Chair Johanson, Vice Chair Kitagawa, and Members of the Committee:

The Office of Planning and Sustainable Development (OPSD) **supports the intent of this measure and offers comments** on HB 2514, HD 1, which prohibits the operation of underground storage tanks with a capacity greater than 100,000 gallons.

The Office of Planning and Sustainable Development prepares and coordinates climate change adaptation actions for the State; and recognizes the value of all of Hawai'i's water in both the natural and built environments, including freshwater, wastewater, and stormwater resources for their best sustainable use, and to preserve the water's quality and quantity.

Hawai'i's changing climate includes scientific data that generally, rainfall throughout the state has decreased by 18% over a 30-year period from 1978-2007.<sup>1</sup> The access to clean and safe drinking water is vital for Hawai'i's climate resilience and sustainability. This is imperative for the Island of O'ahu since the island contains the majority of the state's population.

Measures like this bill seeking to prohibit the operation of underground storage tanks with a capacity greater than 100,000 gallons can reduce the risk of potentially contaminating the State of Hawai'i's potable drinking water sources.

The Office of Planning and Sustainable Development is committed the sustainable development and climate adaptation of the state to meet the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations of Hawai'i to meet their own needs.

5 Hill Ridge, each with an approximate capacity of 12.5 million gallons, but also four other USTs,

6 each with an approximate capacity of 400,000 gallons ("surge tanks" ), that are part of the Red

7 Hill UST system and are located makai of the underground injection control (UIC) line

8 An alternative is the language in HB2274 HD1, establishing a date after which large

9 capacity UST systems located mauka of the UIC line may no longer operate.

10 We defer to the legislature on selecting the appropriate date.

## Statement of the Protect Kahoʻolawe ʻOhana Regarding the Kapūkakī Fuel Storage Tank Facility Calling for the immediate decommissioning and removal of the fuel tanks

E ui aku ana au iā 'oe:	One question I ask of you:
Aia i hea ka wai a Kāne?	Where flows the water of Kane?
Aia i lalo, i ka honua, i ka wai hū,	Deep in the ground, in the gushing spring,
I ka wai kau a Kāne me Kanaloa —	In the ducts of Kāne and Kanaloa,
He wai puna, he wai e inu,	A well-spring of water, to quaff,
He wai e mana, he wai e ola.	A water of magic power, the water of life!
E ola nō, e-a!	Life! O give us this life!

The lines quoted above comprise the last stanza of "He Mele No Kāne," a composition that masterfully describes all of the places that water may be found. From the zenith of the heavens to the depths of the Earth, from the rising to the setting of the sun, water is everywhere. This water is a physical manifestation of the deity Kāne. It is sacred. It is life giving.

In recent weeks, a threat to our life-giving water has reared its menacing head. Officials and activists warned of this potential hazard for years. True to character, the United States Navy is attempting to downplay the seriousness of the issue at hand, just as it did for many years when we fought to stop the bombing of Kaho'olawe. The Navy's lack of integrity and absence of transparency prove that it once again cannot be trusted. The careless abuse of Kaho'olawe and lackadaisical cleanup of the island established precedence of their negligence. We again witness their carelessness and mismanagement of Hawai'i's precious resources.

The fuel storage tanks at Kapūkakī (Red Hill) are a known threat to O'ahu's aquifer. For many years, community groups such as the Sierra Club of Hawai'i and individuals such as Ernest Lau, Board of Water Supply Chief Engineer, cautioned of imminent discharge from the aging fuel tanks that sit over O'ahu's natural volcanic dikes. Yet the Navy continues to deny the presence of such risk and chooses, instead, to evade the fact that we are on the brink of a devastating environmental disaster. At a December 2, 2021 Facebook Live town hall meeting, 25th Infantry Division Cmdr. Maj. Gen. Joseph Ryan told attendees, "Our readiness posture here in the Pacific is predicated, the foundation of it, is the life, health and safety of our service members and their families." Is that not telling? It's not about the island, the environment, and the people of Hawai'i, it's about the military families and their assets. And, tragically, the service members and families have been the first to be impacted.

The Protect Kaho'olawe 'Ohana supports the efforts of the Sierra Club Hawai'i, the O'ahu Water Protectors, Ka'ohewai, and all other environmental advocacy groups that are calling for the **immediate** shut down and decommissioning of the Kapūkakī (Red Hill) Storage Tank Facility. Our water is too precious a resource to wait any longer to take action.

Of course, this is not the first example of a lack of concern for the source of life, our environment, and our well being. In 1965, the U.S. Navy carried out an "experiment" known as "<u>Operation Sailor Hat</u>" on Kaho'olawe. Three 500-ton blasts of explosives created a crater on Kaho'olawe that, in addition to other long lasting effects, may have cracked the water table, diminishing the island's ability to support flora and fauna for generations. Was that "experiment" a foreshadowing of things to come? This cannot happen again, yet leaking fuel tanks and a possible explosion within the crater are a reality and may be probable should conditions such as this be allowed to continue.

The PKO strongly urges our members and our supporters to call upon Honolulu City Council members, State Senators and Representatives, and Hawai'i's congressional delegation to intervene and call for urgent action regarding the Kapūkakī (Red Hill) Fuel Storage Facility. The U.S. Navy must be held accountable for their blatant disregard for the purity of O'ahu's drinking water resources and the safety of O'ahu's communities. We cannot allow history to repeat itself and let the Navy get away with their reckless actions. E ola ka wai, e ola ka 'āina, e ola kākou. Let the water live so that the land may live and so that we may live.

The PKO stands in support of HB2514 and HB2274 which seeks to protect our islands' most precious resource from fuel contamination. Our water is precious and we all have a duty to protect our islands' source of life for present and future generations. We request that the measure be amended by: 1) removing reference to the Red Hill Bulk Fuel Storage Facility in the preamble, to avoid potential federal preemption challenges; 2) amending the proposed new definition of "underground fuel storage tank" to apply to facilities with field-constructed tanks, or with a capacity over 100,000 gallons; and 3) ensuring that no permit may be issued or renewed for an underground fuel storage tank, and that no underground fuel storage tank may be operated after the end of this year, for a facility located mauka of the underground injection control.

Aloha Chair Johanson, Vice Chair Kitagawa, and members of the Consumer Protection & Commerce Committee,

The Sierra Club of Hawai'i **supports with amendments** HB2514 HD1, which has the potential to help prevent the catastrophic contamination of our groundwater aquifers from extremely large-capacity underground storage tank facilities.

The concept of "ola i ka wai" – that water is life – has been understood by the people of Hawai'i since time immemorial. Unfortunately, this concept has not been fully appreciated in historical decisions that have allowed for the installation of large underground storage tank facilities in close proximity to the groundwater aquifer that our environment and people have always depended upon. Tragically, due to these historic decisions, we have already witnessed the contamination of our islands' precious wai.

Accordingly, the Sierra Club supports this bill as a means to ensure that we do not repeat the mistakes of the past, in prohibiting the operation of massive underground fuel storage tanks and facilities that may pose an inherent risk to our water and our ways of life here in Hawai'i.

To ensure that the protections of this measure are put in place in a timely manner and before any further contamination occurs, the Sierra Club respectfully urges amending the language found on page 1, lines 5-7, to read as follows:

> **Group Testimony in Support of HB2514HD1** RELATING TO UNDERGROUND STORAGE TANKS.

#### Mōhala i ka wai ka maka o ka pua

"Unfolded by the water are the faces of flowers." Meaning: Flowers thrive where there is water, as thriving people are found where living conditions are good.

'Ahahui o nā Kauka (the Association of Native Hawaiian Physicians) calls for the urgent and permanent removal of the United States Navy's Bulk Fuel Storage Facility at Kapūkakī, commonly referred to as "Red Hill" in modern times. Safe drinking water is the foundation of health for all humans, and in Hawaiian culture carries even more significance as the base for our word for "wealth," as our ancestors clearly knew people cannot thrive without safe water to nourish our bodies and the land. After decades of warnings about the danger posed by these leaking fuel tanks to sources of drinking water providing for an approximate 400,000 residents of by far the most populous of our islands, we are dismayed to see that this threat has been allowed to progress to this fulminant crisis where both people and the land are being acutely poisoned by the Navy's persistent contamination at Kapūkakī.

The fuel storage facility at Kapūkakī was constructed by the United States Navy, at the time of the crisis of World War II, when its close proximity to a priceless aquifer could have been regarded as insignificant. Some of the liberties taken by the Navy in Hawai'i during this era may have been justified, but the ongoing disregard for our islands and people as little more than military assets since then has presented threats to our health that persist to this day. We are reminded of the 1965 detonation on Kaho'olawe meant to simulate a nuclear blast that cracked the cap rock and permanently destroyed a significant portion of the fresh water to the island, not to mention the continued threat of unexploded ordnance left by the Navy. More than 80 years after construction, it is time for the Navy to acknowledge the extraordinary threat its outdated, dilapidated fuel storage facility at Kapūkakī poses to our people, land, and ocean.

After over a century of hosting the US Navy's military interests, Hawai'i and its people deserve to be treated as more than military assets left to suffer the harms of infrastructure neglect. As Native Hawaiian physicians, we can no longer turn a blind eye to physical and mental health effects this facility poses to our patients and communities not only by contaminating a large portion of the water supply but also by destroying the faith people had in the safety of our water. We applaud the legislative efforts to address this imminent threat, and prevent the development of future dangerous fuel storage facilities, but we urge the legislature to encourage swift action by setting the effective end of operations at existing facilities to July 1, 2022 except for defueling and decommissioning.

#### Hawai'i Alliance for Progressive Action <u>Supports</u>: HB2514 HD1

Aloha Chairs Johanson, Vice Chair Kitagawa and Members of the Committee,

On behalf of the Hawai'i Alliance for Progressive Action (HAPA) I am submitting testimony in strong **support of HB2514 HD1.** HAPA is a state-wide organization that engages approximately 10,000 local residents annually.

Mahalo for hearing HB2514 HD1 to require the Department of Health to adopt the standard that all underground storage tanks not exceed a maximum capacity of 100,000 gallons.

HB2514 HD1 seeks to protect our islands' most precious resource from fuel contamination. The presence of leaky fuel tanks at Red Hill and the Navy's mismanagement of this crisis directly impacts the health and quality of life of Oahu's residents, and will continue to for generations to come. Some of our staff and many of our supporters are directly affected by this crisis. Our water is precious and we all have a duty to protect our islands' source of life for present and future generations.

Please amend the date of implementation of July 1, 2022 as the date after which no underground storage tank can be operated except to defuel and decommission.

The legislature must do all that it can to remove the threat of something far worse happening to our water supply, both now and for future generations to come. O'ahu's residents are facing a serious crisis which will continue for years. Board of Water Supply's Ernie Lau said that the Hālawa shaft – which was shut down as a precaution following the Navy's Red Hill well contamination – could be shut down for years, even permanently.

We cannot allow 80-year-old underground storage tanks that store up to 187 million gallons of fuel per day and that pose such an immense threat of leaking and contaminating our environment and water supply to operate 100 feet above O'ahu's sole-source drinking water aquifer.

Navy officials cannot be trusted to protect our water. They have lied time and time again. The following reasons explain why the legislature must act since the Navy has failed to:

- The Navy lied about an active leak at Pearl Harbor for months, discovering the leak in January 2021 but not informing Health Department officials until May. This was revealed in whistleblower emails and documents in October.
- A whistleblower also told the Department of Health in September that Navy officials provided false testimony and withheld information about the full extent of the Facility's infrastructure, including connected pipelines, as well as "historical records of corrosion issues, including holes in tanks" at its Red Hill fuel facility during legal proceedings.

- The Navy suspended use of its Red Hill water shaft on November 28, but the public only found out on December 1. The Navy continues to confuse and gaslight community members.
- Hundreds of community members reported chemical smells in their water on November 28 and then health issues on November 29, which the Navy refused to acknowledge as a potential health concern until the state Department of Health advised residents to not drink the clearly contaminated water.
- A day after the Navy said it had detected diesel in its 'Aiea Hālawa well at levels more than double the DOH safety limit, the military backtracked, saying the contaminated sample "did not come directly" from the well and the Navy does not believe the result proves the well is contaminated.
- They continue to not be transparent despite agreeing to the Administrative Order of Consent, which requires them to be more forthcoming about operations at the Red Hill facility.
- The BWS Hālawa shaft will be shut down until fuel is removed from the tanks and may not reopen for years to come. This shaft was a source of water for South O'ahu from Hālawa to Maunalua. The BWS has advised that mandatory water conservation measures will now need to be in place in the summer of 2022.
- The Navy "flushed" Red Hill contaminants for days in violation of Department of Health requirements despite repeated warnings. This risked long-lasting effects on birds, plants, fish, and other aquatic life from petroleum contamination

The Department of Health has agreed that the situation is inherently dangerous. DOH said that a water sample taken from the Red Hill drinking water shaft on December 5 confirmed the water is contaminated with "high levels" of petroleum and gasoline. The sample detected total petroleum hydrocarbons diesel range organics levels 350 times above the DOH Environmental Action Level (EAL) for drinking water, and gasoline range organics more than 66 times the DOH EAL.

The Red Hill facility – the fragile, antiquated fuel tanks and supporting systems – has a long history of leaking fuel into the surrounding environment and has already contaminated O'ahu's primary drinking water aquifer. Shutting down Red Hill immediately and entirely is the only way to guarantee the safety of our water and our people.

The Facility's tanks, each with a 12.5 million-gallon capacity, had a quarter-inch thick steel liner when first constructed nearly 80 years ago. They are encased in aging concrete and the steel liners have been corroding to the point where many through-wall holes have been found and in some areas they are one-third of their original thickness.

These tanks have leaked 180,000 gallons of fuel since they were constructed and the Navy's own risk assessment from 2018 concluded that the probability of an acute leak of between 1,000 and 30,000 gallons (independent of any earthquake risk) over the next ten years is 96%. The Navy cannot prove that the tank or tank system will not leak regulated substances into the environment.

Approximately 93,000 people living in military housing have been unable to use their water for over two months. If the Navy water system is further compromised, our housing crisis will mushroom.

Lower levels of petroleum products were also found in samples collected from the Aliamanu Child Development Center as well as homes located on the Navy's water system.

It's absolutely critical that the State Legislature take action immediately to address this major threat to Honolulu's water supply.

Please pass HB2514 HD1 with an amended date of implementation of July 1, 2022 as the date after which no underground storage tank can be operated except to defuel and decommission.

The Hawai'i Public Health Institute<sup>i</sup> is in **support of HB2514 and offers an amendment.** HB 2514 would protect public health and O'ahu's clean drinking water supply by prohibiting the operation of underground storage tanks with a capacity greater than 100,000 gallons.

HIPHI is alarmed by the recent events surrounding Red Hill and the confirmation of petroleum in our water supply. Fresh, clean drinking water is a precious resource, with access to clean drinking water being a basic human right that is "essential for the enjoyment of life and all human rights."<sup>iii</sup>

For years, advocates and organizations like the Sierra Club have warned about the need to protect our drinking water, as the Red Hill Fuel Tank facility sits only 100 feet above the aquifer that supplies water to over 400,000 people, from Hālawa to Hawai'i Kai. The Red Hill facility has a long history of leaking fuel into the surrounding environment and has already contaminated O'ahu's primary drinking water aquifer. Ending operations of the Red Hill facility immediately and preventing future large underground storage tanks from being constructed is necessary to guarantee the safety of our water and our people.

**HIPHI respectfully requests the committee to amend this measure** by implementing July 1, 2022 as the date after which no underground storage tank can be operated, except to defuel and decommission.

This public health crisis was preventable, and we urge the Federal and State governments to take swift action to protect our water supply. Clean water is essential for life, and access to clean, safe drinking water is a basic human right.

The Environmental Caucus of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i stands in strong support of HB 2514 HD 1. This measure would prohibit the operation of underground storage tanks with a capacity greater than 100,000 gallons.

In 2018, nearly four years ago, the O'ahu County Democrats, out of dire concern over the risk to the Moanalua-Waimalu Aquifer, our major drinking water source for Moanalua to Hawai'i Kai, affecting hundreds of thousands of residents, businesses and visitors of the City and County of Honolulu, adopted a resolution, OC 2018-11, urging the Navy to retrofit its tanks or move them away from the aquifer. The Navy has taken no such action, and the situation has now become, in the words of your former colleague, U.S. Rep. Kai Kahele, "a crisis of astronomical proportions." Further, DOH Hearings Officer David D. Day called the Facility a "ticking time bomb." In addition, on January 8, 2022, the State Central Committee of the Democratic Party of Hawaii passed a "Resolution Urging the Immediate Draining of the U.S. Navy Red Hill Fuel Storage Tanks and Closure of the Facility." The passage of this bill would effectively serve to close the Facility. We request that the date to be inserted be January 1, 2023.
