<u>HB 1715</u>

Chair Hashem, Vice Chair Perruso, and members of the Committee on Agriculture, my name is Alison Ueoka, President of the Hawaii Insurers Council. The Hawaii Insurers Council is a non-profit trade association of property and casualty insurance companies licensed to do business in Hawaii. Member companies underwrite approximately forty percent of all property and casualty insurance premiums in the state.

Hawaii Insurers Council **opposes** this bill. Although the intent of the bill is to protect unattended animals locked in motor vehicles, we believe this legislation will lead to property damage by average citizens based on subjective judgment of whether the animal is in "imminent physical danger of suffering harm." Allowing persons to "use whatever means are reasonably necessary to protect the animal and remove the animal from the motor vehicle" may also cause a confrontation between the operator of the motor vehicle and the person attempting to get at the animal. This confrontation may lead to a physical altercation and could result in unnecessary violence and injury. Costs for example, from broken windows or physical harm will affect certain motor vehicle coverages and those costs will ultimately be borne by the insured public.

Instead, we believe the appropriate response to this situation is to call 911 and report it to the police. We ask that this bill be held.

On behalf of the Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) and our Hawaii supporters, I am writing to express strong support for House Bill 1715, which protects citizens from liability for necessary actions taken in good faith to rescue an animal from a hot car. States across the nation are taking steps to prevent animal deaths in hot or freezing cars by fortifying their laws to allow good Samaritans to enter vehicles under certain circumstances.

In only a few short minutes temperatures inside a car can mount to a lethal level. Animals are ill-equipped to handle the heat and humidity because they don't have sweat glands and cannot release the heat that builds up inside their bodies. According to the Humane Society Veterinary Medical Association, "animals pant to evaporate moisture from their lungs, which takes heat away from their body. If the humidity is too high, they are unable to cool themselves, and their temperature will skyrocket to dangerous levels—very quickly." If someone witnesses a trapped pet in extreme distress, they should be able to act without fear of being sued or arrested. HB 1715 lays out reasonable steps that a citizen must take prior to entering a vehicle with the intent to save an animal from life-threatening weather conditions.

Unfortunately, not many individuals realize the danger that heat poses to their pets, and we continue to see casualties each year. First responders on the scene to rescue animals left in hot cars have given firsthand accounts of the suffering that a dog left in such conditions can endure. They have described terrible scenes and in response to these tragedies. Currently, 31 states have laws that either prohibit leaving an animal in confined vehicle under dangerous conditions or provide civil immunity for a person who rescues a distressed animal from a vehicle. HB 1715 includes thoughtful language that increases protection for animals but also prevents vigilantism. Intervention is carefully defined, only to be used when all other options have been exhausted and the animal is in visible distress. This bill also spells out steps for after an animal has been removed to ensure that emergency care is provided, and pets are returned to their owners appropriately.

Every year companion animals succumb to heatstroke in hot, unattended vehicles. Often concerned citizens and law enforcement can locate the car's owner in time to take the necessary steps to keep the animal safe. However, there are situations when the appropriate parties are unable to be located and the clock is running with an animal's life hanging in the balance.

We urge committee members to support HB 1715 as an important, bipartisan step toward creating a more humane Hawaii. Protecting animals from an agonizing death is a problem we can all agree to prevent. With greater awareness and greater latitude for Samaritan interventions, we can make this world a safer and better one for our animal companions.

The Hawaiian Humane Society appreciates the opportunity to offer comments on House Bill 1715, which limits civil and criminal liability for persons who remove unattended animals from motor vehicles that are in physical danger if the actions are reasonable, in good faith, and in accordance with other requirements.

I supervise a team of eight deputized Officers/Investigators that enforce animal laws for the City and County of Honolulu. We are also a member of the National Animal Care & Control Association (NACA) and our officers are certified by them. Neither Hawaiian Humane nor its colleagues around the state could find evidence of animals being harmed due to inadequate law enforcement response to calls about animals locked in cars. The police respond and Hawaiian Humane supports them. Our officers are trained to identify hyperthermia (over heating) and have the tools and training to handle this, whereas the general public is not. In addition, page 3, lines 14-16 of the bill, read "The monies shall be paid to the county director of finance to defray expenses of collecting, keeping, and feeding the animal." Hawaii County has the only in-house animal control department. In the other three counties, those charges would be more appropriately paid to the county animal contractor.

We appreciate the compassion of the advocates who put forward this measure. Locking an animal in a hot car can indeed do serious harm very quickly. That is why the county police departments and the animal service providers across our state take these calls seriously.

Chairman Hashem and members of the Hawaii House Committee on Agriculture:

The American Kennel Club (AKC), which was established in 1884 and promotes the study, breeding, exhibiting, and advancement of purebred dogs, represents over 5,100 dog clubs nationally, including 42 clubs in Hawaii. The AKC advocates for the purebred dog as a family companion, advances canine health and well-being, protects the rights of dog owners, and promotes the ideals of responsible dog ownership. The AKC and our affiliated clubs are pleased and proud to serve communities and their leaders by sharing our animal care and responsible ownership principles. Today, we write to share our concerns with House Bill 1715 and respectfully request committee action in line with our recommendations.

AKC strongly agrees that no dog should be left in a vehicle if its comfort, health, and safety is in question. "Good Samaritan" legislation must provide a balanced approach that protects both the health and safety of dogs and the interests of responsible dog owners. For that reason, we are concerned that HB 1715, as currently written, fails to take into account unintended consequences that may result from providing unchecked civil and criminal immunity for those who break into vehicles to remove dogs they believe are in danger. While we appreciate that the bill attempts to provide some requirements for such an actor, we urge you to amend HB 1715 to allow recourse for the animal's owner if they did in fact take proper steps to ensure the animal's safety was protected, such as by proper ventilation, air conditioning, blankets, or other protocols appropriate for the breed or type of dog. We also urge you to assure that owners are immune from liability for their dog harming someone as a result of breaking into a vehicle, particularly if a dog flees a vehicle and becomes at large.

We appreciate your consideration of our concerns. We and our federation of dog clubs in Hawaii, the Pacific Pet Alliance, would be pleased to assist you in crafting reasonable and effective laws that protect dogs while also respecting the interests of responsible dog owners and breeders. It can be deadly to leave your pet in a locked car. High temperatures can cause irreparable organ damage and death. Wouldn't we agree that protecting animals from an unnecessary death is something we'd like to prevent?

It doesn't have to be that warm outside for a car to become dangerously hot inside.

- When it's 72 degrees Fahrenheit outside, the temperature inside your car can heat up to 116 degrees Fahrenheit within an hour.
- When it's 80 degrees Fahrenheit outside, the temperature inside your car can heat up to 99 degrees Fahrenheit within 10 minutes.
- Rolling down the windows has been shown to have little effect on the temperature inside a car.

1. Liability
