SB 1502 SD1 – RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII

Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Moriwaki, and Members of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of SB 1502 SD1. This bill seeks to establish faculty positions, student programs, and facilities within the College of Social Sciences at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa and the University of Hawai'i – West O'ahu. Its goal is to develop a skilled workforce for the defense sector of the state's economy.

University of Hawai'i at Mānoa

Since 2023, the College of Social Sciences (CSS) at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa (UH Mānoa) has developed and delivered programs to prepare high school and university students for careers in intelligence analysis, national security and cybersecurity. Now, in 2025, CSS and other UH Mānoa units are ready to broaden the scope of these pilot projects by establishing a UH Mānoa-based academic program, Intelligence Studies in the Asia Pacific (ISAP).

ISAP would change the historical practice of transferring personnel from the continent and foreign countries and moving them to Hawai'i to fill local jobs in national security. This workforce development project would enable the people of Hawai'i, who have a strong affinity for Pacific Islander and Asian cultures and languages, to take the lead in monitoring and addressing regional international affairs and security issues within their home state.

With the goal of preparing Hawai'i's people for local high-paying careers in national security fields, CSS will continue to work closely with UH Mānoa units such as Engineering and the College of Arts, Languages and Letters, as well as the University of Hawai'i – West O'ahu's (UH West O'ahu) cybersecurity research laboratory and other campuses within the UH System. This workforce initiative would attract and serve

students who are pursuing a variety of majors, and provide credentials for working professionals to upgrade skills in a rapidly growing Hawai'i industry.

University of Hawai'i – West O'ahu

The Bachelor of Science in Cybersecurity provides students with an advanced cybersecurity education in information security, mathematics, computer science, and computer engineering. This technical cybersecurity degree program prepares students to meet the advanced cybersecurity workforce requirements of public sector agencies and private sector enterprises. This degree program supports both four-year students at UH West O'ahu and pathway students from aligned Associate Degree programs from the University of Hawai'i Community Colleges.

In partnership with the College of Social Sciences (CSS) at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa academic program, Intelligence Studies in the Asia Pacific (ISAP), our collective goal is to prepare Hawai'i's people for local high-paying careers in national security fields. UH West O'ahu's Cyber Security Coordination Center (CSCC) provides students with unique opportunity to develop subject matter expertise and identification of best practices for network defense, vulnerability research, forensic analysis, and industrial control systems. The Cyber Security Research Laboratory (CSRL) provides students with unique internship opportunities to combine cyber security education and skills to promote advanced knowledge in an applied research environment. Students participate in faculty guided applied analysis and research related to the understanding and improvement of security and resiliency for critical information infrastructures and systems at the local, regional, and national level. The CSCC and CSRL provide a collaborative resource for Cybersecurity, Information Security and Assurance, and Information Technology degree students that will also produce highly trained cybersecurity and information technology professionals to meet increasing technical workforce requirements that exists in our communities.

The funding allocated in this bill will support the following initiatives:

1. The establishment of a multidisciplinary Integrated Security and Privacy (ISAP) program at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, utilizing 4.5 Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) employees, including 3 faculty members, with an estimated budget of \$500,000.
2. The creation of a 0.5 FTE position for the Director of the Cyber Security Coordination Center and a 0.5 FTE position for the Director of the Cyber Security Research Laboratory at the University of Hawai'i, West O'ahu. This funding will also cover expenses related to student internships, certifications, equipment, software, and professional certification fees.

We appreciate the opportunity to provide our testimony in support and respectfully ask for your favorable consideration, provided its adoption does not impact priorities as indicated in our Board of Regents Approved Budget.
