Re: H.B. 1745 HD 1 – APPROPRIATING FUNDS TO SUPPORT HAWAII'S FOOD BANKS

### I. OVERVIEW OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

H.B. 1745, HD 1, would appropriate an unspecified sum to the four food banks in the State that perform distribution services for the federal TEFAP program. The funds would be directed to the Office of Community Services (OCS), to administer the grant. We are an agency attached to the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations. OCS is the State administrator of the TEFAP program and thus we already work with the four identified food banks.

The bill states that the funds "shall be used for general operations, including staffing, transportation, food purchase, food storage, and food distribution costs." The bill further states that OCS would distribute the funds "pursuant to the same methodology used by The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) of the Food and Nutrition Service of the United States Department of Agriculture to determine the allocation of TEFAP foods to each of the food banks."

### II. CURRENT LAW

Currently, there are no local appropriations that supplement TEFAP or a TEFAP-like program. Since H.B. 1745, HD1 would involve appropriation of local funds, OCS would need to implement the fiscal as well as programmatic administration of a grant under H.B. 1745 HD1 separately from administration of TEFAP, although they could operate on parallel tracks. ### III. COMMENTS ON THE PROPOSED BILL

OCS is pleased to support this bill. We also appreciate the confidence that the sponsors of the bill are expressing in OCS's abilities to administer such a grant. OCS joins the sponsors of this bill, and the four food banks, in our mutual firm belief that food insecurity is a very serious challenge in Hawaii at present, especially because of the lingering effects of the Covid-19 pandemic.

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai'i Farm Bureau supports HB 1745, HD1, which appropriates funds to help Hawai'i's food banks meet the significantly heightened need for food assistance during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Coronavirus Pandemic has disrupted Hawai'i's local food systems and caused many local producers to lose their local markets. Many catered to tourism, large-scale events, hotels, restaurants, cruise ships, farmers' markets, and school lunch programs, which were non-existent during Hawai'i's shutdown.

Like small businesses around the state, without open and consistent markets, local farmers and ranchers will decrease food production levels and will likely downsize and/or go out of business. To help address the state's food security during the pandemic, Hawai'i's Foodbanks partnered with local food producers to ensure that farmers and ranchers could survive.

After urgent health issues, feeding our community is the most critical challenge we face in the continuing coronavirus pandemic. With no clear end to the crisis within sight, we are already seeing the attention of leaders from around the world shift as food producer markets contract and transportation networks are shaken to their core.

At the onset of the pandemic, the Hawai'i Farm Bureau partnered with Hawai'I's Foodbank to provide local agricultural produce and proteins for their food assistance programs. This partnership provided nearly \$300,000 of locally grown, high-quality, nutritious produce to our communities in need. We were also a food partner at the

Foodbank's mass food distributions which provided locally grown produce for over 50,000 families. As an organization that aggregates and distributes food, the Hawai'i Foodbank staff brought valuable logistical insight to these events. The combined efforts of the Hawai'i Foodbank, the Hawai'i Farm Bureau, and other partner organizations allowed tens of thousands of families to have access to food during unprecedented times. This win-win partnership connected local producers that lost markets and revenue sources due to COVID-19 with the Hawai'i Foodbank to meet the increased demands of feeding Hawai'i's communities.

The dedicated funding for the emergency food assistance program will provide funds to the Hawai'i's foodbanks that support non-profit and community feeding programs by providing community meals during emergencies. This also will help keep Hawai'i's farmers farming while also providing nutritional food to those who need it most. More than ever, the State of Hawai'i needs to assure local food production to meet the needs of the hundreds of thousands of Hawai'i families affected by this emergency and future emergencies.

### APPROPRIATING FUNDS TO SUPPORT HAWAII'S FOOD BANKS

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill.

House Bill No. 1745, H.D. 1, appropriates unspecified general funds in FY 23 to

the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, Office of Community Services (OCS),

to help Hawai'i's food banks meet the significantly heightened need for food assistance due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The bill specifies that the funds are to provide operational support for the Hawai'i Foodbank, Maui Food Bank, Hawai'i Foodbank – Kaua'i Branch, and The Food Basket, provided that 1% of the funds shall be allocated to OCS to carry out the purposes of this Act, provided further that the remaining funds shall be used for general operations, including staffing, transportation, food purchase, food storage, and food distribution costs.

B&F notes that, with respect to the general fund appropriation in this bill, the federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act requires that states receiving Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) II funds and Governor's Emergency Education Relief II funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

Further, the federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires that states receiving ARP ESSER funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

The U.S. Department of Education has issued rules governing how these maintenance of effort (MOE) requirements are to be administered. B&F will be working with the money committees of the Legislature to ensure that the State of Hawai'i complies with these ESSER MOE requirements.

Dear Chair San Buenaventura, Vice Chair Ihara Jr., and Members of the Committee,

The City and County of Honolulu ("City") Office of Climate Change, Sustainability and Resiliency (CCSR) supports House Bill 1745 HD1, which appropriates funds for operating expenses of the four Hawai'i food banks contracted by the Office of Community Services to administer the Emergency Food Assistance program in each of the state's counties.

There was large demand for new feeding programs during the pandemic, prompting grassroots community groups and established food organizations like the Hawai'i Food Bank to step up their campaigns; they nearly tripled the pounds of food they were distributing overnight. Despite these efforts, the food insecurity rate in Hawai'i remains high, rising almost 51% since 2019. The Hawai'i Food Bank on O'ahu continues to feed well over pre-pandemic rates.

After Hawai'i spiked from 27th in the nation in 2019 to 11th for food insecurity in a single year, it will be a long road ahead for post-pandemic recovery. Child food insecurity fared worse, jumping from 9th in 2019 to 2nd in 2020. History has shown that food security rates take a long time to get back to normal. After the 2008 recession, food security rates took nearly a decade to get back to pre-recession levels. The fight does not end when COVID counts go down and the Hawai'i Food Bank, along with their partners comprising of 115 sites on O'ahu and 20 on Kaua'i, make them the foundation of this fight against food insecurity.

The Hawai'i Food Bank demonstrated significant capacity and creativity after the flow of federal and philanthropic funding came in during the height of the pandemic, to not only meet immediate feeding needs but contribute to broader stability of the local food system. For example, the Hawai'i Food Bank on O'ahu partnered with Pomai Kulolo to serve poi in many of their food distributions, something that was not seen prepandemic. They also continued to support local producers of beef, eggs, fruits and vegetables, opening a new institutional market for our local growers. To continue beneficial partnerships with local farmers and the fruition of further innovation, State funding is needed to continue taking steps forward in our recovery.

Finally, the City, through CCSR and the City's Office of Economic Revitalization, recently established a food security and sustainability program to coordinate City actions and partnerships related to food security, sustainability, and climate resilience. Organizations like the Hawai'i Food Bank will be essential partners with the City moving forward, in addition to collaboration with the State, to meet our common goals.

Dear Chair San Buenaventura, Vice Chair Ihara, and Committee Members,

As the President and CEO of Hawaii Foodbank, I am writing in strong support of HB 1745, which would appropriate critical funds to address food insecurity in our State.

Food insecurity is a grave issue in Hawai'i. One in six Hawai'i residents will struggle with hunger this year, including **82,000** children. That's approximately one in four keiki who may go to bed hungry, or whose parents or grandparents will choose to go without so that their keiki can eat. Hawai'i has the second highest rate of child food insecurity in the United States.

Imagine having to make the choice between buying food for your family or other crucial needs, such as electricity, childcare or medicine. Due to our high cost of living, many hardworking residents are forced to do this on a regular basis. No one should be in the position to have to make a choice to go hungry.

The COVID-19 pandemic has exacerbated existing economic difficulties for many families and presented new challenges for others who found themselves struggling to put food on the table for the first time. And, food prices have increased significantly during COVID. Grocery prices have gone up 15% in the last two years, and some foods are much more expensive than they were before— the cost of meats, fish, poultry and eggs have risen by 32%. Earlier in the pandemic, many households were kept afloat by unemployment benefits, federal child tax credits, and CARES Act funds, but continued federal pandemic aid is uncertain.

Meanwhile, at Hawaii Foodbank, we are still serving 50% more people in 2021 than we did in 2019. Last year, we distributed 23 million pounds of food on O'ahu and 2 million pounds of food on Kaua'i, providing food for more than 20 million meals—about twice as much food as prior to the pandemic. We have been able to meet the increased need due to a major increase in federal funds and philanthropy; however, we need support from the State to continue to meet the needs of our community and ensure no-one in our State goes hungry. Already, federal commodity distributions to Hawai'i have decreased substantially over the past year, and philanthropic support, while still higher than before the pandemic, has declined as well.

HB 1745 will provide crucial operational support to Hawai'i's food banks and ensure we can continue to provide healthy, nutritious food to those we serve. Mahalo for your consideration.

Chair San Buenaventura, Vice Chair Ihara, and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii Primary Care Association (HPCA) is a 501(c)(3) organization established to advocate for, expand access to, and sustain high quality care through the statewide network of Community Health Centers throughout the State of Hawaii. The HPCA <u>SUPPORTS</u> House Bill No. 1745, House Draft 1, APPROPRIATING FUNDS TO SUPPORT HAWAII FOOD BANKS.

By way of background, the HPCA represents Hawaii's Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs). FQHCs provide desperately needed medical services at the frontlines to over 150,000 patients each year who live in rural and underserved communities. Long considered champions for creating a more sustainable, integrated, and wellness-oriented system of health, FQHCs provide a more efficient, more effective and more comprehensive system of healthcare.

The bill, as received by your Committee, would appropriate an unspecified amount of general funds for fiscal year 2022-2023 to fund the operating expenses of Hawaii Foodbank, Inc.; Maui Food Bank, Inc.; Hawaii Foodbank, Inc.'s Kauai Branch; and The Food Basket, Inc., for staffing, transportation, food purchase, food storage, and food distribution; provided that one percent be allocated to the Office of Community Services of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations for administrative purposes. The bill would further require the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations' Office of Community Services to allocate the sums among the four food banks by utilizing the priorities system set forth in Title 7, Code of Federal Regulations Section 251.4(h), which is used to determine the distribution of food from the Emergency Food Assistance Program.

The bill would take effect on July 1, 2050.

The COVID-19 pandemic has severely threatened the health and welfare of our citizens, especially Hawaii's underprivileged and rural communities. With so many people unemployed and underemployed, entire families are struggling to put food on the table on a consistent basis.

This situation has greatly exacerbated the need for the Foodbank, its branches, and the Food Basket. This bill would provide desperately needed resources to ensure that the Foodbank, its branches, and the Food Basket will continue to be able to meet the needs of our struggling families.

On a technical note, we observe that this bill might be in conflict with Chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and could be construed as direct state funding to private entities. Because of this, the HPCA strongly urges this committee to consult with the Majority Attorney for clarification on legal check.

### Despite this technical observation, the HPCA strongly urges your favorable consideration of this bill.

Chair San Buenaventura, Vice Chair Ihara, and committee members, thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony on HB 1745, HD1, which appropriate funds to enable Hawaii's food banks administering The Emergency Food Assistance Program to continue to meet the food security needs of the people of Hawaii during this time of unprecedented need due to the disturbances caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

### Kaiser Permanente Hawai'i SUPPORTS HB 1745, HD1.

Kaiser Permanente Hawai'i is Hawai'i's largest integrated health system that provides care and coverage for approximately 265,000 members. Each day, more than 4,400 dedicated employees and more than 650 Hawai'i Permanente Medical Group physicians and providers come to work at Kaiser Permanente Hawai'i to care for our members at our 20 medical facilities, including Moanalua Medical Center, providing high-quality care for our members and delivering on our commitment to improve the health of the 1.4 million people living in the communities we serve.

We know that food insecurity increased due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The four Hawai'i food banks administering The Emergency Food Assistance Program served a critical role for many families facing food insecurities due to job loss and other reasons related to the pandemic and were able to meet the State's increased need for food during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic due to a major increase in federal funds and philanthropy. However, with consistent federal funds, via American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), ending these food banks will struggle to continue to meet the needs of our local residents who need this help.

Kaiser Permanente Hawai'i supports policies that ensure all Hawaii residents have access to affordable, high-quality health care. Further, Kaiser Permanente supports "whole-person care," including the provision of access to services and resources that address beneficiaries' physical health, mental health and social needs. Food security means that all people, at all times, have

physical, social, and economic access to sufficient, safe, and nutritious food that meets their food preferences and dietary needs for an active and healthy lifestyle. To this end, in 2021 Kaiser Permanente Hawai'i invested \$322,000 in grants to community-based organizations to improve food security in Hawaii by increasing availability of emergency food distributions and improving participation in federal food programs such as SNAP. We also carried out our own SNAP campaign to at-risk members. In additions, some of our investments leveraged matching funds for the Double Bucks and TEFAP programs. These grants went on to support programs that increased food security for pregnant and postpartum mothers in low-income, underserved communities. Finally, Kaiser Permanente Hawai'i distributed nearly 450,000 pounds of food to furloughed and displaced hotel workers affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.

We support HB 1745, HD1 because it will provide necessary funding to enable Hawai'i's food banks administering The Emergency Food Assistance Program to continue to meet the food security needs of the people of Hawai'i.



I am Wesley Perreira, Director of Hawai'i Foodbank Kaua'i. I am writing in **strong support of HB1745**, HD1, which provides to operating support for the food banks in each county working with the Office of Community Services to provide emergency food for people struggling with food insecurity.

Our team has worked with persistent intensity since COVID-19 first shut down the island in March 2020. Even now, two years later, Hawai'i Foodbank Kaua'i continues to serve more than **double the number of people** each month compared to pre-pandemic numbers. To continue to provide at this level, we have had to increase our budget by more than 50% and have had to add three people to our team. Last year, we distributed nearly two million pounds of food to ensure that individuals and families on Kaua'i had the food needed.

Feeding America estimates that it could take several years for households experiencing food insecurity to recover from the pandemic. After the 2008 recession, it took ten years until food insecurity levels returns to the levels they were before the recession. The Hawai'i Foodbank team has had a long history of emergency response and are committed to standing in the gap for Kaua'i families through the long tail of COVID-19.

As you know the north shore of Kaua'i experienced a devastating storm and resulting flooding on April 13 – 15, 2018. Realizing the community impact of the storm, Hawai'i Foodbank Kaua'i had a truck filled with food and water headed into the area before the rain even stopped. It was an emergency that garnered significant initial media attention and strong philanthropic support. That support waned as the months following the event passed. Hawai'i Foodbank Kaua'i team continued to serve the Hanalei region with elevated support for 18 months after the flooding, until the community was fully restored.

Hawai'i Foodbank Kaua'i is committed to serving our island's residents struggling with food insecurity as they work to recover from the devastating health and economic impacts of the pandemic. We strongly supports HB7145, HD1. The operating support will help us tremendously as we continue to stand in the gap for individuals and families on Kaua'i who are continuing to experience food insecurity.
