EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: Appropriates funds into and out of the native Hawaiian rehabilitation fund for DHHL to fulfill its fiduciary duties to beneficiaries. Requires DHHL to submit an annual report to the legislature

SYNOPSIS: Appropriates \$600 million to the native Hawaiian rehabilitation fund, to be spent by DHHL to fulfill its fiduciary duties to beneficiaries.

EFFECTIVE DATE: July 1, 2022

STAFF COMMENTS: The Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) administers about 200,000 acres of public lands to be leased to native Hawaiians, upon which they may live, farm, ranch, and engage in commercial or other activities. The department, led by a nine-member commission, must provide financial and technical assistance to native Hawaiians (those with at least 50 percent Hawaiian blood), which enables them to enhance their economic self-sufficiency and promote community-based development. According to the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act of 1920, by doing this, the traditions, culture, and quality of life of native Hawaiians will be self-sustaining.

We all would like to think that by throwing \$600 million at DHHL, we could make a significant dent in the production of Hawaiian homestead lands and getting people off the decades-long wait list into Hawaiian homesteads.

But there are apparently issues with getting DHHL to spend the money it now has.

The federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) provides a Native Hawaiian Housing Block Grant program. DHHL is the sole recipient of such grants. One year ago, DHHL was sitting on about \$55 million in federal funds unspent, as a result of which HUD stopped providing additional funding. Recent news reports say that the federal money is still not flowing. DHHL's website, <a href="http://dhhl.hawaii.gov/nahasda/">http://dhhl.hawaii.gov/nahasda/</a>, shows its current grant status:

To make a dent in the problem, we really need to understand why DHHL can't spend the money it now has. If we can't fix that problem, giving them a slug of additional funds can't be expected to solve much.

In prior testimony, DHHL has acknowledged that its federal appropriations had been less than prior years, in part because of its inability to spend down its appropriations at the time, but has argued that it has turned around its operation and is now able to spend the money appropriated to it. We think that lawmakers should make the effort to understand what was wrong and how the operations were turned around.

This testimony should not be interpreted as opposing an effort to solve the problem. We are very interested in seeing any dysfunction cleared and relief going to those who deserve it. If, for example, the problem is that most of the trust lands are uninhabitable due to location, then this bill should be amended to include language allowing DHHL to negotiate appropriate land swap, with DLNR if necessary, to acquire habitable land in place of uninhabitable land. Thought should go into what other tools than money are needed to accomplish the mission and get people off the waiting list.

Aloha Chair Luke, Vice Chair Yamashita, and members of the Committee:

The Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) strongly supports this bill appropriating funds for DHHL to enable beneficiaries of the Hawaiian home lands trust to acquire a residence and to enable the department to fulfill its fiduciary duties to beneficiaries. Rather than amending the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act (HHCA) by establishing the Hawaiian home lands special funds, DHHL recommends the proposed draft attached that appropriates funds into and out of the native Hawaiian rehabilitation fund for DHHL to fulfill its fiduciary duties to beneficiaries

DHHL appreciates this legislature for hearing our calls for funding and the commitment to fulfilling the state's obligation to our community. An investment of \$600 million toward the implementation of the HHCA would be a historic infusion of resources to address the needs of potentially thousands of beneficiaries on DHHL's Waiting List. DHHL continues to be open to all measures that would return native Hawaiians to the land, as intended by Prince Jonah Kūhiō Kalaniana'ole.

As we embark on the next 100 years acknowledging the significance of the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the signing of the HHCA on July 9, 2021, this bill opens up opportunities for the over 28,000 beneficiaries and their families who continue to wait for the hope of Prince Kūhiō's promise to his people. Current costs for infrastructure development, borne by the Department, are in excess of \$150,000 per lot. In order to fulfill the needs of the current waitlist through this approach, DHHL would require over \$6 billion for infrastructure costs alone to serve its beneficiaries. This significant sum is separate and apart from costs for maintenance of existing lessee communities housing nearly ten thousand beneficiaries, upkeep of several utility systems, and other costs. Over the last decade, the Legislature has funded DHHL at levels higher than in years past, which has provided increased opportunity for DHHL to increase its reach. However, by conservative estimates following this approach, it will take DHHL at least another hundred years to meet the needs of its beneficiaries at current funding levels. This infusion of funds is expected to significantly address those who have been on the waiting list for decades.

#### RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill.

House Bill (H.B.) No. 2511, H.D. 1: establishes the Hawaiian Home Lands

Special Fund that would generate revenues through legislative appropriations, grants,

donations, contributions, accrued interest, and other moneys; appropriates

\$600,000,000 in general funds for FY 23 for deposit into the special fund and

\$600,000,000 in special funds for FY 23 for the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands to

fulfill its fiduciary duties to beneficiaries and to enable beneficiaries of the Hawaiian

Home Lands Trust to acquire a residence; and requires an annual report to the

Legislature.

As a matter of general policy, B&F does not support the creation of any special fund which does not meet the requirements of Section 37-52.3, HRS. Special funds should: 1) serve a need as demonstrated by the purpose, scope of work, and an explanation why the program cannot be implemented successfully under the general fund appropriation process; 2) reflect a clear nexus between the benefits sought and

charges made upon the users or beneficiaries or a clear link between the program and the sources of revenue; 3) provide an appropriate means of financing for the program or activity; and 4) demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining. Regarding H.B. No. 2511, H.D. 1, it is difficult to determine whether the proposed special fund would be self-sustaining.

In addition, B&F notes that, with respect to the general fund appropriation in this bill, the federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act requires that states receiving Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) II funds and Governor's Emergency Education Relief II funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

Further, the federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires that states receiving ARP ESSER funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

The U.S. Department of Education has issued rules governing how these maintenance of effort (MOE) requirements are to be administered. B&F will be working with the money committees of the Legislature to ensure that the State of Hawai'i complies with these ESSER MOE requirements.

#### Comments:

\$600 Million for houses for the 28,000 families on the DHHL waitlist. Also another bill already approved by this committee calls for \$638 Million in arrears plus \$79 Million per year in future for OHA from ceded land revenues, exclusively for "betterment of Native Hawaiians" who comprise 20% of Hawaii's people; with no set-aside of 4 times those amounts exclusively for the other 80% of Hawaii's people who lack a drop of Hawaiian blood. What about money for DHHL: Department of Haole Homelands? And don't forget another bill before this committee that will force each county government to pay the construction costs and maintenance of water, roads, and other infrastructure on the DHHL lands it hosts.

\$600 Million + \$638 Million = \$1.238 BILLION just this year alone! Exclusively for "Native Hawaiians" even while they also continue to benefit from all the remaining government programs that benefit all our people. As the late Senator Everett Dirksen of Illinois might say: A Billion here, a Billion there -- pretty soon you'll be talking about real money!

Hmm ... Checking my math. \$600 Million to help 28,000 waitlisters. That's \$21,429 per house. In our Hawaii realestate market that might be enough for a 2-hole outhouse like my grandparents had in rural Michigan. But will the money simply be handed over to the waitlisters? Of course not. It must be filtered through a huge bureaucracy and given to construction contractors to build roads and water lines on the racially segregated ghettos where houses can only be "owned" in leasehold. How much more money will be demanded every year forever for DHHL?

Here's a better idea. According to OHA's latest annual report, on June 30, 2021 OHA had assets of \$764,820,000. So let OHA pay the \$600 Million, and they'll still have \$165 Million to play with. Then the \$600 Million which the legislature wants to squander on DHHL can be used to provide tax reductions for our hard-pressed taxpayers, or books and toiletpaper for our schools. Why should OHA be expected to pay the \$600 Million to DHHL? Because they can! And because within recent days OHA has sent out an email or text message to everyone on its roster asking for testimony to support these bills. Clearly OHA favors the bill. Clearly OHA believes it is part of OHA's kuleana to use government money to engage in political lobbying for bills providing benefits exclusively to people of its highly favored race. So let OHA put its money where its mouth is. You legislators have the power to "raid" money from any special fund or any department of the state government, as you have often done with the Hurricane Relief Fund or the money controlled by the Highway Department. It's time for you to exercise

that power to rein in OHA and save the rest of Hawaii's people from the monster that threatens to devour the State.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: Establishes the Hawaiian home lands special fund. Appropriates funds into and out of the special fund for DHHL to enable beneficiaries of the Hawaiian home lands trust to acquire a residence and to enable the department to fulfill its fiduciary duties to beneficiaries.

SYNOPSIS: Adds a new section to the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act of 1920 to establish the Hawaiian home lands special fund.

Appropriates \$600 million to the special fund.

EFFECTIVE DATE: July 1, 2022

STAFF COMMENTS: The Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) administers about 200,000 acres of public lands to be leased to native Hawaiians, upon which they may live, farm, ranch, and engage in commercial or other activities. The department, led by a nine-member commission, must provide financial and technical assistance to native Hawaiians (those with at least 50 percent Hawaiian blood), which enables them to enhance their economic self-sufficiency and promote community-based development. According to the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act of 1920, by doing this, the traditions, culture, and quality of life of native Hawaiians will be self-sustaining.

We all would like to think that by throwing \$600 million at DHHL, we could make a significant dent in the production of Hawaiian homestead lands and getting people off the decades-long wait list into Hawaiian homesteads.

But there are apparently issues with getting DHHL to spend the money it now has.

The federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) provides a Native Hawaiian Housing Block Grant program. DHHL is the sole recipient of such grants. One year ago, DHHL was sitting on about \$55 million in federal funds unspent, as a result of which HUD stopped providing additional funding. Recent news reports say that the federal money is still not flowing. DHHL's website, <a href="http://dhhl.hawaii.gov/nahasda/">http://dhhl.hawaii.gov/nahasda/</a>, shows its current grant status:

To make a dent in the problem, we really need to understand why DHHL can't spend the money it now has. If we can't fix that problem, giving them a slug of additional funds can't be expected to solve much.

This testimony should not be interpreted as opposing an effort to solve the problem. We are very interested in seeing any dysfunction cleared and relief going to those who deserve it. If, for example, the problem is that most of the trust lands are uninhabitable due to location, then this bill should be amended to include language allowing DHHL to negotiate appropriate land swap, with DLNR if necessary, to acquire habitable land in place of uninhabitable land. Thought should go into what other tools than money are needed to accomplish the mission and get people off the waiting list.

Chair Luke, Vice Chair Yamashita, and Committee Members:

The League of Women Voters of Hawaii strongly supports HB 2511 marking \$600 million to help clear the backlog of Native Hawaiians waiting to get into livable homes. This legislation will prove historic when the backlog is reduced significantly as homes become occupied within a reasonable time.

The bill should prioritize the solutions needed on the multi-faceted challenges: earmarking land, cost of infrastructure, mortgage financing. Top priority should be given to acquiring desirable land on Oahu. Residents of Oahu should not be penalized because they live on an overpopulated island.

The state's Rainy Day Fund should not bear the brunt of funding the commitment. The Rainy Day Fund is an important safety net the state needs to maintain security for all its residents.

The bill should establish the special fund as a trust to continually support overcoming the multi-faceted challenges to fulfill the mission of the Department. Having the money held in trust safeguards the money for the purposes of the trust. An independent trustee answerable only to the Administrator, Department of Hawaiian Home Lands/Chairman, Hawaiian Homes Commission, should be appointed to administer the trust. The capable trustee must be free of entanglements subject to conflict-of-interest concerns. The trustee should be able to report funds management directly to the legislature in some fashion.

Appropriate assistance should be provided to the Department to assure best practices are used to implement the legislature's intention. Obstacles to clearing the backlog should be surfaced, identified and removed as swiftly as possible.

Accomplishment of the legislature's intent will be historic in view of the decades and generations of neglect given to the Admissions Act and its compact with the Hawaiian people. The measure should also help mitigate the extreme shortage of affordable housing in Hawaii.

Aloha Chair Luke and Members of this Committee:

The Ko'olau Foundation strongly supports House Bill 2511, House Draft 1, which would establish and contribute to a new special fund to enable more native Hawaiians to access homesteads.

In our view, for the State of Hawai'i to move to this level of funding for Hawaiian homestead development is long overdue and greatly needed. Far too many Hawaiian people are in need of housing security. The wait list for applicants to be awarded homesteads continues to grow, and the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands has been frustrated in its efforts to satisfy the needs of our people. This is because the United States government and the State of Hawai'i have failed to deliver on their promises to satisfy the terms of the Hawaiian Homelands Act of 1920.

Allthough the Ko`olau Foundation is primarily focused on historic preservation and cultural resource concerns, we feel that the core of our culture lives in our people. Many Hawaiians are trapped in a never-ending cycle of rent increases or eviction, homelessness, or other shelter emergencies. This disconnects them from the strength they would need to survive and thrive, and from appreciation of our rich culture and heritage.

As a side note: we believe awarding homesteads and preserving the Hawaiian culture are the primary purposes of the Hawaiian Homelands Act which DHHL is working to fulfill. That said, the fund should be used to meet those kinds of Hawaiian needs, with less emphasis on beneficiaries who have already been awarded homesteads. In addition, once a beneficiary has received an award, they should not be able to receive a second similar award until the wait-list has been completely awarded.

We appreciate your consideration of our plea, and urge that this bill be passed by the legislature this year. Mahalo for receiving our mana'o.



The Council for Native Hawaiian Advancement (CNHA) <u>STRONGLY SUPPORTS</u> HB2511, HD1, which would establish the Hawaiian Home Lands special fund into which will be appropriated \$600 million for use by qualifying Hawaiian Home Lands beneficiaries to acquire a residence and to enable the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) to fulfill the State of Hawai'i's fiduciary duty to these beneficiaries.

The State of Hawai'i holds a fiduciary obligation to Hawaiian Homes Commission Act (HHCA) beneficiaries, as part of its compact with the United States in exchange for admission into the Union and subsequently upon adopting the HHCA as a provision of the State's Constitution. The State later expanded its obligations to include enabling qualifying Native Hawaiians "to return to their lands in order to fully support self-sufficiency" and to support "the self-determination of Native Hawaiians." Due primarily to inadequate State funding, DHHL has amassed a waitlist of over 28,700 beneficiary-applicants, with countless applicants having passed away while awaiting the State to fulfill its obligation to them.

Prince Jonah Kūhiō Kalaniana'ole advocated for the passage of HHCA in 1921 on behalf of the Native Hawaiian people. After a century during which over 84% of the indigenous population was decimated by foreign-introduced diseases, pushing them to near extinction, 'Ōiwi leaders determined that the only way to rehabilitate Native Hawaiians, who the U.S. government characterized as "landless and dying," was to "place them back upon the soil." 3

We are a hui of organizations that provide direct-delivery and support services to the Native Hawaiian community across a variety of areas, including health, education, culture, 'āina, and resource management. We **STRONGLY SUPPORT** HB2511, HD1, which would appropriate \$600 million in much-needed and long-overdue funding to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) to enable native Hawaiians to acquire residences and to enable the DHHL to fulfill its fiduciary duties to beneficiaries.

During the first quarter of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, Prince Joseph Kūhiō Kalaniana'ole, Hawai'i's Congressional Delegate at the time, advocated for the United States to set aside approximately 200,000 acres of land to establish a permanent homeland for native Hawaiians, who were

identified as a landless and "dying" people as the result of disease, intermarriage, and loss of lands.

"After extensive investigation and survey on the part of various organizations organized to rehabilitate the Hawaiian race, it was found that the only method in which to rehabilitate the race was to place them back upon the soil," Prince Kūhiō wrote to U.S. Senators.

Finally enacted in 1921, the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act (HHCA) intended to return native Hawaiians to the land while encouraging them to become self-sufficient farmers, ranchers, and homesteaders on leased parcels of reserve land.


The federal Admission Act in 1959 mandated that the State of Hawai'i, as a compact with the U.S., administer the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act and the approximately 200,000 acres of "ceded land" set aside for Native Hawaiian homesteading, with oversight by the U.S. Congress.

Since then, the State of Hawai'i has struggled to fulfill the promise it made in exchange for statehood to house native Hawaiians under the HHCA program. The DHHL waitlist has steadily grown over the past decade, increasing from nearly 26,000 in 2010 to more than 28,700 today.

HB2511, HD1, represents a historic step towards the State of Hawai'i fulfilling its fiduciary obligations to beneficiaries of the HHCA trust. If enacted, this would be the single largest state or federal investment in the program in any one year in the 100-year history of HHCA. HB2511, HD1, holds the potential for generational change for native Hawaiians who have languished on the waitlist for far too long by offering the chance for homeownership in their kulāiwi.

The Environmental Caucus of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i stands in strong support of HB 2511 HD 1. This measure would establish the Hawaiian home lands special fund. It will appropriate funds into and out of the special fund for DHHL to enable beneficiaries of the Hawaiian home lands trust to acquire a residence and to enable DHHL to fulfill its fiduciary duties to its beneficiaries.

The Department of Hawaiian Home Lands is responsible for the management of 203,500 acres of trust lands, 9,959 homestead leases statewide with 44,096 lease applications. There are over 28,700 applicants that remain on the waitlist for residential, agricultural, and or pastoral leases. The reason for this excessive backlog is funding. Funds are necessary for infrastructure development and mortgage financing. The appropriation of \$600,000,000 would surely assist in both areas which would certainly decrease the long waitlist for native Hawaiians to obtain housing and the State to satisfy its trust obligations under the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act (1920), the Admissions Act, and the Hawaii State Constitution.

For these reasons, the Environmental Caucus of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i supports HB 2511 HD1 as it will assist the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands in developing the necessary infrastructure as well as providing mortgage finance assistance to develop homes and farms on DHHL properties for native Hawaiian as required by law.

Mahalo for the opportunity to stand in strong support of HB2511.

We commend the legislature for taking this bold step to fulfill the promise of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, which was signed over 100 years ago in 1920. While many other organizations can speak to the significance of helping thousands of native Hawaiian beneficiaries get off a waiting list that has had far too many people for far too long, Appleseed would like to comment on the benefits of this bill from an economic standpoint.

This bill would appropriate \$600M for the Department of Hawaiian Homelands (DHHL) to spend towards helping beneficiaries. DHHL currently has 17 projects in the pipeline and by some estimates this appropriation would provide approximately 2,000 -3,000 affordable homes depending on infrastructure costs, mortgage subsidies needed etc. Because beneficiaries often have multiple generations in one household each house would provide a home for a family of 5-7 people. Assuming 2,500 homes with 6 people in each home we could estimate approximately 15,000 residents will benefit from this \$600M in public spending. In other words the public subsidy for each home is about \$240,000.

And what exactly will be their benefit? Well for the first family moving in, six people will have access to predictable affordable housing for at least 20 years at which point some repairs might be needed. Assuming 6 people living in the house which cost \$240,000 worth of public funds this amounts to \$2,000 per person per year or \$167 per month.

Is it worth it for the state to invest \$167 per month for beneficiaries and their families to have access to secure and affordable housing? Considering that many Hawaii renters are paying more than half their income in rent, *many beneficiares will be saving much more than \$167 a month in housing costs as compared to renting in the private market*. And this money that beneficiaries will save due to their affordable housing will most likely go back into the local economy instead of a landlord that may or may not even live in Hawaii.

And these hundreds of dollars of monthly savings due to this government program will only grow after the owners pay off the mortgage. Which again, will mean more money being spent in the local economy. Overtime, the longer that a family continues to live in that DHHL home the lower their housing costs will be relative local wages. Which is unfortunately the opposite of what is happening in the non-DHHL housing market where prices keep climbing as wages stay stagnant.

As compared to what that beneficiary family would pay in the private market for housing, the \$240,000 invested by the public in permanently affordable housing will yield long-term savings

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for the household and much more spending in the local economy. The long-term financial benefits to Hawai'i will be far greater than the \$240,000 initial investment.

We encourage the committee to support this bill as not only a critical step to helping our beneficiaries but as an important step in providing long-term affordable housing and more spending in the local economy.

The building of free homes for Hawaiian Kanaka Maoli is long overdue. Since Territorial Days and the passing of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act in 1920, under Section 203(b) Sugarcane Lands were excluded from homesteading at that time, because a percentage of the Leases was to be provided towards building homes for Homesteaders under the Act. In those days it was an approximate allocate of money for around \$5,000 which now in the inflation calculator is approximately \$70,287.00; which would definitely be enough money to build the average kit home. Many DHHL'S Beneficiaries are looking forward to the possibility of having an actual home, instead of waiting forever on the list. It is important to assess which Beneficiaries applied (sometimes 2x but was lost) but did not receive the Homestead Award because they were told by DHHL they must get a house loan, which at one point was \$350,000 and a real hardship. Now, with attention to a real remedy, and the finding of \$125 million in the Investigation of DHHL Funds from the amended Self Determination Emergency Funding acquired since the year 2000 by Senator Fevella, the time is ripe to help the Kanaka Maoli People from the plight of mismanagement and misappropriation of house building funds. Dear Chair Sylvia Luke and Vice-chair Kyle T. Yamashita, and Other Members of the House Committee on Finance,

My name is Claire Gearen, and I write in strong support of House Bill 2511 HD1 relating to Hawaiian Homelands.

In September of 2019, I attended Faith Action for Community Equity's Affordable Housing Summit. Guest speakers Peter Ho, Rick Blangiardi, Stanley Chang, Kimberly Pine, Peter Savio, and others spoke about the "challenges and opportunities" of creating more affordable housing in Hawaii. Although Hawaiian Homelands was not specifically mentioned, my main take-away from the day long intensive was that moving the waitlist for Hawaiian Homelands would benefit all those seeking affordable housing in the state.

Indeed, approximately 28,700 households are on the waitlist for land, which is equal to close to half of the 65,000 units of housing stock projected at that time to be needed for our state in the near future.

It is telling that both Catholic Charities and Habitat for Humanity have submitted testimony in support of this legislation.

A \$600 million appropriation could house 2,000-4,000 families on the waitlist. This would free up housing stock for other Hawai'i households.

This has been an argument merely in terms of affordable housing needs for our island community, but let us not forget that it is currently:

129 years since the illegal overthrow of the Hawaiian Kingdom. 124 years since a United States simple majority senate vote annexed the Hawaiian Islands (against U.S. law).

101 years since the passing of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act! (With only 1 household housed for every 3 on the waitlist.)

And 29 years since the passing of the 1993 U.S. Apology Resolution, with little to show for it in terms of redress for wrongs committed.

I am a high school teacher with the Hawai'i Department of Education and I would like to point out that almost 25% of Hawai'i Public School students are native Hawaiian. Stable housing is the greatest priority for their success in school. In fact, in recent years I saw firsthand how moving the waitlist for Hawaiian Homelands can support a child. My student's family was awarded a turnkey property in Kapolei. This student wrote about his gratitude for his family's new home, and I learned that his grandfather, a Vietnam Veteran, had slipped in and out of homelessness and died on the waitlist. As we know, this is a tragic and not at all an uncommon story.

House Bill 2511 "holds the potential for generational change for native Hawaiians who have languished on the waitlist for too long."

Thank you to all who have introduced this bill. It gives me great hope for the future.

Aloha Chair Luke, Vice Chair Yamashita, and Members of the House Committee on Finance:

I am testifying today in strong support of HB2511, HD1, Relating to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands ("DHHL"). Sufficient funding has been a major stumbling block for DHHL, and passing this measure is an important step towards bringing Prince Kūhiō's vision to life on the ground and in our communities.

Although I am testifying in my personal capacity, I have some experience in this area. I am a Professor of Law at the University of Hawaiʻi at Mānoa's William S. Richardson School of Law and the Director of Ka Huli Ao Center for Excellence in Native Hawaiian Law. I teach and write in this highly specialized area, including the Law School's course in Native Hawaiian Law where we cover the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act ("HHCA") and funding issues in particular. I am also a practicing attorney with over twenty years of litigation experience in Native Hawaiian Law.

Honoring Prince Kūhiō's vision is about more than respecting our ali'i. Your legal duties under the HHCA are a condition of statehood. In other words, the State's admission to the Union was granted, in part, on the condition that our local government implement the HHCA. For many reasons, that has not happened. As a result, at the 1978 Constitutional Convention, Hawai'i's people made changes to our Constitution, removing the Legislature's discretion to fund DHHL. Additionally, article XII, section 2 of Hawai'i's Constitution reaffirmed that Hawaiian Homes projects throughout this pae 'āina "shall be faithfully carried out." Unfortunately, even with this express language, more than one hundred years after the HHCA's passage, its full intent and purpose have yet to be realized.

HB2511, HD1 is an important step in the right direction. Please vote to pass it out today.

I have been in the Fire department for over twenty years, and I enjoy giving back to the community. I was stationed at Waianae, Nanakuli, Waimanalo, Kapolei, and East Kapolei over my many years as a firefighter. I am proud to serve the public as a first responder and as a Native Hawaiian. I have been equally proud to serve the Hawaiian Homestead community over my many years of public service. Being a Native Hawaiian, I was excited to put my name on the Hawaiian Homes list when I was younger. Not because I wanted to appropriate land or a home, but because I had a chance to be part of a community. Growing up in Kaneohe, my parents had difficulties with life, and like many other Hawaiian children, I was left with my grandparents. Unfortunately, my grandmother passed when I was five years old, so I was left with just my grandfather. He was seventy-three years old. We lived in a modest home in Kaneohe, hardly a working TV, and one radio. But what we didn't have in items or even family members, we made up with love and support. The values I learned in that household with my grandfather have shaped me to be who I am today. In that home, I learned the value of giving back to others. In that home, I learned what sacrifice means. In that home, I learned what responsibility entailed, and how not to blame others for where I am in life. In that home, I learned what it meant to be from Hawaii. I learned as I got older, that the values I cherished were in-part taught to me by my grandfather and the home we lived in. Owning a home in the land where you grew up and where your ancestors grew up, fills you with a sense of pride. Aloha nui kākou,

Mahalo for the opportunity to share my mana'o on HB2511 SD1. The State of Hawai'i is legally obligated to provide sufficient funds to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) and is not fulfilling this obligation. I will spare you the details of this legal obligation, but as an elected official I expect you all to be well versed.

DHHL's mission to provide homestead lots to DHHL beneficiaries is CONTINGENT on having appropriate funding. Most recent estimates suggest a cost of \$6B in order to get all of the applicants currently on the DHHL waiting list onto homestead lots. Allocation of \$600M with the passing of this bill is just ONE SMALL STEP in a pono direction for the State of Hawai'i to provide CRITICAL FUNDING to DHHL.

Besides providing funding that the State is already obliged to, please think about the overall state of housing in the islands. All of Hawai'i's people are struggling in our exceptionally and uniquely constrained housing market. I hear many speak of affordable housing endeavors, and I believe that providing housing to DHHL beneficiaries is one of the BEST ways to make huge impacts on addressing the need for affordable housing for Hawai'i's local residents. If all 28,916 DHHL applicants on the waitlist are able to move onto homestead lands this impacts the need for affordable housing in two ways: 1. affordable housing is provided to 28,916 people of Hawai'i, not foreigners or transients AND 2. the units currently occupied by these thousands of applicants and their families in Hawai'i will be freed up and will potentially increase the options available in the housing market for other local residents, thereby lessening the constraints on the housing market.

Yes, providing these funds during a pandemic seems almost impossible. But it is not impossible. You have the opportunity to MAKE it possible. There is never a good time. And every year that this bucket is kicked down the road, more native Hawaiians are dying on the waitlist. Please make drastic changes to the quality of life of native Hawaiians, your constituents, in Hawai'i by supporting this bill.

Aloha Chair Shimabukuro, Vice Chair Keohokalole, and members of the Committee:

The Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) strongly supports this bill appropriating funds into and out of the native Hawaiian rehabilitation to fulfill its fiduciary duties to beneficiaries and requiring DHHL to submit an annual report to the legislature. DHHL humbly asks this committee to pass this bill unamended.

DHHL appreciates this legislature for hearing our calls for funding and the commitment to fulfilling the state's obligation to our community. An investment of \$600 million toward the implementation of the HHCA would be a historic infusion of resources to address the needs of potentially thousands of beneficiaries on DHHL's Waiting List. DHHL continues to be open to all measures that would return native Hawaiians to the land, as intended by Prince Jonah Kūhiō Kalaniana'ole.

As we embark on the next 100 years acknowledging the significance of the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the signing of the HHCA on July 9, 2021, this bill opens up opportunities for the over 28,000 beneficiaries and their families who continue to wait for the hope of Prince Kūhiō's promise to his people. Current costs for infrastructure development, borne by the Department, are in excess of \$150,000 per lot. In order to fulfill the needs of the current waitlist through this approach, DHHL would require over \$6 billion for infrastructure costs alone to serve its beneficiaries. This significant sum is separate and apart from costs for maintenance of existing lessee communities housing nearly ten thousand beneficiaries, upkeep of several utility systems, and other costs. Over the last decade, the Legislature has funded DHHL at levels higher than in years past, which has provided increased opportunity for DHHL to increase its reach. However, by conservative estimates following this approach, it will take DHHL at least another hundred years to meet the needs of its beneficiaries at current funding levels. This infusion of funds is expected to significantly address those who have been on the waiting list for decades.

## RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill.

House Bill No. 2511, H.D. 2: appropriates \$600,000,000 in general funds for FY 23 for deposit into the Native Hawaiian Rehabilitation Fund and \$600,000,000 in trust funds for FY 23 for the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands to fulfill its fiduciary duties to beneficiaries; and requires an annual report to the Legislature.

B&F notes that, with respect to the general fund appropriation in this bill, the federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act requires that states receiving Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) II funds and Governor's Emergency Education Relief II funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

Further, the federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires that states receiving ARP ESSER funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

The U.S. Department of Education has issued rules governing how these maintenance of effort (MOE) requirements are to be administered. B&F will be working with the money committees of the Legislature to ensure that the State of Hawai'i complies with these ESSER MOE requirements.

Chair Shimabukuro and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General provides the following comments on this bill.

This bill appropriates funds from the general fund into the Native Hawaiian rehabilitation fund (NHRF), a trust fund administered by the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) under section 213(d) and (i) of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, 1920 (HHCA). Page 4, lines 15-19, of the bill exempts this general fund appropriation from the executive budget and allotment process. The bill then appropriates the funds from the NHRF to DHHL, to develop homestead lots or units, purchase available land or units, provide funding to applicants on DHHL homestead waiting lists, and provide other services as needed to address the waiting list.

Under the separation of powers doctrine, the Legislature has the authority to appropriate general funds, while the Governor has the authority to determine the manner in which the funds are spent. See, e.g., Univ. of Conn. Chapter AAUP v. Governor, 512 A.2d 152, 156 (Conn. 1986) ("An appropriation is a statute passed by the legislature to authorize expenditures, while an allotment is the action by which the executive branch sets aside funds sufficient to cover a portion of the expenditure authorized by the appropriations act."). Exempting the initial general fund appropriation in this bill from the executive budget and allotment process appears to violate the

separation of powers doctrine. However, it would be appropriate to exempt DHHL's expenditures from the NHRF from the executive budget and allotment process because the NHRF is a trust fund established by the HHCA.

To address this concern, we recommend amending section 4 of the bill on page 4, lines 12-19, to read as follows:

SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$600,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 to be deposited into the native Hawaiian rehabilitation fund[; provided that the appropriation included in this Act shall not bind the department of Hawaiian home lands to conform to the executive budget execution policies and allotment process for the expenditure of funds].

If the Committee intends to exempt DHHL's expenditure of the funds from the NHRF from the executive budget and allocation process, we recommend amending section 5 of the bill on page 4, line 20, to page 5, line 3, to read as follows:

SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the native Hawaiian rehabilitation fund the sum of \$600,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 for the department of Hawaiian home lands to fulfill its fiduciary duties to beneficiaries[-]; provided that the appropriation included in this Act shall not bind the department of Hawaiian home lands to conform to the executive budget execution policies and allotment process for the expenditure of funds.

Providing this funding to the Department of Hawaiian Homelands will benefit native Hawaiians to the extent that it results in additional homesteads which would address the long list of beneficiaries waiting for their home in their native land. It is shameful for Hawaiians to die on the waitlist while waiting for the State of Hawaii to deliver on its 63-year old promise. If Maui County voters approve, the County will be designating a position within the County's new Department of Housing to work closely with the Department to deliver the needed housing for beneficiaries in Maui County.

Further, to the extent that additional funding will assist with the provision of Hawaiian Home Lands homesteads to the many wait-listers in Maui County, this matter is of concern to the County of Maui as any new homesteads help to address the crisis of affordable housing in our communities.

For the foregoing reasons, I **strongly support** this measure.

#### Comments:

This bill calls for \$600 Million for houses for the 28,000 families on the DHHL waitlist.

Also another bill already approved in committee calls for \$638 Million in arrears plus \$79 Million per year in future for OHA from ceded land revenues, exclusively for "betterment of Native Hawaiians" who comprise 20% of Hawaii's people; with no set-aside of 4 times those amounts exclusively for the other 80% of Hawaii's people who lack a drop of Hawaiian blood. What about money for my own favorite government agency DHHL: Department of Haole Homelands? Then there's SB3357 that would appropriate megabucks to various departments for exclusive benefit of ethnic Hawaiians. And don't forget another bill SB879, which has already passed its committee, that will force each county government to pay the construction costs and maintenance of water, roads, and other infrastructure on the DHHL lands it hosts.

\$600 Million + \$638 Million = \$1.238 BILLION just this year alone! And more in various other bills now passing their committees with zero "Nay" votes. Exclusively for "Native Hawaiians" even while they also continue to benefit from all the remaining government programs that benefit all our people. As the late Senator Everett Dirksen of Illinois might say: A Billion here, a Billion there -- pretty soon you'll be talking about real money!

Hmm ... Checking the arithmetic. \$600 Million to help 28,700 waitlisters. That's \$20,906 per house. In our Hawaii realestate market that might be enough for a 2-hole outhouse like my grandparents had in rural Michigan. But will the money simply be handed over to the waitlisters? Of course not. It must be filtered through a huge bureaucracy and given to construction contractors to build roads and water lines on the racially segregated ghettos where houses can only be "owned" in leasehold. How much more money will be demanded every year forever for DHHL?

Here's a better idea. According to OHA's latest annual report, on June 30, 2021 OHA had assets of \$764,820,000. So let OHA pay the \$600 Million, and they'll still have \$165 Million to play with. Then the \$600 Million which the legislature wants to squander on DHHL can be used to provide tax reductions for our hard-pressed taxpayers, or books and toiletpaper for our schools. Why should OHA be expected to pay the \$600 Million to DHHL? Because they can! And because when the original version of this bill was heard on February 2 OHA sent out an email or text message to everyone on its roster a day or two before the hearing, asking for

testimony to support this bill. Clearly OHA favors the bill. Clearly OHA believes it is part of OHA's kuleana to use government money to engage in political lobbying for bills providing benefits exclusively to people of its highly favored race. So let OHA put its money where its mouth is. You legislators have the power to "raid" money from any special fund or any department of the state government, as you have often done with the Hurricane Relief Fund or the money controlled by the Highway Department. It's time for you to exercise that power to rein in OHA and DHHL and save the rest of Hawaii's people from the racial entitlement monsters that threaten to devour the State.

Chair Shimabukuro, Vice Chair Keohokalole and Committee Members:

The League of Women Voters of Hawaii strongly supports HB 2511 marking \$600 million to help clear the backlog of Native Hawaiians waiting to get into livable homes. This legislation will prove historic when the backlog is reduced significantly as homes become occupied within a reasonable time.

The bill should prioritize the solutions needed on the multi-faceted challenges: earmarking land, cost of infrastructure, mortgage financing. Top priority should be given to acquiring desirable land on Oahu. Residents of Oahu should not be penalized because they live on an overpopulated island.

The state's Rainy Day Fund should not bear the brunt of funding the commitment. The Rainy Day Fund is an important safety net the state needs to maintain security for all its residents.

The League agrees in requiring the department to submit annual reports to the legislature. The bill should establish the special fund as a trust to continually support overcoming the multi-faceted challenges to fulfill mission of the Department. Having the money held in trust safeguards the money for the purposes of the trust. An independent trustee answerable only to the Administrator, Department of Hawaiian Home Lands/Chairman, Hawaiian Homes Commission, should be appointed to administer the trust. The capable trustee must be free of entanglements subject to conflict-of-interest concerns. The trustee should be able to report funds management directly to the legislature in some fashion.

Additionally, the current requirement of 50 percent blood quantum is a silent threat hanging over all applicants. As applicants die off the list, their families will have lost the opportunity envisioned and provided for by Prince Kuhio. Successor rights are allowed to 25 percent blood quantum of certain relatives, but the land must be in the hands of a beneficiary first. Persons with 50 percent quantum are being lost all too quickly.

Accomplishment of the legislator's intent will be historic in view of the decades and generations of neglect given to the Admissions Act and its compact with the Hawaiian people. The measure should also help mitigate the extreme shortage of affordable housing in Hawaii.

We are a hui of organizations that provide direct-delivery and support services to the Native Hawaiian community across a variety of areas, including health, education, culture, 'āina, and resource management. We **STRONGLY SUPPORT** HB2511, HD2, which would appropriate \$600 million in much-needed and long-overdue funding to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) to enable native Hawaiians to acquire residences and to enable the DHHL to fulfill its fiduciary duties to beneficiaries.

During the first quarter of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, Prince Joseph Kūhiō Kalaniana'ole, Hawai'i's Congressional Delegate at the time, advocated for the United States to set aside approximately 200,000 acres of land to establish a permanent homeland for native Hawaiians, who were

identified as a landless and "dying" people as the result of disease, intermarriage, and loss of lands.

"After extensive investigation and survey on the part of various organizations organized to rehabilitate the Hawaiian race, it was found that the only method in which to rehabilitate the race was to place them back upon the soil," Prince Kūhiō wrote to U.S. Senators.

Finally enacted in 1921, the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act (HHCA) intended to return native Hawaiians to the land while encouraging them to become self-sufficient farmers, ranchers, and homesteaders on leased parcels of reserve land.

The federal Admission Act in 1959 mandated that the State of Hawai'i, as a compact with the U.S., administer the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act and the approximately 200,000 acres of "ceded land" set aside for Native Hawaiian homesteading, with oversight by the U.S. Congress.

Since then, the State of Hawai'i has struggled to fulfill the promise it made in exchange for statehood to house native Hawaiians under the HHCA program. The DHHL waitlist has steadily grown over the past decade, increasing from nearly 26,000 in 2010 to more than 28,700 today.

HB2511, HD2, represents a historic step towards the State of Hawai'i fulfilling its fiduciary obligations to beneficiaries of the HHCA trust. If enacted, this would be the single largest state or federal investment in the program in any one year in the 100-year history of HHCA. HB2511, HD2, holds the potential for generational change for native Hawaiians who have languished on the waitlist for far too long by offering the chance for homeownership in their kulāiwi.

In closing, we urge the Committee to PASS HB2511, HD2. Mahalo nui loa for this opportunity to provide testimony.

The Council for Native Hawaiian Advancement (CNHA) <u>STRONGLY SUPPORTS</u> HB2511, HD2, which would appropriate \$600 million for use by qualifying Hawaiian Home Lands beneficiaries to acquire a residence, thus enabling the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) to fulfill the State of Hawai'i's fiduciary duty to these beneficiaries.

The State of Hawai'i holds a fiduciary obligation to Hawaiian Homes Commission Act (HHCA) beneficiaries, as part of its compact with the United States in exchange for admission into the Union and subsequently upon adopting the HHCA as a provision of the State's Constitution. The State later expanded its obligations to include enabling qualifying Native Hawaiians "to return to their lands in order to fully support self-sufficiency" and to support "the self-determination of Native Hawaiians." Due primarily to inadequate State funding, DHHL has amassed a waitlist of over 28,700 beneficiary-applicants, with countless applicants having passed away while awaiting the State to fulfill its obligation to them.

Prince Jonah Kūhiō Kalaniana'ole advocated for the passage of HHCA in 1921 on behalf of the Native Hawaiian people. After a century during which over 84% of the indigenous population was decimated by foreign-introduced diseases, pushing them to near extinction, 'Ōiwi leaders determined that the only way to rehabilitate Native Hawaiians, who the U.S. government characterized as "landless and dying," was to "place them back upon the soil." 3

Aloha Chair Shimabukuro, Vice Chair Keohokalole, and Members of the Committee,

Ka Lāhui Hawai'i Kōmike Kalai'āina submits the following written testimony in SUPPORT of House Bill 2511 HD2 which appropriates funds into and out of the native Hawaiian rehabilitation fund for DHHL to fulfill its fiduciary duties to native Hawaiians (Native Hawaiians of 50% blood quantum or more). This measure would help the State to fulfill its obligation to native Hawaiians to return them to the land and provides a real opportunity to reduce the number applicants on the DHHL wait list. Currently, there are over 28,000 applicants on the DHHL list waiting to receive awards - this number has risen exponentially over the decades. For example, in 1983 there were only approximately 8,000 applicants on the DHHL wait list.

The Hawaiian Homes Commission Act was passed by Congress and signed by the US President in 1921. After the lands were transferred to the State to be held in Trust' for native Hawaiians in Section 4 of the 1959 Admissions Act, the State was mandated by a Hawai'i State Constitutional amendment in 1978 to provide "sufficient sums" to DHHL for 4 purposes one of which was for the development of homes. Currently, the average price of a home in Hawai'i is a million dollars - a price that the average Hawai'i resident (including Native Hawaiians) cannot afford. According to a 2017 study entitled "Asset Limited Income Constrained Employed: A Study of Financial Hardships in Hawai'i," fifty-seven percent of all Native Hawaiians in Hawai'i are struggling financially and 33% of all houseless are Native Hawaiian.

Leaders at the legislature often talk about addressing the 'housing shortage' in Hawai'i. The average household size of a Hawaiian homestead household is 4. If awards were given to all 28,000 wait listers tomorrow that would make a huge dent in Hawai'i's 'affordable housing crisis'. Eliminating the number of eligible native Hawaiians on the DHHL wait list should be a priority for the State.

The American Civil Liberties Union of Hawai'i ("ACLU of Hawai'i") supports HB 2511 HD2 that appropriates funds into and out of the native Hawaiian rehabilitation fund for DHHL to fulfill its fiduciary duties to beneficiaries.

The ACLU of Hawai'i is committed to protecting the civil liberties and civil rights enshrined in our federal and state Constitutions, and advancing our campaign policies to Decriminalize Houselessness, Reimagine Policing and Smart Justice.

As part of our efforts to build a new vision of safety and justice, we advocate for the State to shift spending priorities away from mass criminalization and incarceration that disparately impacts Native Hawaiians, towards investments in education, housing, health care. human services and restorative justice in our communities.

Over the years, the Legislature has created multiple task forces and supported initiatives for the purpose of examining and improving the state's criminal legal system and reducing the carceral population. These include:

- Justice Reinvestment Initiative (2011)
- Native Hawaiian Justice Task Force (2012)
- H.C.R. 85 Task Force (2018)
- Criminal Pretrial Task Force (2018)
- The Hawaii Correctional Oversight Commission (2020)
- Criminal Justice Research Institute

Additionally, numerous reports and literature have highlighted the racial bias and disparities that exists within Hawai'i's criminal legal system – and disparately targets Native Hawaiians.

While these Commissions and initiatives have issued a plethora of recommendations to reduce the jail and prison population, and eliminate racial disparities within our criminal legal system, these recommendations have been ignored, underfunded and rarely implemented.

Simultaneously, the State has spent millions of dollars incarcerating Native Hawaiians instead of investing those funds into data-driven strategies, including stable housing, that would reduce the number of Native Hawaiians in the criminal legal system.

Due to limited data collection within our criminal legal system, it is unknown just how many Native Hawaiians under community supervision or incarcerated are on the waitlist for Hawaiian Home Lands or eligible for Hawaiian Home Lands. However, given the stark racial disparities within Hawaii's criminal legal system, the State should track this data. Determining the number of Native Hawaiians involved in the criminal legal system who are current beneficiaries on the waitlist, or are eligible for Hawaiian Home Lands, is an important data point to inform public policies, including appropriations for diversion, rehabilitation and re-entry programs.

Numerous studies confirm that housing can determine education, health and economic opportunities, and exposure to crime. Research also shows that people returning from jails and prisons face many barriers to successful re-entry. Often, the most serious challenge is securing stable housing. In turn, housing has long been recognized as a prerequisite for stable employment, access to social services and other aspects of individual and family functioning.

Nationally, statistics show that formerly incarcerated people are almost 10 times more likely to be homeless than general public.<sup>1</sup>

Closer to home, the 2020 O'ahu Point in Time Count noted that over half of all houseless individuals identified as Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander.<sup>2</sup> The Touchpoints Report also estimated that 25-50% of the homeless in Hawai'i have a history of incarcerated and that an estimated 30% of people released from our jails and prisons are exiting to houselessness.<sup>3</sup>

This measure is a significant step towards fulfilling the State's fiduciary duties to beneficiaries, including Native Hawaiians disparately impacted by Hawai'i's criminal legal system.

Aloha Chair Shimabukuro, Vice Chair Keohokalole and members of the Committee,

My name is Hokulani Johnasen and my 'ohana resides in the Hawaiian Homestead of Keaukaha, Hawai'i. I STRONGLY SUPPORT HB2511, HD2, which would appropriate \$600 million in much-needed and long-overdue funding to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands to enable native Hawaiians to acquire residences. HB2511, HD2, represents a historic step towards the State of Hawai'i fulfilling the promise it made to house native Hawaiians when it assumed responsibility for the administration of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act (HHCA) as a condition of statehood. If enacted, this would be the single largest state or federal investment in the program in the entire 100-year history of the HHCA.
