SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE GOVERNOR, MAYORS OF EACH COUNTY, AND THE STATE TO WORK TOWARDS A JUST CLIMATE FUTURE BY INTEGRATING INDIGENOUS KNOWLEDGE INTO POLICY AND DECISION-MAKING PROCESSES RELATED TO CLIMATE ADAPTATION, CLIMATE MITIGATION, AND CLIMATE RESILIENCY.

WHEREAS, due to the current and projected impacts of 1 2 climate destabilization on Hawaii and the world, immediate 3 action is necessary for human survival and a chance at a just 4 climate future; and 5 WHEREAS, as the original inhabitants of Hawaii, Native 6 Hawaiians have refined their methods of survival based on 7 science and observation throughout the millennia; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, Native Hawaiians continue to practice, refine, and 11 share their indigenous knowledge for collective survival; and 12 13 WHEREAS, indigenous knowledge includes practices that have 14 sustained native peoples since time immemorial, and is often 15 referred to as ike kupuna, traditional ecological knowledge, indigenous innovations, and, more generally, cultural practices; 16 17 and 18 WHEREAS, indigenous knowledge also includes native 19 languages, which serve to connect past, present, and future 20 generations to a shared history, culture, and set of values; and 21 22 WHEREAS, indigenous knowledge-based principles are deeply 23 enshrined in the Hawaii State Constitution, as articulated by 24 the right to a clean and healthy environment, protections for 25 26 the State's natural resources, and the recognition and protection of traditional and customary practices, including 27 Olelo Hawaii; and 28 29

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WHEREAS, Hawaii's unique geographical location positions 1 itself to not only cultivate indigenous knowledge, but also to 2 use its location to facilitate and connect shared learnings 3 across Moananuiakea (the Pacific region) and the world; and 4 5 6 WHEREAS, on June 11, 2024, traditional leaders from across Moananuiakea signed the Tuurama Ariki Declaration, which commits 7 to ongoing collaboration, dialogue, and the exchange of 8 knowledge among Pacific nations to respond to urgent challenges 9 impacting the Pacific region and the planet; and 10 11 12 WHEREAS, the Legislature recognizes the cascading and ongoing impacts to Hawaii's aina-based, climate-related, and 13 14 Native Hawaiian groups, due to rapid and ongoing federal level changes that reverse longstanding and critical environmental, 15 social, and political policies, which are likely to impact 16 residents now and for generations to come; and 17 18 19 WHEREAS, an equitable and just climate future cannot be achieved without purposeful, meaningful, and consensus 20 21 methodologies that integrate indigenous knowledge into the policy and decision-making processes of the State; now, 22 therefore, 23 24 25 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2025, the 26 27 House of Representatives concurring, that the Governor, Mayor of each county, and the State are urged to work towards a just 28 29 climate future by integrating indigenous knowledge into policy 30 and decision-making processes related to climate adaptation, climate mitigation, and climate resiliency; and 31 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governor, Mayor of each county, and the State are urged to formulate and identify goals 34 to facilitate a just climate future that purposefully and 35 meaningfully includes indigenous knowledge as an integral 36 37 component; and 38 39 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Olelo Hawaii is urged to be invested in, integrated, and practiced as a key mechanism to 40 achieving a just climate future; and 41 42



BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this
