SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DIRECTOR OF COMMERCE AND CONSUMER AFFAIRS TO ESTABLISH AND CONVENE A PHARMACY REIMBURSEMENT WORKING GROUP TO EXPLORE AND PROPOSE LEGISLATION FOR THE 2026 LEGISLATIVE SESSION.

WHEREAS, Hawaii continues to face a shortage of health care 1 providers, particularly in rural areas and the neighbor islands; 2 3 and 4 5 WHEREAS, pharmacies serve as a vital resource for health care delivery in the State because they are conveniently located 6 7 and easily accessible to underserved communities; and 8 WHEREAS, pharmacists today play an increasingly vital role 9 in health care and can provide patient care services beyond the 10 traditional role of dispensing prescription medication, such as 11 medication therapy management, immunizations, health screenings, 12 chronic disease management, and patient education and 13 14 counseling; and 15 WHEREAS, pharmacists perform these functions in concurrence 16 17 with health care facilities and in accordance with policies, procedures, and protocols developed collaboratively by health 18 professionals, including physicians, surgeons, and registered 19 nurses, and for which pharmacists have received appropriate 20 training to perform; and 21 22 WHEREAS, pharmacies can help with cost savings by 23 preventing hospital readmissions and managing chronic 24 conditions, thereby reducing the overall cost of health care and 25 increasing positive patient outcomes; and 26 27 28 WHEREAS, reimbursements to pharmacies and registered pharmacists who safely provide health care services within their 29 30 scope of practice is cost effective and brings the State closer to meeting the health care needs of the community, while 31 strengthening the integrated care team model that has been 32

1 proven effective for many of the State's most vulnerable 2 patients; and 3 WHEREAS, in 2023, the Office of the Auditor issued a report 4 5 assessing the social and financial impacts of mandating health insurance coverage for services provided by pharmacists; and 6 7 WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that reimbursement from 8 patients' health plans is the next step to ensure that 9 pharmacists in the State can maximize their clinical services 10 and practice within their full scope of licensure pursuant to 11 chapter 461, Hawaii Revised Statutes; now, therefore, 12 13 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-third 14 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2025, 15 that the Director of Commerce and Consumer Affairs is requested 16 to establish a Pharmacy Reimbursement Working Group to study 17 mandatory health insurance coverage and payment for health care 18 services provided by pharmacists and to propose legislation 19 20 mandating reimbursement for pharmacy services to be introduced in the Regular Session of 2026; and 21 22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Director of Commerce and 23 24 Consumer Affairs is requested to invite the Insurance 25 Commissioner, or the Insurance Commissioner's designee; one representative of the Board of Pharmacy; two representatives 26 27 from the retail pharmacy community; one representative from an 28 independent pharmacists' association; and two representatives 29 from the health insurance industry, to participate as members of 30 the Working Group; and 31 32 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Pharmacy Reimbursement 33 Working Group is requested to: 34 Meet regularly to gather information about pharmacy 35 (1)reimbursement practices with the goal of requiring 36 reimbursement for health care services provided by 37 pharmacists acting within their scope of practice in 38 the State; 39 40 41 (2) Discuss the impact of reimbursement for pharmacists providing health care services in the State and 42





examine whether the lack of reimbursement poses a 1 2 hardship on individuals needing treatment, the extent to which the proposed mandatory insurance coverage 3 would impact access to care in the State, and the 4 impact of providing coverage for the treatment or 5 6 service to the pharmacist or pharmacy; 7 Draft proposed legislation that would require health 8 (3) insurers in the State to provide coverage for health 9 care services provided by licensed pharmacists acting 10 within their scope of practice and fairly reimburse 11 pharmacies or pharmacists for those services provided 12 within their scope of practice under chapter 461, 13 Hawaii Revised Statutes; and 14 15 Evaluate pharmacists in other jurisdictions and the 16 (4) kind of services being provided within their scope of 17 practice and whether those services would have a 18 significant impact on preventative care services in 19 the State; and 20 21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Pharmacy Reimbursement 22 Working Group submit a written report of its findings and 23 24 recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 25 the Regular Session of 2026; and 26 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 28 29 Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, Insurance Commissioner, and Executive Officer 30 of the Board of Pharmacy. 31
