Chair Ohno, Vice Chair Ganaden, and Members of the Committee:

House Bill 2435 seeks to "require pat downs and searches of female inmates to be conducted by female correctional facility employees unless the prisoner presents a risk of immediate harm to herself or others or risk of escape." This measure also seeks to prohibit male correctional facility employees from entering areas where female inmates may be in state of undress including, but not limited to, restrooms, shower areas, or medical treatment areas.

The Department of Public Safety (PSD) opposes this measure as it is not needed. Departmental Policy (COR.08.31 – Searches of Inmates) and the federal Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) specifically address gender related issues with respect to pat downs and searches of female inmates, and department post orders address male correctional officers restricted access to areas where female inmates may be in state of undress including, but not limited to, restrooms, shower areas, medical treatment areas, etc. Therefore, the Department respectfully requests this measure be held.

STRONG support for this measure. Abuse of female inmates including rape and sexual coersion are all too common in our prison system. Women in the criminal justice system deserve basic human rights and basic human dignity, not to mention safety from harm by prison guards and officials.

In the early 2000's Hawaii Community Alliance on Prison's helped uncover a pattern of sex assualt on female inmates in a Kentucky Prison: See this article: http://resistancebehindbars.org/node/153

This resulted returning female inmates to Hawaii. But this clearly has not solved the problem of systemic abuse of women. In 2016 four Hawaii Guards at the Women's Correctional Center were accused of rape. Clearly not enough is being done to comply with the Prison Rape Elimination act.
