SB 558 SD2 – RELATING TO VALUE-ADDED PRODUCTS

Chair Kahaloa, Vice Chair Kusch, and Members of the Committee:

The University of Hawai'i supports the intent of SB 558 SD2, which establishes under the Agribusiness Development Corporation, a "food and product innovation network" that provides access to facilities, resources, expertise and education to capitalize on the "Made in Hawai'i", "Produced in Hawai'i", or "Processed in Hawai'i" brand, critical for meeting the State's agricultural and economic diversification goals.

Synergies between partners and primary network members can expand access statewide, and leverage resources while avoiding unnecessary duplication in support of innovation and business development.

A key factor in the success of exports and commercialization of value-added products is the establishment of facilities with the capacity to support growing businesses as they scale up production, to support economic diversification through offshore markets in all counties, supporting commodities and off-grades in each region.

SB 558 SD2 further defines "Wider network" and "World-class products" emphasizing the need for coordination to access resources, including equipment and know-how, to support product development that meets international standards for quality, safety, sustainability, and market competitiveness. This is critical for the state's economic development through value-added product development, capitalizing on exports.

The University of Hawai'i supports the intent of SB 558 SD2, on the condition its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities as indicated in our BOR Approved Budget.

> SENATE BILL NO. 558 SD2 RELATING TO VALUE-ADDED PRODUCTS

Chairperson Kahaloa, Vice Chair Kusch, and Members of Committee:

The Agribusiness Development Corporation (ADC) <u>supports</u> Senate Bill No. 558 SD2, which establishes a Food and Product Innovation Network (FPIN) within ADC. Appropriates funds for food and product development or innovation facilities in the county of Maui and on the islands of Oahu and Hawaii.

ADC strongly supports this measure, which provides funding for a statewide FPIN, which will create rural jobs, provide additional revenue streams to our local farmers and producers, and foster the development of locally made value-added products to expand the "Made in Hawaii" brand.

Research and product development is risky and requires a lot of up-front capital, which discourages a lot of Hawaii's emerging agribusinesses and entrepreneurs from exploring new markets. The establishment of FPINs will derisk investment for growing businesses and accelerate their efforts in developing new products to promote food resiliency and Hawaii's export marketing. The facilities will be the place where agribusinesses and entrepreneurs can develop a wide variety of locally made value-added products from preparation to packaged product. Because it is a network, information and expertise can be shared and passed on to others to replicate success.

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ADC believes these investments will make the agency more dynamic and stimulate economic development, particularly in our rural communities. By making these investments, ADC will be able to attract and support agribusinesses and entrepreneurs and help them reach economies of scale.

Aloha e Chair Kahaloa, Vice Chair Kusch and members of the committee:

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) **strongly supports SB 558, SD2**, which seeks to establish the Food and Product Innovation Network within the Agribusiness Development Corporation to expand value-added processing and product development facilities across O'ahu, Maui, and Hawai'i Island. This initiative is a crucial step toward strengthening Hawai'i's local food economy and empowering Native Hawaiian farmers, food producers, and small businesses.

OHA, as the constitutionally established entity tasked with advocating for Native Hawaiians, recognizes the importance of fostering economic opportunities that align with Native Hawaiian values and traditions.¹

One of the most significant barriers to success for Native Hawaiian food entrepreneurs is the lack of access to commercial kitchens, processing facilities, and technical assistance. SB 558_SD2 directly addresses these challenges by creating a statewide network of open-access facilities and technical support programs that will enable local producers to transform raw agricultural goods into market-ready products. Through this measure, Native Hawaiian farmers and food businesses will gain increased access to infrastructure necessary to process and package agricultural products—including culturally significant foods such as kalo, 'uala, ulu, and loko i'a-raised seafood. By expanding processing capabilities, this bill enhances the ability of these products to reach local markets, the Department of Education's school meal programs, and institutional buyers. In doing so, it reduces Hawai'i's reliance on imported goods, strengthens local food security, and keeps agricultural dollars circulating within our communities.

Beyond economic benefits, SB 558_SD2 also supports cultural and environmental sustainability. Investing in value-added production ensures that Native Hawaiian agribusinesses can scale up operations, create jobs, and preserve traditional food systems. The bill provides targeted investment in food innovation facilities across the state, including funding for a facility in Maui to utilize axis deer for food and value-added

products, including leather and pharmaceuticals. Additionally, the Food and Product Innovation Network will provide training and business development support, including entrepreneurship courses, marketing strategies, branding guidance, and compliance assistance for exports. These efforts align with broader goals of preparing businesses to scale up, achieve sustainability, and increase exports under the "Made in Hawai'i" brand.

OHA urges the Committee to **pass SB 558_SD2** and invest in a stronger, selfsustaining food system that uplifts Native Hawaiian farmers, promotes economic opportunity, and enhances Hawai'i's long-term food security.

In consideration of SB 558, SD2 RELATING TO VALUE-ADDED PRODUCTS.

Chair Kahaloa, Vice Chair Kusch, and members of the Committee:

The Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism (DBEDT) strongly supports the intent of SB558 SD2, which seeks to establish a Food and Product Innovation Network within the Agribusiness Development Corporation (ADC). This initiative is essential to Hawai'i's agricultural diversification goals, providing critical support to farmers, food entrepreneurs, and value-added manufacturers across the state.

To ensure consistency across legislative measures and maximize the network's impact. DBEDT respectfully recommends the following amendments to SB558 SD2:

Flexibility in Facility Development

- Replace fixed facility locations with language that allows ADC to develop future sites strategically, as proposed in HB774 HD2.
- Ensure that new facilities can be developed on ADC-owned lands in Kekaha, Hawaii Island, Maui, and Molokai to allow for regional expansion.

Adaptive Funding Allocation

Modify the funding provisions to provide ADC with greater discretion in distributing resources based on identified regional needs and industry demand.

Enhanced Regional Support & Entrepreneurial Development

 Ensure that the Food and Product Innovation Network provides shared resources, technical assistance, and commercialization support to enable Hawai'i-based businesses to scale up new products from R&D to market-ready production.

Drafted Amendments for SB558 SD2

SECTION 2, Subsection (b), Item (1)

Replace existing partner locations language with:

- (b) Partner members of the food and product innovation network shall include:
- (1) Future facilities to be developed on lands owned by the agribusiness development corporation in Kekaha, on the island of Kauai; a to-be-determined location on the island of Hawaii; and additional facilities on the islands of Maui and Molokai to expand regional support and enhance statewide coverage;
- (2) The foreign-trade zone facility in Hilo, on the island of Hawaii;
- (3) The university of Hawaii Maui college food innovation center, on the island of Maui; and
- (4) The university of Hawaii Leeward community college value-added product development center in Wahiawa, on the island of Oahu.

SECTION 5 - Funding Allocation

Replace specific facility funding allocations with:

"There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii an unspecified sum for the development of Food and Product Innovation Network facilities. The funds shall be expended by the Agribusiness Development Corporation to support facility development, expansion, and operational

sustainability."

Key Benefits of This Legislation

1. Strengthens Hawai'i's Agricultural Economy

By enhancing value-added product development, this bill empowers local farmers to increase profitability and reduce waste through food innovation and processing.

2. Supports Statewide Business Growth

The network will equip small businesses and entrepreneurs with industry expertise and state-of-the-art manufacturing equipment.

3. Expands Regional Access & Food Security

Establishing strategically located facilities ensures equitable access to food innovation resources across all islands, particularly rural agricultural areas.

4. Encourages Export Growth & Job Creation

The network will enable businesses to increase local production capacity while complying with export certifications, expanding local-to-global market reach, and creating new jobs.

DBEDT strongly supports the passage of SB558 SD2 with the proposed amendments to align with HB774 HD2. These amendments ensure that the Food and Product Innovation Network is scalable, regionally inclusive, and aligned with the state's agricultural and economic objectives.

We appreciate the Committee's dedication to advancing Hawai'i's food innovation and agricultural diversification efforts, and we urge the adoption of our proposed amendments.

My name is Micah Munekata, and I am the Director of Government Affairs at Ulupono Initiative. We are a Hawai'i-focused impact investment firm that strives to improve the quality of life throughout the islands by helping our communities become more resilient and self-sufficient through locally produced food, renewable energy and clean transportation choices, and better management of freshwater resources.

Ulupono <u>supports</u> SB 558 SD 2, which establishes a food and product innovation network within the Agribusiness Development Corporation and appropriates funds for food and product development or innovation facilities in the County of Maui and on the islands of O'ahu and Hawai'i.

Farmers can increase their profitability by creating value-added products with their offgrade produce. Off-grade produce can be perfectly edible and nutritionally sound, but might not be "good looking" enough for grocery shoppers. With off-grade produce comprising 10% to 40% of typical harvests,¹ this network would help enable farmers to generate revenue from currently unused crops.

We appreciate this committee's efforts to look at policies that support local food production and the success of our farmers and ranchers in scaling up to help our state meet its agricultural and economic diversification goals.

Aloha Chair Kahaloa, Vice-Chair Kusch, and Members of the Committee:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate, and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai `i Farm Bureau supports SB 558, SD2, which establishes a Food and Product Innovation Network within the Agribusiness Development Corporation and appropriates funds for food and product development or innovation facilities in the county of Maui and on the islands of Oahu and Hawai'i.

As expenses rise, increases in farm revenues and profits are critical to the continued viability of farms and ranches. Farmers can do this by "adding value" to raw agricultural crops. Currently, off-grade and excess production is sometimes wasted due to market conditions. Converting them into value-added products will increase farm revenue and provide new business opportunities, increase employment opportunities, and address Hawai'i's goals of increased self-sufficiency and sustainability.

High production costs are a major driver of narrow profit margins for Hawai'i's farmers and value-added food producers. Labor, taxes, land, transportation, utilities, and supplies are all costs of doing business that often result in value-added food producers just breaking even.

If a Hawai'i farmer or entrepreneur wants to process an off-grade product into a valueadded product they are usually forced to send it to the mainland because Hawai'i lacks value-added processing facilities. This cost of transportation to and from the mainland is often enough to discourage farmers from pursuing value-added production. Hawai'i is potentially losing millions of dollars because of the cost of processing agricultural crops into value-added products. A network of food and value-added facilities in Hawai'i will support the production of new value-added products so that farmers can increase their income while allowing locally produced value-added goods to compete with imported products, and expand into new export markets, strengthening our local economy.

The strength of Hawai'i's economy depends upon a diversity in commerce that is resilient to economic downturns and aggressive in creating new growth opportunities.

On behalf of the Directors and members of the Hawai'i Forest Industry Association (HFIA), please support SB558 SD2 Relating to Value-Added Products.

Since 1989 HFIA has worked towards actualizing healthy and productive forests across the state of Hawaii and recognized Hawaii's opportunity for economic growth and diversification. We've taken much pride in encouraging our members to create products utilizing locally sourced materials. We've done this via our Hawaii's Wood Brand program which represents fine items made from wood grown in the Hawaiian Islands. The program requires participants to meet certain criteria ensuring their products are Hawaii Made and of good quality. Roughly 40% of HFIA's members are woodworkers, the vast majority of whom utilize woods sourced locally. Many HFIA woodworkers sell their finished products both locally and out of state. These sales of high quality, Hawaii Made products, to out of state buyers are a small-scale example of what SB558 SD2 could yield on a broader scale across various food and product categories.

It is also important to note that Hawaii is home to millions of acres of land zoned as Conservation Reserve. These lands hold forest resources that could be utilized for innovation and to create value-added, Hawaii Made products. Extracted resources could be replenished for future harvest and use. These lands also hold wild game that could be processed to feed local families or exported as a Hawaii Sourced product with the support of a Food and Product Innovation Network.

Ultimately, a successful Food and Product Innovation Network could yield various benefits including economic diversification and growth, job creation, business innovation and networking and resource sharing amongst entrepreneurs in the State of Hawaii. For these reasons we hope that you will support SB558 SD2.
