URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES TO CONSULT WITH THE KAHANA BAY STEERING COMMITTEE, THE COUNTY OF MAUI, AND THE UNITED STATES ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS REGARDING A PATH FORWARD FOR THE PROPOSED KAHANA BAY EROSION MITIGATION PROJECT.

Senate Concurrent Resolution 76 urges the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) to consult with the Kahana Bay Steering Committee (KBSC) and other government agencies regarding a path forward for the proposed “Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project.” **The Department supports the intent of the resolution to seek a regional resolution to the shoreline erosion issues and offers comments and proposed amendments.**

KSBC is a coalition representing resort and condominium owners in the ahupua‘a of Kahana on Maui. In October 2021 they submitted a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS)¹ for the “Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation” project. The project proposed to build seven t-groins that will extend 215 into the ocean in order to create six coves, to dredge between 50,000 and 100,000 cubic yards of offshore sand, and to place the sand in the coves to create six beaches.

The Office of Conservation and Coastal Lands is a regulatory agency under the DLNR responsible for overseeing activities in the State Land Use Conservation District. OCCL was the accepting authority for the first and second DEIS. As the accepting authority, OCCL has held numerous meetings with the project consultants and County officials, conducted numerous site visits with the project engineers, and in June 2024 sent a representative to meet directly with the KBSC. At these meetings OCCL outlined the path forward for the project: finalize the EIS, and submit a Conservation District Use Application.

The resolution seeks to have the Department take a more active role in moving the project forward, and calls for DLNR to submit a report to the Legislature on the Department's progress. We believe it would be inappropriate for OCCL, as a regulatory agency, to assume the coordinating role for a private project that will be seeking regulatory approval by OCCL. We would urge the Legislature to request that the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development (OPSD), whose mandate is to coordinate planning efforts across state and county agencies, assume this role.

The proposed Resolution also notes that OCCL has not acted upon applications to repair the temporary sandbag walls fronting many of the properties in this region. These sandbag walls were approved under Emergency Conservation District Use Permits. Emergency permits are issued administratively and are considered exempt from requiring an Environmental Assessment. OCCL has received requests to renew the emergency permits fronting three of the properties.

The Department's authority to issue and to renew emergency permits for shoreline erosion control is currently being challenged in court. OCCL believes the prudent course of action would be to await the outcome of the court action before acting on these requests. We have notified the landowner's consultants of this in December 2024. However, OCCL is willing to present these requests to the Board of Land and Natural Resources for decision making sooner if that is the permittees' request.

Finally, the proposed Resolution proposes that the State initiate talks with the US Army Corps of Engineers over ownership of the project. The Department understands that the County of Maui has already engaged the Corps in those discussions.

Based upon the above, the Department offers the following changes to the Resolution:

- That the inaccurate and misleading statements on page 2, lines 5 through 15, be struck.
- That the paragraph on page 2, lines 26-32, be rephrased as such:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2025, that the ~~Department of Land and Natural Resources~~ Office of Planning and Sustainable Development is urged to ~~consult with~~ coordinate a meeting between the Department of Land and Natural Resources, the Kahana Bay Steering Committee, the County of Maui, and the United States Army Corps of Engineers regarding ~~a path forward for~~ the proposed Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project;

- That the requirement that DLNR report to the legislature on the progress "in moving the Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project forward," on page 3, lines 13-17, be struck, as it is neither the DLNR's nor OPSD's role to move this private project forward.

Dear Chair Inouye, Vice Chair Elefante and Members of the Committee on Water and Land:

We submit this testimony on behalf of the Association of Apartment Owners of Hololani (“Hololani”) in **strong support of SCR76 with amendments.**

Hololani is in support of SCR 76, which urges the Department of Land and Natural Resources to consult with the Kahana Bay Steering Committee, the County of Maui, and the United States Army Corps of Engineers regarding a path forward for the proposed Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project.

Kahana Bay, where Hololani is situated, has experienced catastrophic erosion issues which began in 2007 and continue to threaten the shoreline due to sea level rise and climate change impacts.

In 2017, at the urging of the Maui County Department of Planning, Hololani and eight other neighboring condominium projects and the owner of the remaining kuleana parcel along the Kahana Bay shoreline, formed the Kahana Bay Steering Committee (“KBSC”). KBSC has worked since then to develop, plan, implement and fund a regional erosion mitigation project, and in 2018, retained Oceanit to assist.

KBSC has invested significant time, effort and money in this project. However, after Oceanit published the Second Draft Environmental Impact Statement in 2021, the project stalled, in part because the County of Maui indicated that it was unwilling to assume the liability risks of owning the proposed groins that would be required to keep the restored sand in place. Currently, many of the condominium properties

along this shoreline are relying on emergency sandbags as their only protection against further erosion of the shoreline, and remain precariously exposed to further, and potentially catastrophic, erosion.

We respectfully request that the Committee adopt this resolution and would suggest that several amendments be made based on discussions we have had with stakeholders. These amendments include clarifying the “whereas” clauses involving the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development as a coordinating body in bringing together parties to work on this project.

Our proposed amendments to SCR 76 are included with this testimony. We appreciate your consideration of these proposed amendments and thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in strong support of this measure.

Proposed Amendments to SCR 76

URGING THE **OFFICE OF PLANNING AND SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT TO CONSULT WITH** DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES, ~~TO CONSULT WITH~~ THE KAHANA BAY STEERING COMMITTEE, THE COUNTY OF MAUI, AND THE UNITED STATES ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS REGARDING A PATH FORWARD FOR THE PROPOSED KAHANA BAY EROSION MITIGATION PROJECT.

WHEREAS, at the urging of the County of Maui Department of Planning, the owners of units in the nine condominium projects, through their owners' associations, and one residential kuleana parcel on Kahana Bay, are members of, and have provided funding for, the Kahana Bay Steering Committee to develop and implement the Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project, which is a proposed regional project to restore the eroded beaches on Kahana Bay; and

WHEREAS, **in 2018**, the Kahana Bay Steering Committee retained Oceanit to assist in the engineering, planning, permitting, and implementation of the Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project; and

WHEREAS, by 2019, Oceanit had engaged in extensive community and agency consultation, prepared an environmental impact statement preparation notice, and held scoping meetings; and

WHEREAS, Oceanit published the Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project Second Draft Environmental Impact Statement on November 8, 2021; and

WHEREAS, unfortunately, the Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project has been stalled, and no final environmental impact statement has been prepared; and

WHEREAS, the Kahana Bay Steering Committee proposed to fund the Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project, at an estimated cost of \$26,000,000 to \$40,000,000, through community facilities district financing pursuant to Chapter 3.75, Maui County Code, which would require public ownership of the rock groins necessary to hold the replenished sand in place; and

WHEREAS, the County of Maui has indicated that it is unwilling to assume the liability risks of owning the groins **and has not promulgated rules to implement the community facilities district financing program**; and

~~— WHEREAS, the Office of Conservation and Coastal Lands of the Department of Land and Natural Resources informed the Kahana Bay Steering Committee that it will not discuss a path forward for the Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project; and~~

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~~— WHEREAS, the Office of Conservation and Coastal Lands of the Department of Land and Natural Resources has not acted on applications to repair the emergency sandbag structures that serve many condominium properties as~~

~~the only source of protection against severe erosion of the Kahana Bay shoreline; and~~

WHEREAS, the Board of Land and Natural Resources has urged condominium associations along Kahana Bay to develop a collective solution to protect public resources; and

WHEREAS, the United States Army Corps of Engineers might be willing to assume control of the Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project if requested to do so by the State, the County of Maui, or an agency of the State or the County of Maui; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2025, the House of Representatives concurring, that the **Office of Planning and Sustainable Development is urged to consult with the Department of Land and Natural Resources, is urged to consult with** the Kahana Bay Steering Committee, the County of Maui, and the United States Army Corps of Engineers regarding a path forward for the proposed Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the aforementioned parties are urged to consider:

~~—(1) Legal options for the ownership of the rock groins;~~

~~(2)~~(1) Whether the United States Army Corps of Engineers would undertake an evaluation of the Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project under Section 103 of the River and Harbor Act of 1962;

~~(3)~~(2) The path forward, timeline, and roles of the **Office of Planning and Sustainable Development, the** Kahana Bay Steering Committee, the County of Maui, and the Department of Land of Natural Resources if the United States Army Corps of Engineers, following the requested evaluation, assumes control of the Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project; and

~~(4)~~(3) Financing options for the Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project, both with and without United States Army Corps of Engineers' participation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the **Office of Planning and Sustainable Development Department of Land and Natural Resources** is urged to submit to the Legislature, no later than December 31, 2025, a report on the **Department's** progress in moving the Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project forward; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Chief of Engineers and Commanding General of the United States Army Corps of Engineers, **Office of Planning and Sustainable Development**, Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources, Mayor and Planning Director of the County of Maui, and Chair of the Kahana Bay Steering Committee.



Testimony of **Lahaina Strong**
Before the Senate Committee on
Water and Land

In Consideration of Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 76 and Senate Resolution No. 59

To Chair Inouye, Vice Chair Elefante and the honorable members of the committee,

We are writing on behalf of Lāhainā Strong, an organization deeply rooted in our community's resilience and advocacy. Originally formed in 2018 following the Hurricane Lane fire in Lahaina and revitalized after the devastating fires of August 8, 2023, Lahaina Strong has become the largest grassroots, Lahaina-based community organization, with over 35,000 supporters. Our mission is to amplify local voices and champion community-driven solutions, which are more critical than ever as we continue rebuilding and recovering.

Lāhainā Strong, stands in **strong opposition of Senate Concurrent Resolution 76 and Senate Resolution 59**, which urges the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) to consult with the Kahana Bay Steering Committee, the County of Maui, and the United States Army Corps of Engineers regarding a path forward for the proposed Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project. At a time when thousands of Lahaina residents remain displaced and have yet to return home, our community cannot afford to see state resources, attention, and decision-making diverted toward a project that primarily benefits non-resident, out-of-state investors.

The Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project is not a public benefit initiative—it is a private-interest-driven effort designed to protect nine oceanfront condominium complexes, the majority of which are operated as short-term rentals (STRs) or second homes. According to Maui County Real Property Tax Data, approximately 85% of TVR properties are owned by out-of-state investors, and the Hawai'i Housing Factbook 2024 confirms that more than half of all condominium purchases in Maui County are made by non-residents. Additionally, several of the condominium complexes included in this

project—Kahana Reef, Kahana Outrigger, and Kahana Village—are on Maui’s Minatoya List, which allows transient vacation rentals in apartment-zoned properties. This means that approving this resolution would prioritize the protection of beachfront investment properties over the basic needs of displaced local families who are struggling to rebuild.

For years, the West Maui community has fought against this project due to its environmental, social, and economic consequences. When the second draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) was published in 2021, it was met with significant public opposition. The project was stalled for good reason—because it was widely recognized as flawed and unsustainable. Now, in the wake of the August 2023 fires, when Lahaina needs every available resource focused on rebuilding homes, schools, and infrastructure for local families, it is unconscionable to resurrect this effort under the guise of coastal protection. The State must not allow a project that benefits non-resident investment properties to take precedence over the urgent needs of Lahaina’s displaced families.

Beyond the issue of resource allocation, the environmental consequences of this project are devastating. The proposal includes the construction of rock groins and sand replenishment, strategies that have been repeatedly shown to fail in the long term and cause irreversible damage to adjacent shorelines.

Managed retreat—not shoreline armoring—is the only viable long-term solution for coastal erosion in Hawai‘i. Prioritizing managed retreat over shoreline armoring is not just an environmental necessity—it is a matter of protecting public trust resources and ensuring that Hawai‘i’s beaches remain accessible for future generations.

Lahaina Strong urges the Legislature to **oppose SCR76 and SR59** and stand firm in prioritizing local recovery efforts over private investment interests. Coastal management decisions must be guided by science, public trust protections, and the needs of local communities—not by the financial interests of non-resident investors. The people of Lahaina cannot afford to lose more beaches, more resources, and more time fighting for the right to return home while out-of-state interests dictate the future of our coastline.

Comments:

The Save Honolua Coalition strongly opposes Senate Resolution 59 (SR59) and Senate Concurrent Resolution 76 (SCR76) due to the serious environmental risks, threats to cultural heritage, and financial concerns associated with the proposed Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project.

The plan to construct rock groins to address shoreline erosion may seem like a solution, but history has shown that these types of structures do more harm than good. Hard engineering like this disrupts natural coastal processes, leading to increased erosion in other areas, harming marine life, and permanently altering the shoreline.

Beyond the environmental risks, this project disregards the deep cultural significance of Kahana Bay. Large-scale engineering projects like this should not move forward without meaningful consultation with the Native Hawaiian community. The land and sea are not just resources; they are part of a living cultural heritage. Any mitigation efforts must respect and incorporate indigenous knowledge rather than imposing top-down solutions that could erase history and tradition.

Finally, the massive price tag of \$26 million to \$40 million raises serious concerns. Even Maui County officials are hesitant to take on liability for the project, which should be a red flag. With so many critical needs in our state, it's worth asking if this is truly the best way to spend taxpayer dollars.

For these reasons, we urge the legislature to stop SR59 and SCR76 and prioritize the environment, culture, and long-term sustainability.

Dear Sir or Madam,

I am writing to you to address the need to preserve the coastline at the edge of the Hololani property by voting to support HCR132, SCR47, and SCR76, as well as SB1456. (four) years ago, we received approval for revetment with a concrete wall and sandbags in front of it. The sandbags have deteriorated at an alarming fast rate, putting the revetment wall at risk. Replacing the sandbags with large rocks is an immediate necessity, both to preserve the homes of the residents and to protect the ecology of the shoreline from increased damage should further erosion demand more drastic intervention.

We understand that the shoreline is an important ecological concern. But the revetment wall has already been completed. If repairs to that structure should become necessary, this would be far more disruptive than simply replacing the sandbags with rocks. And yet, if the sandbags cannot be replaced, that is precisely what will happen. As seaweed grows on the bags, we have been watching turtle foraging produce rips and tears in the fabric. The pounding of waves quickly pulls the sand through these holes. Replacing the current seabags with more of the same will simply continue the problem. Rocks would create a more durable barrier to protect the walled shoreline of this property, since turtle foraging and visitor infringement would have less effect on the rocks than the sandbags.

Multiple ecological and social impacts are likely to result if our sandbags cannot be replaced with rocks. If the sandbags completely erode, the concrete of the barrier wall would be subjected to the damaging waves. If these materials collapse into the water, the corals off the shoreline would be damaged from buffeting by these debris. To complicate the matter, if our shoreline fails, the ocean comes in further along our neighboring properties, increasing the destruction to their properties as well as ours. Given that the corner of one of our buildings lies less than 20 feet from the current retaining wall, continued shoreline degradation puts the stability of that building's foundation at risk. If the building begins to crumble, the debris would surely be more damaging to the ocean environment than merely replacing our sandbags with rocks.

While safeguarding the ocean environment is of crucial importance, the social implications of threatening 64 condominiums cannot be ignored. Protecting this shoreline will help mitigate the issues of flooding on the Lower Honoapiilani Rd – a problem that

affects residents all along this part of the coastline. So while the Hololani would pay for this work, the community at large would benefit. Many long-term and full-time residents call the Hololani home. Many, like myself, are active members of the Lahaina community. I have worked for over a decade as a substitute teacher in the local schools, becoming a fixture at Lahainaluna high school where I work nearly every day. As well, I have been a foundational member of the 3rd grade tutoring program, as well as part of the local order of Franciscan nuns who serve this community. Additionally, many of our units have been, and continue to be, occupied by Lahaina fire survivors. With housing in West Maui in such short supply, putting 64 units at risk seems unnecessarily short sighted.

For the important reasons above, permits have already been obtained from local agencies for replacing our sandbags. We ask that you support the decision of these committees by voting affirmatively for SCR76, SCR47, HCR132, and SB1456 in order to allow our project to proceed for the benefit of both the communities in the ocean as well as those on its shore.

Thank you so much for your time in considering this concern. I hope to hear back favorably after you have heard our testimonies.

I am writing you to ask for your support in granting a right of entry to proceed with construction on state lands in order to proceed with the construction of a rock revetment wall at the Hololani resort.

When my Wife and I purchased this condo over a decade ago, there was a moderate amount of beautiful sandy beach, and it is so sad that it has been lost to such a degree. We were told at the time of our purchase that an active plan to protect the shoreline was in place and was going to happen in the near future. Unfortunately, that was delayed to the point we are at now when the project has become somewhat urgent.

Public Benefit and Beach Access

Opponents claim the project will benefit only condominium owners; however, these beaches are public and open to everyone. Public access is the law, and there is no request to change that. In fact, I would encourage officials to consider expanding public access as part of this project, so the entire community can benefit.

Nature of the Proposed Solution

This is not a large-scale seawall hardening project. T-groins, when carefully designed and properly engineered for the specific conditions of a bay, have the potential to stabilize the shoreline with minimal risk of flanking erosion. In the case of Kahana Bay, the existing natural rock walls on either side further reduce that risk. Paired with additional methods—such as vegetative berms—T-groins can be part of a thoughtful, sustainable erosion mitigation strategy.

Protection of Economic and Housing Resources

Although many of these units are vacation rentals, there are also full-time residents. The number of residential occupants has grown since the Lahaina fire, making these properties an increasingly important housing resource. Furthermore, some of these properties are on the “Minatoya list” and are being considered for conversion back to long-term housing to address Maui’s critical housing shortage. Rather than losing this potential solution, we should protect these buildings and keep our options open.

If changes occur with the Minatoya list, the Kahana area may remain one of the last relatively affordable vacation rental zones on Maui compared to higher-priced areas like Kā’anapali and Kapalua. Preserving this mix of housing stock and more accessible accommodations helps maintain balance in our local economy.

Conclusion

SCR76 presents a reasonable path forward by urging collaboration among state, county, and

federal agencies. Restoring and protecting the shoreline benefits everyone, and with the right approach, it can be done responsibly and sustainably.

Our Experience as Condo Owners in Maui – A Growing Concern

I hate to say this, but based on our experience, I wouldn't recommend anyone buy in Maui right now. Owning a condo in Hawaii was our lifelong dream. In 2022, that dream came true when we purchased a beautiful condo in the Kahana Bay area. We worked hard and saved for years to make it happen. Our plan was to rent it out short-term, visit often, and eventually spend months there in retirement.

However, since purchasing, we've seen shocking changes in beach erosion. The situation is far worse than when we bought, and our building is now in danger. The only thing holding back the ocean is a line of sandbags, which are now deteriorating. Our resort already has replacement sandbags in storage—fully paid for by condo owners—yet Maui County refuses to issue permits for installation. Meanwhile, during storms, waves are already overtopping the failing barriers. The county won't even respond to our requests, leaving us completely in the dark.

We understand that some environmental groups oppose sandbags, but the reality is that ignoring the problem is making it worse. Many sandbags have broken apart and are now floating in the ocean, which benefits no one. Instead of allowing this situation to spiral further, why not approve solutions that protect both the shoreline and the community?

The Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation Project (KBMP) consists of nine different resorts and 862 condos in Kahana Bay, all of which are at risk. The project has already developed a well-researched plan to install T-groins, designed by experts to calm the violent waves. Condo owners are fully prepared to fund this project, yet it has been sitting on government desks for at least eight years, with no movement. Meanwhile, similar projects have been approved elsewhere in Hawaii. Another option—coral reef restoration—was recently approved in Olowalu, securing a \$10 million grant. This method could reduce wave energy by 97% while benefiting marine life. Why isn't this being seriously considered for Kahana?

There are also troubling rumors that some groups simply want to let the buildings fall into the ocean and see this as an opportunity to reclaim the land from mainland property owners. After witnessing the anti-mainland sentiment that surfaced after the Lahaina fires, I don't know what to believe anymore. What I do know is that we—along with other hardworking families—invested in good faith, only to be left abandoned by local authorities. The thought that we are not welcome here is not too far-fetched, especially considering Maui County's upcoming plan to phase out 7,000 short-term rentals. It feels like yet another way to push out mainland owners while ignoring the economic consequences and the impact on property values.

I call for long-term, preventive thinking and action—before it's too late. We can't wait for another disaster to happen before leaders start taking this seriously. Just like the fires in Lahaina, where lack of preparation led to unimaginable loss, we're watching another preventable crisis unfold in slow motion. Will Maui County once again fail to act until it's too late?

At this point, we need collective action and maybe something will finally be done before another tragedy strike

I am writing to express my **strong opposition** to **Senate Concurrent Resolution 76 & 59** and any similar resolutions that will lead to grant a non-exclusive easement over state submerged lands to allow Resort Condominiums in Kahana, Lahaina, Maui, to construct, use, repair, and maintain a rock revetment.

As a resident of Lahaina and someone who has witnessed the tremendous devastation caused by the 2023 wildfires, I believe our resources and efforts must be focused on the **ethical, safe, and environmentally responsible rebuilding** of our community. Lahaina, like many of our neighbors, is still in the process of recovering, and I urge this committee to consider the broader implications of this resolution in the context of our ongoing recovery.

Environmental and Coastal Impact

Rock revetments and similar shoreline armoring structures, while initially effective in protecting private property, have been shown to **accelerate coastal erosion**, disrupt natural sediment transport, and damage critical marine ecosystems. In the long term, they often exacerbate the very problems they are designed to mitigate. This is particularly concerning given the growing threats posed by **climate change**, such as rising sea levels and more frequent and intense storms.

Granting a **easement** for a rock revetment would lock in a **destructive approach** to coastal management at a time when we should be prioritizing more **sustainable, adaptive strategies** that will protect both the environment and the future of our community.

Public Trust and the Need for Responsible Development

Hawai‘i’s coastline and beaches are not only natural treasures but also public resources protected under the Public Trust Doctrine. The proposed easement would **prioritize private interests** at

the expense of public access and the long-term health of our coastal ecosystems. We must ensure that decisions made today **reflect a commitment to future generations**—a commitment that respects both our cultural heritage and our environmental responsibilities.

Given that Lahaina is still in the recovery phase from the devastating wildfires, it is critical that any new developments or infrastructure investments are **made with thoughtful, long-term planning** in mind, and with consideration for both the human and environmental needs of our island.

Global Examples of Alternative Solutions and Best Practices

Many coastal communities around the world have shifted away from **hard shoreline armoring**, recognizing its negative environmental consequences. Instead, they are embracing **nature-based solutions** that preserve or restore natural coastal processes, offering both resilience and ecological benefits. Here are some examples of alternative approaches that have proven successful:

- 1. The Netherlands – "Room for the River" Program**

The Netherlands has led the way in **adaptive coastal management** through programs like "Room for the River," which prioritizes **floodplain restoration** and **natural barriers** to mitigate flooding. Rather than relying on hard defenses, the program works with nature to manage water flow, restoring wetlands and creating space for rivers to expand naturally.

- 2. Australia – Living Shorelines**

Along the coast of Australia, **living shorelines** are being used as an alternative to traditional seawalls. These solutions involve the restoration of **mangroves, seagrass beds, and salt marshes**, which act as natural buffers against storm surges and erosion while supporting biodiversity and offering significant carbon sequestration benefits.

- 3. United States – California's Managed Retreat**

In California, particularly in places like Pacifica and Malibu, **managed retreat** is being explored as a solution to coastal erosion. This involves **relocating infrastructure** away from vulnerable areas and investing in nature-based solutions like **dune restoration, beach nourishment, and wetland conservation** to protect both communities and the environment.

- 4. Singapore – Coastal Protection with Eco-Friendly Infrastructure**

Singapore has employed innovative coastal protection strategies, such as **integrating mangroves into urban infrastructure** and using **eco-friendly seawalls** designed to enhance biodiversity while protecting the coastline. These methods not only provide protection from storm surges and erosion but also improve local marine life habitats.

- 5. New Zealand – Soft Shoreline Management**

New Zealand's approach includes **soft engineering techniques** such as beach nourishment, dune restoration, and the planting of native vegetation to create **natural buffers** against coastal erosion. These measures have proven effective in reducing the need for hard armoring while maintaining the natural beauty of the coast.

Conclusion

Instead of moving forward with SCR 47 and permitting another rock revetment in Kahana, I urge the committee to reject this resolution and support policies that **prioritize sustainable, nature-based solutions** to protect our coastline. Every year, while still working, we would say, one more project, and we are gone to Maui. Here Today, Gone to Maui!

When we bought our condo at Valley Isle Resort, we thought this was our dream come true. Now that dream, along with a lifetime of honest hard work, is turning into our worst nightmare. All may very soon be lost. There are no years left in our lives to make up for this loss.

Larry barely escaped the fire on that fateful night in Lahaina, only to come to another dangerous crossroad with red lights and danger sirens blaring: Danger, Danger ahead. The same imminent danger that he faced fleeing the Lahaina fire lies directly ahead unless these dire warnings are heeded.

By some strange coincidence, Larry sat next Mike Foley on his flight out of Maui to Honolulu during the fire. But we don't believe in coincidences. We took this as a sign the Lord was in control. What are the odds? For about an hour, Mike explained in detail, his plan to save Kahana Bay. We believe Maui has a valuable resource in Mike Foley's knowledge and expertise and ask the committee to consideration of his proposal to save Maui's precious shoreline: The Kahana Bay Erosion Mitigation. This plan implements beach nourishment using seven T-groins, stabilizing structures, which would serve as sand reservoirs for a sustainable beach. They are designed to keep sand in place over the long term and provide new marine habitat.

Larry and I are writing in favor of SCR 76 and immediate action to protect Kahana Bay and the properties along this shoreline.

Valley Isle Resort is currently only protected by temporary sandbags. We are on the corner unit and know the ocean's erosion will accelerate soon, and our condo and structures—along with the beach—will slowly collapse into the ocean. This is not a distant threat; we are watching the waves become more violent every month, putting our condo at imminent risk.

Not all units at Valley Isle Resort are vacation rentals—many are full-time residences for local homeowners, many families who survived the fire, and long-term tenants.

- Many of these units have housed Lahaina fire victims through FEMA—a critical emergency housing resource that will disappear. If the properties in Kahana Bay are lost, the consequences will be devastating:

- Over 1,000 housing units will be destroyed, each worth \$600,000 to \$2.5 million, leading to millions in lost property tax revenue.
- Local businesses, including restaurants, coffee shops, and stores, rely on the thousands of visitors and residents who live in this area. Without these people, these businesses will suffer severe economic losses.
- The shoreline will be permanently altered, and Maui will lose yet another cherished natural resource.

Time is of the essence, the sandbag solution is failing! We need a permanent, coastal restoration solution, similar to what has been successfully implemented in Waikiki today. The state must act now to ensure Kahana Bay remains intact for future generations.

We respectfully urge you to support SCR 76 and prioritize this issue before it is too late.

In the interim, we request additional sandbags and plantings be allowed to hold back the waves from hitting our corner unit. We are inches from the waves crashing.
