Chair Mizuno, Chair Ohno, and Members of the Committees:

My name is Lee Ann Teshima, and I am the Executive Officer of the Board of Nursing (Board). The Board offers comments only on Section 1 of this bill.

The purposes of this bill are to: (1) authorize advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs) to perform medical or aspiration abortions if certain requirements are met; and (2) clarify who may refuse to perform an abortion and the notice procedures for refusal.

The Board appreciates S.D. 1's inclusion of language recommended by the Board and specifying that an APRN may perform an abortion by medication or aspiration within the first trimester of pregnancy, provided that the APRN: (1) has prescriptive authority; (2) practices within their nurse's practice specialty; (3) completes a Board-approved specified training program that includes a clinical component; and (4) as a valid, unrevoked, and unencumbered license.

Current training for APRNs may vary depending upon the APRN's practice specialty. While some APRNs may have the requisite training to perform aspiration abortions, this board believes that the additional safeguards set forth in S.D. 1 are appropriate to ensure APRNs are qualified to perform aspiration abortions within their practice specialty.

For the Committees' information, California enacted legislation allowing nurse practitioners (referred to as APRNs in Hawaii) and certified nurse midwives to perform abortions by aspiration techniques during the first trimester of pregnancy. In addition, in January 2019, New York enacted legislation allowing healthcare practitioners, including APRNs, to perform aspiration abortions within their scope of practice.

Dear Chairs Ohno and Mizuno, Vice Chairs Kobayashi and Kobayashi, and Honorable Members.

The Hawai'i State Commission on the Status of Women <u>supports</u> SB415 SD1, which would authorize advanced practice registered nurses to perform aspiration abortions.

In 1970, Hawai'i became the first state to legalize abortion outside of rape, incest or when the pregnancy would impair a woman's physical or mental health. Today, Hawai'i has joined more politically conservative states in restricting qualified, licensed clinicians from performing abortions. Due to the physician-only abortion restriction under state law, the right to abortion in Hawai'i remains illusory.

Geographical barriers to abortion access are compounded by both Hawai'i's doctor shortage and the current law, which prohibits licensed, qualified health care professionals from providing aspiration abortion. Aspiration abortion, also referred to as surgical abortion, remains the most common procedure for terminating a pregnancy in the first trimester. The Commission argues that the state has no compelling interest in restricting trained clinicians from providing aspiration abortions.

Further, this measure would have a profound impact on women in rural and medically underserved communities in our state where abortion services are scarce. Accordingly, the Commission ask that the Committee pass SB415 SD1.

Dear Chairs Mizuno and Ohno and Members of the Committees,

Planned Parenthood Votes Northwest and Hawaii ("PPVNH") writes in strong support of S.B. 415, SD1, which would remove burdensome and unnecessary restrictions on abortion access in Hawaii. We also request an amendment to recognize that, as medical technology and practices advance, other provider types may become qualified to provide safe and effective abortion care.

Abortion Access in Hawaii

Current Hawaii law prohibits anybody other than physicians and surgeons from providing abortions. However, other types of providers, including advanced registered nurse practitioners ("APRNs") can provide equally safe abortion care. A 2018 review by the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine examined available research comparing the outcomes of abortions provided by physicians with those provided by nurse practitioners and other advanced practice clinicians. This review concluded that APRNS are just as capable of providing safe and effective abortion care when they have received proper training.¹

The same review concluded that limits that prevent otherwise-qualified providers from providing abortions "are more burdensome for women who reside far from providers and/or who have limited resources." This is true in Hawaii, where our state's provider restrictions have led to a shortage of abortion providers that presents a real-life barrier to access for many people in Hawaii. Without the ability to access abortion in real life, the legal right to an abortion is meaningless for people in Hawaii.

We know that many people in Hawaii live on an island without a provider or with limited access to a provider. People on Kauai, Molokai and Lanai must travel to Oahu or Maui for care. On the Big Island, abortion care is only provided one day per month and on Maui, one day every other week. When people face such geographic barriers to abortion access, they are forced to travel long distances to access care, increasing costs for travel, lodging, childcare, and other expenses and sometimes delaying care. If people are unable to travel to

another county or another island due to these costs or other barriers, they may not be able to access abortion at all.

The Impact on People in Hawaii

Planned Parenthood has seen firsthand the negative impact that this unnecessary barrier has on our patients and on the ability of people in Hawaii to access the care they need. In 2018, more than ten percent of our abortion patients in Hawaii had to travel between islands to receive abortion care. There are likely many other people who are unable to travel between islands who do not receive the care they need.

This provider restriction also negatively impacts Planned Parenthood's ability to provide accessible health care that meets the needs of our patients. Because many providers are not currently allowed to provide abortion care, Hawaii has a significant shortage of abortion providers. This shortage limits Planned Parenthood's ability to provide scheduling flexibility to our patients, making our services less accessible for some patients. It also burdens the abortion providers themselves, who often spend large amounts of time traveling between islands to meet the need for abortion.

Join the Growing Number of States Removing Burdensome Physician-Only Requirements

S.B. 415 is a simple, commonsense solution to these challenges for patients and providers. Other states have already taken similar steps to decrease barriers to abortion access. For example, both California and Oregon already allow APRNs to independently provide both medication and aspiration abortions. On February 1st, 2019, the Attorney General of Washington issued an opinion stating that APRNs can provide abortions in Washington state without a physician being present.² And other states that have left similarly burdensome restrictions in place, including Maine and Montana, are experiencing legal challenges to these restrictions.

In the recent Supreme Court case *Whole Woman's Health v. Hellerstedt*, the Court stated that any regulation that places a substantial obstacle for people seeking abortion or that unduly burdens abortion access violates the Fourteenth Amendment. Washington's recent Attorney General opinion recognized that restricting qualified providers such as APRNs from providing abortions is likely to place an undue burden on people seeking abortion because it unnecessarily restricts access while conferring no medical benefit. The opinion noted that "we think it is unclear whether a physician-only requirement would survive a Fourteenth Amendment challenge in light of *Whole Woman's Health* and the National Academies' recent conclusions that non-physicians can safely and effectively provide medication and aspiration abortions."

S.B. 415 also complies with *Whole Women's Health* in that it seeks to remove other provisions that may constitute undue burdens to women seeking access to abortion care. These include the removal of unnecessary and excessive criminal penalties that intimidate abortion

providers and restrict access to care, the removal of a hospital exception and a requirement that doctors provide notice when they object to performing abortions.

Currently, statute allows both individual health care providers and entire hospitals to refuse to provide abortions. Allowing hospitals to opt out of providing abortions creates a significant barrier to people seeking abortion. This is particularly true when an individual needs an abortion due to a medical emergency and may not be able to safely go to another hospital for the care they need.

Hawaii legislators should remove undue burdens that prevent people in Hawaii from accessing the care they need by passing S.B. 415, SD1.

Steps to Further Improve Abortion Access

We also respectfully request an amendment to this legislation. Specifically, we request that legislators strengthen S.B. 415 by bringing it in line with the more robust improvements proposed in H.B. 1434.³ This bill goes a step further than S.B. 415 by recognizing that future advancements in the practice of medicine may allow additional provider types to safely and effectively provide abortion by allowing additional provider types to provide abortion if they are qualified to do so.

S.B. 415 should be amended to recognize that, as medical technology and practices advance, other provider types may become qualified to provide safe and effective abortion care. This will improve access to abortion care by allowing additional qualified health care providers to perform abortion. This amendment will strengthen this legislation and do more to improve the ability of all people in Hawaii to access the health care they need.

Hawaii has long been a leader in expanding and protecting access to the full spectrum of sexual and reproductive health care, including abortion. Our current provider restrictions reduce health care access without any benefit to the health or safety of people in Hawaii, creating an undue burden for people in Hawaii seeking abortion care. We urge legislators to support S.B 415 to remove unnecessary barriers to abortion and make sure that all people in Hawaii, no matter where in the state they live, can access safe, legal abortion care.

Thank you for this opportunity to testify in support of this commonsense legislation to improve health care access in our state.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit a testimony in support of SB415 SD1, which would authorize the advanced practice registered nurses to perform aspiration abortions.

As you know, Hawaii's unique geography combined with our outdated physician-only restriction on abortion creates unnecessary barriers to the women seeking abortion. The barriers are greater to those who cannot afford the time and/or money to travel between islands.

A growing number of research shows that advanced practice clinicians – nurse practitioners, certified nurse midwives, and physician assistants – are able to safely provide both medical and surgical abortion.¹ The American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG) also recommends training and allowing advanced practice clinicians to provide abortion.² AAUW of Hawaii supports this bill for it would expand access to reproductive health for women of Hawaii.

The American Association of University Women (AAUW) of Hawaii is a state-wide organization made up of six branches (Hilo, Honolulu, Kauai, Kona, Maui, and Windward Oahu) and includes just over 450 active members with over 1700 supporters statewide. As advocates for gender equity, AAUW of Hawaii promotes the economic, social, and physical well-being of all persons.

Hawaii Family Forum is a non-profit, pro-family education organization committed to preserving and strengthening life, family and religious freedom in Hawaii. Although we are on record opposing abortion in any form, and remain so, we are mindful that it is already legal and available in Hawaii. Current Hawaii law is appropriate in its restrictions to only allow a physician, surgeon or an osteopathic physician and surgeon from providing aspiration abortions.

Abortion, the killing of the unborn, is a medical procedure and as with any other medical procedure, laws are established to ensure the mother's safety. No matter what side of the debate you are on, everyone should appreciate this extra layer of protection. Regulations on access to abortions are necessary to protect the health and life of women who do choose to have an abortion and, to whatever extent possible, reduce the number of women who make such a choice

We have serious reservations against adding Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRN) to the list of medical personnel that can perform medical or aspiration abortions. Currently, our understanding is that only five states (Montana, Oregon, New Hampshire, Vermont & California) allow advanced practice clinicians to provide first-trimester medication and aspiration abortions.

Finding any true statistics on complications of abortion (including death) is already virtually impossible because according to the national Centers for Disease Control (CDC) "states and areas *voluntarily report* data to CDC for inclusion in its annual Abortion Surveillance Report. CDC's Division of Reproductive Health prepares surveillance reports as data become available. There is *no national requirement* for data submission or reporting." (Emphasis mine.)

There are some states that have debated restrictions on abortion including hospital admitting privileges, bans on abortion at 20 weeks, bans on tele-medicine and webcast chemical abortion and abortion clinic health regulations. Instead of expanding access to abortion, we should support increased funding for abstinence education, heightening awareness about adoption, supporting counseling services for women with unwanted pregnancies and establishing parental notification.

Attached is a petition signed by over 80 people (to date) in Hawai'i done through VoterVOICE and only includes residents with a bona fide address. To protect their privacy, only their zip code and city was provided. Along with these members of the community, we strongly encourage you to hold this bill and keep the current restrictions in place.

I have received care from APRNs on many occasions, and find them to be extremely knowledgeable, skilled, and caring for their patients. Indeed, the information and care provided to me by APRNs has often included much better explanations, informed consents, and details on self-care than physicians provide, because physicians are often more limited in time they can devote to a patient.

Hawaii has long been a leader in expanding and improving access to reproductive health care, including abortion. But this time, we are missing the mark. - 1) It does not provide protection for faith-based hospitals. These hospitals should not be forced to provide any type of abortion, procedures which are in direct conflict of their stated mission and in conflict with the beliefs of some of the people who work there. Chairmen Mizuno and Ohno, Vice Chairs B. Kobayashi and D. Kobayashi, and Members:

- 1. Women in Hawaii have unfettered access to abortion. According to the <u>Guttmacher Institute</u>: "Hawaii does not have any of the major types of abortion restrictions—such as waiting periods, mandated parental involvement or limitations on publicly funded abortions—often found in other states."
- 2. SB415 SD1 is an affront to women. By considering the degradation of health care services demanded in the invasive procedure of removing a baby from a woman's womb prior to the normal delivery you are lowering the standard of care that women deserve to receive. There are numerous complications that can arise during this procedure including death. An interesting term "medication" abortion. Isn't' a medication supposed to cure not kill? It is a chemical abortion not medication. Pregnancy is not a disease. Dr. Anthony Levatino, a former abortionist explains what happens in an "aspiration" abortion and the risks associated with the procedure here. Risks include laceration or perforation of the uterus; damaging the uterus, intestine, and nearby blood vessels; hemorrhage, infection, future pre-mature/early delivery, infertility and even death. This bill glosses over the seriousness of the procedure and returns us to the "back alley" days of the past.
- 3. Several years ago there was a truck that drove the streets of Honolulu with pictures of "the products of conception" i.e. aborted babies. There was outrage because the images were so graphically barbaric. Think about it. Anyone who performs these life-ending procedures day after day must eventually awaken to inhumane nature of abortion and the fact that a human being must die for the procedure to be a success. Many pro-abortion doctors abandoned the practice and became life advocates including Dr. Anthony Levatino, Dr. Bernard Nathanson and Dr. John Bruchalski. Planned Parenthood managers such as Abby Johnson, left the organization because of the brutality perpetrated on a tiny human being during the abortion. Abby Johnson started a non-profit called "And Then There Were None" to help people leave the abortion business. Many employees in abortion related service providers are traumatized by the abortion procedure and hope to find a way out. Abby's non-profit helps them transition into more

rewarding jobs. It is not surprising that some doctors, especially those who admit performing the procedure, are advocates of this bill. If the procedure could be delegated to nurses, it could be a great relief to the abortion doctor's consciences. For most doctors, the abortion procedure violates the very core of the medical profession – to save lives, not take lives.

- 4. If abortion weren't so lucrative, there might not be any physicians willing to perform the unethical and immoral procedure. Some states have to <u>fly in doctors</u> because of the unsavory nature of the act. Sad as it may be that Hawaii forces all residents to financially contribute to this horrific act, it would be much sadder if Hawaii reduced the level of training and experience of the individuals performing the procedures, and worse still if Hawaii eliminated conscience protections for medical staff. No one, in any circumstance, should ever be forced to participate in the taking of human life as occurs in both abortion and "aid in dying" procedures. No one should be discriminated in employment because they don't want to kill any of their patients. This bill does not afford this essential protection to medical professionals and that is very wrong. Medical professionals who only want to save lives must be protected by the state and never should the state be allowed to infringe upon their conscience rights.
- 5. Another of the most egregious aspects of the bill is paragraph 2. d. that makes violations of the law subject to a paltry \$1000 fine, not a criminal act. Because a woman does not always choose abortion when her "partner" desires the abortion, the women's health, safety, and even life may be in jeopardy. Many a pregnant women has been murdered or severely injured because she did not "choose" an abortion. For example, earlier this year, Michigan law as reported in the Detroit Free Press, "Kahlil Arron-Shabzz Ellison, 22, of Pontiac, was arraigned Jan. 20, 2019, after he was charged with assault pregnant individual intentionally causing miscarriage/still birth-life. Ellison was given a \$1 million bond." In Hawaii, would this type of miscarriage of justice only result in a \$1,000.00 fine if this bill passes? Is this just an "abortion" carried out by someone who is not a medial professional? This would be a serious injustice to pregnant women and their unborn children. We can't let legislation like this pass in our state.
- 6. When you vote in favor of expanding abortion service providers, you are condoning the barbaric/demonic procedure. In our hearts we know abortion is wrong. That is why we make up euphemisms such as "choice", "clump of cells", "products of conception" instead of calling it what is it: a dead baby. Hawaii Life Alliance believes that life begins at conception and ends at natural death. We are also committed to supporting those through non-judgmental love and support, pregnancy education and healthy options, who are facing and unplanned pregnancy.

According to a May 2018 Guttmacher Institute report, Hawaii does NOT have any of the MAJOR types of restrictions-such as waiting periods, mandated parental involvement or limitations on publicly funded abortions-often found in other states.

We are grateful, that although, opposed to abortion, Hawaii allows only doctor's and surgeons to provide surgical (suction aspiration) and medical (medication) abortions.

One argument that pro-choice groups often use is that abortion is safe and rare. (Allowing non MD's to perform surgical and medical abortions would be less safe) Also, in this case expanding surgical and medical abortions will most likely increase abortions in Hawaii. We must also keep in mind, minor girls are able to obtain and abortion without at the very least, parental notification.

On The American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (who support this measure) website: www.acog.org, FAQ page states:

What should I expect during a medical abortion?

The drugs used in a medical abortion will cause bleeding that is much heavier than a menstrual period. There may be severe cramping. Nausea, vomiting, fever, and chills may occur. You can take over-the-counter pain medication. Your health care provider also may prescribe stronger pain medication if needed. It can take several days or weeks for the abortion to be complete.

<u>Do I need to follow-up with my health care provider after having a medical abortion?</u>

You will need to see your health care provider within 2 weeks to *MAKE SURE* the abortion *IS COMPLETE*. If you are still pregnant after taking the medication, you may be given another dose of medication or you may need to have a surgical abortion. Continuing the pregnancy is not recommended because the drugs used for medical abortion are known to cause severe birth defects. (My emphasis added)

I submit, is it fair or even realistic to subject 14, 15, 16, 17 etc. year old girls to be in the counsel and medical care of an APRN with the possible severe outcomes that ACOG themselves admit can potentially occur - without extensive years of training and experience? Wouldn't you agree the expertise of a doctor would clearly be best equipped to perform and prescribe abortions on Hawaii's youth and woman in general?

Lawmakers, please do what is right and not allow this bill to move out of this committee. This is not about being radically pro-life, but rather being radically responsible for the medical care of our keiki and women.

LEGISLATORS: If you only have a short amount of time to read a few testimonies, PLEASE READ THIS ONE! The future of women's health is at stake.

Supporters of this bill will state that "abortions are so safe, APRNs can do them with proper training". The logic of this claim is a fallacy and WOULD PUT WOMEN'S HEALTH AT RISK. You may hear arguments like "abortions are less likely to have complications than people who have their wisdom teeth removed"1 (Time Magazine 12/9/14), or hear others comparing the safety record of abortions to other "easy" medical procedures. Please don't fall for these fallacy arguments. Consider these points:

1. Historical safety data is based on DOCTORS performing the surgery!

State legislators should not be putting women at risk for subpar healthcare based on safety statistics being performed by doctors. Doctors are the most qualified to perform surgery.

2) CAPABLE does not mean BEST

Just because an APRN is **capable** of performing the surgery, does't mean a women's health should be placed at a greater risk. It's that 1 in 1,000 when something goes wrong and a women is grateful there is a doctor in the room to deal with the complication. That women, the 1 in 1,000, is not a statistic, she is a person worthy of the **best** care available.

3) Risk of DEATH

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), during 2008 - 2012, there was one maternal death for every 153,846 legally induced abortions in the United States.2 A surgical abortion isn't the same as removing a skin tag (where use of APRNs is prevalent)3. A surgical abortion is serious business, requiring the best available care to women. And now that MEDICAL abortions has also been added to this bill, the risk is even greater since the complication rate is GREATER with medical abortions.

4) EXPERIENCE Does Matter

One of the leading abortion providers in Australia admits that an experienced surgeon helps to reduce the most serious complication. Per their website: "Perforation of the uterus, where the surgical instruments make a hole in the wall, is potentially the most serious complication but fortunately is rare with an **experienced surgeon**."4

5) Eye Industry Example

If you were personally going in for eye surgery, such as cataract surgery, would you go to an ophthalmologist or an Optometrists? Does it really matter because "cataract surgery is very common and is generally a safe procedure",5 and "statistics suggest that the lifetime risk of a detached retina as a cataract surgery complication in the United States is about 1 percent."6 Sound similar to the arguments in support of this bill?

Yet, here is what that industry has to say about this: "An ophthalmologist is a medical doctor, and a qualified eye surgeon. Only medical eye doctors called Ophthalmologists are licensed properly to perform eye surgery. **Never** risk losing your vision for a cheaper priced vision correction surgery with anyone other than a medical eye doctor."7

Given these five points, there are no legitimate reasons worthy of **intentionally putting women's healthcare at risk** by placing surgery in the hands of mid-level providers. We are not talking about skin tags here. Abortion is surgery with a real risk of death. Just because the numbers are low, like cataract surgery, doesn't mean you should allow mid-level providers to perform these procedures.

For this reason, I STRONGLY OPPOSE SB415, and hope you will vote NO.

Chairs Mizuno and Ohno, Vice Chairs, and Committee Members,

My name is Kerrie Villers, and I submit my testimony in **strong opposition**to SB415 SD1.

While aspiration abortion is often presented as a "straightforward" procedure that is simple and feasible for health professionals other than physicians to carry out, the fact remains that it is still a surgical procedure, and there are numerous surgical procedures that are "straightforward", yet only physicians or doctors (dentist, podiatrist, etc.) are allowed to perform. This is because there is ALWAYS a risk of complication associated with surgery no matter how routine.

In 2015, over 70% of abortions nationally were aspiration abortions and though the rate of complications is low, the fact remains that there are unintended complications that arise from this surgical procedure, as there may be from any procedure. Complications such as anesthesia reactions, cervical lacerations, perforations, and hemorrhaging, may necessitate urgent care and hospitalization thereafter, which truly makes this a health concern for women undergoing the procedure. This risk compels me to ask that this medical procedure continue to be reserved to physicians as we do other standard medical procedures that have relatively low risk, such as dental care.

Should this legislature consider providing APRNs licenses to perform surgeries, I should hope that it would be in an area of medicine that would more proportionately affect the entire population and not be one that would adversely affect only women's health.

This bill also restricts conscientious objection by stripping hospitals of their free choice in participating in abortions, which may conflict with the ethical and religious values held by certain institutions. The exemption for hospitals was well thought out before and should remain.

Finally, this bill places a new and unnecessary burden on nurses by requiring written notice in order to not participate in an abortion. I am concerned for nurses who may not be aware that they have to meet this new mandate in order to not violate their conscience. I also am alarmed at the fact that the conscientious objection is not absolute in this bill since the clause "refusal does not cause a serious risk to another person's health or life" indicates that under certain conditions, a nurse who has already clearly objected to participation may be required to do what he or she finds ethically objectionable. It is precisely because the nurse sees participation as causing serious risk to another person's health or life that the nurse has objected. Additionally, what constitutes "serious risk to ... health" is not defined making it unclear the conditions under which a nurse could be forced to participate.

For the above reasons, I humbly ask that you not pass this bill. It proposes changes to the law that are not good for women's health and safety, for our nurses, and for hospitals in general. Thank you for your consideration.

The Hawai'i Section of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (HI ACOG) represents more than 200 obstetrician-gynecologist physicians in our state, and we support SB 415 SD1. Advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs) are integral to women's healthcare in Hawai'i. Under current Hawai'i statutes, these highly-trained clinicians are already authorized to practice independently and they provide non-surgical abortion services. SB415 SD1 will allow trained APRNs to provide surgical abortions. This bill has several potential benefits for the women of Hawai'i:

- As the majority of surgical abortions take place in the first trimester, this bill has the potential to significantly improve access to comprehensive reproductive care for women in Hawai'i.
- Many women routinely receive well-woman care from an APRN. This bill would give those women the
 option to maintain continuity of care while undergoing surgical abortions. This continuity may help some
 women avoid the burden of travel and additional clinic appointments to see a physician for these same
 services.

Not only have many of us worked with APRNs and can attest to their competency and skill, the safety of trained APRNs performing this procedure has been demonstrated. This conclusion was recently confirmed by the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine, a non-partisan source that provides objective assessments of science and technology. 2

After a successful multi-year pilot program, California passed a similar law, expanding first-trimester surgical abortion provision to nurse practitioners, certified nurse midwives, and physician assistants.³ HI ACOG hopes Hawai'i can benefit from the conclusions of this California pilot program and use this data to support our own evidence-based legislation to expand timely access to safe abortion services in Hawai'i.

HI ACOG supports evidence-based legislation such as SB415 SB1 that would increase access to comprehensive women's healthcare. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

Chair Mizuno, Chair Ohno, Vice Chair B. Kobayashi, Vice Chair D. Kobayashi, and members of the House Committees on Health and Intrastate Commerce, thank you for this opportunity to provide written comments related to this bill, SB415, SD1. This bill, if enacted, authorizes advanced practice registered nurses to perform aspiration abortions.

The mission of the Hawai'i State Center for Nursing is that through collaborative partnerships, the Center provides accurate nursing workforce data for planning, disseminates nursing knowledge to support excellence in practice and leadership development, promotes a diverse workforce, and advocates for sound health policy to serve the changing health care needs of the people of Hawaii.

The Center offers the following information for your committee's review:

- California, New York, Montana, Oregon, Vermont, and New Hampshire laws or rules enable non-physician providers to perform abortions. The two most recent enacted legislation is from California and New York.

The American Civil Liberties Union of Hawai'i ("ACLU of Hawai'i") writes in support of S.B. 415, S.D. 1, which would eliminate significant barriers to healthcare for women in Hawai'i by allowing advanced practice registered nurses ("APRNs") to perform aspiration abortions.

Hawaii's current law requiring abortions to be provided by a physician creates a significant — sometimes, insurmountable — barrier to those who wish to terminate their pregnancy. This law and the burden it creates are so severe that it may render the state vulnerable to constitutional challenges. This limit on who may perform abortions is a burden in and of itself, but is exacerbated by Hawaii's current physician shortage and its geography as an island state. Currently, people on Kauai, Molokai, and Lanai must travel to Oahu or Maui for abortion care. In addition to incurring the high cost of interisland travel, a person may also need to take time off from work, arrange childcare, and book lodging just to see their provider. In 2018, more than ten percent of Planned Parenthood's abortion patients in Hawai'i had to travel between islands to obtain care.

Hawaii's physician-only abortion requirement does not protect women's health or "[offer] medical benefits sufficient to justify the burdens upon access" that the law imposes.² APRNs can

safely provide abortion care.³ Absent such a medical benefit, Hawaii's physician requirement may constitute an undue burden on abortion access, exposing the state to potential litigation similar to what has been brought in Maine.⁴ The U.S. Constitution requires the connection between a law limiting access to abortion and the benefit to women's health to be *real*, and the medical benefit that the law provides for women's health must outweigh any burdens on access that the law creates for women. We believe that Hawaii's law does not survive this test.

For the above reasons, we respectfully request the committees to support this measure. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

As an obstetrician-gynecologist, I have been privileged to work with amazing advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs) in a variety of clinical settings. APRNs are integral to women's healthcare in Hawaii. This bill would allow APRNs to provide surgical abortion services. As the majority of surgical abortions take place in the first trimester, this bill has the potential to significantly improve access to comprehensive reproductive care for women in Hawaii.

The safety of trained APRNs preforming this procedure has been demonstrated through clinical research. This conclusion was recently confirmed by the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine, a non-partisan source that provides objective assessments of science and technology.

I am a third generation Hawaii resident and I am writing tesitmony in strong support of S.B. 415, SD1, which would remove burdensome and unnecessary restrictions on abortion access in Hawaii. Current Hawaii law prohibits anybody other than physicians and surgeons from providing abortions. APRNS are just as capable of providing safe and effective abortion care when they have received proper training.

We know that many people in Hawaii live on an island without a provider or with limited access to a provider. People on Kauai, Molokai and Lanai must travel to Oahu or Maui for care. On the Big Island, abortion care is only provided one day per month and on Maui, one day every other week.

When people face such geographic barriers to abortion access, they are forced to travel long distances to access care, increasing costs for travel, lodging, childcare, and other expenses and sometimes delaying care. If people are unable to travel to another county or another island due to these costs or other barriers, they may not be able to access abortion at all.
