# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ACT 253, SESSION LAWS OF HAWAII 2023.

#### **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:**

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Act 253, Session 2 Laws of Hawaii 2023 (Act 253), established the neighbor islands 3 blind and visually impaired service pilot program within the 4 department of human services. The goal of Act 253 is to bridge 5 the gaps in services for blind and low vision residents across 6 the State, particularly focusing on those living on the neighbor islands. The department's efforts to implement Act 253 were 7 8 delayed until July 2024, as the department's staff were 9 responding to the needs of staff and residents impacted by the August 2023 Maui wildfires. 10

Despite the delays, the department of human services engaged a consultant, posted a survey, and had several in-person and virtual meetings to gather information from blind and low vision neighbor island residents to discuss potential training and services that the pilot program may offer. A report to the legislature was submitted in December 2024 detailing the department's efforts, findings, and recommendations, including



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1 requests for two additional temporary full-time equivalent 2 positions within the department and appropriations to implement 3 the pilot program. 4 The purpose of this Act is to: 5 Rename the pilot program by replacing the term (1) "visually impaired" with the less stigmatizing term 6 7 "low vision"; and 8 (2) Clarify the pilot program's implementation timeframes. SECTION 2. Act 253, Session Laws of Hawaii 2023, is 9 10 amended as follows: 11 1. By amending section 1 to read: 12 "SECTION 1. The legislature finds that thousands of Hawaii 13 residents have visual disabilities that hamper daily living and 14 may lead to isolation, limited productivity, loss of 15 independence, and lack of social integration. The department of human services estimates that there are twelve thousand Hawaii 16 residents who are blind or [have a significant visual 17 18 impairment, ] low vision, many of whom live on Oahu where access 19 to opportunities and services are better organized and readily 20 available compared to the neighbor islands.

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1 The legislature further finds that state and local support 2 services for blind or [visually impaired] low vision 3 individuals, including training, adjustment to blindness 4 services, and transportation services, are provided through economies of scale, and therefore tend to benefit residents in 5 6 populated areas as compared to those in sparsely populated 7 areas. As such, approximately two thousand neighbor island 8 residents who are blind or [visually impaired] low vision are 9 left with the choice of either moving to Oahu or living without 10 the opportunity to have full and integrated lives in their 11 existing communities.

Accordingly, the legislature finds that there is a need for a supplemental service program that provides additional support services to blind and [visually impaired] low vision individuals residing on neighbor islands.

16 The purpose of this Act is to:

17 (1) Require the department of human services to:

18 (A) Establish a neighbor islands blind and [visually
19 impaired] low vision service pilot program that
20 supplements existing statewide services by
21 providing training and other services to neighbor

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(8) Advocacy training and assistance to secure needed
 benefits, services, and individual rights; and
 (9) Other services, including peer support needed for
 program participants to sustain independence and
 social integration.

The services provided by the pilot program pursuant to this 6 7 subsection shall be provided by volunteers, who shall be 8 recruited, assigned, and supervised by the department or an 9 entity contracted by the department to organize and implement 10 the pilot program. All volunteers shall have the necessary 11 qualifications, be chosen based on experience and training, and use training methods consistent with the structured discovery 12 approach used by the new visions program operated by the Ho'opono 13 services for the blind branch within the department's division 14 of vocational rehabilitation." 15

16 3. By amending subsections (f) to (h) in section 2 to17 read:

18 "(f) The department shall enter into a contract with a 19 nonprofit organization to recruit, train, and supervise 20 volunteer service corps members and oversee the pilot program; 21 provided that existing department personnel may be assigned to

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fulfill administrative and fiscal responsibilities of the pilot 1 2 program. Any contract entered into pursuant to this subsection shall be exempt from chapters 103D and 103F. Any nonprofit 3 4 organization contracted under this subsection shall have: 5 (1) The knowledge, experience, and qualifications necessary to provide peer support services to program 6 7 participants; (2) A management team, consisting of officers and 8 9 directors, of whom a majority are blind or [visually impaired; ] low vision; and 10 (3) Membership chapters or organization subunits located 11 12 on the neighbor islands that will be served by the 13 pilot program. The department shall establish a neighbor islands 14 (q) blind and [visually impaired] low vision service pilot program 15 16 working group composed of neighbor island residents who are blind or [visually impaired] low vision to make recommendations 17 regarding the establishment and implementation of the pilot 18 19 The department, in collaboration with the working program. 20 group, shall develop a written implementation plan that includes 21 a pilot program performance period and program budget, and shall

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submit the plan, including any proposed legislation, to the
 legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
 the regular session of [2024.] 2026. The working group shall be
 exempt from the requirements of part I of chapter 92, Hawaii
 Revised Statutes.

6 (h) The department shall submit a report of its findings
7 and recommendations pertaining to the neighbor islands blind and
8 [visually impaired] low vision service pilot program to the
9 legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of
10 the regular session of 2029. The report shall include:

- 11 (1) A record of pilot program activities and
- 12 accomplishments;
- 13 (2) A recommendation on whether to extend the pilot14 program; and
- 15 (3) Any proposed legislation."

16 4. By amending subsections (j) and (k) in section 2 to17 read:

18 "(j) The pilot program [shall begin no later than January
19 1, 2024, and] shall cease to exist on July 30, 2029.

- 20 (k) For purposes of this section:
- 21 "Department" means the department of human services.

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1 "Neighbor island" means a county with a population less 2 than five hundred thousand. 3 "Pilot program" means the neighbor islands blind and [visually\_impaired] low vision service pilot program established 4 5 pursuant to this Act. "Program participant" means a resident of a neighbor island 6 7 whose mobility or ability to live independently is substantially limited due to loss of sight and who is participating in the 8 9 neighbor islands blind and [visually impaired] low vision 10 service pilot program. 11 "Special needs transportation" means transportation 12 provided to program participants at times or for trips when public transportation is not a reasonable option." 13 14 SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 15 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000, and 16 shall be repealed on June 30, 2029. 17

Updates the name of the Neighbor Islands Blind and Visually Impaired Service Pilot Program established by Act 253, SLH 2023, by replacing the term "visually impaired" with the term "low vision" and clarifies the pilot program's implementation timeframes. Sunsets 6/30/2029. Effective 7/1/3000. (HD2)

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
