#### I. OVERVIEW OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

**DLIR** <u>supports</u> this measure provided it does not conflict with the priorities identified in the Governor's Executive Budget request. HB661 proposes to appropriate funds subject to a matching funds requirement for Health Care Provider Loan Repayment Program administered through the John A. Burns School of Medicine of the University of Hawaii at Manoa.

Reducing the tremendous burden of student debt will encourage more health professionals to continue working in underserved areas and thereby help reduce the pressing need for healthcare workers in those areas. HB 661 – RELATING TO LOAN REPAYMENT FOR HEALTH CARE PROFESSIONALS

Chair Belatti, Vice Chair Takenouchi, and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to present testimony today. The John A. Burns school of medicine (JABSOM) **strongly supports HB 661** which seeks funding for the Hawai'i State Loan Repayment Program administered by JABSOM in the amount of \$1,000,000 for fiscal years 2023-2024 and 2024-2025.

Since September 2012, the Hawai'i State Loan Repayment program has been operating successfully, and has supported 76 recipients in exchange for work commitments in underserved geographic practice areas in Hawai'i. Of the loan repayment participants, 80% have remained in Hawai'i to practice, and more than half have remained at the site where they performed their service. As of this date, there are 23 active providers in the Hawai'i State Loan Repayment program with another 9 providers applying for JABSOM's Innovative Loan Repayment Program, which is also administered by JABSOM and uses non-federal monies to match State funds to support other local healthcare providers who do not meet the federal guidelines but who still work in an area of need.

The Hawai'i State Loan Repayment program leverages public funds and private donations to access matching federal funds through the State Loan Repayment Program of the National Health Service Corps Branch of the United States Department of Health and Human Services. Currently, health care professionals who have benefited from the loan repayment program serve on all islands and in the communities of Waimea, Kihei, Waiʻanae, Hilo, and Wailuku; at health clinics in Kalihi-Pālama and Kokua Kalihi Valley; and in public institutional settings at the federal detention center in

Honolulu, the Hālawa correctional facility and the Maui County correctional center. Health care professionals who are eligible to participate in the program include physicians, nurse practitioners, psychologists, social workers, and many others.

Many Hawai'i residents are unable to obtain timely and appropriate health care due to shortages of primary and behavioral health care professionals in the State. These shortages not only threaten individual health, but also cumulatively affect the State's health care costs. Areas of Hawai'i that have been designated by the federal government as medically underserved have been most significantly affected by shortages of primary and behavioral health care professionals, such as physicians, nurse practitioners, physician assistants, and psychologists. Social workers, marriage and family therapists, and nurses are also urgently needed in these areas.

In many cases, the increasingly high cost of education for health care professionals binds graduates to a career path designed to repay often exorbitant student loans. These career paths most frequently lead to professional practice in highly specialized practice in urban areas rather than in general practice on the neighbor islands or in underserved areas of Oʻahu where the need is greatest. Furthermore, those states with robust primary health care systems have lower costs and improved patient outcomes. Recognizing this correlation, many states have made the policy decision to dedicate public funds to loan repayment programs to help develop a strong primary health care workforce for underserved areas.

An investment of State matching funds would enable JABSOM to draw as much federal money as possible and allow the program to provide loan repayment to more health care professionals in our ongoing efforts to alleviate the health care professional shortages in Hawai'i.

We request a minor, non-substantive amendment to page 2, line 12 by the insertion of the word "Branch" to reflect the correct name of the federal program that underwrites the Hawai'i State Loan Repayment Program:

"National Health Service Corps <u>Branch</u> State Loan Repayment Program of the United States Department of Health and Human Services".

Thank you for this opportunity to testify in support, provided that its passage does not replace or impact priorities as indicated in the University's Board of Regents Approved Executive Biennium Budget.

#### Hawaii Substance Abuse Coalition supports HB661

ALOHA CHAIR, VICE CHAIR AND DISTINGUISHED COMMITTEE MEMBERS. My name is Alan Johnson. I am the current chair of the Hawaii Substance Abuse Coalition (HSAC), a statewide organization for substance use disorder and co-occurring mental health disorder treatment and prevention agencies and recovery services.

There is a huge shortage of behavioral health workers, including psychiatrist, psychologists, nurses, and social workers. So much news about it, we hardly need to justify it. However, here is a report from HRSA:

By 2030, we project these changes in demand for behavioral health workers:<sup>1</sup>

3% increase in demand for adult psychiatrists (to 39,550)

1% decrease in demand for child & adolescent psychiatrists (to 9,190)

15% increase in demand for nurse practitioners (to 12,050)

8% increase in demand for physician assistants (to 1,670)

5% increase in demand for psychologists (to 95,600)

12% increase in demand for social workers (to 268,750)

9% increase in demand for marriage & family therapists (to 57,970)

15% increase in demand for addiction counselors (to 105,410)

13% increase in demand for mental health counselors (to 158,850)

3% increase in demand for school counselors (to 119,140)

This loan matching program would certainly help.

The Hawai'i State Center for Nursing provides testimony in support of this measure both for the intent of the measure and for full funding of this initiative.

The mission of the Hawai'i State Center for Nursing is that through collaborative partnerships, the Center provides accurate nursing workforce data for planning, disseminates nursing knowledge to support excellence in practice and leadership development, promotes a diverse workforce, and advocates for sound health policy to serve the changing health care needs of the people of Hawai'i.

Chair Belatti, Vice Chair Takenouchi, and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii Primary Care Association (HPCA) is a 501(c)(3) organization established to advocate for, expand access to, and sustain high quality care through the statewide network of Community Health Centers throughout the State of Hawaii. The HPCA <u>SUPPORTS</u> House Bill No. 0661, RELATING TO LOAN REPAYMENT FOR HEALTH CARE PROFESSIONALS.

By way of background, the HPCA represents Hawaii's Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs). FQHCs provide desperately needed medical services at the frontlines to over 150,000 patients each year who live in rural and underserved communities. Long considered champions for creating a more sustainable, integrated, and wellness-oriented system of health, FQHCs provide a more efficient, more effective and more comprehensive system of healthcare.

This bill, as received by your Committee, would appropriate \$1,000,000 in general funds for fiscal year 2023-2024, and \$1,000,000 for fiscal year 2024-2025, for the Hawaii State Loan Repayment Program so long as these funds are matched on a dollar-for-dollar basis by funds from a private or another public source. The funds would be expended by the John A. Burns School Medicine of the University of Hawaii at Manoa, and would take effect on July 1, 2023.

The State of Hawaii is experiencing a severe shortage of health care professionals in the workforce, especially in rural areas. Recent studies note that the current shortage of physicians is at 20% of the total full-time equivalent positions throughout the State. The shortage is especially severe in the fields of primary care, infectious diseases, colorectal surgery, pathology, general surgery, pulmonology, neurology, neurosurgery, orthopedic surgery, family medicine, cardiothoracic surgery, rheumatology, cardiology, hematology/oncology, and pediatric subspecialties of endocrinology, cardiology, neurology, hematology/oncology, and gastroenterology.

This bill would provide the resources to continue a financial incentive that enhances the quality and stock of Hawaii's future healthcare workforce. Accordingly we commend this effort and wish to participate in any and all discussions concerning workforce development.

Currently, Hawaii has a statewide physician shortage of 776 Full Time Equivalents (FTEs), as reported in the UH System Annual Report on Findings from the Hawai'i Physician Workforce Assessment Project. This deficit is 44 FTEs larger than one year ago. Since 2012, support from the Hawaii State Legislature in partnership with JABSOM, HMSA and Queens Medical Center through the State Loan Repayment Program has helped to recruit physicians to practice in Hawaii. HMA is grateful for the continued support of this financial assistance program, particularly for needed recruitment to counties like Hawaii and Maui, where provider shortages are as high as 40%. HMA also supports the expansion of this program to include incentives for psychologists and social workers.

It remains an important priority for Hawaii physicians to sustain quality healthcare in Hawaii and maintain the delivery of vital services to our underserved areas, particularly on the neighbor islands. The Loan Repayment Program must be sustained to support young physician trainees and improve our Hawaii physician workforce that remains critically low.

My name is Michael Robinson, and I am the Vice President of Government Relations & Community Affairs at Hawai'i Pacific Health. Hawai'i Pacific Health is a not-for-profit health care system comprised of its four medical centers – Kapi'olani, Pali Momi, Straub and Wilcox and over 70 locations statewide with a mission of creating a healthier Hawai'i.

HPH writes in SUPPORT of HB 661 which appropriates funds for the Hawaii State Loan Repayment program administered by the John A. Burns School of Medicine (JABSOM).

The continuation of the Hawaii State Loan Repayment program that supports payments of educational debt for primary care and behavioral health physicians, nurse practitioners, physician assistants, psychologists, social workers, licensed professional counselors, marriage and family therapists and certified nurse midwives who work for non-profit organizations in Health Professions Shortage Areas of Hawaii plays a vital role in addressing the shortage of healthcare professionals in the state. Hawaii has a shortage of almost 800 doctors, and almost all other types of primary care and behavioral healthcare workers. Without these healthcare providers, the people of Hawaii do not have access to the healthcare they need. The shortage is most acute for those on the neighbor islands and those with the least resources. One of the fastest and least expensive methods for recruiting providers is through loan repayment.

JABSOM has successfully administered the program which has supported 76 healthcare providers since the program began in 2012. To date, nearly 2/3 of those providers continue to work in medically underserved communities.

Chair Belatti, Vice Chair Takenouchi, and committee members, thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony on HB 661, which appropriates funds for the Loan Repayment Program for Health Care Professionals, provided that the funds are matched on a dollar-for-dollar basis by funds from a private or another public source.

#### Kaiser Permanente Hawai'i SUPPORTS HB 661.

Kaiser Permanente Hawai'i is one of the nation's largest not-for-profit health plans, serving 12.6 million members nationwide, and more than 269,000 members in Hawai'i. In Hawai'i, more than 4,200 dedicated employees and more than 650 Hawai'i Permanente Medical Group physicians and advance practice providers work in our integrated health system to provide our members coordinated care and coverage. Kaiser Permanente Hawai'i has more than 20+ medical facilities, including our award-winning Moanalua Medical Center. We continue to provide high-quality coordinated care for our members and deliver on our commitment to improve the health of our members and the 1.4 million people living in the communities we serve.

Our rural areas continue to be the most underserved populations in Hawaii. Therefore, we recommend inclusion of areas served by rural health clinics as part of underserved geographic areas. Hawai'i has a shortage of about 776 doctors, and almost all other types of primary care and behavioral healthcare workers. In 2022, approximately 60 physicians were found to have retired, 212 decreased their work hours, and 84 physicians left the state, further contributing to the physician shortage. Without these doctors and other healthcare providers, the people of Hawai'i do not have access to the healthcare they need. The shortage is most acute for those on neighbor islands and underserved areas served by rural health centers. The funding from this loan repayment program, will create opportunities directly in the state to recruit and retain our healthcare workforce.

We ask the committee to PASS HB 661. Mahalo for the opportunity to testify on this important measure.

Queen's appreciates the opportunity to provide testimony in **support** of HB661, which appropriates funds for the Hawaii state loan repayment program administered through the John A. Burns School of Medicine; provided that the funds are matched on a dollar-for-dollar basis by a private or another public source.

We support efforts to develop our healthcare workforce given the projected shortage in our state. The 2022 Hawai'i Physician Workforce Assessment estimated the current shortage for physicians to be over 700. Dear Chair Belatti and HLT Hse Committee Members:

I am writing to express my strong support for HB661. As President of the Hawaii chapter of the American Physical Therapy Association (APTA-HI), and as a physical therapist myself, I understand firsthand the financial burden that comes with pursuing an education in this field. The cost of education has risen dramatically in recent years, and many physical therapists are left with significant student loan debt upon graduation. This amount of debt is on par with what is expected for our other colleagues that are physician's, dentists, and other doctoral level healthcare providers.

Physical therapy is a critical healthcare profession that helps people of all ages and abilities to recover from injuries, manage chronic conditions, and improve their quality of life. Yet, the cost of education often prevents people from pursuing this career path, particularly those from underprivileged or rural communities.

By providing loan reimbursements for physical therapists, we can help to alleviate the financial burden of pursuing an education in this field. This will not only make it easier for aspiring physical therapists in Hawaii to enter the workforce but also help to ensure that we have a robust and diverse workforce of physical therapists staying in this state. Due to the parallels a physical therapist has to an autonomous healthcare provider, the term physical therapist should be added to this bill to better suit this state's constituents. Having the state's very first Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT) program at Hawaii Pacific University, just walking distance from JABSOM, further solidifies the need to be inclusive of physical therapists with benefits other healthcare provider colleagues enjoy.

Furthermore, providing loan reimbursements for physical therapists can help to address the shortage of physical therapists and quality healthcare providers in Hawaii. Many physical therapists are deterred from returning or staying home to work in Hawaii due to the high cost of living coupled with the unreasonable amount of debt-to-income ratio that is not equivalent to our aforementioned colleagues. By offering loan reimbursements, we can incentivize physical therapists to work in these underserved rural areas and improve access to care for patients who need it most.

Comments for H.B. No. 661, Relating to Loan Repayment for Health Care Professionals

February 15, 2023

Aloha Representatives Belatti and Takenouchi,

I am providing testimony regarding H.B 661 with a recommendation to expand the list of health care professionals who can benefit from loan repayment to include the rehabilitation professions of physical and occupational therapy and speech/language pathologists.

I serve as the Interim Dean of the College of Health and Society (CHS) at Hawai'i Pacific University (HPU). The CHS includes Hawai'i's first and only Doctor of Physical Therapy, Doctor of Occupational Therapy, and Master of Physician Assistant Studies programs. Graduates of these programs will help meet the health and rehabilitation needs of the residents of Hawai'i. However, the cost of living and debt burden can be too great for many of these graduates to continue to live and work in Hawai'i.

Appropriating funds to the department of health to fund the Hawai'i state loan repayment program to provide loan repayment to health care professionals who commit to work in federally designated health professional shortage areas in Hawai'i will help build the much-needed workforce in the areas of primary care. I support this effort and encourage the sponsors of this bill to go further to include other health professionals such as physical therapists (PTs), physical therapist assistants (PTAs), occupational therapists (OTs), certified occupational therapist assistants (COTAs) and speech language pathologists (SLPs).

The 2022 Healthcare Workforce Initiative Report from the Healthcare Association of Hawai`i lists health professions with 30 or more open positions. There is a dire need for primary care health professionals such as physicians, nurses, and physician assistants and behavioral health professionals such as social workers and therapists. But according to this report, there is also a need for *rehabilitation* health professionals, such as PTs, PTAs, OTs, COTAs, and SLPs. Rehabilitation therapists are essential members of the healthcare team. Residents of Hawai`i deserve the care they need to successfully return to work, to live healthy lives, and to participate in the activities that are important to them, their families, and the community.

I fully support H.B 661 with an expansion of these efforts to include PTs, PTAs, OTs, COTAs, and SLPs.
