Effective 7/1/2050. (HD1)

The Hawaii State Department of Education (Department) supports HB 1525, HD1.

If enacted, this bill will help the Department's School Food Services Branch streamline and standardize reporting obligations for Acts 175 and 176, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021. Combined, this bill and those two Acts facilitate status reports of the Department's progress in meeting the local farm-to-school meal goals.

Dear Chair Johanson and Members of the Committee:

My name is Micah Munekata, and I am the Director of Government Affairs at Ulupono Initiative. We are a Hawai'i-focused impact investment firm that strives to improve the quality of life throughout the islands by helping our communities become more resilient and self-sufficient through locally produced food; renewable energy and clean transportation; and better management of freshwater and waste.

Ulupono supports the intent of HB 1525 HD 1, which provides additional guidance and updates the reporting obligations for State departments, including the Department of Education (DOE), pursuant to Act 175 and 176 (2021), which establish programmatic goals for the purchase and procurement of locally sourced products.

Ulupono supports this bill's attempt at ensuring that all food purchased is captured by State departments in each report to the Legislature. However, the current reporting language required of DOE by Act 175, is important to providing key snapshot data on food purchases and program administration for what is essentially the State's largest kitchen. The current reporting items include DOE's school meal county data, costs of food and meals, savings realized, local seller and distributor data, menu development, and trainings conducted. This information, if reported upon, will provide critical baseline information to inform the Legislature, the Administration, and the public on strategic progress toward meeting the DOE's legislatively mandated local sourcing goal.

We note that DOE does mention in its Act 175 report a need for resources to build strategic internal controls, such as a developed centralized data system. We recommend adding resources to the DOE to develop this data system to be implemented in a timely manner.

The Hawaii Farm Bureau supports HB 1525, HD1, which provides additional guidance and updates the reporting obligations for state departments, including the department of education, pursuant to Acts 175 and 176 (SLH 2021), which established programmatic goals for the purchase and procurement of locally sourced products.

HFB strongly supports the increased use of locally grown agricultural products, fruits, vegetables, meats, dairy, and poultry products in our state institutions.

On behalf of the Hawai'i Farm to School Hui, thank you for the opportunity to testify in **support of HB1525 HD1**, which provides additional guidance and updates the reporting obligations for state departments, including the department of education, pursuant to Acts 175 and 176 (SLH 2021), which established programmatic goals for the purchase and procurement of locally sourced products.

Acts 175 and 176 (SLH 2021) are very important to advancing farm to school and farm to state efforts in Hawai'i. We appreciate that this bill improves and aligns the reporting requirements of both Acts.

We also note that it may be beneficial to **require reporting on the total purchases and total local purchases by produce category**, as reported by the Department of Public Safety in the table on page 4 of the [Governor's Report to the 2022 Legislature on Act 176, SLH 2021](#).

The **Hawai'i Farm to School Hui** is a statewide network comprising five Island Networks and over forty public-private entities with a collective mission to strengthen Hawaii's farm to school movement. The three pillars of successful farm to school programs are: 1) school gardens and on-campus farms, 2) food education, and 3) school food improvements through local procurement. The Hui formed in 2010 and is a program of Hawai'i Public Health Institute.

The Hawai'i Farm to School Hui appreciates this Committee's strong support of farm to school and farm to state, and respectfully requests that the Committee continue this support by passing this bill.
