- 1 EOA's Position: The Executive Office on Aging (EOA), an attached agency to the Department
- 2 of Health supports this measure, provided that its enactment does not reduce or replace priorities
- 3 within the Administration's base budget request.
- 4 Fiscal Implications: This measure appropriates funds in the amount of \$9,000,000 for
- 5 SFY2020 and \$9,000,000 for SFY2021 for the Kupuna Care program.

6 **Purpose and Justification:** EOA notes that the appropriation in this bill is a priority of the Ige

- 7 Administration. Governor Ige's budget request maintains a total base budget of \$8,731,368 per
- 8 year from SFY2020 through SFY2021.
- 9 The Governor's package will include his funding request in the base budget, allowing the Area
- 10 Agencies on Aging to efficiently plan and continuously procure Kupuna Care services rather
- 11 than waiting to see if a separate appropriation is approved and released. In addition, the
- 12 contracted service providers will have continual funding to address workforce capacity issues.

As Hawaii's aging population continues to grow, the need for long term services and supports 1 will increase. The growing number of older adults is likely to put a severe strain on the State's 2 3 resources for long term services and supports. The health care cost for persons age 65 and older was estimated to be five times larger than the cost for persons younger than age 65. 4 5 Kupuna Care assists frail adults, age 60 and older to lead independent, meaningful, and dignified 6 lives, by providing a continuum of home and community based services and supports. Its aim is 7 to allow for aging in place, thus preventing or delaying the need for more expensive and more 8 restrictive levels of care. Funding is critical as the population over age 60 is increasing rapidly. 9 Kupuna Care is comprised of nine core services namely personal care, homemaker, chore, home delivered meals, adult day care, case management, assisted transportation, regular transportation, 10 and attendant care. These services support individuals in performing Activities of Daily Living 11 12 (personal hygiene, dressing, eating, toileting, transferring). In SFY2018, Kupuna Care services was provided to 5,643 individuals. The cost to serve 5,643 was \$8,605,000 or \$1,524 per person 13 14 per year. Based on the Governor's base budget request, the State could serve an additional 262 individuals. 15

16 Recommendation: Kupuna Care is a part of the Administration's base budget request. We 17 support advancing this measure provided that its enactment does not reduce or replace priorities 18 with the Administration's base budget. Should there be a surplus of funds available for this 19 measure, we would be very supportive of funding this important initiative.

I am Melodie Aduja, Chair of the O`ahu County Committee on Legislative Priorities of the Democratic Party of Hawai`i. Mahalo for this opportunity to submit testimony on SB 1023. The O`ahu County Committee on Legislative Priorities ("OCCLP") hereby submits its testimony in **SUPPORT of SB 1023, relating to Aging.**

SB 1023 makes an appropriation to the department of health to provide full funding for the kupuna care program.

Hawai`i faces a long-term care crisis that prevents too many kupuna and people with disabilities from being able to live with dignity at home or in their communities. The vast majority of kupuna who are aging or living with a disability want to do so at home, but face challenges finding and affording the support they need to do so Programs that emphasize independence rather than institutionalization must be better structured to support then. DPH will take steps to strengthen and expend the home care workforce, give kupuna and people with disability access to quality, affordable long-term care, services, and supports, and ensure that all of these resources are readily available at home or in the community. *Democratic Party of Hawai`i Platform (2018), p. 12, In. 44-50.*

For the foregoing reasons, i.e., to give kupuna quality, affordable long-term care, services, and supports, OCCLP supports SB 1023 and urges its passage out of the Committee on Ways and Means.

SB 1023, Makes an appropriation to the Department of Health to provide full funding for Kupuna Care.

Good morning Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran, and members of the Committee on Ways and Means:

Lanakila Pacific strongly supports SB 1023 to provide full funding for Kupuna Care and offers comments to require the Executive Office on Aging to adopt Hawaii Administrative Rules to ensure some of Hawaii's most vulnerable kupuna have access to services that allow them to age in place. Lanakila Pacific's Lanakila Meals on Wheels Program is Hawaii's largest and only island-wide home delivered meal provider for homebound kupuna and other individuals with disabilities. We have witnessed first-hand the increased need for resources to serve Hawaii's rapidly growing kupuna community.

Home delivered meals funded through Kupuna Care are provided to kupuna who have been in-home assessed and deemed eligible by the City & Counties. Many of these kupuna report they do not have access to other sources of healthy and nutritious food beyond what Lanakila Meals on Wheels delivers to them. When we deliver the meals, we often see kupuna living all alone, with empty pantries and refrigerators. In a 2018 survey, 99.2% of the kupuna responded the meals are important to them and help them feel more secure. In addition to the meal, the staff or volunteers may be the only person the kupuna will spend time with that day. The friendly visits and wellness checks contribute to kupuna being able age in place for as long as they can and avoid costly institutionalization. In the same 2018 survey, 97.5% of the kupuna responded the meals help them be independent and continue living at home. Kupuna aging in place results in savings in Medicare spending and is also the preference of the majority of the kupuna we serve.

Kupuna Care has been a lifeline in Hawaii since 1999, and now, more than ever, needs to be fully supported in the base budget to ensure it can continue to serve kupuna who depend on it. The Kupuna Care program will also greatly benefit from having Hawaii Administrative Rules to regulate and guide it so we can continue to successfully deliver services.

Thank you for recognizing the needs of older Americans in the State of Hawaii by voting in favor of fully funding and amending to establish Hawaii Administrative Rules for Kupuna Care.

I am writing in strong support of SB1023 to fully fund the Kupuna Care program. Since 1999, this program has been successful through allowing Kupuna to remain in their own homes and not be forced into nursing homes, which cost upwards of \$150,000 per year.
