H.B. NO. 1419

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FIRE PROTECTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that some of our nation's 2 most devastating fires have been the result of lingering 3 hotspots reigniting, including the Oakland Hills fire of 1991 4 which destroyed more than two thousand five hundred structures, the 2021 Boulder County fire which was the most destructive in 5 6 Colorado's history, and, the deadliest fire in the United States 7 in over a century, the 2023 Lahaina fire. While investigations are still underway, evidence is increasingly pointing to the 8 9 widespread California fires of January 2025 being caused by 10 reignition of previous blazes that were not entirely 11 extinguished.

12 The legislature further finds that with worsening drought 13 conditions and more severe weather events associated with strong 14 wind gusts, it is imperative that fires are monitored even 15 following initial control and apparent extinguishment actions to 16 eliminate the chances of reignition.

3	SECTION 2. Chapter 132, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is			
4	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated			
5	and to read as follows:			
6	" <u>§13</u>	2- Duty to address fire stages. When discussing the		
7	<u>status of</u>	fires with regards to public dissemination of		
8	informati	on, internal guidelines for fire operations and		
9	suppressi	on actions, formal reporting, and fire safety		
10	regulatio	ns, the county fire chiefs, state fire marshal, and		
11	state fir	e council shall use the following terminology:		
12	(1)	"Uncontrolled" means any fire which threatens to		
13		destroy life, property, or natural resources, and		
14		(A) Is not burning within the confines of firebreaks,		
15		or		
16		(B) Is burning with such intensity that it could not		
17		be readily extinguished with ordinary tools		
18		commonly available.		
19	(2)	"Containment" means the status of a wildfire		
20		suppression action signifying that a control line has		
21		been completed around the fire, and any associated

1		spot fires, which can reasonably be expected to stop
2		the fire's spread.
3	(3)	"Controlled" means the completion of the control line
4		around a fire, any spot fires therefrom, and any
5		interior islands to be saved; burned out any unburned
6		area adjacent to the fire side of the control lines;
7		and cooled down all hotspots that are immediate
8		threats to the control line, until the lines can
9		reasonably be expected to hold under the foreseeable
10		condition.
11	(4)	"Extinguished" means a previous fire where no hotspots
12		or smoke are detected within the lines for at least
13		forty-eight hours and, under red flag warning or
14		drought conditions, ninety-six hours."
15	SECT	ION 3. New statutory material is underscored.
16	SECT	ION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
