**EOA's Position:** The Executive Office on Aging (EOA), an attached agency to the Department of Health, supports the intent of HB 278, HD1, Relating to Health, and provides the following comments.

Fiscal Implications: This measure requests an appropriation for FY 2023-2024 to the

Executive Office on Aging for an Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementias public health

campaign and for an Alzheimer's working group.

**Purpose and Justification:** The purpose of this measure is to establish and appropriate funds for a working group to plan and implement a public health campaign for Alzheimer's awareness. The working group will be comprised of the directors (or their designees) of Health, the Executive Office on Aging, the Alzheimer's Association and AARP. The public awareness campaign will educate the public about: 1) the early signs of cognitive impairment; 2) the value of early detection and diagnosis; and 3) discussing changes in memory and thinking with health care professionals. The working group will also provide a report of findings and recommendations to the Legislature no later than January 1, 2024.

While the Executive Office on Aging supports the intent of this measure, EOA has already established workgroups, with funding from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), to currently update and develop a new state plan on Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementias. The Alzheimer's Association and AARP are already represented in our state plan working group. Therefore, the proposed working group in this measure is not needed. Also any reports for EOA's special projects and initiatives are also incorporated into the annual report that EOA submits to the Legislature. Additionally, the updated state plan will include goals and activities in four CDC areas: 1) data; 2) workforce development; 3) program and policy and 4) **public awareness and education**. We acknowledge that the public awareness and education campaign in the new state plan will be much broader than the goals identified in HB278, HD1 however, these elements can be incorporated into the public awareness goal of the ADRD state plan.

Regarding an appropriation to implement a public health awareness campaign, we believe \$500,000 would be adequate.

**Recommendation**: EOA supports the intent of this measure provided that its enactment does not reduce or replace priorities with the Administration's budget request. Additionally, we feel that the purpose of the public health campaign can be incorporated into the new state plan for Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementias.

- (2) That the appropriation be approved for multiple fiscal years to maximize the Executive Office on Aging's flexibility in implementing the public health campaign in concert with efforts occurring in other states; and
- (3) That the bill be made to take effect on July 1, 2023.

I am Ron Shimabuku, Director of Public Policy and Advocacy for the Alzheimer's Association. We are testifying in <u>STRONG SUPPORT of House Bill No. 278 and offer</u> <u>amendments for your consideration</u>.

The Alzheimer's Association was established to assist those facing Alzheimer's disease and other dementias by providing local support groups and educational resources while advancing crucial research and public policy initiatives.

Alzheimer's disease is a public health crisis across the country. In Hawaii, approximately 29,000 individuals aged 65 and older live with Alzheimer's disease. By 2025, this figure is projected to increase by 20.7%. In addition, many are experiencing subjective cognitive decline — one of the earliest warning signs of future dementia. In 2020, 6.7% of individuals aged 45 and over reported increased confusion or worsening memory loss, putting them at risk of later developing dementia. More than two-thirds have not talked to their healthcare professional about it.

New FDA-approved therapies are here, and more are on the horizon, which may allow people more time to participate in daily activities, remain independent, and decide on the future of their health. These treatments are beneficial at the early onset of the disease; therefore, early detection and diagnosis are critical. Educating the community at large is paramount to prevention, health management, and equitable access to FDA-approved treatments that may prevent or delay disease.

The bill, as received by your Committee, would:

(1) Establish and appropriate funds for a working group to plan and implement a public health campaign for Alzheimer's awareness;

(2) Appropriate funds for an Alzheimer's disease and related dementias public health campaign; and

(3) Be made effective on June 30, 3000.

The Alzheimer's Association would like to provide the following comments respectfully:

- (1) In 2020, the Executive Office on Aging (EOA) received the Building Our Largest Dementia (BOLD) Infrastructure for Alzheimer's Program Award from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). This award led to the development of working groups to update the Hawaii 2025: State Plan on Alzheimer's Disease & Related Dementias (also referred to as the Hawaii State Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementias State Plan) established in 2013. One of the working groups centered on public awareness and education. <u>Therefore, it is our belief that a working group for the purposes of this bill</u> <u>is not needed as it would lead to overlapping efforts with the existing working group</u>.
- (2) We have obtained preliminary cost estimates from marketing and communication firms in Hawaii to conduct a public health campaign to educate our communities on the early signs of cognitive impairment, the value of early detection and diagnosis, and discuss changes in memory and thinking with health care professionals. These estimates range from \$555,000 to \$981,945. We ask for your consideration to appropriate \$1,000,000 and extend it for multiple fiscal years to allow EOA to complement this with the BOLD award.
- (3) This appropriation takes effect on July 1, 2023.

## With these amendments, the Alzheimer's Association strongly urges your favorable consideration of this bill.
