### In consideration of HOUSE BILL 1394, HOUSE DRAFT 1 RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES

House Bill 1394, House Draft 1 proposes to appropriate funds to the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) Division of Forestry and Wildlife to manage hotspots at trailheads as part of the Nā Ala Hele Trail and Access Program (Program). The Department strongly supports this measure provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities indicated the Department's Executive Budget request.

The Department acknowledges the Hawai'i Tourism Authority's Destination Management Action Plan initiative, identified a series of destination "hotspots" across the state that are presenting management challenges to the agencies tasked with managing the hotspot areas. Program staff are currently actively engaged in a strategic planning effort to address the challenges associated with visitor use and have initiated programs and projects statewide to help mitigate the impacts of a rapid rise in outdoor recreation.

The funding proposed by this bill will allow the Department to put personnel and planning efforts in motion to address a number of these hotspots, including trailheads in the Koke'e region of Kaua'i, the Maunawili Falls and Ka'iwa Ridge trails on O'ahu, multiple areas on Maui, Naha Trail on Lāna'i, and Pololū Valley, Waipi'o Valley, and Maunakea on Hawai'i Island. The positions proposed will enable enhanced active management of the Division of Forestry and Wildlife's recreational inventory. The Department respectfully requests that the funding amount for operating expenses be established at \$2,000,000 recurring annually.

Aloha Chair Inouye, Vice Chair Elefante, and Members of the Committee on Water and Land,

The Hawai'i Tourism Authority (HTA) appreciates the opportunity to offer comments on HB1394 HD1, which appropriates funds to the Department of Land and Natural Resources for operating costs and personnel to manage certain trailheads as part of the Nā Ala Hele trail and access program.

Aloha Chair Inouye and Members of the Senate Water and Land Committee,

I strongly support HB 1394 HD1 for the following reasons:

Hawai'i's most cherished outdoor spaces on all the islands need to be better protected from the consequences of trail overcrowding and overuse. Our state's trails should be an asset we can be proud to share with visitors, but this will require long-term commitment and investment. HB 1394 HDI would demonstrate that commitment.

HB1394 HD1 would better equip our Statewide Trail and Access System known as Nā Ala Hele, with resources and personnel needed to properly fix, manage, and maintain the "hot spots" that are being "loved to death." For too many years, the Nā Ala Hele program has struggled to manage our state's trail and access system with minimal staffing and resources.

Knowing the ownership of trails and accesses in the hot spots, as well as ownership of the historic Hawaiian trails, is critical to Nā Ala Hele's work. HB 1394 HDI, SECTION 2. (7) provides for a full-time, permanent abstractor position on O'ahu where many key sources of information for the abstractor's research are located. Historic Hawaiian trails are a special category of trail completely unique to Hawai'i and culturally significant. Historic Hawaiian trails can be government-owned, per the Highways Act of 1892 (see HRS §264-1). Claiming government-ownership of historic Hawaiian trails needs to be timely and requires professional research by an abstractor who is well-versed in Hawaiian land-tenure, language, and history. Time is running out for the protection of historic Hawaiian trails, as more rural lands are purchased and developed, especially on the neighbor islands.

Please support HB1394 HD1, which will improve the state's ability to manage our trails on all the islands as well as help to protect the vulnerable, historic Hawaiian trails for future generations.
