Comments:

More specifically, the state should also contact hemp and licened marijuana growers to collect the stems and discarded portions of the plant at a nominal cost, to incorporate into the building and construction material. Please have this working group look at *hempcrete* online to see the benefits of using this material in construction. Hemp and marijuana stalks absorb toxins from every source, which will contribute to environmental health as it relates to the restoration thereof. *Hempcrete* is also one of the strongest materials in concrete mixtures and would replace x-amount of aggregate materials that are used to make concrete - which would help to reduce the amount of sand that is needed for this purpose.

Furthermore, in cases such as the highly dangerous state of the Hana Highway bridge at mile marker 19 - where the bridge is in such a state of disrepair that residents are counting the days until a car falls through the hole in the bridge - *hempcrete* would withstand the constant moisture that erodes the current bridge at high rates, thus reducing costs upon the State of Hawai'i to repair that bridge. As I understand, the State of Hawai'i likes to bring in tourists for the purpose of profit, but the State of Hawai'i cannot afford to make the bridge safe. Ultimately all residents who live on the East side of the bridge are the ones impacted by the bridge.

Lastly, as it relates to climate change, our rainfall is lacking, due to the loss of trees. You can verify this by asking your computer's search engine about the role that trees play in the rain cycle. Specific example: In the last 5 years, Hana has lost a significant amount of trees. The ride that used to be marked with rainforest is now marked with grassy meadows. Subsequently, recent rain reports are indicating that Hana has undergone a significant amount of rainfall since 2019. My identified request is that you would have the DOT contact and work with native forestry initiatives to plan for the planting of native trees alongside areas where the road was repaired.
