DEPARTMENT'S POSITION: The Department of Human Services (DHS) supports efforts of the Legislature, Executive Branch, and Judiciary to invest in the government workforce. Creating job training or fellowship programs to make Hawaii's government jobs more attractive and competitive is necessary to encourage Hawaii residents to remain in Hawaii and gain professional and educational experience while working for the government. DHS also supports development of training and fellowship programs or pathways for residents with different levels of educational achievement that create opportunity to pursue additional education or skills training while working for the government. Time is of the essence to design job training strategies that increase capacities and competencies of the government workforce to address the rapid economic changes brought about by technology, the gig economy, artificial intelligence, and climate change.
