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BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-third 1 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2025, 2 that this body encourages the adoption of recommendations from 3 the United Nations Global Plastics Treaty and Rapa Nui Summit 4 Declaration to address climate justice and sustainable 5 6 development; and 7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body encourages the State 8 to undertake effective, inclusive, sustainable, and rights-based 9 considerations to address the challenge of plastic pollution and 10 the degradation of marine and coastal ecosystems; and 11 12 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body encourages the 13 adoption of actions promoting protection, conservation, and the 14 15 sustainable use of the ocean, including preservation of marine biodiversity and ecosystems and implementation of mechanisms to 16 increase marine resilience, especially among indigenous peoples 17 18 and local coastal communities; and 19 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body supports the 20 promotion of culture-based climate justice, utilizing the 21 principles established in the Charter of the United Nations and 22 23 the Charter of the Pacific Islands Forum; and 24 25 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body encourages greater participation in the United Nations human rights, sustainable 26 development, and climate processes promoting rights, fundamental 27 freedoms, and protection of the planet; and 28 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 30 Resolution be transmitted to the Secretary General of the United 31 32 Nations, Executive Director of the United Nations Environment Programme, Administrator of the United Nations Development 33 34 Programme, members of Hawaii's congressional delegation, and 35 Governor.
