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## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

5 REQUESTING THE OFFICE OF HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS TO CONVENE A WORKING
6 GROUP TO EXAMINE AND CONSIDER THE TRANSFER OF NATIVE
7 HAWAIIAN BURIAL SITE MANAGEMENT UNDER CHAPTER 6E, HAWAII
8 REVISED STATUTES, FROM THE STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION
9 DIVISION TO THE OFFICE OF HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS.

13 WHEREAS, the Legislature recognizes that it is the State's 14 duty to protect the Native Hawaiian cultural and religious 15 practice of caring for iwi kūpuna pursuant to article XII, 16 section 7, of the Hawaii State Constitution; and

WHEREAS, in enacting Act 104, Session Laws of Hawaii 1976, 18 which established chapter 6E, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to codify 19 the State's Historic Preservation program, the Legislature 20 recognized and declared that historic properties and burial 21 22 sites are included in the State's public trust, stating that "it shall be the public policy of this State to provide leadership 23 24 in preserving, restoring, and maintaining historic and cultural property, to ensure the administration of such historic and 25 cultural property in a spirit of stewardship and trusteeship for 26 27 future generations, and to conduct activities, plans, and programs in a manner consistent with the preservation and 28 29 enhancement of historic and cultural property"; and 30

31 WHEREAS, in 1990, the Legislature amended section 6E-43, 32 Hawaii Revised Statutes, to include language stating that "at 33 any site, other than a known, maintained, actively used cemetery 34 where human skeletal remains are discovered or are known to be 35 buried and appear to be over fifty years old, the remains and 36 their associated burial goods shall not be moved without the 37 department's approval"; and

39 WHEREAS, the amendments made to section 6E-43, Hawaii40 Revised Statutes, also included language stating that "all



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1 burial sites are significant and shall be preserved in place until compliance with this section is met"; and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, chapter 10H, Hawaii Revised Statutes, formally 5 recognizes Native Hawaiians as the "only indigenous, aboriginal, maoli people of Hawaii" and facilitates and furthers Native 6 7 Hawaiian self-governance; and 8 WHEREAS, the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of 9 10 Indigenous Peoples states that "[i]ndigenous peoples have the right to self-determination", the "right to maintain, protect, 11 and have access...to their religious and cultural sites", and 12 13 "repatriation of their human remains"; and 14 15 WHEREAS, the State and this body recognize that the Office 16 of Hawaiian Affairs was constitutionally established as a trust vehicle to act on behalf of Native Hawaiians until a Native 17 18 Hawaiian governing entity could be reestablished; and 19 WHEREAS, the State Historic Preservation Division of the 20 Department of Land and Natural Resources was established to 21 administer a comprehensive historic preservation program 22 23 pursuant to chapter 6E, Hawaii Revised Statutes; and 24 25 WHEREAS, the State Historic Preservation Division is tasked 26 with the identification and protection of historic burial sites, and, with respect to Native Hawaiian burial sites, is tasked 27 with sharing decision-making over relocation or preservation in 28 place, transfer, or other disposition of previously identified 29 Native Hawaiian burial sites, with the State's island burial 30 councils that were established pursuant to section 6E-43.5, 31 32 Hawaii Revised Statutes; and 33 34 WHEREAS, pursuant to H.R. No. 113, H.D. 1 (2021), and S.R. No. 171, S.D. 1 (2021), the Office of Hawaiian Affairs convened 35 a Burial Sites Working Group in 2022 to investigate the matter 36 37 of burial site treatment and to offer recommendations for 38 improvements; and 39 40 WHEREAS, the Burial Site Working Group took extensive community testimony as part of its fact-finding mandate and in 41 its final report dated February 2023, made three key findings: 42

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1 WHEREAS, occasionally, the State Historic Preservation 2 Division faces potential conflicts of interest, or the appearance of conflicts of interest, resulting from historic 3 4 preservation reviews, inadvertent discoveries, descendancy 5 claims, and making recommendations to the Island Burial Councils: and 6 7 8 WHEREAS, these potential conflicts of interest may be 9 resolved by transferring parts of the Burial Sites Program to 10 another agency; now, therefore, 11 12 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 13 Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2025, the Senate concurring, that the Office of Hawaiian 14 15 Affairs is requested to convene a working group to examine and consider the transfer of Native Hawaiian burial site management 16 17 under chapter 6E, Hawaii Revised Statutes, from the State 18 Historic Preservation Division to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs; and 19 20 21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group is requested 22 to: 23 (1)Identify and determine which duties and 24 25 responsibilities of the State Historic Preservation Division regarding the protection of Native Hawaiian 26 27 burial sites and administration of the Island Burial 28 Councils under chapter 6E, Hawaii Revised Statutes, 29 may be shared with or assumed by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs; 30 31 32 (2) Consider the staff and financial resources of the 33 Office of Hawaiian Affairs, legal requirements, technological needs, and other relevant factors in 34 determining the feasibility of the Office of Hawaiian 35 Affairs assuming these duties and responsibilities; 36 37 38 (3) Develop and recommend an implementation plan and 39 associated timeline for the transfer of any duties, 40 including any necessary statutory and administrative amendments to effectuate the transfer; 41 42
