# SUBJECT: Testimony on S.B. No. 51, Relating to Public Financing for Candidates to Elected Office.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this bill. The Campaign Spending Commission ("Commission") supports the intent of this bill but is concerned about the funding, the need for additional personnel, and the implementation with the 2026 election.

This bill establishes a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates seeking election to state and county public offices to beginning with the 2026 general election year, appropriates funds to the Hawaii Election Campaign Fund, and appropriates funds to the Commission. This public financing program is modeled after the pilot Hawaii County Council Comprehensive Public Funding Project<sup>1</sup> that ran in 2010 and 2012.

The bill establishes the maximum amount of comprehensive public funds ("CPF Max") for each office as well as the minimum qualifying \$5 contributions ("\$5 MQC") that must be raised for each office. The following table shows the \$5 MQC and CPF Max for each office:

If one candidate for each office qualified and received the CPF Max in the 2026 election period, this program will pay out **\$15,110,000** in public financing to the qualified candidates. In contrast, if one candidate for each office qualified to receive partial public funding in the 2026 elections, the state will pay a maximum of **\$2,948,612** in public financing. Under §11-O of the proposed new subpart to Part XIII of Chapter 11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, there must be a minimum of \$30,000,000 in the Hawaii Election Campaign Fund on September 1, 2025 in order for the Commission to run the comprehensive public financing program established by the bill.

In Section 7 of the bill, there is an appropriation of \$200,000 for this fiscal year and the same amount for the next fiscal year, for the Commission to hire two full-time equivalent (2.0 FTE) temporary positions to prepare for comprehensive public financing in the 2026 elections. The Commission has not had an increase in personnel for the past 29 years despite the number of candidate committees and noncandidate committees having almost doubled in size. Currently, there are only 5 staff members who oversee 700+ committees that have anywhere from 1-3 officers who require assistance on how to comply with the various requirements of campaign finance law thereby generating hundreds of staff hours assisting committees over the phone, inperson, and by email as well as a number of enforcement actions for violations. Under HRS §11-314(7), one of the Commission's 14 duties is to investigate and hold hearings for receiving evidence of any campaign finance violations. The Commission has no investigator on staff and has had to rely on contracts for investigative services with outside agencies.<sup>2</sup> In comparison to other State and county good government groups with compliance and enforcement duties, the Commission has had a modest budget and nominal staff despite a tremendous growth in committees, an expansion in its duties and responsibilities, and enforcement mandates. The Commission respectfully seeks your support so that the Commission may ensure that the

integrity and transparency of the campaign finance process is upheld. The Commission requests that these two positions be permanent rather than temporary.<sup>3</sup>

In summary, the balance in the Hawaii Election Campaign Fund is \$2,199,230.60 as of December 31, 2024. Obviously, this amount is insufficient to pay for the comprehensive public funding program, including the additional personnel the Commission will need, and thus, the total appropriation of \$30,200,000 in Section 6 of the bill is necessary. Further, it would be impossible for the Commission to run this program for the 2026 election. The 2026 election period started the day after the general election on November 5, 2024 for those candidates with a 2-year election period and runs until the general election on November 3, 2026. Modifications to the electronic filing system, reports, forms, and training and education are necessary components which would need to be addressed.

Respectfully, the Commission requests that this committee address these concerns because there is insufficient funds, personnel, and time to implement a program of this magnitude if it is going to pass this measure.

# RELATING TO PUBLIC FINANCING FOR CANDIDATES TO ELECTED OFFICE

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill.

Senate Bill (S.B.) No. 51 amends Chapter 11, HRS, by adding a new subpart to

Part XIII titled "Comprehensive Public Funding for Candidates to State and County Offices," which establishes a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates seeking election to State and county public offices in the State of Hawai'i, to begin with the 2026 general election year. Included with the establishment of the Comprehensive Public Funding Program (CPFP) is the creation of a CPFP subaccount within the Hawai'i Election Campaign Fund (HECF) to carry out the purposes of this measure. Deposits to the CPFP subaccount include appropriations made by the Legislature, excess seed money contributions, qualifying contributions, unspent public funds distributed to any certified candidate, fines levied by the commission for violation of the CPFP, and voluntary donations.

This measure also appropriates \$30,200,000 in general revenues for FY 26 for deposit into the HECF for expenditure by the Campaign Spending Commission for the

CPFP; and appropriates \$200,000 out of the HECF for FY 26 and FY 27 to fund 2.00 temporary full-time equivalent position and to prepare for the comprehensive public funding of candidates in elections taking place in 2026.

As a matter of general policy, B&F does not support the creation of any special account that requires regular general fund appropriations to support its activities and does not demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining. Regarding S.B. No. 51, it is difficult to determine whether the proposed CPFP subaccount would be self-sustaining.

Chair Rhoads and Committee members:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on Senate Bill 51.

The Office of the City Clerk takes no position on the merits of financing campaigns with public monies. However, we recommend that the Committee consider the donor qualification model found in the previous iteration of the bill wherein the Campaign Spending Commission is the sole jurisdictional entity involved with administering the program.

In that model, no information is transferred across offices and limited access to the State's voter registration system/data is granted to enable the Commission to conduct its verification of qualifying donor contributions. County election offices serve in a mere consultative role to clarify questions related to any voter registration record.

That approach would align a Hawaii program with other States that administer public financing of campaigns for state legislative seats, whereby verification processes (if required) are conducted by either a State campaign spending agency or secretary of state. We also provide the approach as employed in Arizona (see: <a href="https://www.azcleanelections.gov">https://www.azcleanelections.gov</a>) that established a specific commission with the sole mission of implementing the public financing program.

Perhaps most concerning to election administrators is that as presently drafted, assigning County Clerks with verifying contributors effectively blurs distinctions and timelines of administering the elections with other activities that are more closely associated with the campaigning process. As such, we recommend that the Committee consider a different alternative to the donor verification process.

Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Gabbard, and Members of the Senate Judiciary Committee,

I strongly support SB 51, which will strengthen Hawai'i's public campaign financing system and curb the outsized influence of money in our elections. Having worked on waste policy to address waste management issues for the past three years, I have seen how well-funded industry lobbyists often override community needs, making it difficult for common-sense solutions to move forward. This dynamic erodes public trust and discourages civic participation.

SB 51 provides a path toward a more accountable democracy by allowing candidates to run without reliance on private donations. Other states, including Maine and Connecticut, have shown that public financing does not radically shift political power, but it does change who holds influence–giving everyday people a stronger voice.

Public financing is both popular and cost-effective. A clean elections program is supported by three out of four voters, and even at the highest participation levels, the estimated cost is less than \$10 million per year–just 0.05% of the state budget. This is a small price to pay for a more transparent and accountable government.

For these reasons, I strongly urge you to pass SB 51 to help restore trust in our democracy and ensure that Hawai'i's government works for the people-not just those who can afford to buy access.

# **Testimony in Support of SB51**

Submitted to the Senate Judiciary Committee by Evan Weber, Managing Director, Our Hawai'i, 2/5/2025

Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Gabbard, and all Committee members,

Mahalo for the opportunity to testify before you today. On behalf of Our Hawai'i's over 38,000 members and supporters across the pae 'āina, I write in strong support for Senate Bill SB51, relating to public financing of candidates to elected office. Our members and supporters are local people — kama'āina and kānaka maoli, keiki and kūpuna, from Kaua'i to Kohala, Kailua to Kapolei and every place in between. They have joined our movement to fight for a Hawai'i that puts local people — not big money interests — first, because they are deeply worried about the direction of our islands and believe now is the time for change.

Our supporters are not alone. The crisis of public trust in government has reached a tipping point. After years of the FBI putting our officials in handcuffs, resignations, and scandals, <u>Hawai'i voters</u> as a whole in the 2022 election ranked government corruption as their number 3 top issue, only behind inflation and affordable housing, in a survey conducted on behalf of Our Hawai'i by the most accurate polling firm in US elections in 2020.

The incomplete reforms adopted by the legislature in 2023, while important, did not go far enough on a policy matter or in terms of shifting public perception. Polling conducted in 2024 by the Clean Elections Hawai'i Coalition, consisting of over 3-dozen local organizations, showed that two out of three voters (66%) believe that "elected officials care more about wealthy donors than the needs of my community." Ouch. 9 out of 10 voters also believe that influence or obligate legislators to some degree, with over half of voters believing that degree is "greatly."

# Two Out of Three Voters Say Elected Officials Care More About Wealthy Donors Than Needs of Communities





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This poll was conducted in March 2024, right *before* an April 17th <u>bombshell exposé</u> <u>dropped on the front page of the New York Times</u>, exposing to the world the deep culture of pay-to-play corruption that has existed at high levels of Hawai'i political leadership. The exposé specifically called out the loophole in our campaign finance laws which this legislation and other similar bills introduced this session seek to close. With the article being released towards the end of last legislative session, reform-minded lawmakers did not have time to act, but now you do.

"Great" Concern Over Money In Politics and Private Campaign Spending for Majorities



Luckily, a solution is on the table for you to solve this problem. The same voters, across race, ethnicity, income level, and political party, overwhelming support a Clean Elections program when it is described to them in plain terms, with 68% of voters saying they would support passing a law to create a Clean Elections program in Hawai'i. And they are 4 times more likely to support than oppose a candidate for office who backs and champions such a program as well.

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With public trust at an all time low, now is the time for systemic and transformative solutions. While progress has been made, it is not enough. We need to address the overriding issue of money in our politics where it begins, in our elections.

SB51 would go as far as is legally possible under the United States constitution, by providing a viable alternative to the status quo private money campaign system. It would level the playing field for candidates who are not wealthy or well-connected, and take a historic step towards getting big money out of our elections.

No longer would legislators have to look over their shoulders, worried about how their donors who will fund their next campaign might react to each and every vote. Legislators can be fully focused on delivering for their constituents, not campaign donors. That's how democracy is supposed to work!

We know that programs like this work, and are cost-effective: we've seen it in places like Connecticut, Maine, Hawai'i County and cities all around the US. Even if Hawai'i saw higher participation rates than any other State, estimates show the cost would be less than \$10 million per year—just 0.05% of the state budget. That's just over \$6 per resident or less than \$1 per tourist—a small price to pay for a more transparent, accountable government, and an amount that a majority of those polled said they'd be willing to pay.

We have the policy. We have the public desire for change. We have the resources. The only question is do we have the political will? That will be up to you to make it so. As you deliberate, know the public is watching.

Mahalo nui loa for your courage and action. Laulima, we can move forward to a better future for our Hawai'i.

# POLL: Two Out of Three Voters Say Elected Officials Care More About Wealthy Donors Than Needs of Communities, Want 'Clean Elections' as Solution

71% of voters support a Clean Elections program to publicly fund campaigns, with only 12% opposing. 9 in 10 say campaign contributions influence and obligate legislators, and 66% say elected officials care more about wealthy donors than communities.

*HONOLULU, Hawai'i* — More than 3 in 4 (78%) Hawai'i voters believe legislators are influenced and obligated by campaign contributions and have had their trust in government impacted by recent corruption scandals, 2 in 3 (66%) believe elected officials care more about "wealthy donors" than the "needs of their communities," and about the same amount (71%) support a "Clean Elections" publicly-financed elections program as a solution, according to a new poll conducted by SurveyUSA from February 27th - March 6th, 2024 and released by the Clean Elections Hawai'i Coalition. The survey interviewed 1,008 registered and likely voters across Hawai'i and found widespread and deep concern about money in politics and corruption in government, as well as broad and deep support for a "Clean Elections" program of public financing as a reform solution across ethnic and racial, gender, geographical, and political demographics.

"Clearly, the idea of Clean Elections is one with strong appeal to a very broad cross-section of Hawaii voters," said **Ken Alper, President of SurveyUSA** who conducted the poll. "Two thirds of voters say their representatives care more about their donors than they do about local communities – and not coincidentally, two thirds of voters support a Clean Elections program in Hawaii. This tackles a major issue for voters, and that's why you see such strong numbers in support of it."

Poll results show strong support for a "publicly-financed elections" program across all likely voters, across all major ethnic groups, and across political parties, with 3 out of 4 likely Democratic and Republican primary voters supporting the program, and voters being 4 times more likely to support (42%) than oppose (10%) a candidate for office who supports Clean Elections.

At the same time, results are alarming as it relates to current concern over money in politics, private campaign financing, and trust in elected officials and the government. A jaw-dropping half or more of all voters think that private campaign contributions are "greatly" influencing or obligating their legislators and are concerned about the financial transparency of candidates running for office, with 9 out of 10 likely voters sharing these concerns to some degree. 2 out 3 likely voters believe elected officials are more focused on wealthy donors than the needs of their community, and 3 out of 4 have had their trust in government shaken by recent corruption scandals.

"This survey should be a wakeup call for our elected officials — ordinary working people do not trust that you are working in our communities' interest." said **Sergio Alcubilla, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Workers Center and a spokesperson for the Clean Elections Hawai'i campaign.** "Last year's marginal reforms have not moved the needle on public perception or trust in legislators. But a solution is on the table and ready for legislators to win back the public trust and make meaningful reform to a system that many feel is rigged against them. It's time we put the best interests of the community first. The time for Clean Elections is now."

# Two Out of Three Voters Say Elected Officials Care More About Wealthy Donors Than Needs of Communities



Opponents of Clean Elections in Hawai'i have tried to point to its cost as a deterrent, and suggested that voters would not be willing to shoulder the burden. However, when asked directly about the cost per taxpayer of a Clean Elections program, 58% say the cost is reasonable while less than 1 in 4 believe it is unreasonable. [Maybe: Even when opposition framing which contains falsehoods about cost is shared about Clean Elections, voters still show net support for the program by double digits — 19 percentage points. Furthermore, voters seem enthusiastic about a variety of ways to pay for the program. Early this month, legislation for publicly financed elections described as the "last shot" for legislators to make reform before the elections passed the Hawai'i Senate and was transferred to the House of Representatives, where today it was scheduled for a hearing on Thursday, March 14th in the Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs committee at 2pm in Capitol Conference Room 325. Members of the media and the public are encouraged to attend.

<u>About SurveyUSA and the Polling Methodology:</u> SurveyUSA is an independent, apolitical and non-partisan research organization that conducts custom, local opinion research for universities, non-profits, local and state governments and small to medium-sized businesses, ad agencies and public relations firms. Nate Silver's fivethirtyeight.com rates 517 polling firms on an ongoing basis, and no research company of any size scores as highly as SurveyUSA on four key metrics: SurveyUSA is in the 94th percentile for absence of partisan bias, the 98th percentile for accuracy, the 98th percentile for predictive value, and the 100th percentile for most prolific.

SurveyUSA interviewed 1,265 adult respondents from the entire state of Hawaii 02/27/24 through 03/06/24. Of the adults, 1,008 were identified by SurveyUSA as being registered to vote and were asked the substantive questions which follow. This research was conducted using a blended sample, mixed mode approach. 71% of registered voters were online panelists chosen randomly who were shown the survey questions on the display of their smartphone, laptop, or tablet. 29% of registered voters were texted on their cell phones by live operators who secured the cooperation of each respondent before linking them to an online survey. The pool of adult respondents was weighted to US Census targets for gender, age, ethnicity, education, and home ownership.

Strong Support in Aloha State for 'Clean Elections' Program to Publicly Fund Campaigns; Majority Says Projected Cost Would be Reasonable; ¾ Of Hawaii Voters Say Legislators Become Obligated to Campaign Donors; Deep Concerns About Financial Transparency of Candidates For Office:

Results of SurveyUSA research conducted exclusively for Clean Elections Hawaii show strong support across the state for a publicly funded system for political campaigns, with two-thirds of voters in favor of such a program as soon as the idea is broached.

68% of registered voters say they would support passing a law to create a Clean Elections program in Hawaii (38% strongly support, 30% somewhat support); only 11% are opposed. Support is no less than 60% among any demographic subgroup.

When asked if they would support or oppose a Clean Elections program if it did not result in new taxes, the percentage supporting increases 5 points, to 73% (41% strongly supporting, 32% somewhat supporting), with the largest increases in support seen among Japanese voters (18 points), Latinos (11 points), and Democrats (9 points).

58% of voters say the estimated \$6 per resident cost of the program is reasonable; just 1 in 4, 23%, say it is unreasonable.

42% of voters say they are more likely to vote for candidate who supports Clean Elections; 31% say it makes no difference in their vote. Only 1 in 10 voters say they would be less likely to vote for such a candidate; White voters and those with 4-year college degrees are the most likely to say they'd be more likely to vote for a candidate who supports Clean Elections; the youngest voters are the most likely to say they'd be more likely to vote for a candidate who supports Clean Elections; the youngest voters are the most likely to say they'd be more likely to say they'd be less likely to support such a candidate.

⅔ of voters, 66%, agree with this statement: "My current elected officials are more focused on the interests of their wealthy donors than on the needs of my community." 33% strongly agree; 33% somewhat agree. 22% disagree (16% somewhat, 6% strongly). 84% of Republicans agree, compared to 57% of Democrats.

¾ of registered voters, 78%, agree with this statement: "Recent public corruption scandals have negatively impacted my trust in our state government." 47% strongly agree, 31% somewhat agree; only 15% disagree. Agreement is at or above 72% among every demographic subgroup.

A 51% majority say campaign contributions greatly influence the policies supported by legislators; another 27% say contributions have a moderate impact – 78% in all. 11% say they have a slight influence, 3% no influence at all. Voters age 50 to 64 are the most likely to say contributions have at least a moderate influence; those aged 18 to 34 are the least likely.

78% also say legislators become obligated to those who donate money to their campaigns, with 53% saying they become greatly obligated, 25% moderately obligated. 10% say they are only slightly obligated, 3% not at all. No fewer than 70% of voters in any demographic subgroup say legislators become obligated.

By more than 2:1, voters say limiting the size and number of campaign contributions helps to prevent corruption in politics, with 54% feeling that way; 23% say these limits have no impact on corruption. Democrats are more likely to say limits help prevent corruption; Republicans and independents are less likely to say so.

69% are moderately (28%) or greatly (41%) concerned that businesses may not wish to expand in Hawaii if it has a reputation for a lack of ethical conduct, a lack of campaign transparency, or a "pay-to-play" reputation. 12% are just slightly concerned; 7% are not concerned at all. Concern increases with age, from 60% of 18 to 34-year-olds being moderately or greatly concerned, to 69% of 35 to 49-year-olds, to 73% of those age 50+.

79% are concerned (29% moderately, 50% greatly) about the financial transparency of candidates for office; 10% are slightly concerned, 3% not concerned at all. No fewer than 70% of voters in any demographic subgroup are concerned.

#### TESTIMONY Beppie Shapiro, Legislative Committee, League of Women Voters of Hawaii

Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Gabbard, and Committee Members: The League of Women Voters of Hawaii thanks the Committee Chairs and members for hearing this valuable and popular bill.

The League of Women Voters of Hawaii strongly supports SB51 which: Establishes a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates seeking election to state and county public offices in the State, to begin with the 2026 general election year; Requires the Campaign Spending Commission to submit a progress and final report to the Legislature; and appropriates funds. We also offer comments.

The League of Women Voters of the United States believes that methods of financing political campaigns should enhance political equality for all citizens; protect representative democracy from being distorted by big spending in election campaigns; ensure the public's right to know who is using money to influence elections; enable candidates to compete equitably for public office; ensure that candidates have sufficient funds to communicate their messages to the public; and combat corruption and undue influence in government.

Delegates and voters in the 1978 Constitutional Convention in Hawaii realized the importance of this concept, resulting in the creation of the Hawaii Election Campaign Fund and Hawaii's partial public funding option. Below is a quote from the Convention during the discussion of the HECF: " . . . if we think these tremendous sums being spent [on elections], these tremendous sums being contributed, are not sums for which we are going toultimately pay because of poor government . . . and because of undue influence . . .we are fooling ourselves." Delegate Naomi Campbell during the 1978 Constitutional Convention.

Who funds privately funded elections? Wealthy businesses and individuals. Over half of all Hawaii campaign donations in 2022 came from just 980 donors who each gave at least \$6,0001. (The sources of campaign contributions changed markedly in Connecticut legislative races after implementation of full public funding. In 2018, 99% of campaign funds used by legislative candidates came from individuals, in sharp contrast

to preprogram practices when less than half of thecontributions made to political candidates came from individuals.<sup>2</sup>)

Why could this be a problem? The affluent have different priorities: 68 percent of the general public believes politicians ought to see to it that everyone who wants to work can find a job, while only 19 percent of the wealthy believe the same; the general public is twice as likely to support raising the minimum wage high enough to keep families out of poverty as affluent respondents; a majority of Americans think that wealth should be taxed at the same rate as work, but the wealthiest 20% of Americans, who are most likely to make substantial contributions to political campaigns, are those most likely to profit from low taxes on capital gains.<sup>3</sup>

The broader public is short-changed by policies which may be influenced by wealthy business interests. Publicly funded elections let the voting public have more influence on political decisions, as is widely appreciated by voters. A survey of Hawaii voters in 2022 showed that 74% of the Hawai'i voting public would be more likely to support a candidate who refused campaign donations from out-of-state developers, major landowners, hotel conglomerates, and energy companies; 70 percent of voters were more likely to support a candidate who refused donations from lobbyists and corporate PACs.<sup>4</sup> When large contributions are made by business interests, it's likely that the customers of those businesses indirectly pay, in higher prices, for these contributions. Again, the public pays for the costs of privately funded election campaigns. When candidates are funded by the public, politicians are free to make decisions based on the merit of ideas, not biased, consciously or not, by consideration of who gave or will give money to their election campaigns.

The costs to implement Full Public Funding of Elections are reasonable and affordable. Connecticut's program spent less than \$14 million during the last election cycle. Even with high participation rates amongst candidates, estimated expenses for Hawai'i are less than \$10 million per year, representing less than 0.1% of the state budget.

Connecticut's Citizen's Elections program (CEP) shows how full public funding can repay its cost: "For many years, environmentalists tried to expand the bottle bill recycling program..., but the powerful beverage industry and its paid lobbyists were able to stop every effort at reform because they gave thousands of dollars to legislators. This year (2016), the legislature—with three-quarters of members having participated in the CEP—voted... to reclaim millions of dollars' worth of unclaimed bottle deposits, ... approximately \$25 million a year out of the pockets of the beverage industry and into the general fund. This alone recoups more money than the CEP costs"<sup>2</sup>.

Instead of fundraising, candidates can spend more time talking to their constituents or analyzing and discussing solutions to Hawaii's problems as quoted by CT state legislators.<sup>2</sup>

SB51 will support a more diverse field of candidates. Currently people without wealth or wealthy families and friends, who may be politically akamai and interested in running for office, often feel (probably rightly) that they will not be able to conduct winning campaigns, since 90% of races in nationally and in Hawaii are won by the candidate who spends most in an election contest.

These campaign finance objectives, which I believe are widely shared, lead directly to recommending full and realistic public financing of election campaigns as in SB51.

The League of Women Voters of Hawaii strongly urges this Committee to pass this bill.

# SENATE BILL 51, RELATING TO PUBLIC FINANCING FOR CANDIDATES TO ELECTED OFFICE

FEBRUARY 5, 2025 · JDC HEARING

**POSITION:** Support.

**RATIONALE:** The Democratic Party of Hawai'i Education Caucus <u>supports</u> SB 51, relating to public financing for candidates for elected office, which establishes a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates seeking election to state and county public offices in the State of Hawai'i, to begin with the 2026 general election year; and requires the Campaign Spending Commission to submit reports to the Legislature

Government should work for the public interest, not special interests.

In the 2010 and 2012 election cycles, the Hawai'i Island County Council ran a pilot program for comprehensive public funding. Similarly, Connecticut and Maine have instituted statewide clean elections programs, which have proven successful at increasing electoral participation and reducing candidates' reliance on private donations. Over 70 percent of Democratic legislators use public financing to fund their campaigns in Maine.

Hawai'i continues to be embroiled in public corruption scandals, following the bribery allegations that were levied against former Senate Majority Leader Kalani English and former State Representative Ty Cullen. Other public officials, such as employees at local permitting offices,

have also recently been ensnared in bribery scandals, in some cases with connections to Milton Choy, the lobbyist who was responsible for coordinating the bribery scheme that Sen. English and Rep. Cullen became a part of. These cases show that we have a moral crisis in our public institutions and must do all we can to restore integrity to government.

When candidates for public office are forced to rely on private donations to build relationships, those transactions can cause corruption or create the perception of it. Put simply, legislators are responsive to donors because donors fund their campaigns. Money is crucial to winning. Roughly 91 percent of candidates who outspend their opponents win their elections.

Relatedly, many people choose not to run for public office because they can't afford the cost of a campaign, leaving many incumbents routinely uncontested in their reelection bids. The average winner of a State House seat in Hawai'i spends approximately \$40,000 on their campaign, compared to only \$16,000 for the losing candidate. Over half of all campaign donations in 2022 came from just 980 donors, each of whom contributed at least \$6,000 in candidate donations during the last election cycle.

This bill will eventually create an election system that is fair for our island home. Once a clean elections program is fully effectuated in 2028–more than enough time to fund the system for the next non-gubernatorial election season–candidates will no longer need to rely on contributions from wealthy donors. Instead, they can seek support from their constituents in the form of small donations that verify their credibility and subsequently obtain public funding in an amount sufficient to run effective campaigns. Legislators will, in turn, be empowered to focus on engaging with their communities, rather than wheedling the donor class. Ultimately, this will help our government reflect the will of the people, not the wallets of the privileged.

It's crucially important that the legislature does everything in its power to remove the influence money has on politics. Candidates work for donations that create relationships that can cause corruption or the perception of it. Money is crucial to winning, for example, 91% of candidates who outspend their opponent go on to win. Many elections are uncontested because potential candidates can't afford the high price tag. Furthermore, the average house winner spends \$40,000 compared to only \$16,000 for the loser.

Publicly financed elections will allow candidates to get support from their constituents rather than wealthy donors. As a result, elections will become more competitive with a more diverse set of candidates. Legislators will be free to act on behalf of voters without being concerned about what their donors think. Candidates will also be able to spend more time with constituents rather than fundraising. Furthermore, a system of fully publicly financed elections is overwhelmingly supported by Hawai'i voters.

Publicly funded elections are already being successfully implemented locally and in other jurisdictions. Hawai'i Island County Council races had this program in 2010 and 2012. Connecticut and Maine have clean elections statewide which are both very popular and successful. Over 70% of Democratic legislators use this program in Maine. Connecticut's program was established to get money out of politics following large corruption scandals.

SB 51 would provide participating candidates with competitive amounts of funding they need to run an effective campaign, and would ban them from receiving any private donations at all. This system worked very well for Hawai'i County Council races in 2010 and 2012, and currently works very well statewide in places like Connecticut and Maine.

Winning publicly financed elections is the single biggest thing we could do to end pay-to-play corruption in our politics and start building a Hawai'i that puts Hawai'is land and people first — not big money interests.

Let's take away the need for politicians to fundraise so they can have the most positive impact serving the people who voted them into office by placing all their efforts into making positive change for their communities and beyond.

This measure will help restore the people's trust in government. Considering the convictions of Senator J. Kalani English and Representative Ty Cullen for cash bribes, it is clear that the legislature must do everything in its power to remove the influence that money has on our politics, including reforms like public financing. Public financing of elections is one of the most important ways to free our state political system from undue influence from corporations, businesses, and special interest groups. Three quarters of Hawaii voters support a system of fully publicly financed elections.

Public financing will make campaigning easier. No one likes asking individuals for large sums of money. Public financing will free candidates from fundraisers and countless phone calls. Reducing or even eliminating candidates' reliance on wealthy donors and the need to perpetually fundraise frees candidates and officials to spend more time with their constituents and to focus on the most pressing issues of their community, such as the impacts from the growing climate crisis. It also promotes public trust in officials and in government.

There is overwhelming public support in Hawaii for a "Clean Elections" program to get big money out of our politics by providing for full public financing of elections while prohibiting private contributions, with 74% of voters saying they'd be more likely to support a candidate who backed such a policy.
