EXECUTIVE OFFICE ON EARLY LEARNING'S POSITION: Support the Intent

Good afternoon. I am Lauren Moriguchi, Director of the Executive Office on Early Learning (EOEL). EOEL supports the intent of S.B. 967, S.D. 1.

We appreciate the Legislature's recognition of the need to increase access to high-quality early learning. We fully support the Commission's request for funding to sustain its 18 pre-K classrooms across the state. EOEL is statutorily responsible for the development of the State's early childhood system that shall ensure a spectrum of high-quality development and learning opportunities for children throughout the state, from prenatal care until the time they enter kindergarten, with priority given to underserved or at-risk children. The charter pre-K classrooms are included in our proposal to increase access to prekindergarten for our keiki – they provide an important option that addresses family choice and provides opportunities in areas that do not have pre-K programs. If the Commission is not able to sustain their currently-operating classrooms, it will be to the detriment of the community.

In its implementation of the 18 pre-K classrooms, the Commission aligns curriculum and assessments to the Hawaii Early Learning and Development Standards, and works toward achieving the quality standards of the National Institute for Early Education Research, as EOEL does for the EOEL Public Prekindergarten Program. We believe the Commission is committed to working with EOEL toward ensuring a high-quality pre-K program for our keiki.

We defer to the Commission regarding the other merits of the bill. Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this bill.

I am Robert G. Peters, Chair of the Early Learning Board (ELB) which is the governing board for the Executive Office of Early Learning (EOEL). Thank you for this opportunity to offer testimony in support S.B. No. 967, S.D. 1 on behalf of the Early Learning Board.

The ELB supports the S.B. No. 967, S.D. 1 appropriation request to continue the 18 charter school classrooms developed with funding from the Federal Preschool Development Grant, received by the Charter School Commission in 2015. 2019 marks the completion of the grant and this appropriation would sustain the quality early learning program opportunities for 360 children across our State.

Knowing the impact that quality learning experiences in pre-K have, particularly upon low income and at-risk children and their families, the ELB believes it is incumbent upon our State to continue the excellent work begun with the Federal start-up funds. The Charter School Commission reports gains on many fronts for the pre-K participants: cognitive, social emotional and physical development as well as language, literacy and math. These are the kinds of positive outcomes that pre-K experience offers our keiki and we don't wish to lose them.

As the governing board for the EOEL, we would like to affirm that charter pre-K classrooms are included in plans to increase access to families, particularly in areas lacking such opportunities, to ensure choice options. In addition, EOEL is committed to working with the Charter Commission to provide high-quality pre-K programs for Hawaii's keiki.

The ELB respectfully requests that the Committee move this bill forward. Thank you again for your consideration and the opportunity to offer testimony.

The Department of Budget and Finance notes that the measure does not provide details on the funding level for the classes or how the funding will be determined. Funding for K-12 classes are based on an equivalent per pupil funding amount provided to the Department of Education schools.

Na Wai Ola Public Charter School appreciates the opportunity to submit this testimony in **SUPPORT of SB 967.**

My name is Caitlin Kryss, and I am a Pre-K teacher at Na Wai Ola Public Charter School in Mountain View, Hawaii. Our Pre-K program was created by the federal Preschool Development Grant (PDG), and since the program's inception, we have seen countless benefits to our students and to their families, including health and developmental screenings for keiki, family engagement events, and high-quality educational experiences for our youngest learners. Mountain View is an economically disadvantaged community, and the proportion of families living below the federal poverty level has increased from 19.9% in 2000 to 23.6% in 2017. Rates of unemployment have remained high (over 40%) and have increased in Mountain View, Hawaii from 42% in 2000 to 52% in 2017 (U.S. Census Bureau, 2000 and 2017).

According to the State of Hawaii, Executive Office of Early Learning (2019), almost half of children in every kindergarten class in Hawaii come to school lacking in social, emotional, physical and cognitive skills vital to their success as early learners because they did not participate in an early learning

program, like preschool. It is 2019. How can we have come so far, and yet our keiki are still so far behind? Is it because 1 in 6 residents in Hawaii live in poverty (Fox, 2017) and the cost of full-time child care, including the majority of preschool programs, represents over 40% of a single parent's income (Child Care Aware of America and Hawaii, 2013)? In economically disadvantaged rural areas, families simply cannot afford private preschool. The achievement gap will only grow if we don't continue to work together to make preschool education accessible to all our keiki, and especially to our most vulnerable populations, like the population we serve at Na Wai Ola PCS.

According to Yoshikawa et al. (2013), preschool experience has been linked to long term benefits for both the individual and for society, especially for children of low income families. The results of the study concluded that preschool has been correlated with lowered high school dropout rates and teenage pregnancies, greater years of education completed, greater income, and reduced crime. Many of these correlations have direct impact on society. Incarceration and welfare incur significant costs to society, both monetarily, and emotionally. According to the Urban Child Institute and the State of Hawaii, Executive Office of Early Learning (2013), persons without preschool education were 2.08 times more likely to be arrested for a misdemeanor, and 2.14 times more likely to be arrested for a felony than those who received preschool education. Furthermore, this report highlights the monetary returns that come from community investment in public preschool. The report states that within a mere four decades, for every dollar the community spent on public preschool, \$5.12 in benefits were returned to private citizens, local, state and federal governments. With this data, we can see that preschool is a worthwhile investment for our government and for our entire society.

As early childhood education (ECE) professionals, we know our work does not and cannot stop at our classroom doors. We must serve as advocates in our communities for young children and their families and engage in ongoing professional development. The PDG provided countless professional

development opportunities for its charter school Pre-K teachers and aides. After nearly 4 years under the grant, we represent a highly-trained workforce dedicated to improving the lives of the keiki in our care and their families. If our charter school Pre-K programs are lost, we lose all that expertise as well. We provide high-quality preschool to children who would otherwise not have access to it without publicly funded programs. Please kokua these communities, their children, and our future and secure the funding to continue the public charter Pre-K programs created under the PDG.

SB967 SD1 RELATING TO THE STATE PUBLIC CHARTER SCHOOL COMMISSION

House Committee on Lower & Higher Education

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) <u>SUPPORTS</u> SB967 SD1, which would amend the charter school law to expressly authorize the State Public Charter School Commission to establish and fund charter school prekindergarten classrooms, and appropriate funds to the Commission to support such classrooms in fiscal year 2019-2020. This measure is necessary to ensure the continuation of a program that benefits young learners, and increases their likelihood of future academic success and positive overall development.

In any given year, there are about 17,000 four-year-old children in Hawai'i, approximately half of whom will enter kindergarten without having attended preschool. Not surprisingly, a significant majority of public school kindergarten teachers report that their new students are not ready for school. Encouraging greater preschool attendance may substantially increase our children's readiness for school, and their chances of success in kindergarten and beyond: research shows that children are more likely to succeed in kindergarten, reach higher levels of educational attainment, and contribute meaningfully to society, among other positive outcomes, when provided with the opportunity for high-quality early childhood education.

In 2014, OHA wrote a letter to the U.S. Department of Education (USDOE), in support of the State's successful application to the USDOE's Preschool Development Grants Program. The State's application proposed to improve kindergarten readiness with an ambitious yet achievable plan, to expand access to high-quality preschool classrooms in high-need communities through a charter school prekindergarten program. Eleven public charter schools, seven of which are Hawaiian culture-based or Hawaiian language immersion schools, currently support prekindergarten classrooms, with charter school directors reporting a significant difference in kindergarten readiness as a result. SB967 SD1 will ensure funding for the continuation of the charter school prekindergarten program, and allow preschool-aged children, including Native Hawaiian keiki, in our public charter schools to continue accessing the advantages of early childhood education.

OHA continues to be a strong supporter of Hawai'i's public charter schools, many of which provide a culturally-grounded education for Native Hawaiian and other children. 17 of the 37 public charter schools in Hawai'i are Hawaiian culture-based or Hawaiian language immersion schools, in which OHA has invested over \$18.6 million between FY 2005-2006 and FY 2016-2017. On October 19, 2017, the OHA Board of Trustees approved an additional \$3 million total to these charter schools for FY 2017-2018 and FY 2018-2019. OHA made this investment because research shows that Hawaiian students exposed to culturally-driven educational strategies have a stronger sense of socio-emotional well-being, deeper engagement with their schools, and a stronger commitment to civic activities in their community, factors which are directly tied to greater academic achievement.

Therefore, OHA urges the Committee to <u>PASS</u> SB967 SD1. Mahalo nui for the opportunity to testify on this measure.

Ho'okāko'o Corporation is in <u>STRONG SUPPORT of S.B. 967, S.D. 1</u> which authorizes the State Public Charter School Commission to establish and fund charter school prekindergarten classrooms.

Two of our charter schools, Kualapu'u School on Moloka'i and Kamaile Academy in Wai'anae, are participating in the Preschool Development Grant program administered by the State Public Charter School Commission, collectively serving nearly 70 prekindergarten children.

Early findings indicate that our prekindergarten students demonstrate increased readiness for Kindergarten and stronger academic performance than students who did not attend prekindergarten as evidenced by DIBELS data on First Sound Fluency and Phoneme Segmentation Fluency. Family engagement activities conducted by our prekindergarten programs are also proving to be an effective means to cultivate increased parental involvement in the education of their children, critical to student academic success.

Our children, all of whom are from low income families, deserve every opportunity that helps them succeed in school and in life. Access to prekindergarten is making a positive impact on the lives of our children.
