Chairs Elefante and Lee, Vice Chair Wakai and Inouye, and Members of the Committees:

The Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (DCR) **supports the intent** of Senate Concurrent Resolution (SCR) 32 / Senate Resolution (SR) 18, which requests the DCR collaborate with the Department of Transportation (DOT) to use inmate work furlough programs for state roadway and highway maintenance

DCR appreciates the legislature's interest in DCR and DOT's collaboration to use the inmate work furlough programs for state roadway and highway maintenance. At present, DOT is the largest employer of inmate labor relating to state roadway and highway maintenance. DOT has for years, contracted with DCR's Hawai'i Correctional Industries (HCI) Division for six (6) daily workline crews to perform state roadway and highway maintenance. As additional inmates qualify for participation in these worklines, DCR will incrementally increase the number of worklines.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of the intent of SCR 32 / SR 18.


Chair Elefante, Chair Lee, Vice Chair Wakai, Vice Chair Inouye and Members of the Committees:

The Hawaii Correctional System Oversight Commission (HCSOC) **supports the intent and offers comment** on Senate Concurrent Resolution 32, Requesting the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation to collaborate with the Department of Transportation to use inmate work furlough programs for state roadway and highway maintenance.

The Commission would like to bring to your attention the fact that these services are already being provided for those who are considered community custody as a community service workline, being paid – at most – \$1.00 per hour. Since the Department already has a workline partnership with the DOT, it's the Commission's concern that the payment for those on the furlough workline would potentially remain the same as those on the community service workline. Although the Commission supports the expansion of work opportunities in preparation for reintegration back into society, the purpose of work furlough, among other things, is to earn and save money in preparation for release from incarceration. Therefore, those who are considered work furlough should be paid at least minimum wage.
