## WRITTEN TESTIMONY ONLY

Chair Rhoads and Members of the Committee:

My name is Colin Hayashida, and I am the Insurance Commissioner of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs' (Department) Insurance Division. The Department appreciates the intent of this bill and offers comments.

The purpose of this bill is to require health insurers to provide coverage for a comprehensive category of reproductive health services, drugs, devices, products, and procedures and to prohibit discrimination in the provision of reproductive health care services.

The Department respectfully requests deleting proposed amendments to Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) section 431:10A-116.6 at p. 25, lines 7 to 12, as these amendments may unintentionally narrow the scope of HRS section 431:10A-116.6 and conflicts with HRS article 10A.

One of the coverages is "[w]ell-woman care, as prescribed by the commissioner by rule consistent with guidelines published by the federal Health Resources and Services Administration[.]" The Division lacks expertise in this area and is not the appropriate entity to effectively prescribe well-woman care benefits.

Another coverage is "[a]ny additional preventive services for women that must be covered without cost sharing under title 42 United States Code [U.S.C.] section 300gg-13, as identified by the federal Preventive Services Task Force or the Health Resources and Services Administration of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, as of January 1, 2017." 42 U.S.C. section 300gg-13 does not provide a detailed list of services and instead references guidelines and recommendations issued by agencies. Interpreting these guidelines and recommendations would raise enforcement difficulties.

Additionally, this bill amends the definition of "contraceptive supplies" by adding the phrase "regardless of whether they are to be used by the insured or the partner of the insured, and regardless of whether they are to be used for contraception or exclusively for the prevention of sexually transmitted infections." This amendment seemingly mandates coverage for drugs, devices, or products that are *not* intended for use by the insured, as well as drugs, devices, or products that are intended only for infection prevention, and *not* for contraception. Accordingly, this amendment may be viewed as a new mandate. This bill also sets forth coverage for multiple services on: page 3, line 3 to page 6, line 4; page 10, line 10 to page 13, line 11; and page 17, line 16 to page 20, line 9. These coverages may be viewed as new mandates.

The addition of new mandated coverage may trigger section 1311(d)(3) of the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA), which requires states to defray the additional cost of any benefits in excess of the essential health benefits of the State's qualified health plan under the PPACA.

Additionally, any proposed mandate providing coverage for care requires the passage of a concurrent resolution requesting the State Auditor to prepare and submit a report assessing the social and financial impacts of the proposed mandate, pursuant to HRS section 23-51.

## RE: COMMENTING ON SENATE BILL NO. 1043, SENATE DRAFT 1, RELATING TO HEALTH CARE

Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Wakai, and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii Primary Care Association (HPCA) is a 501(c)(3) organization established to advocate for, expand access to, and sustain high quality care through the statewide network of Community Health Centers throughout the State of Hawaii. The HPCA <u>COMMENTS</u> on Senate Bill No. 1043, Senate Draft 1, RELATING TO HEALTH CARE.

Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) provide desperately needed medical services at the frontlines in rural communities. Long considered champions for creating a more sustainable, integrated, and wellness-oriented system of health, FQHCs provide a more efficient, more effective and more comprehensive system of health.

To date, our Board of Directors continues to analyze this bill with the hope of reaching consensus on an official position. In the meanwhile, we would like to share our perspectives on SECTION 11 of this bill.

SECTION 11 would establish a new section to the Department of Human Services' (DHS) statutes (Chapter 346, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS)) that would prohibit the exclusion from participation in, denial of benefits of, or otherwise subject an individual on the basis of a disability the services, drugs, devices, products, or procedures covered by the Insurance Code for reproductive health care. Persons violating this statute would be considered in violation of Chapter 481, HRS, (Unfair Practices Act), as well as possibly be subjected to a cause of action under State or federal law.

As a recipient of federal funding, FQHCs are prohibited from providing abortion services to patients. FQHCs, are also contracted with DHS for reimbursement under the Hawaii Medicaid Program and as such must follow the statutes, rules, and policies of DHS.

Presently, the following are unclear to us:

- (1) If a physician at an FQHC refuses to perform an abortion at an FQHC facility in accordance with federal mandate, would the physician be in violation of SECTION 11?
- (2) If a physician at an FQHC refers a patient to another health care professional to perform an abortion, would that be considered a denial of service in violation of SECTION 11?
- (3) If yes is answered for either question (1) or (2) above, would the Federal Tort Claim Act, which provides immunity for physicians and personnel conducting services at an FQHC, apply to a cause of action that originates in State court pursuant to SECTION 11?

While we agree with the underlying premise that mandatory reproductive health coverage will improve the health care outcomes of our citizenry, we also believe that possible conflicts in federal and State policy can have catastrophic consequences for health care professionals who must follow the mandates from both.

We will continue to research these issues and monitor this bill as it proceeds through the legislative process.

Dear Chair Rhoads, Vice-Chair Wakai and members of the Committee on Judiciary:

On behalf of Bayer US ("Bayer"), I write to respectfully submit testimony in SUPPORT of Senate Bill 1043. As a global leader in women's healthcare – and the premier manufacturer of both short-term and long-term birth control products – Bayer strongly supports efforts to ensure that women have access to all forms of FDA approved contraception. As such, Bayer strongly supports the provisions of SB 1043 which would enshrine the Affordable Care Act (ACA) contraceptive mandate into state law and ensure that women in Hawaii continue to have access to the birth control method that best meets their individual needs.

Since the passage of the Affordable Care Act (ACA), most health insurance plans are required to cover all FDA approved birth control methods with no co-pay. As a result, determinations regarding the best contraceptive choices are left to patients and their doctors and are not influenced by co-pays or other medical management techniques that have the potential to steer women towards less effective methods of contraception. Prior to the ACA contraceptive mandate, only 42% of women had access to a hormonal intrauterine device (IUD) – which the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG) classifies as the most effective form of reversible contraceptive – without a co-pay. After the ACA was implemented, the percentage of women with zero co-pay access to IUDs has increased to almost 90 percent. Not surprisingly, improved access to more effective contraception has coincided with a continued drop in the rate of teenage pregnancy, unintended pregnancy, and abortion in the United States.

Despite this progress, legislative and regulatory efforts to weaken the ACA at the federal level threaten the continuation of the contraceptive mandate. To ensure that women continue to have affordable access to the contraceptive method that works best for them, several states — including California, Illinois, Nevada, Washington, and Oregon — have already adopted state legislation that codifies the ACA's contraceptive mandate. Multiple other states are considering similar legislation this year. By passing SB 1043, the Legislature will ensure that Hawaii maintains its leadership role in ensuring access to vital preventative services and continues its progress towards reducing the rate of unintended pregnancies and the associated costs to the State's Medicaid program.

It is important to note that SB 1043 would not favor one birth control method over another and would not prohibit the substitution for a generic or lower cost branded product in cases where an FDA approved therapeutic equivalent to the prescribed product is available. As such, the bill ensures that women have access to the birth control method that best meets their needs, while still allowing health plans to manage costs by covering a lower cost option when appropriate.

For these reasons, Bayer supports SB 1043.

## SB 1043, SD1 Relating to Health Care

Chair, Vice Chairs, and committee members, thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony on this measure mandating coverage for a comprehensive category of reproductive health services, drugs, devices, products, and procedures.

## Kaiser Permanente Hawaii would like to offer comments.

Kaiser is concerned that this bill attempts to mandate new coverage beyond the ACA, and therefore, an impact assessment report is statutorily required under Sections 23-51 and 23-52 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. Furthermore, any addition of a new mandated coverage may trigger section 1311(d)(3) of the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, which would require the State to defray the cost.

Additionally, Kaiser is concerned with the latest amendment requiring "<u>A bill or statement for services</u> from any health care provider or insurer shall be sent directly to the person receiving the services."

Currently, the subscriber, employer or guarantor is the only entity that receives health plan information, including billing and EOB statements. These are the same entities responsible/eligible for enrollment and dues payment. Therefore, this amendment would impact insurer's current workflow by requiring information for services to be now sent to the patient, even when the health plan may not be aware that such information has been deemed confidential.

However, the federal privacy rule (HIPAA) already gives a patient the right to request confidential services, i.e., by making an appointment confidential, and request that billing be sent to whatever address desired. See HIPAA §164.522(b)(1). Therefore, if a patient wants information to be kept confidential, he is already afforded that confidential protection under the federal privacy rule. Therefore, there is no need for this duplicative requirement which will also have the unintended consequence of disrupting insurer's current business practice.

As a section of the Nation's leading group of physicians dedicated to improving health care for women, the Hawai'i Section of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (HI ACOG) represents more than 200 obstetrician-gynecologist physicians in our state. HI ACOG **strongly supports SB 1043\_SD1** as it aims to protect access to comprehensive sexual and reproductive health care services in Hawai'i.

Hawai'i has a legacy of progressive action and legislation regarding reproductive rights, family planning, and access to basic health care services. However, as the current national political climate aims to restrict access to reproductive health services, it is imperative that Hawai'i enact this new legislation in order to protect these fundamental services for future generations.

As women's health care providers, we see on a daily basis how women in our state depend on access to a wide spectrum of reproductive health care services, including screening and treatment for sexually transmitted infections; cervical cancer screening and treatment; contraceptive counseling; affordable contraceptive supplies and prescriptions; abortion and miscarriage management; and comprehensive well-woman and postpartum care. Every patient we have the privilege to care for has needed one of more of these services during the course of her life, and having access to these medications, services, and procedures without prohibitive costs allows that patient to receive timely, evidence-based health care. We also see the devastating health consequences that occur when a patient does not have access to these basic services. It is not infrequent that a simple treatable disease such as an abnormal pap smear progresses to late stage metastatic cancer due to lack of access to basic health care services. By supporting legislation that promotes access to basic health care services, patients can more easily navigate through difficult health conditions, and more quickly return to their lives, to their families, and to contributing to our community. Furthermore, numerous studies have shown that public investment in reproductive health and family planning services saves far more in long term health care costs.

This legislation would also ensure that all people in Hawai'i can access these critical services regardless of gender or sexual orientation. Let's continue to be one of this nation's leaders in ensuring reproductive health care access for all. HI ACOG **strongly supports SB 1043\_SD1** and urges you to do the same. The Hawaii Medical Service Association (HMSA) appreciates the opportunity to testify on SB 1043, SD1 which requires health insurers, mutual benefit societies, and health maintenance organizations to provide coverage for a comprehensive category of reproductive health services, drugs, devices, products, and procedures. Prohibits discrimination in the provision of reproductive health care services.

HMSA appreciates the intent of this measure, to preserve certain aspects of the Affordable Care Act for the residents of Hawaii, despite the uncertainties surrounding the current Presidential administration's efforts to "repeal and replace" the Affordable Care Act. HMSA has always worked to ensure it provides reproductive benefits to its members.

However, we have serious concerns on this measure as it appears to add coverage beyond the Affordable Care Act, and will result in increased costs to the healthcare system. The requirement of "no-copay's" on all services in this bill goes against cost sharing that is routinely applied to other medical conditions. We also have concerns on the section of the bill that mandates payment to out of network providers.

We ask that should this bill move forward it should be subject to an impact assessment report by the Auditor pursuant to Sections 23-51 and 23-52 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes.

The current federal administration continues to pursue restrictions on health care access and to undermine consumer protections. Having been largely thwarted in Congress they have turned to federal rule making. Most recently, the **federal administration has sought to enact rules that would allow employers to refuse to provide contraception coverage on the basis of moral or religious reasons**. Although a federal court has issued a nationwide injunction preventing these rules from going into effect, the rules are still a threat as it is highly likely that the decision will be appealed to the Supreme Court. The federal administration has also proposed rules that would make it extremely difficult for insurers to cover abortion. Without SB1043, insurers will most certainly consider dropping or limiting coverage these essential reproductive health services.

Given these federal attacks on basic rights and health care, it is more important than ever that our state legislature act to ensure that nobody loses access to the health care and protections they depend on. SB1043 will do just that. This legislation would codify the Affordable Care Act's preventive service coverage requirements in state law, ensuring that people in Hawaii don't lose their access to no-copay preventive services such as birth control, well-woman exams, and life-saving cancer screenings. It would also strengthen and expand these coverage requirements by requiring coverage of the full range of sexual and reproductive health care services, including abortion and treatment to avoid HIV.
