The Hawaii State Department of Education (Department) supports HB 0069 and offers comments on this measure.

The Resources for Enrichment, Athletics/Academics, Culture, and Health (REACH) program provides valuable out-of-school time opportunities to middle and intermediate public school students at no cost to their families. For school year 2022-23, 42 public and charter middle and intermediate schools have received funding to implement its REACH program, which has steadily increased since school year 2018-19. This increased interest in out-of-school time programming and support for all 87 middle and intermediate schools far exceeds the current \$500,000 allocation for REACH.
