SB 663 – RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII COLLEGE OF TROPICAL AGRICULTURE AND HUMAN RESOURCES.

Chair Kim, Vice Chair Kidani and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of SB 663 relating to the University of Hawai'i College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources which appropriates funds to establish eight full-time equivalent (8.0 FTE) agricultural technician positions and four full-time equivalent (4.0 FTE) community coordinator positions.

We respectfully offer the following amendments: The title of the bill; SECTION 1., lines 2-3; and SECTION 2., line 11, and page 2, line 1, to correct the name of the college to university of Hawaii at Manoa college of tropical agriculture and human [resources] <u>resilience</u> (CTAHR). The renaming of the college was approved in October 2024 to better align CTAHR's name to its land-grant mission of improving the human condition and human use of natural resources through research, education and Cooperative Extension.

CTAHR's agricultural research and extension stations (CARES) provide crucial support for local farmers, ranchers, and communities, and its research and extension operations are hampered by a lack of permanent agricultural technician positions. These technicians are essential for conducting plant and animal experiments and demonstrations, as well as the upkeep of station facilities and equipment. Community coordinator positions facilitate the development of CARES as hubs of collaborative innovation and community prosperity through Talk Stories. Increasing technical and support staff for Extension agents increases the devotion of more time to educating and mentoring farmers and the communities of the CARES centers statewide.

We support SB 663 with the suggested amendments, provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities as indicated in our BOR Approved Budget.

Aloha Chair Kim, Vice-Chair Kidani, and Members of the Committee:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate, and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

**The Hawai i Farm Bureau supports SB 663**, which appropriates funds for the University of Hawai i at Manoa College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resilience (CTAHR) to establish eight full-time equivalent (8.0 FTE) agricultural technician positions and four full-time equivalent (4.0 FTE) community coordinator positions.

The excellent work performed by CTAHR for Hawai'i's farmers and ranchers cannot be overstated. The ongoing outreach and education are unparalleled in the State. Farmers and ranchers rely on this program for their success. CTAHR has helped develop and improve agricultural technologies pertinent to Hawai'i's farmers and ranchers. This includes intensive cover crop research, promoting the importance of locally grown produce, developing biological and cultural methods for controlling pests without chemicals, and the use of biological nitrogen fixation to significantly increase the production of high protein foods while at the same time reducing the need for commercially produced fertilizers.

Agricultural Technician positions and Community Coordinator positions are needed to successfully implement CTAHR's mission through CTAHR's Agricultural Research and Extension Stations (CARES) initiatives that:

1. Serve as hubs for area/region-specific agricultural research, education, and community engagement.

2. Support local farmers and ranchers and offer educational programs for all ages, from keiki to adults, that benefit communities statewide.

Agricultural technicians are essential for establishing and maintaining experimental and demonstration plant and animal trials and the upkeep of station facilities and equipment. Community coordinator positions connect CARES to the communities with education and farming opportunities for local families and keiki.

These positions provide support to CTAHR's Research and Extension Stations, local community resilience, and the state's highly valued agricultural industry, which is challenged by economically damaging pests, disease, climate, and production issues. They also provide agricultural and natural resources educational outreach and agriculture workforce development.
