Chair Tokuda and Committee Members:

My name is Anthony Lenzer, and I am a member of the legislative committee of the Policy Advisory Board for Elder Affairs (PABEA). This Board advises the Executive Office on Aging (EOA) on aging issues, and advocates on behalf Hawaii's kupuna and their families. My testimony reflects the views of PABEA and not necessarily those of the Executive Office on Aging.

PABEA strongly supports Senate Bill 534 SD 1 which creates a Kupuna Caregivers Program within the Executive Office on Aging. This program is designed to help employed caregivers of elderly family members obtain necessary services, which will help them remain effective members of Hawaii's workforce. These services include transportation, personal care, respite care, adult day care, and chore/homemaking services. Qualified caregivers will receive vouchers for up to \$70 per day for agencies to provide such services. The program will be administered by the Area Agencies on Aging, through their Aging and Disability Resource Centers.

This program is vitally important for three reasons:

(1) over one-fifth of Hawaii's population is now aged 60+, including over 34,000 persons age 85+. The percent of residents aged 85+ is expected to double in the next 30 years. (a) <u>These "oldest old" are most</u> likely to have multiple chronic illnesses and/or disability, and be most in need of help in order to remain at home:

(2) family members, friends, and other unpaid caregivers provide most of the assistance to frail elders. An AARP study found 154,000 unpaid elder caregivers in Hawaii, and AARP's 2014 study of 1,000 registered voters aged 45+ found that 53% were providing or had provided care for an elderly loved one (b). National data indicates that the typical long-term family caregiver is a 49 year old woman who is caring for her mother, for twenty hours/week, while trying to keep up with work and other household responsibilities (c). Many studies have documented the physical, emotional, and financial stresses associated with caregiving, especially when few workers (nationally, only 13%) have paid family leave (d):

and (3) <u>while some state, federal, and county funds are available to assist frail elders, there is little money</u> for the caregivers themselves. The situation has been described by one County Executive on Aging as follows: "Unless a County receives funding from their County Council, our options to provide caregiverspecific services are limited. For Maui County, we can use approximately 10% of our overall Federal funding (Title III E) for services such as Family Caregiver Support, Training, and Counseling, Adult Day Care Respite, In-Home Respite, and support for Grandparents Raising Grandchildren (not to exceed 10% of Title III E). Without additional County funding, our ability to actively serve family caregivers would be, therefore, quite limited."(e)

In summary, the Kupuna Caregivers bill is needed because: Hawaii's growing older population, and the

increasing number of oldest old persons require a variety of services to remain at home, and these are primarily provided by unpaid family caregivers; family caregivers are typically employed and have other responsibilities in addition to elder care; and there are few sources of financial support for the services which will help caregivers continue to assist their loved ones, while meeting other responsibilities.

Dear Chair Tokuda, Vice - Chair Dela Cruz and Members of the Committee, My name is Myra Myatt and I am writing to express my support for SB 534 and the creation of the Kupuna Caregivers program . This bill will provide the needed respite care that our kupuna caregivers deserve and the support our working families and businesses need.

I believe that I planned well for my retirement --- with modest savings and a Long-Term Care policy – what I didn't count on was being a full-time caregiver for my aging mother-in-law, Rica.

Rica will turn 100 this June and shows no signs of declining. She does have medical needs, and my husband and I must dip into our own retirement funds to cover some of the costs. If I were to put her in a care facility, the funds would be gone in no time. Hence, I take care of her at home and I have been doing so for the past five years.

Because Rica needs someone all the time, I am not afforded the opportunity to see my own 95-year-old mother on the mainland. (Respite care for Rica would run about \$300 a day.) Additionally, my sister has been diagnosed with Alzheimer's Disease. We are only two in the family and she will not be able to care for our mother. Soon, I will need to figure out how to care for both my mother on the mainland, and my mother-in-law in Hawaii – and somehow take care of myself.

Taking care of our elders at home truly enhances their lives, but it has the potential to be devastating financially, draining emotionally and can pose a real threat to the caregiver's health. It is not a situation that anyone would wish for, but it is a reality for many people in their 50s, 60s and 70s. Our parents are living a long time; they need care, yet many caregivers also need to remain in the workforce to help cover living costs.

The proposed Kupuna Caregivers Assistance bill would provide a much-needed opportunity for stay-athome caregivers to literally "take a break" or help defray the cost of putting a loved one in day care so that a younger caregiver can continue to work.

As our duly elected legislators, we look to you to pass new legislation that meets our --- your constituents -- needs. Bill SB 534 more than qualifies for that consideration.

My name is Doreen Hosaka-Lum, and I am writing to express my support for SB 534 and the creation of the Kupuna Caregivers program. This bill will provide the needed respite care that our kupuna caregivers deserve and the support our working families and businesses need.

This is a challenge that I am personally facing at this very moment. As a full-time social worker for the State of Hawaii, Department of Health, together with my husband who also works full-time for United Airlines, we are struggling to juggle our work schedules and hire caregivers for my 91 year old, blind mother. She is unable to safely care for her own needs and requires 24 hour care. I have had to take a lot of time off from work to help care for my mother's daily needs on top of taking her to medical appointments. At this time I am still waiting on the approval of my application for family leave under the Federal Family & Medical Leave Act of 1993 (FMLA) from my employer and have had to take vacation leave to provide her care. This has not only put a strain on my family, marriage and finances, but on our individual physical, social and emotional well-being as well. We truly want to provide the best care for my mother in her own home on her own terms for as long as we possibly can; but if we are unable to do this ourselves, we don't even believe we could afford placing her in a care home setting as an option.

This legislation would create a long-term kupuna caregivers program, which would provide support for working caregivers, like ourselves, who also take care of their aging loved ones. Unlike other programs, this bill focuses on providing respite care for working caregivers who typically have no other financial or emotional support. To whom it may concern:

I am writing to support in passing the Senate Bill 534/ House Bill 607, to create a fund to help caregivers provide care for our kupuna.

I am a full time employee, work 40 hours a day. Back in the late 1990s, my mom and I took turns taking care of my father who had alzheimer then became bedridden. My mom then work three different shifts while I was still attending college. If my grandfather does not have doctor's appointment, it's my mom's turn which brings me and my brother to take off work. My grandfather died at 99 years of age.

My mother is getting older too and we want to care for her. We love our families and we don't want them to go to a care home facility. Having this Bill to pass will help and eases the burden of the family members. The couple hours helps alleviate the stress.

Hope that our legislators can vote to pass this Bill.

Although Florence is healthy now, she (and we) have been through three separate injuries (shoulder, back and hip), each requiring a different caregiving protocol. While my husband and I were working, our sons took their turns caregiving with us during the week. We have also used a combination of in-home caregivers, adult day care and, for a time, a nursing home. I am grateful for this opportunity to contribute to what I hope is a huge citizens' movement toward passage into law of the Hawaii Kupuna Caregivers program.

I am passionate about caregiving. I have "been there and done that." My beloved wife Masako was in need of caregiving, of an always increasing and more desperate urgency, for nearly all of the last 35 years of her life that ended on August 19, 2016, in St. Francis Hospice (she was 79; I was 72 at the time of her passing). Through those decades of multiple episodes of clinical depression, asthma/COPD and related allergy problems, pancreatic issues, Alzheimer's Disease diagnosed in 2013, and finally endometrial/uterine cancer in 2015-16, I tried to balance work (until my retirement in 1999), my own need to be fit and attentive to Masako, and the caregiving responsibility for which I was woefully unprepared and probably inadequate. I hasten to credit the services of our Kaiser Permanente membership and the final-days compassionate caring of the St Francis Hospice institutional team, but at the end of the day -- and eventually the beginning, middle and end of every day -- I was Masako's sole support. I gave it my all in accordance with our marriage vows: a labor of love that was terrifying, all-consuming, and exhausting. The labor took a toll on my own spirit and body, mostly in the form of a severely crippled spine [I admit to an heredity disposition] that was ill equipped for the deadweight -- and amateurish/untrained -- maneuvering of my Masako in her final months from bed to bathroom to living room and then the reverse.

It is important to consider financial impacts that pertain to caregiving. In my case, I retired from my federal civil-service position as soon as I was eligible at age 55, with the concomitant income loss of about 50 percent. I almost surely would have persevered to age 65 or 70 but for my wife's condition and need for care. The simple arithmetic I can arrive at is that, say, 10 additional years of employment would have meant some \$35,000 extra per annum as an income stream = \$350,000; plus the federal and state taxes that would have bolstered government tax revenues (I of course have paid no state taxes since 1999); plus additional buying power to increase local businesses' retail sales; plus the considerable uptick in my monthly retirement income for the remainder of my life. It is an absolute fact that my caregiving for Masako hurt our "bottom line" severely and irrevocably. (Also, Masako was a full-time homemaker who never became eligible for a Social Security pension; I have only my civil-service-retirement-system annuity, so mine is a "one check" retirement household.)

I can only imagine the relief, and gratitude, I would have felt had a resource like the Hawaii Kupuna Caregivers program been available back in my caregiving days. You, legislators, now have the chance to make the resource a reality to those who have succeeded me...and who knows when I will assume the role of caregivee instead of caregiver? The respite-relief aspects of the program, within the parameters to be applied to it, are growing in tandem with our aging population and constitute, I am convinced, a proper allocation of public funds to assist such a wide spectrum of our community. And so I ask, I plead: Please give SB 534 a resounding "Yes" vote!

My name is _____, and I am writing to express my support for **HB 607** and the creation of the Kupuna Caregivers program. This bill will provide the needed respite care that our kupuna caregivers deserve and the support our working families and businesses need.

This legislation would create a long-term kupuna caregivers program, which would provide support for working caregivers who also take care of their aging loved ones. Unlike other programs, this bill focuses on providing respite care for working caregivers who typically have no other financial or emotional support. As so many of us know, the desire to spend time caring for our aging parents and grandparents is often in competition with our need to continue participating in the workforce to be able to provide for our families.

By providing a care benefit of \$70 per day, this bill establishes a much needed "care floor," ensuring that working families would have access to resources to provide care at home. This fund is not meant to cover a stay in a long-term care facility like a nursing home, which we know is often much more expensive than home care. Instead, it would allow for support at home with activities of daily living, like hiring home care aides for a few hours or providing transportation services. It may not sound like much to some people, but this sort of respite care is a lifeline for family caregivers!

I believe that all of us know at least one person who has needed long-term care. As legislators, we have elected you to be leaders to the people of Hawaii, and we are asking you, now, to lead on helping us provide the care our families need.

As a 24/7 caregiver for my wife for the last 13 years I have experienced all the frustrations caregivers go through on a daily basis. I retired from my job to take care of her because it became too expensive hiring a service to watch her for 8 hours a day at \$25 per hour. I started by using the service for 2 hours per day but as her dementia progressed I increased the hours to four hours then to six hours. Finally I had to retire. 5 years ago I found she could attend adult day care for \$65 per day. She still attends which gives me the respite care I truly needed but would not admit it at first until I started having physical problems like high blood pressure, headaches, and the list goes on. While my wife is at adult day care I now find time to advocate for caregivers by providing them with resource material and free counseling to help them survive and thrive. I facilitate a caregivers support group in Kailua at the adult day care where my wife attends. S.B. 534 would be a godsend to so many caregivers. I realize the bill is meant to help families that are working but I feel it leaves out a very important segment of the population. There are many seniors that are retired and on a fixed income like myself that are taking care of a loved one at home.

I totally support S.B. 534 but would like to have two items added:

- To qualify a person has to work 30 hours per week. I feel there should be an income cap both up and down. Some people could be working 30 hours per week and making \$10,000 per month and qualify. Then you have senior caregivers living on a fixed income taking care of a loved one that is retired yet needs some respite care and they would not qualify. Thus, I believe income should be a considering factor in the qualification process.
- 2. Having all service providers on contract will just slow down the process. For example, an adult day care center would have all the necessary qualifications to operate yet they still have to be under contract. I realize the necessity of accountability being built into the system, but it will hurt the very segment of the population S.B. bill 534 is supposed to help by delaying the process. EOA and EAD are having a difficult time managing what they currently have now. How are they going to manage a large influx of additional request for service unless the system is properly modified. My understanding for a simple service the wait time is about one month. How long will the wait time be once S.B. Bill 534 is passed without any modification? You will end up with a bureaucratic nightmare and much of the money will be wasted in trying to sort everything out unless the government partners with the service providers to come up with a better working system at the very beginning. Thus, a committee of

government and service providers should be brought together to decide how the service is provided.

One last comment would be the health care industry, especially in the caregiving segment, is a very short field of employment because of the wages. Maybe it is time to look at some type of wage relief for qualified caregivers. The entry level positions are just too low for anyone to survive working full time. There are immigrants from certain countries where caregiving is a way of life for their families which could be brought into the work force and trained to be certified caregivers to augment the shortage of caregivers as well as providing caregiver training our youth population at the high school level as a career option. Higher wages might attract more younger people into the caregiving workforce as well as a first step to higher positions in the medical field.
