## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

SUPPORTING FREE AND RESPONSIBLE SCHOLASTIC JOURNALISM AND ACTIVELY SUPPORTING AND HONORING THE FIRST AMENDMENT OF THE UNITED STATES CONSTITUTION IN STUDENT PUBLICATIONS.

WHEREAS, the Department of Education distributes to every 1 student a Student Publication/Audio/Video Release Form "in order 2 to protect students' rights to privacy as outlined in the Family 3 Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) and the Protection of 4 Pupil Rights Amendment (PPRA),"; and 5 6 7 WHEREAS, the Student Publication/Audio/Video Release Form must be returned with a parent's signature so that, as stated on 8 9 the Form, "the student's names and/or likenesses, photo, video, 10 and/or audio may be used in HIDOE school-related publication print and analog/digital media"; and 11 12 WHEREAS, the Student Publication/Audio/Video Release Form 13 lists "name and picture in annual yearbook" as an example of a 14 Department of Education or school-related publication covered by 15 FERPA; and 16 17 WHEREAS, in a survey of high school student media advisers, 18 all advisers indicated they believe their administrator believes 19 a signed Student Publication/Audio/Video Release form is 20 required to use a student's name and/or photo in school-21 22 sponsored student-produced media, such as yearbooks, newspapers, broadcasts, and literary magazines; and 23 24 WHEREAS, the Hawaii Student Journalism Protection Act, 25 enacted under Act 24, Session Laws of Hawaii 2022, and Board of 26 Education Policy 101-9 allows student journalists at public 27 schools to exercise freedom of speech and freedom of the press 28 in school-sponsored media, and protects advisers from 29

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1 material and substantial disruption of the orderly operation of the school; provided that the 2 determination of a risk of material and substantial 3 4 disruption shall be based upon specific facts, including past experience at the school and current 5 6 events influencing student behavior, and not on 7 undifferentiated fear or apprehension; and 8 9 WHEREAS, FERPA only restricts the release of information by school officials; outside parties, including student 10 11 journalists, who are neither employees nor agents of the school, are not covered by FERPA; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, minors can give consent as long as they are 15 cognitively able to understand what it means to talk to a journalist; and 16 17 WHEREAS, student journalists follow the Society of 18 Professional Journalists Code of Ethics to: 19 20 21 (1)Seek truth and report it; 22 (2) Minimize harm; 23 24 (3) Act independently; and 25 26 27 (4) Be accountable and transparent; and 28 WHEREAS, applying FERPA to student media is unnecessarily 29 placing prior constraint on student journalists; now, therefore, 30 31 32 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 33 of 2025, the Senate concurring, that this body supports free and 34 35 responsible scholastic journalism and actively supports and 36 honors the First Amendment of the United States Constitution in student publications; and 37 38 39 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Education is 40 requested to, no later than December 31, 2025: 41
