Aloha Chair Gates, Vice-Chair Kahaloa, and Members of the Committee:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai'i Farm Bureau supports HB 312, which replaces representatives from the sugar and pineapple industries with representatives of the coffee and diversified agriculture industries.

The Hawai'i Farm Bureau recognizes the desire to update the membership of the advisory committee on pesticides, given that both the sugar and pineapple industry acreage and crop values have dropped significantly.

We understand that this measure would substitute those industry representatives with members of two other agricultural industries; coffee and diversified agriculture, that each account for a substantial farm production value provided to the State.

Aloha Chair Gates, Vice Chair Kahaloa and Members of the Committee,

On behalf of the Hawai'i Alliance for Progressive Action (HAPA) I am submitting testimony in support of HB312, which replaces representatives from the sugar and pineapple industries with representatives of the coffee and diversified agriculture industries.

HAPA supports the inclusion of representatives from the coffee and diversified agriculture sectors and removal of sugar and pineapple representatives on the Advisory Committee on Pesticides, given the changes in agricultural landscape over the past few decades.

The sugar and pineapple industries have largely departed from the islands and have been replaced by diversified agriculture across the board. At the time of the advisory committee's establishment, the sugar and pineapple industries were major stakeholders in the State's agricultural sector. In 1980, Hawaii was home to fourteen sugar and four pineapple plantations that covered more than 300,000 acres. In 2017, these two crops accounted for less than 5,000 acres. According to a 2017 U.S. Department of Agriculture report, diversified agriculture accounted for over \$84 million in production while the coffee industry provided the State over \$43 million.

The advisory committee on pesticides has the important role of assisting the DOA with the development of the rules and how agriculture will be conducted in the islands. This role is important and needs to be properly represented by the current farming community.

Please support HB312.
