1 **Fiscal Implications:** None

2 **Department Testimony:** Thank you for the opportunity to testify in SUPPORT of HB 1675
3 which would permit minors, as currently defined in §577A-1, HRS, “from the age of fourteen to
4 seventeen inclusive,” to consent to medical care related to the diagnosis, treatment, or prevention
5 of HIV. Parents or legal guardians would not be able to abrogate consent. The minor would not
6 be liable for payment. This measure would also update archaic terminology in §577A, HRS, by
7 replacing “venereal disease” with “sexually transmitted infection.”

8 The department strongly supports this bill as it could help prevent HIV acquisition in
9 minors and supports critical treatment of minors diagnosed with HIV. Safe, highly effective
10 medications for the treatment and prevention of HIV need to be accessible for all individuals
11 diagnosed with HIV or at high risk of acquiring HIV. Medications taken by an HIV-uninfected
12 individual to prevent acquisition of HIV are highly effective and were approved for use in
13 minors in 2018.

14 Current statutes do not appear to permit a minor to consent to medical care related to the
15 prevention of HIV. This is a critical gap in access to medical care. This measure would resolve
16 this gap. Permitting minors who cannot or will not seek the consent of their parents or guardians
17 to consent to HIV medical care is essential to the health of the minor and a valuable step in
18 ending the HIV epidemic in Hawaii.

Comments on HB 1675

Chair Yamane, Vice Chair Tam, and members of the House Committee on Health, Human Services, & Homelessness, thank you for the opportunity to provide comments on **HB 1675**.

In Hawai'i, health care professionals are in high demand yet in low supply, particularly on the neighbor islands and in rural and underserved areas of our state. Improving access to care by qualified healthcare professionals is critical to ensuring the people of Hawai'i receive quality healthcare when they are in need that is provided by their preferred healthcare provider.

In 2017, through Act 88, the Legislature enabled APRNs to provide the care that is proposed for amendment here to include Physician Assistants. APRNs have since been able to provide this important care to minors with consideration of the minor's valid consent. The Center defers to the profession of Physician Assistants related to their education and training. The Center further recognizes and commends the Legislature for identifying changes, including using healthcare provider neutral language, and amending the definitions section to clearly define who is included in the "healthcare provider" term. These amendments will expand access to care for people seeking care pursuant to these statutes while maintaining the utmost safety and quality of those authorized by law to provide this care.

We commend the State Legislature for identifying solutions to address access to healthcare in Hawai'i. Thank you for providing the opportunity to comment on this measure.


TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF HB 1675 RELATING TO MEDICAL CARE FOR MINORS

Aloha Chair Yamane, Vice Chair Tam, and fellow committee members,

I am writing in STRONG SUPPORT to House Bill 1675 on behalf of the Stonewall Caucus of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i (formerly the LGBT Caucus). HB 1675 will permit minors to consent to medical care and services related to the diagnosis, treatment, or prevention of HIV. Specifies that a minor, under certain circumstances, shall not be liable for payment associated with the diagnosis, treatment, or prevention of HIV. Authorizes physician assistants, in addition to physicians and advanced practice registered nurses, to render such medical care and services to minors.

No minor should have to out themselves to access lifesaving medical care.

The Stonewall Caucus is glad to see that HB 1675 also includes coverage for pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP). PrEP prevents the spread of HIV especially if used in combination with condoms. New HIV cases are on the rise and we need to ensure that everyone that wants and needs it has access to PrEP. The upfront cost of PrEP is 1,000 times cheaper than treating HIV or AIDS.

We hope you all will support this important piece of legislation.

The Hawaii Health & Harm Reduction Center (HHHRC) strongly supports HB 1675 which would give minors consent to life-saving HIV prevention medications called Pre-exposure Prophylaxis or PrEP. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention strongly recommend PrEP as one of the most effective biomedical interventions to prevent HIV. The current HRS for minor consent does allow minors to consent to treatment of HIV and other sexually-related diseases but not have access to medications like PrEP to prevent the infections.

HHHRC respectfully asks for one important issue to be added to the bill, in collaboration with the health plans to ensure that if a minor does access PrEP and it is covered by the minor's parents' health insurance, that the services not be disclosed to the parents. Research indicates that if young people have to disclose sexually-related issue to parents, they may decide to avoid the services altogether. We respectfully submit this language:

Requiring a covered entity, upon notification that minor—initiated HIV prevention and/or PrEP services should not be disclosed, to maintain the confidentiality of minor—initiated HIV prevention and/or PrEP services.

HHHRC's mission is to *reduce harm, promote health, create wellness and fight stigma in Hawaii and the Pacific*. We focus our efforts on those disproportionately affected by social determinants of health, including but not limited to: people living with and/or affected by HIV, hepatitis, substance use, and the transgender, LGBTQ and the Native Hawaiian communities.

HHHRC is one of the largest PrEP medical providers in the state and has had to turn away 17 year olds and other minors who wanted to learn about these effective prevention strategies. During COVID, there were HIV outbreaks on the continent and passing HB 1675 is one step to ensuring that Hawaii doesn't have unnecessary HIV infections that could have been prevented.

Thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony on HB 1675, which permits minors to consent to medical care related to the diagnosis or treatment of HIV or the prevention of HIV and authorizes physician assistants, in addition to physicians and advanced practice registered nurses, to render such treatment to minors.

Hawai`i Academy of Physician Assistants (HAPA) SUPPORTS HB1675

HB 1675 allows minors to consent to HIV treatment and prevention services and is a significant step in our statewide Hawai`i 2 Zero (H20) cure initiative, which aims to reduce HIV/AIDS cases down to zero — zero new infections, zero new deaths and zero stigma caused by HIV. Adolescents and young adults (aged 13-29) accounted for 21% of new HIV diagnoses in 2019¹ and are the least likely of any age group to be tested, in treatment, or have a suppressed viral load. Addressing HIV infection and spread among adolescents and young adults requires that they have access medical care to get the information and tools they need to make healthy decisions, reduce their risk factors, and get treatment. However, it is well established that minors may avoid seeking care for sexually transmitted infections if they must involve their parents or guardian.² HAPA supports HB 1675 because it allows minors age fourteen to seventeen to obtain such services without parent or guardian involvement and promotes access to care for this significantly vulnerable population.

HB 1675 also includes physician assistants as healthcare providers who may treat minors, which further reduces barriers to timely, quality care for our state's youth.

An article written by Harper et al (2014) noted that, "HIV-related stigma has been increasingly recognized as a key factor impeding HIV identification, prevention, and treatment." The CDC states that the use of PrEP is highly effective for preventing HIV from sex by about 99 percent.
