Title of Bill: HB 0828, HD1 RELATING TO STUDENT TRANSPORTATION.

Purpose of Bill: Requires the department of education to establish a student bus fare rate system to include free bus passes for students whose household qualifies the student for free or reduced price lunch under the free and reduced price lunch program. Appropriates funds. Effective 6/30/3000. (HD1)

Department's Position:

The Hawaii State Department of Education (Department) provides comments and raises some concerns relating to HB 828, HD1. The Department supports the goal to provide free bus passes for students whose household qualifies for free or reduced lunch under the free and reduced price lunch program.

One concern is due to the limited resources, the timing of reviewing and processing the applications, approvals, and distribution of passes may be delayed. Streamlining and automating the information in one central system may alleviate some of these issues.

The Department is appreciative of an appropriation in this measure provided it does not adversely affect the priorities in the Department's Board of Education approved budget.

Dear Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Kitagawa, and Committee Members,

On behalf of HCAN Speaks!, I am writing in **SUPPORT of HB 828, HD1.** This bill requires the department of education (DOE) to establish a student bus fare rate system to include free bus passes for students whose household qualifies the student for free or reduced price lunch under the free and reduced price lunch program.

Currently, DOE students who qualify for free lunch in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) – their families earn up to 130% of the federal poverty level (FPL) – are eligible for free bus passes. However, those that qualify for reduced-price lunch – between 130% and 185% of the FPL – are NOT.

Teri Keliipuleole Jasmine Slovak Erica Yamauchi Especially with the FPL underestimating the true extent of poverty in Hawaii,¹ reducedprice lunch students and their families are not able to afford the basics. While the income eligibility limit for reduced-price lunch is about \$59,000 for a family of four,² the "bare-minimum costs of basic necessities" for that same family is more than \$100,000, according to the *ALICE in Hawai'i* report.³

In other words, a single mom with two children who makes \$35,000 a year qualifies for reduced-price school meals, but currently she must pay \$72 per quarter per child for bus passes, or \$576 per school year. That is a major expense for a family that is already struggling to make ends meet.

The pandemic has exacerbated a long-standing problem of chronic absenteeism among DOE students.⁴ Those absences have been concentrated in rural areas and among historically marginalized populations.⁵ Not surprisingly, research shows that access to school bus rides helps vulnerable student populations reduce their absences.⁶

HOUSE BILL 828, HD 1, RELATING TO STUDENT TRANSPORTATION

FEBRUARY 23, 2023 · HOUSE FINANCE COMMITTEE · CHAIR REP. KYLE YAMASHITA

POSITION: Support.

RATIONALE: The Democratic Party of Hawai'i Education Caucus <u>supports</u> HB 828, HD 1, relating to student transportation, which requires the department of education to establish a student bus fare rate system to include free bus passes for students whose household qualifies the student for free or reduced price lunch under the free and reduced price lunch program.

Currently, the Hawai'i Department of Education provides regular bus service to meet school transportation requirements and ensure adequate attendance for children. According to HIDOE, an average of 35,090 regular education students ride the bus each day, along with 3,359 special education students. Bus service is essential for students who lack other transportation options, especially those who live in remote communities or face financial hardship.

To qualify for regular bus service, students in grades kindergarten through five must reside a mile or more, and students in grades six through twelve must reside 1.5 miles or more, from the school within their geographic area in which they are enrolled. Students who qualify for bus service may receive a free bus pass if they meet eligibility requirements or pay \$36.00 for quarterly one-way trips, \$72.00 for quarterly round trips, or \$10.00 for ten coupons. A student who qualifies for *free* lunch under the free and reduced-price lunch program is eligible for a free bus pass. <u>Yet, free</u> bus passes are not given to students who qualify for *reduced* price lunch.

Since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, bus service has become a tremendous challenge for remote communities. On Hawai'i Island, for instance, bus routes have been routinely cancelled because of a lack of drivers in areas that are already exceedingly large and that require lengthy travel times for students—in some cases, students must travel over 1.5 hours to reach their schools. These areas also tend to be some of the most impoverished districts in our state.

Families of students at Ka'u High School and Pahala Elementary (one campus), for instance, have a median annual income of \$39,751, less than half of the state average of \$83,173 for families of public school students. According to the most recent STRIVE HI report, 63 percent of students at Ka'u High and Pahala Elementary missed fifteen or more school days. <u>This data</u> <u>shows the strong correlation between poverty and chronic absenteeism, a problem that is</u> <u>exacerbated by the lack of affordable transportation options for working families.</u> Passage of this measure would assist many impoverished families in obtaining transportation for their keiki and, thus, reduce the chronic absenteeism that prevents children from reaching their full potential.
