In consideration of SENATE BILL 849, SENATE DRAFT 1 RELATING TO WILDLIFE CONSERVATION

Senate Bill 849, Senate Draft 1 proposes increasing penalties and fees for taking and killing indigenous species of aquatic life, wildlife, and land plants that are native to the state. It designates penalties for the taking, harming, or killing of an 'io. **The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports this measure.**

'Io are listed as endangered birds under Exhibit 2 of Chapter 13-124, Hawai'i Administrative Rules. Therefore, intentional taking, harming, or killing of an 'io is prohibited and subject to penalties outlined in HRS §195D-9. SD1 of this bill would provide added protection of 'io in case the Department determines it is warranted to remove 'io from the endangered birds list. On February 3, 2020, 'io were delisted under the federal Endangered Species Act of 1973, but do receive federal protection from intentional take under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act. It should be noted, that if the Department determines it is warranted to remove 'io from the endangered bird list, this bill protects 'io from intentional take but project operators would not be required to avoid, minimize, and mitigate take of 'io if take occurs incidentally because of the normal operation of a project.

As described in this bill, the penalty for violating terms of Chapter 195D, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, would be increased from a misdemeanor for all offenses to a class C felony for a second or subsequent offenses. The bill also increases administrative fines the Department or a court may impose and includes an option for rehabilitative community service. The Department supports this portion of the bill because we consider offenses to threatened and endangered species to be severe and we expect that higher fines would deter violations of Chapter 195D, Hawai'i Revised Statutes. The Department also supports using

rehabilitative community service as a remedial tool where it is warranted to teach compassion towards Hawai'i's native species.

I am writing to you today in concern for pushing forward the bill on increasing penalties for killing native wildlife. From my classes' experience working with groups like the Waianae Watershed, we have learned and seen the detrimental effects of not having necessary native plants on parts of our island. This can be anything from water retention, to out right preventing the spread of wildfires. Hawai'i is uniquely situated in the middle of the pacific, rich with vast wildlife, some of which can't be found anywhere else in the world.
