Chair Ichiyama, Vice-Chair Poepoe, and Members of the Committee:

The Department of Taxation ("Department") offers the following <u>comments</u> regarding H.B. 1447 for your consideration.

H.B. 1447 adds a new section to chapter 235, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to create a new refundable native plant preservation tax credit. The refundable tax credit is equal to \$1,000 multiplied by the percentage of the taxpayer's land that is occupied by native plants, provided that native plants occupy at least 20 percent of the taxpayer's land. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) is responsible for administration of this credit, including certification of qualified use and amount of credit taxpayers may claim.

This measure is effective upon approval and applies to taxable years beginning after December 31, 2022.

The Department recommends making the tax credit nonrefundable, as refundable credits are more prone to fraudulent claims.

Further, the Department defers to DLNR on its ability to certify this credit, but respectively requests that a third-party certification requirement be maintained, as the Department lacks subject-matter expertise to determine eligibility for and to administer this credit.

Finally, the Department notes that due to the number of bills with tax law changes that have been introduced this year, the Department may not have the resources to implement all measures passed this session for tax year 2023. The Department will continue to monitor the status of proposed legislation and will advise whether some changes will require a later effective date.

In consideration of HOUSE BILL 1447 RELATING TO NATIVE PLANT SPECIES

House Bill 1447 proposes to create an income tax credit for taxpayers who engage in preservation efforts using native plants. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) acknowledges the intent of this measure, but this bill places a significant burden on the Department rather than the individual taxpayer.

The Department recognizes that private landowners play an integral role in stewarding their lands and supports the intent of this measure because it encourages private landowners to plant native plants on their property. However, the bill, as drafted, puts a significant burden on the Department to verify and certify the percentage of native plants expressed as an amount over twenty (20) percent, to certify the taxpayer's "use" of native plants, and to maintain records of taxpayers claiming this credit. Although a fee is suggested to offset the costs of certification of claims, no concomitant increase of staffing is made or funds appropriated. Additionally, the credit calculation of \$1,000 per percent of taxpayer's land could involve those owning a very small plot of land (vs. extensive acreage), as this set fee rewards those with small acreage owned but with a high percentage in native plants, giving a disproportionately large resultant tax credit. This could likely frustrate the stated intent of the bill to increase native plant "biodiversity."

SUBJECT: INCOME, Tax Credit for Preservation of Native Plants

BILL NUMBER: HB 1447

INTRODUCED BY: HUSSEY-BURDICK, AMATO, BELATTI, COCHRAN, GANADEN, KAHALOA, KAPELA, KILA, NISHIMOTO, PERRUSO, POEPOE, TAKENOUCHI, TODD

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: Creates an income tax credit for taxpayers who engage in preservation efforts using native plants.

SYNOPSIS: Adds a new section to chapter 235, HRS, to create a refundable income tax credit for native plant preservation. The credit amount is \$1,000 multiplied by the percentage of the taxpayer's land that is occupied by native plants. No credit is allowed if the percentage is less than 20%.

Tasks DLNR with certifying claims for the credit.

Provides that all claims for the tax credit, including amended claims, shall be filed on or before the end of the twelfth month following the close of the taxable year for which the credit may be claimed. Failure shall constitute a waiver of the right to claim the credit.

Defines "native plants" as any plants that are indigenous or endemic to Hawaii.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Taxable years beginning after December 31, 2022.

STAFF COMMENTS: The tax system is there to raise revenue to keep the government moving. Using the tax system to give taxpayers money to do things that lawmakers want them to do for social policy reasons merely throws the revenue raising system out of whack, making the system less than reliable as there is no way to determine how many taxpayers will avail themselves of the credit and in what amount.

Furthermore, tax credits are nothing more than the expenditure of public dollars, but out the back door. If, in fact, these dollars were subject to the appropriation process, would taxpayers be as generous about the expenditure of these funds when our kids are roasting in the public school classrooms, there isn't enough money for social service programs, or our state hospitals are on the verge of collapse?

The additional credit would require changes to tax forms and instructions, reprogramming, staff training, and other costs that could be massive compared to the amount that may be paid out in credits.
