance if / when permits are challenged for environmental or other concerns. Having this continuation of services is very important as it allows the operator to remain in business and continue until or if reviews show that for any reason operations should be stopped. If narrowing this Bill to apply to Ka'anapali ORMA permit operators as was the intention assist in moving forward towards approval that would be fully acceptable.

If long standing permit holders that have operated within all guidelines and followed all regulations are put into a position whereby, they need to fully cease all activities of their business during environmental reviews then we will lose strong, dependable operators and punish them for following and abiding by all State mandated guidelines. Once they close history shows, and practical understanding reflects *that they are not coming back*! We should not lose valuable Hawaii jobs and reputable community businesses in this manner.

Beyond the immediate impact to our valuable Ka'anapali and West Maui visitors and our employees and business many, many support operators and businesses will be crushed. Please consider:

- Estimated \$60M in annual revenues generated by all Ka'anapali ORMA permit operators goes away
- 3% of \$60M in revenue now goes to DLNR or \$1.8 M to their budget, that goes away. NOTE: A Bill is now also being proposing a bill in legislature to raise this to 5%. Whether 5% or 3 % if no revenue no %
- \$1.00 per passenger to DAR (program just started in 2024) that would be \$750K-\$1M, that all goes away
- 4.172% sales tax on \$60M or \$2.83M in state tax revenue, that all goes away
- \$9M (estimated) in commissions paid to travel agents, concierge, and activity desk operators on \$60M, that all goes away*
- All pre and post revenue to restaurants and shops in the Ka'anapali area by tens of thousands of annual boating and ocean recreation participants, that all goes away*
- More than 225,000 meals prepared by local restaurants or caterers for use on all boating operation, that all goes away-and the jobs of those people preparing them!
- Mechanics, fuel providers, maintenance personnel, transportation, ice deliveries, Uber drivers and countless others impacted with massive drop in needs and then loss of need for those jobs. That all goes away
- \$500K or more in beverage purchase and delivery of those items. This all goes away

Whereas Chapter 343 HRS does not imply anywhere in its statutes that ocean-based permits apply. It was designed for new land-based permit actions only. Based on false information, the Hawaii State Supreme Court ruled otherwise.

HB 661 did pass, but it needs work. Act 343 has been used as a weapon by user groups in conflict to shut down and remove permits at great cost. These court decisions were based on a one-sided presentation and biased testimony, not on science. Both the aquarium fishery and Kaanapali user groups relied on the attorney general and did not have legal representation in these cases before the rulings.

Science invalidated all foundations for the Umber ruling testimony. This includes impacts on fish populations, corals, algae growth, etc.

HB 661 will exempt the removal of permits while EIS is being done, It is long overdue.

One section in HB 661 may be an issue for us as aquarium fishers; it may take away BLNR finals, say on EIS.

I suggest letting a panel of biologists (not the governor or BLNR) from the appropriate agency contribute during the process, prepare a response to the EIS final filing, and come up with recommended changes for the agency to act on if necessary to mediate permitting ecological impacts.

Before an EIS is started, it would be very helpful to those who are to do it to be given a guide or suggested topic and the information the agency wants in the EIS. What impacts are considered necessary for the EIS review?

HB 661 Changes Suggestions:

Long-standing past and new permits for existing permit issuance divisions, even for new permitted activity in those permitted areas like fisheries, should be allowed by law while continuing to comply with existing laws and should remain in place while EIS is being done.

{The EIS Environmental Impact Statement, under HEPA laws Act 343, should be used by the Legislature, Government agency, or Permit granter to regulate and minimize "action" activity impacts, not shut down user groups by removing permits, especially long-standing highly regulated permits.}

After completion of an EIS and approval, a permit should be granted, and, if necessary, the agency may impose biologist panel conditions at that time. This can be done without laws regarding permits being enacted. Permit conditions should be allowed to be changed by the permitting agency to mitigate environmental concerns found in EIS. Permitting agencies like DOBAR can utilize DLNR DAR scientists to review their marine use permits EIS documents.

Legislative or agency laws based on EIS findings and panel suggestions procedures can then be used to enact more permanent changes to regulations to ensure sustainable and low-impact permit actions in the future. If necessary, permit conditions can be made into law with BLNR rules packages or legislative pathways.

After passage, permits should be reviewed with the agency panel to review environmental impacts every 5 years. If deemed necessary after those meetings, regulation changes may be proposed and go through the legislative or BLNR legal process for more active management.

New permit "actions" should be reviewed to see if EIS applies, and licenses may be given if the action has a low impact while complete EIS is complied with if an EIS is deemed necessary.

The agency may hold the permits for new permits with projected high impact determined by a team of biologists and approved by the governor and BLNR, while a full EIS is complied with. Upon review of the EIS, the action has more than minimal impacts. The new permit may be revoked if a review panel of biologists deems the action too great during the process by a panel of biologists.

The impact of an "action" for permit removal should be defined as putting at risk an endangered species listed in the red list of IUCN, risk to the environment by an introduced invasive species, and/or a species listed in CITES for regulated take. and export by CITES permit only. All permits for science or aquaculture research or aquaculture breeding broodstock are one-time permits and should be exempt from HEPA Act 343 laws as they are reviewed on a case-by-case basis granted by the permitting agency who will has discretionary power over granting those permits.

Another important point that needs consideration with HB 611 and SB 1074 is what steps regarding an active EIS should allow permits.

I would suggest the name of the EIS compliance company or Government agency letter stating payment or activity has been started to do the EIS or the active EIS process is currently being done, or proof of an EIS submission before exempting permits ruled by the courts to comply with HEAP EIS Act 343 laws. This will allow those permits to continue or be reissued while Act 343 HEPA EIS compliance is being met.

The Supreme Court ruled with the aquarium fishery that the whole fishery could do an EIS, and so too should the tourist groups and commercial food fishery. So, a section regarding groups' compliance with permit EIS requirements should include permittee names for the group EIS permit exemption should also apply.

There should be no limits to the time of past active permits to be renewed. Aquarium Fishery permits were removed in 2017 with no just cause or scientific basis.

Comments:

Why: Too often, Act 343 EIS impacts have been applied to low-concern, low-risk, or unlisted species. IUCN has listed all aquarium species taken by past permits as "least concern".

While blackmail by Act 343 rulings may be the reason for BLNR's decisions not to grant permits even after the passage of the West Hawaii Aquarium Fishery HEPA ESI requirements the aquarium fishery permit issuance, it may be to protect others from the same law, giving the governor all veto power may also be an issue putting the power of one person in charge of critical valuable Hawaii businesses. So, we ask you not to allow that in HB 661. Clarity also needs to be done on whether the governor is superseding BLNR power on those EIS permits.

DAR has supported us in every hearing on the aquarium fishery, saying permits should be renewed and EISs should be passed in every case. BLNR has done the opposite, ignoring science. HB 661 will remove much of the lawsuit against user group pressure BLNR has, and we should be able to pass the completed Oahu EIS if HB 661 is enacted. Scientists in scientifically founded divisions like DAR researchers or dept of Agriculture biologists would

be more accurate and ecosystem-friendly than politicians or non-biology-trained lawyers in BLNR or DOBAR to make the permit issuance decisions.

West Hawaii EIS has already passed, but no permits have been issued. HB 661 will also help them to receive much-deserved permits. Due to confusing laws and legal fears.

Please remove and review HB 661 wording for legal interpretation by the courts to help **Eating Fisheries, Aquarium Fisheries, Dept of AG, Tourism and others**, all of which support HB 661 and SB 10745. I am sure you are aware that HB 1074 should also be considered for changes to match.

What HB 661 Draft 2 says:

- (d) The final authority to accept a final statement shall rest with:
- (1) The governor, or the governor's authorized representative, whenever an action proposes the use of state lands or the use of state funds, or whenever a state agency proposes an action within the categories in subsection (a); or
- (2) The mayor, or the mayor's authorized representative, of the respective county whenever an action proposes only the use of county lands or county funds.

The agency receiving the request, within thirty days of receipt of the final statement, shall notify the applicant and the office of the acceptance or non-acceptance of the final statement. The final statement shall be deemed to be accepted if the agency fails to accept or not accept the final statement within thirty days after receipt of the final statement; provided that the thirty-day period may be extended at the request of the applicant for a period not to exceed fifteen days.

In any acceptance or nonacceptance, the agency shall provide the applicant with the specific findings and reasons for its determination.

While the findings section of this bill suggests that commercial (i.e., private) activities are intended to be the subject of the bill, verbiage in the proposed new language (on page 2, line 12, and again on page 3, lines 9 & 10) state that the subject activities include those "... or undertaken by a state or county agency" This creates confusion as to the intent of the bill. Further, proposed language on page 2, line 20 references the appropriate "accepting agency" which is not a defined term in either HRS 343 or the rules for Hawaii's

environmental review process (aka HEPA). If the intent is for the amendment to apply only to private commercial applicants going through HEPA, then the correct term would be "approving agency."

Commercial collection of marine life for aquarium purposes has been practiced in Hawai'i for decades, and is recognized by the legislature as an approved, permissible activity. Hawai'i Revised Statutes ("HRS") § 188-31.
- 2. Any person taking marine life for commercial purposes must first obtain a commercial marine license under HRS § 189-2. However, HRS Chapter 189 does not include substantive regulations on where, how, or when commercial fishing may be conducted. All such regulations come from other sources.
- 3. In September 2017, the Hawai'i Supreme Court issued its ruling in *Umberger v. Department of Land and Natural Resources*, 140 Hawai'i 500, 403 P.3d 277 (2017). Dep't of Land and Natural Resources*, Case No. 1CCV-20-0000125, Complaint for Declaratory and Injunctive Relief filed January 27, 2020 ("*Kaupiko I*").

6. The Circuit Court in *Kaupiko I* ruled that an HRS § 188-31 permit is not a mandatory pre-condition to all aquarium collection and that aquarium collection with the HRS § 189-2 commercial marine license required compliance with HEPA. Following that ruling, the

DLNR entered into a stipulation with the plaintiffs therein to impose "terms and conditions" on CMLs, requiring compliance with HEPA before the CML could be used "for aquarium purposes." See, *Kaupiko I*, Docket No. 196, Judgment, January 28, 2021.

- 7. Neither the Plaintiff herein, or any member of the Plaintiff association, or any other aquarium fisher or representative of aquarium fishers, was a party in that lawsuit. In fact, the PIJAC was denied intervention despite its clear interest in the outcome. The "terms and conditions" have remained a requirement of the DLNR on all commercial marine licenses since January 28, 2021.
- 8. The fishers prepared an Environmental Impact Statement ("EIS") to support their request to resume commercial aquarium collection around the island of Hawai'i with all possible allowable gear, and for all required licenses and permits. An initial EIS was rejected by the Board of Land and Natural Resources ("BLNR" or "the Board") in May of 2020. The fishers updated the document and the Revised Final EIS ("RFEIS") was published in the spring of 2021, after which it was accepted by the Board by operation of HRS § 343-5(e), through which the legislature determined that an EIS is accepted unless affirmatively rejected by the reviewing agency.
- 9. Immediately thereafter, another lawsuit was filed, in which the Plaintiffs therein sought to invalidate the RFEIS based on the claim that the RFEIS was insufficient, as a matter of single small mesh net license pursuant to HRS § 188-31, nor has it made a formal application available. In addition, the DLNR has not provided any clarification on whether it agrees that Plaintiff's members have complied with the "terms and conditions" imposed on using a CML "for aquarium purposes", nor provided any clarification on how to determine compliance therewith. As a result, there has been no legal commercial aquarium collection in Hawai'i waters since January 28, 2021. Plaintiff's members desire and seek to engage in commercial aquarium collection, but remain unable to do so.
- 10. Despite the acceptance of the RFEIS in July 2021, the DLNR has not issued a law, in numerous respects. The Circuit Court, however, found that the RFEIS was sufficient as a matter of law, and entered judgment to that effect on September 12, 2022. See, *Kaupiko v. Board of Land and Natural Resources*, 1CCV-21-0000892, Docket Nos. 145, 153 and 155 (*Kaupiko II*). The Plaintiffs in that action appealed, and the Supreme Court issued its ruling affirming the Circuit Court on August 28, 2024. In that opinion, the Supreme Court discussed each of the complaints concerning the sufficiency of the RFEIS and, in every case, found the RFEIS to comply with the requirements of HRS Chapter 343 and Hawai'i Administrative Rule ("HAR") § 11-200.

II. Jurisdiction and Venue

11. This Court has jurisdiction over this matter pursuant to HRS §§ 603-21.5; 603-

21.9; 604A-2; HRS Chapter 632; and Article I, sections 2, 5 and 8 and Article XI, section 6 of the Hawai'i Constitution.

12. Venue properly lies in this judicial circuit pursuant to HRS § 603-36(5) because the claims for relief arose in this circuit and because it is the location where the Defendants are domiciled.

That the Court issue appropriate injunctive relief to preclude the DLNR from discriminating for or against any group or subset of present CML holders in enforcing the requirements, rules, terms or conditions for CML issuance and/or usage in State waters.

because the RFEIS satisfies the requirements of HAR § 11-200.1-11;

Constitutional Legal Inequity of Act 343!

Lawyer review:

Applying Act 343 to only specific user groups violates constitutional access for all to public domain undersea landscape lands. Act 343 has been used to eliminate the user group; Hawai'i's near-shore aquarium fishery is not based on ecological science but soley based in user group conflict. It has harmed the livelihood of fishermen operating on the Hawaiian Islands. It is our view that the bill is a significant overreach, has several constitutional deficiencies, and should be returned to the Legislature for correction.

Fundamentally, the moratorium is a hasty response to intense lobbying by outside biased environmental groups. It is not grounded in scientific consensus. The Hawaii Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) DAR previously objected to Act 343 closure of any user group based on the lack of any scientific basis. As a result, it is not well thought out and has created many constitutional headaches for the State, and potential litigation risk, as explained below. In addition, fighting the improper use of Act 343 has cost the state millions in legal fees.

Protections for Native Hawaiians

The bill makes no carve-outs or provisions to protect native Hawaiians. Historically 10% of the fishery was Native Hawaiian fishers. The Hawaii Constitution guarantees that the State will "protect all rights, customarily and traditionally exercised for subsistence, cultural and religious purposes and possessed by ahupua'a tenants who are descendants of native Hawaiians who inhabited the Hawaiian Islands prior to 1778" Hawaii Const. Art. XII, § 7. Hawaiians have relied on the islands' near-shore fisheries for centuries, and this bill does not take into account the impacts that a moratorium may have on native Hawaiian livelihood, culture, and way of life.

Public Access to Fisheries

The bill also impermissibly restricts public fishing access. Under the Hawai'i Constitution, "[a]II fisheries in the sea waters of the State . . . shall be free to the public, subject to . . . the right of the State to regulate the same" Hawai'i Const. Art. XI, § 6.

The moratorium would eliminate an entire fishery over time, completely denying public access. This goes far beyond mere "regulation" of fisheries and would therefore violate the Constitution.¹

Equal Protection and Due Process

Act 343 also raises significant concerns under the equal protection and due process clauses of the United States Constitution, which are designed to protect against exactly this kind of arbitrary, unsupported government action. Even assuming the Act 343 would be subject to only rational basis review (and setting aside for now the possibility that it would disproportionately impact native Hawaiians or other user groups unfairly), there appears to be no rational basis for the environmental reviews of already well-managed DLNR Ocean Permits. See, e.g., Nehring v. Ariyoshi, 443 F. Supp. 228, 239 (D. Haw. 1977) (concluding that there would be an equal protection violation under rational basis review where the State had not studied alleged environmental benefits and could produce no evidence to support their existence).

Dormant Commerce Clause

Act 343 also raises concerns under the Dormant Commerce Clause, which prohibits laws that unduly burden interstate commerce regarding Ocean Permits. The moratorium would severely disrupt the interstate aquarium trade supply chain. Act 343 has halted Hawaiian aquarium fish supply, industry would go to other countries for supply, some of which may tolerate environmentally destructive fishing practices like cyanide fishing. As such, the bill may violate the dormant commerce clause because it would burden interstate commerce in a manner that is clearly excessive in light of the purported (and highly dubious) environmental benefits. See Hughes v. Oklahoma, 441 U.S. 322, 337 (1979) (A state cannot "force those outside the State to bear the full costs of 'conserving' the wild animals within its borders").

Public Trust Doctrine and Takings

Act 343 could also create legal complications related to the public trust doctrine (under which the State holds water bodies in trust for the people) and the takings clause (under which the State may not take property without just compensation). At this stage, it is not clear that the moratorium is consistent with Hawai'i's public trust obligations. Likewise, it is not clear to what extent compensation would be required for the "taking" of the right to transfer permits. Both of these issues could eventually cause significant hassles.

Conclusion

We think this Act 343 has enough constitutional deficiencies that it should be reviewed and revised by the Legislature. It is in everyone's interest to pass a law that is based on sound science—does not place an undue burden on the State based on upholding scientific processes, not biased guesswork, or abused by lobbying pressure—and that is not vulnerable to constitutional attack.

Hello, my name is Shannon, and I have had the honor of calling Maui home for the past nine years. While I am not of Hawaiian descent and was not born and raised here, I deeply believe in the importance of stewardship: caring for and protecting these islands while also appreciating their beauty and sharing them responsibly with others.

Even in my short time living here, I have seen the impacts of unchecked tourism. I have witnessed visitors treating Maui like an amusement park, disregarding the reef, the culture, and the local communities. As a crew member and captain for Trilogy Excursions, I make it a daily mission to educate our guests on the significance of land and ocean stewardship. These excursions are not just about tourism; they provide a platform to teach visitors how to respect and care for the environment.

I understand the need to assess beach-loading tourism along Kā'anapali Beach. However, I strongly believe that we can conduct this assessment while still allowing commercial vessels to operate. Shutting down all commercial activities would have significant economic consequences, especially for the many employees—both in the excursion industry and in the hotels that depend on these tours. This community has already endured immense loss following the Lahaina fires, including the loss of livelihoods and stability. I, too, lost my home and everything I owned. Like many on the west side, I have worked hard to rebuild my life while also supporting my community.

In the wake of the fires, I committed myself to hands-on recovery efforts. When I was displaced, a friend in Kula took me in, and while I couldn't access Lahaina immediately, I dedicated my time to supporting the Kula community, which had also suffered devastating losses. I became deeply involved in what became known as the "Kula Hub," working alongside the county, nonprofits, the National Guard, and local residents to provide supplies, water, and emergency brush cleanup for months. That grassroots effort has since evolved into Mālama Kula, an ongoing land stewardship program. To support this work, I reduced my employment with Trilogy to part-time so I could continue giving back to the land and community I love.

If commercial activities at Kā'anapali Beach were to cease entirely, I, and many others, would be forced to find new employment, making it much harder for me to continue this vital stewardship work. While I personally support a long-term shift toward more sustainable employment in the islands, an abrupt shutdown would cause unnecessary hardship. Instead, I believe we can balance both priorities: allowing commercial operations to continue while conducting the necessary assessments.

I also want to emphasize that tour vessels play an important educational role. Most visitors arrive with little understanding of how to be responsible environmental stewards. Onboard programs provide a crucial opportunity to instill respect for Maui's delicate ecosystems and culture, something that would be lost if these excursions were eliminated.

Ultimately, I will respect the decision of the courts, but I urge you to consider a path that allows both economic stability and environmental responsibility to coexist. I genuinely appreciate your time and consideration.

I live on the island of Kaua'i.

I **strongly oppose** SB 1074, SD1, which would gut HEPA, one of our bedrock environmental laws. HEPA requires consideration of the environmental and cultural impacts of activities *before* they occur. Instead, the bill would allow state agencies like DLNR to keep rubberstamping permits until whenever they may get around to actually looking at the impacts.

DLNR has for years rubberstamped diversions of billions of gallons of water in East Maui and Kaua'i and extraction of millions of reef fish on Hawai'i Island and O'ahu, without ever looking at the impacts. Communities in Kaua'i and across Hawai'i pae'āina have successfully taken the agency to court to demand accountability by DLNR. This bill would eliminate this progress and hand these destructive activities a free pass.

This bill isn't necessary and is the result of a scare campaign aimed at gutting our environmental protections. HEPA is meant to apply broadly to promote environmental consciousness, *but nonetheless provides for exemptions of activities that have minor impacts*. This bill instead seeks to give a blanket free pass to commercial users of our public trust land, water, and ocean resources, *no matter what the harms*. It takes a sledgehammer to the law to swat at a fly.

The bill joins the all-out war against our environmental protections by the Trump administration and corporate interests. Hawai'i should know and do better than this and not wreck our bedrock laws that uphold fundamental principles of environmental stewardship and democracy.

I strongly oppose SB1074, SD1, which would allow agencies to keep rubberstamping environmentally harmful activities (like commercial aquarium collection) until whenever the agencies may get around to actually looking at the impacts and doing anything about it. I am deeply concerned how this bill would affect Hawai'i's reefs and lawai'a pono practices.

- Commercial aquarium collectors have devastated reef ecosystems around O'ahu and Hawai'i Island, extracting hundreds of thousands of fish and invertebrates each year in hotspots including West Hawai'i and Kāne'ohe Bay. Collected species include lau'ipala (yellow tang), kole (goldring surgeonfish), pāku'iku'i (Achilles tang), among many other native and endemic species that are critical for maintaining healthy reefs and supporting Native Hawaiian subsistence fishing and cultural practices.
- This reef life is sold and shipped in plastic bags to the continent and around the world to supply the global pet market for ornamental reef fish, instead of staying on the reefs to support ecosystem health and Native Hawaiian fishing practices that have been handed down for generations.
- Thanks to HEPA and recent court rulings, our reefs have finally gotten a break from unlimited aquarium extraction while the collectors and State look at environmental

and cultural impacts, mitigation measures, and alternatives through the public environmental review process.

- Please let HEPA do its job to *inform agency decision-making beforehand*, rather than handing industry a free pass to continue causing harm for years on end until they get around to completing the environmental review process. This bill would turn HEPA review into an afterthought and meaningless formality to justify harm that's already been done . . . and can't be undone.

On January 23, 2008 I met my wife on this beach. We have grown our family with the addition of our 2 children. My family comes to Kaanapali beach to see their Ohana. We respect the aina like it's our own. We urge the committee to please allow our community in Kaanapali to continue to thrive. With the passage of this bill we hope to continue operations while any reviews are to be completed.

SB1074 allows previously permitted activities to continue operating while undergoing environmental assessment, or an environment impact statement is required. This is critical for ensuring regulatory stability and preventing unnecessary interruptions for compliant businesses. In no way is this Bill meant to undermine the Umberger Ruling.

Usually, an environmental review is required before opening an area to commercial activities. However, for those commercial activities that started some 40 years ago, this review may not have taken place a simple oversight. My name is Moana Ching (Ulu), I am a lineal descendant of the ahupua'a of Kawanui and Keauhou in North Kona, Hawai'i and currentnly live in Ponahawai, Hilo. Members of my immediate family (husband and children) as well as my extended family (father, brothers, sisters nieces, and nephews) are active lawai'a who not only rely on healthy reef and nearshore ecosystems to feed our families but to maintain and perpetuate the lifeways of Hawai'i, inclusive of the values, knowledge, and practices that make up our unique island consciousness. I submit this letter noting my **strong opposition to SB 1074, SD1**, which would allow agencies to continue to authorize environmentally harmful activities (like commercial aquarium collection) without first ensuring a thorough and meaningful environmental review is completed.

I am deeply concerned how this bill would affect Hawai'i's reefs and lawai'a pono practices.

- Commercial aquarium collectors have devastated reef ecosystems around O'ahu and Hawai'i Island, extracting hundreds of thousands of fish and invertebrates each year in hotspots including West Hawai'i and Kāne'ohe Bay. Collected species include lau'ipala (yellow tang), kole (goldring surgeonfish), pāku'iku'i (Achilles tang), among many other native and endemic species that are critical for maintaining healthy reefs and supporting Native Hawaiian subsistence fishing and cultural practices.
- This reef life is sold and shipped in plastic bags to the continent and around the world to supply the **global pet market for ornamental reef fish**, instead of

Our membership exceeds 100 adult and ʻōpio members including cultural practitioners, community leaders, lawaiʻa, and descendants of konohiki families with roots in the Koʻolaupoko community dating back to time immemorial. We are finally seeing once rare fish, such as Longfin Anthias, Bicolor Anthias, Flame Wrasse and other fish that had all but disappeared whilst they were being collected. The fish that are collected have a high mortality rate. Those that survive end up in an aquarium, for a few to enjoy, rather than remaining on the reef, free for all to enjoy, while keeping the ecosystem in balance. Before we moved to Hawaii, we traveled here frequently to dive and enjoy a unique environment, where about 25% of the aquatic life is endemic to Hawaii. We should strive toward preserving these creatures in their natural environment, rather than allowing them to be collected, killed and/or shipped out of Hawaii. It makes no sense to allow tropical fish collection again, especially since it has been banned for six or seven years. Please consider the wishes of those who care, including Native Hawaiian groups, and do the right thing. Please put a permanent ban on tropical fish collection and help give the reefs a fighting chance to survive. In the interim, please coninue to require that a non-biased environmental impact statement be completed BEFORE allowing such environmentally destructive practices. This will allow fo a real measure of the impact of cuch a decision.





Aloha Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Gabbard and Committee members

Hawaii's Thousand Friends, a non-profit organization dedicated to ensuring that appropriate planning, management and land use decisions are made that protect the environment, human health and cultural resources and that decision are made in conformity with the law opposes SB 1074 SD1, which seeks to amend HRS 343, Hawaii Environmental Policy Act, to allow previously authorized or permitted commercial activity or operations to continue while the appropriate agency determines whether the activity or operation is subject to or exempt from the environmental review process when challenged.

It is unclear where SB 1074 SD1 got the idea that the environmental review process was only for new projects and not to disrupt ongoing, well-regulated activities. This is misleading when the purpose of HRS 343 is to integrate the review of environmental concerns with existing planning processes of the State and counties and alert decision makers to significant environmental effects which may result from the implementation of certain actions.

If passed SB 1074 SD1 would allow commercial activities, even if those activities that are illegal, to continue even if their practices harm the environment. Just because a commercial activity was approved without going through the environmental review process does not mean that the activity is not harmful to the environment.

Ignoring harmful activities whether permitted or unpermitted violates the State Constitution Article XI Section 1 For the benefit of present and future generations, the State and its political subdivisions shall conserve and protect Hawaii's natural beauty and all natural resources, including land, water, air, minerals and energy sources, and shall promote the development and utilization of these resources in a manner consistent with their conservation and in furtherance of the self-sufficiency of the State.

All public natural resources are held in trust by the State for the benefit of the people. (State Constitution Article XI Section 1)

Hawaii's public trust doctrine is a constitutional principal that requires the state to protect the state's natural resources for the benefit of the public. This applies to water, land, air, minerals, and natural beauty.

Once environmental damage is identified the State has a public trust responsibility to protect impacted natural resources and prevent any further degradation. If such action requires stopping a commercial activity, permitted or not, and requiring an environmental review under HRS 343 so be it.

To help preserve and protect Hawaii's fragile and finite natural resources we urge the Committee to hold SB 1074 SD1.

Aloha Committee,

Nā Pāpa'i Wāwae 'Ula'ula submits this testimony in strong opposition to SB 1074.

In addition to voicing our strong opposition to SB 1074, we would like to take the opportunity to provide this Committee with additional information and context regarding the lawsuit involving the commercial boating operations in $K\bar{a}$ anapali and the tentative agreement we have reached, which renders this drastic bill completely unnecessary.

In 2017, we filed suit against DLNR asking it to consider the environmental impacts of the increased commercial activity in $K\bar{a}$ anapali because of concerns for public safety in the ocean, as well as public access and parking, discharge of wastewater into our nearshore environment, among other things. In 2024, the court ordered DLNR to halt issuing and renewing commercial permits off $K\bar{a}$ anapali until DLNR could complete an environmental assessment, or determine the permits are exempt from review.

Following the Court's decision, Nā Pāpa'i immediately reached out to DLNR to propose an interim solution that implemented common sense permit conditions and actions that would allow commercial activity to continue while environmental assessments were ongoing. We received no response from DLNR.

DLNR's inaction unnecessarily escalated this situation and has pitted West Maui community members and families against each other. Thankfully, community leaders took matters into their own hands and contacted the boaters directly to work out a solution, long before this bill was introduced. The commercial boating community was extremely receptive, and we have since been in talks with boating industry leaders.

The parties have reached a tentative agreement that would allow boating activities to continue, with protections in place that address the community's concerns, including ocean safety and public access while environmental review takes place. Sadly, instead of engaging with the parties to reach a solution in this case, DLNR has dragged its feet on this agreement, and is now begging the state legislature for a blank check that would further enable their on-going mismanagement, while also systemically dismantling environmental protections with no recourse. This bill would give DLNR free reign to continue to rubberstamp a variety of destructive activities far beyond boating with no accountability to the community, the courts, or this legislative body. If DLNR

were interested in actually helping the parties reach a consensus, we would be there already, but DLNR, and their attorney, Miranda Steed, have been nothing but an obstacle in this process.

We urge you to vote NO on SB 1074. Having this bill pending while we are trying to finalize our settlement is only driving a further wedge between the parties and our community, and it is not conducive to finding workable solutions that benefit everyone. The urgency to pass SB1074 is manufactured. This bill is drastic, divisive, and unnecessary. Please reject SB1074.

My name is Nichole Hutaff-Nakamura I strongly supports HB661 with noted changes below.

HB661 has been under opposition by those seeing this as a threat to HEPA, aka: Umberger Ruling regarding aquarium fishing. In no way is this Bill meant to undermine the Umberger Ruling. It's intention is to prevent the shut down of non-consumptive tour boats off of Ka'anapali beach out of business.

To pass this Bill will directly help 32 permitted Ka'anapali companies keep running while the EA is done. To shut down businesses who have been running legally and ethically (some for 4 decades) all of a sudden without any proof that any one of them has specifically done anything wrong is just completely unfair and frankly scary. This is an unintended consequence of the current HEPA process, intended to stop consumptive activities, e.g. aquarium collection activities.

If not stopped, what is happening in Ka'anapali will set a precedent for every harbor, beach, park, special management area, etc. in the state. If this same very vocal anti-tourism minority group that is suing the Ka'anapali and Mala permits (and they are the same people) get these businesses shut down without one piece of proof offered up, the rest of the state may find themselves in the same position.

Bringing balance and protection to our delicate and unique ecosystems takes precedence, acknowledging the importance of an EA, but an abrupt and immediate stop to the existing permitted activities, would create another imbalance. One that would impact the economic systems on Maui which are already in a very delicate state given COVID and the August 8, 2023 WildFires.

Recommendation:

Add exceptions to Hawaii Environmental Policy Act (HEPA) for:

- Areas where commercial, permitted and government oversight exists, and these activities have been ongoing for over 30 years.
- This exception is ONLY for non-consumptive permitted activities

Without this determination, over 230 families will directly be out work and countless other vendors which serve these businesses will also be impacted.


We are deeply concerned about commercial and industrial levels of "non-commercial" extractive activities, including fisheries, in state waters.

Such a proposal recklessly gambles with the stability and health of resources held in public trust- resources for which you all are entrusted by current generations to protect for future generations to come.

My name is sara hakan. I have been an active community Members for the last 17 years, am a fire survivor and have worked on the boats in lahaina and Kā'anapali for the last 10 years. I strongly support HB661 with noted changes below.

HB661 has been under opposition by those seeing this as a threat to HEPA, aka: Umberger Ruling regarding aquarium fishing. In no way is this Bill meant to undermine the Umberger Ruling. It's intention is to prevent the shut down of non-consumptive tour boats off of Ka'anapali beach out of business.

To pass this Bill will directly help 32 permitted Ka'anapali companies keep running while the EA is done. To shut down businesses who have been running legally and ethically (some for 4 decades) all of a sudden without any proof that any one of them has specifically done anything wrong is just completely unfair and frankly scary. This is a unintended consequence of the current HEPA process, intended to stop consumptive activities, e.g. aquarium collection activities.

If not stopped, what is happening in Ka'anapali will set a precedent for every harbor, beach, park, special management area, etc. in the state. If this same very vocal anti-tourism minority group that is suing the Ka'anapali and Mala permits (and they are the same people) get these businesses shut down without one piece of proof offered up, the rest of the state may find themselves in the same position.

Recommendation:

Add exceptions to Hawaii Environmental Policy Act (HEPA) for:

- Areas where commercial, permitted and government oversight exists, and these activities have been ongoing for over 30 years.
- This exception is ONLY for non-consumptive permitted activities

Without this determination, over 230 families will directly be out work and countless other vendors which serves these businesses will also be impacted.

I am writing from Hanapēpē on the island of Kaua'i to express my strong opposition to SB 1074, SD1. This bill would dismantle HEPA, one of Hawai'i's most important environmental protections, by allowing agencies like DLNR to approve permits without properly assessing the environmental and cultural impacts of their decisions.

For years, DLNR has rubberstamped massive water diversions in East Maui and Kaua'i and allowed the extraction of millions of reef fish from Hawai'i Island and O'ahu—without ever fully evaluating the consequences.
