- 1 **Fiscal Implications:** Costs to implement this measure will impact the priorities identified in the
- 2 Governor's Executive Budget Request for the Department of Health's (Department)
- 3 appropriations and personnel priorities. The Department estimates that one enforcement position
- 4 should be established and funded annually to implement this proposal.
- 5 **Department Testimony:** The Department supports prohibiting single-use toiletries and other
- 6 single-use plastic products to reduce the amount of plastic waste that is incinerated or disposed in
- 7 State landfills. However, the Department does not have the staff and funds to implement
- 8 inspection and enforcement. The Department respectfully requests funding and the establishment
- 9 of one new position to receive complaints and inspect lodging establishments identified as
- distributing single-use toiletries in violation of HB1645 HD1. In addition to conducting
- 11 enforcement actions and dispensing citations, this position would also provide education and
- outreach to the regulated community.
- The Department also respectfully requests that this measure be placed in a separate
- chapter among Chapters 339 and 339D, for greater visibility by non-solid waste management
- 15 facilities.

Aloha Chair Johanson, Vice Chair Kitagawa, and members of the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

The Hawai'i Tourism Authority (HTA) appreciates the opportunity to offer comments on HB1645 HD1, which prohibits lodging establishments from providing personal care products in small plastic bottles within sleeping room accommodations, any space within sleeping room accommodations, or bathrooms used by the public or guests. We agree with the intent of this legislation as it is in alignment with our Strategic Plan and our Destination Management Action Plans, and we humbly offer the committee some suggestions to consider incorporating in this proposed measure.

We appreciate the additional time that was provided by the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Labor & Tourism as part of House Draft 1 and would urge that these timeframes, which allow three years for full implementation of this bill, be supported by this committee. We are aware of many properties that are already moving in the direction of eliminating the use of small plastic bottles for their amenities. Due to the pandemic, these amenity dispensers have become difficult to secure and time is needed to acquire an adequate supply to be in compliance.

We would also ask the committee to consider providing support to the many local small businesses that are selling their products as guest amenities in order to support this move away from small bottles. As part of this measure, perhaps the committee may consider funding that would support

these local small businesses in their transition from small plastic bottles to dispenser-size containers of their products.

Finally, as it relates to enforcement, we continue to remain concerned that the Department of Health may experience challenges while attempting to enforce this measure. We would recommend that the visitor industry be required to self-certify that they are in compliance with the law rather than requiring the Department of Health to conduct inspections. We would further recommend that a hotline or dedicated email address be made available to the public to report possible violations of this measure.

We believe that by supporting the reasonable implementation timeframe, providing support for our local small business community, and requiring the industry to self-certify through this legislation that we will be able to address and resolve the issue of small plastic bottles utilized by the industry here in Hawai'i. We appreciate the opportunity to provide these comments on HB1645 HD1. Mahalo.

### Position: Support HB1645.

The Surfrider Foundation is a national nonprofit organization dedicated to the protection and enjoyment of our ocean, waves, and beaches. Surfrider Foundation maintains a network of over 150 chapters and academic clubs nationwide, including 4 chapters in the Hawaiian Islands. The Surfrider Foundation focuses on many aspects of the environment such as coastal protection, plastic pollution, and water quality.

As an organization that has strongly championed efforts in Hawai'i to reduce single-use plastics, Surfrider Foundation strongly supports HB1645. Shockingly, over 91% of plastics are not recycled. The hospitality industry in Hawai'i generates millions of single-use plastic personal care products each year, with the majority ending up in our local landfills or being burned at H-Power. For example, a single 200-room four-star hotel can use about **300,000 pieces of single-use plastic in a month** if it is at full-capacity and does not invest in any eco-friendly alternatives (link).

In early 2021, New York state banned single-use **plastic** containers of soap, **shampoo** and other toiletries provided by hotels by 2024. Per the New York law, hotels will have to make the switch to refillable dispensers and environmentally-friendly containers for all body and hair care products. Smaller businesses with under 50 rooms are given an extra year to get ready for the change. California passed a similar law in 2019. Note that the New York bill had the backing of the hospitality industry.

Multinational hotel chains like Marriott International are already making the switch, after the company conceded that it sends 500 million toiletries to landfill every year. Pump dispensers can now be found at over 1,000 of its hotels, a seventh of their worldwide portfolio. However, laws such as HB1645 are needed to ensure that businesses commit to reducing their single-use plastic footprint.

HB1645 will represent an important step towards eliminating unnecessary single-use plastics and improving the sustainability of the hospitality industry in Hawai'i.

Thank you for your consideration of this testimony in support of HB1645, submitted on the behalf of the Surfrider Foundation's 4 Chapters in Hawai'i and all of our members who live in the state and visit to enjoy the many coastal recreational opportunities offered by all of the islands' coastlines.
