REQUESTING THE CONVENING OF A FAMILY CAREGIVERS WORKING GROUP TO EXAMINE AND ASSESS LEGISLATION RELATING TO THE ROLE OF CAREGIVERS OF PATIENTS DISCHARGED FROM HOSPITALS.

- **Department Testimony:** The Department of Health recommends amendments identical to SCR 1
- 107 SD1. 2
- 3 During the 2014 legislative session, HCR 78 was passed that requested DOH to convene
- 4 a new Working Group to study the similar subject matter contained in this resolution and to
- 5 submit a report to the 2015 Legislature. DOH was a member of the Working Group. The
- 6 department feels that the process established by the legislature to request a Working Group study
- 7 and report and for the legislature to review the report should continue to be followed. This will
- 8 help to ensure the integrity of the prior legislatively-requested process and help to maintain the
- 9 public's trust. The HCR 78 SLH 2014 report was submitted to the legislature via the
- 10 department's internal process on March 20, 2015, following the Group's final meeting on
- January 12, 2015, and following subsequent revisions at the request of the Group's co-chairs. 11
- The entire report was submitted to the Senate President and the Speaker of the House by the 12
- Governor's Office in early April 2015. 13

The department recommends the legislature review the Working Group's report in its 1 entirety and consider all its findings, conclusions, and recommendations before proceeding on 2 3 this resolution. For example, the draft report identifies five recommendations based on twenty findings. Contrary to the claim of the 9th whereas contained in this resolution, four of the 4 recommendations were unanimously agreed upon by the Working Group, and a small minority 5 disagreed on the other recommendation. By examining the report, the legislature could find that 6 7 the recommendations could be a more prudent next step. 8 As a result, the department hopes these comments provide your committee and the legislature with a prudent rationale for the need to review the Working Group's report in its 9 entirety as part of its careful deliberation on HCR 145. However, if the legislature wishes to 10 11 pursue a new working group pursuant to HCR 145, the department requests the legislature find another agency such as the Legislative Reference Bureau to provide administrative support to the 12 co-chairs, including drafting and writing the final report for submittal to the 2015 legislature. 13 Due to other pressing priorities the Department does not currently have the resources to provide 14 administrative and logistical support to the co-chairs of the Family Caregivers Working Group 15 and prepare and draft any new reports produced by the Family Caregivers Working Group. 16 17 Further, the legislature should consider holding an informational briefing relating to the HCR 78, SLH 2014 to gather information from stake holders since HCR 145 would not allow the 18 19 participants of the new working group to vote on any findings or recommendations thereby making a new working group unnecessary. 20

STATEMENT OF THE ILWU LOCAL 142 ON H.C.R. 145 REQUESTING THE CONVENING OF A FAMILY CAREGIVERS WORKING GROUP TO EXAMINE AND ASSESS LEGISLATION RELATING TO THE ROLE OF CAREGIVERS OF PATIENTS DISCHARGED FROM HOSPITALS

The ILWU Local 142 supports H.C.R. 145 for another working group to be convened to address the role of family caregivers when patients are discharged from the hospital.

The first working group convened last year to address this issue could not arrive at consensus on the issues. Nevertheless, S.B. 296 was introduced this session to address the issue and included language to exempt hospitals from liability, which had been a major concern for the hospitals. However, hospital representatives were not appeared and vehemently testified in opposition to S.B. 296, resulting in deferral of the measure.

H.C.R. 145 is another attempt at discussion of the issue, hopefully this time with more balanced representation from hospital representatives and caregiver advocates and with a better outcome.

If liability is the main concern for hospitals, we remind them that they may be open to lawsuits whenever something goes wrong—whether they are at fault or not. Furthermore, hospitals risk penalties from the federal Hospital Readmissions Reduction Program when patients fare poorly due to inadequate care at home and must be readmitted to the hospital. It is in the hospitals' best interest to provide as much assistance as possible to family caregivers to ensure that patients are not readmitted and may be cared for in their own homes. Alternative institutionalization will be far more costly to the patients, their families, and taxpayers.

The ILWU urges passage of H.C.R. 145 and convening of another working group. Thank you for considering our views and concerns.

The Hawaii Alliance for Retired Americans (HARA) strongly supports HCR 145 to establish a working group to examine and assess legislation relating to the role of caregivers of patients discharged from hospitals.

Since most discharged hospital patients need follow up care at home, it is important that caregivers are prepared for this task. Unfortunately, most families are not prepared for this sudden critical demand. Few caregiving families are either properly trained or equipped to provide this aftercare. The gap between the highly trained professionals in the hospital setting and the home situation is significant.

HCR 145 is an appropriate first step in addressing the problem. A working group headed by co-chairs appointed by the House and Senate with broad community representation to present recommendations to the legislature would address the concerns of the hospital as well as the community sectors.

HARA urges the Health Committee to adopt House Concurrent Resolution 145.
