HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING THE GOVERNOR TO DETERMINE A COURSE OF ACTION FOR THE STATE, SHOULD THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT CUT FUNDING FOR MEDICAID.

1 WHEREAS, Medicaid provides comprehensive health and long-2 term care to more than seventy-two million Americans with 3 limited income and resources who meet eligibility requirements, 4 including children, adults, seniors, and individuals with 5 disabilities; and

7 WHEREAS, Hawaii's state Medicaid program, Med-QUEST, 8 provides health care coverage to approximately one in five 9 Hawaii residents and one in three children and serves as a 10 cornerstone of Hawaii's health care infrastructure and a 11 lifeline for vulnerable population; and


13 WHEREAS, in fiscal year 2023, the total Medicaid spending 14 in Hawaii was \$3,000,000,000, of which seventy-three percent was 15 paid by the federal government, which highlights the impact 16 federal funding has on Medicaid services in the State; and

18 WHEREAS, Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) are 19 federally funded entities that meet certain requirements, 20 including providing care to patients regardless of the ability 21 to pay; and

WHEREAS, Hawaii's FQHCs provide critical health care services at over one hundred sites; in 2023 they served 158,448 patients, including over forty-five thousand children, twentyfive thousand kupuna, 7,520 individuals experiencing homelessness, 3,568 veterans, and 1,744 agricultural workers, which demonstrates the wide-ranging impact and reach FQHCs have amongst the most vulnerable groups in the State; and 30

31 WHEREAS, Hawaii's FQHCs predominately serve low-income
32 populations, with over fifty percent of patients seen at FQHCs

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1 2 (2) Assuming that all states drop the ACA Medicaid expansion coverage in response to the elimination of 3 the ninety percent federal match rate, federal 4 Medicaid spending would decrease by twenty-five 5 percent (or \$1,700,000,000,000), and state Medicaid 6 spending would decrease by five percent (or 7 \$186,000,000,000) over a ten-year period; and 8 9 WHEREAS, under the second scenario, total Medicaid spending 10 would be cut by nearly one-fifth (or \$1,900,000,000,000), and 11 12 nearly a quarter of all Medicaid enrollees, twenty million people nationally, would lose coverage; and 13 14 15 WHEREAS, only states that have adopted the Medicaid expansion would see any spending or enrollment impacts under 16 these policy proposals, though changes would vary by state; and 17 18 19 WHEREAS, according to the Kaiser Family Foundation study, 20 if Hawaii picked up the new expansion costs under the first scenario, the anticipated loss of federal funding per fiscal 21 year that would need to be offset by state funds is 22 23 \$320,000,000; and 24 WHEREAS, under the second scenario, in which Hawaii would 25 drop Medicaid expansion coverage, federal Medicaid funding would 26 decrease by \$9,400,000,000, while state Medicaid funding would 27 28 decrease by \$1,000,000,000 annually and result in one hundred fifty-six thousand people, or thirty-four percent of Hawaii's 29 total Medicaid population, losing coverage; and 30 31 32 WHEREAS, if Hawaii maintains Medicaid expansion coverage in the wake of this policy change, lawmakers will need to increase 33 34 the general fund appropriation to HMS401 on a continual basis or find new sources of funding for this vital program; and 35 36 37 WHEREAS, such severe cuts to Medicaid would have dire 38 consequences for the State and FQHCs, such as reducing health 39 coverage for Medicaid patients, increasing the number of 40 uninsured individuals, decreasing access to care, and reversing positive health outcomes associated with Medicaid expansion; and 41 42





WHEREAS, the federal government has also initiated massive 1 reductions in the federal workforce that will increase the 2 number of uninsured workers and their families in the State, 3 which will have a significant impact on Hawaii's Medicaid 4 program; now, therefore, 5 6 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 7 Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 8 of 2025, that the Governor is urged to determine a course of 9 action for the State, should the federal government cut funding 10 for Medicaid; and 11 12 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governor is urged to consult with the members of Hawaii's congressional delegation to 14 ascertain the impacts of pending federal legislation on Medicaid 15 expansion and the timing of any reduction in federal funding; 16 17 and 18 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governor is requested to 19 submit a report of any findings and recommendations, including 20 proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty 21 22 days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2026; and 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 24 25 Resolution be transmitted to each respective member of Hawaii's congressional delegation, the Governor, Director of Commerce and 26 Consumer Affairs, Director of Health, Director of Human 27 Services, and Director of Finance. 28
